## Recycling Continues

Leaders from the Village and four surrounding townships will meet to discuss the future of recycling in the area. The Recycling Committee, formed two months ago, will present a draft plan to expand recycling opportunities in our community.

The meeting will be held on June 6, 7:30 p.m., at the

Manchester Village Office. Interested persons are welcome to attend.

Educational efforts will be an important aspect in developing a successful program and will also be addressed by the committee. Plans are already being made to have an informational booth at the Community Fair this summer.

Currently the Village of Manchester and the townships of Bridgewater, Freedom, Manchester and Sharon are funding the recycling bin which is located at Walco Foods in Manchester. Use of the bin is increasing.

The recycling bin will be staffed on Saturdays during the summer starting June 9. An informational flyer will be available describing proper material preparation which cuts the costs of servicing the bin.

The goal of the Recycling Committee is to find an economically feasible way to increase recycling and reduce the amount of solid waste going into limited landfill space.

## Water Hydrant Testing June 7

Thursday, June 7, village fire hydrants will be tested to measure water pressure. This flow testing sometimes causes iron deposits to break loose and flow along with the water. This does not affect the healthfulness of the drinking water, but it may cause water to be "rusty" for short periods of time.

Because of this, village residents are advised not to do laundry on Thursday or early Friday morning.

We apologize for the inconvenience, but flow testing is necessary in the interest of public safety and for re-certification of fire protection rating.

## Village Tax Rate Lowered

The tax rates for village property on this year's tax roll will drop this year.

The tax levy for general operations, highways, parks, and water has been reduced from 14.31 mills to 12.7859 mills.

The tax levy for debt service on bonds, approved by the voters for the new wastewater treatment plant and for sewer projects, has been reduced from 5.33 mills to 4.6 mills.

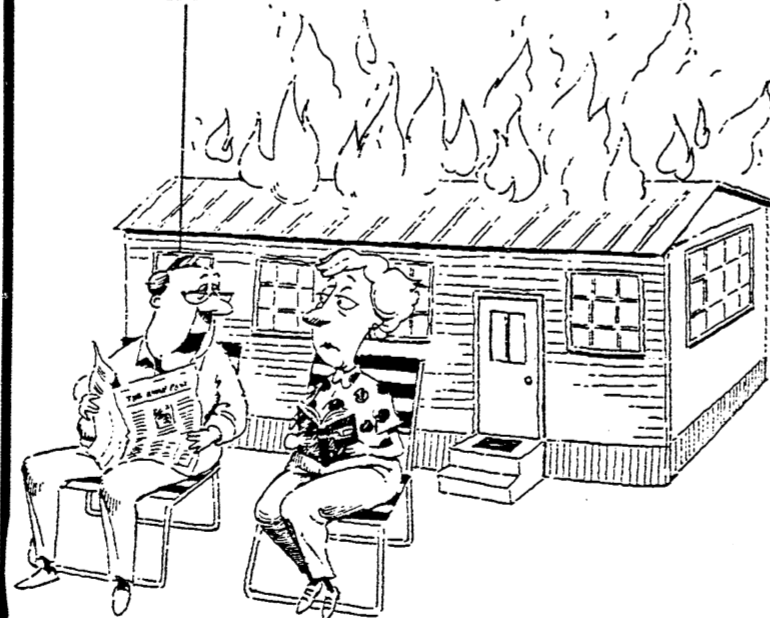

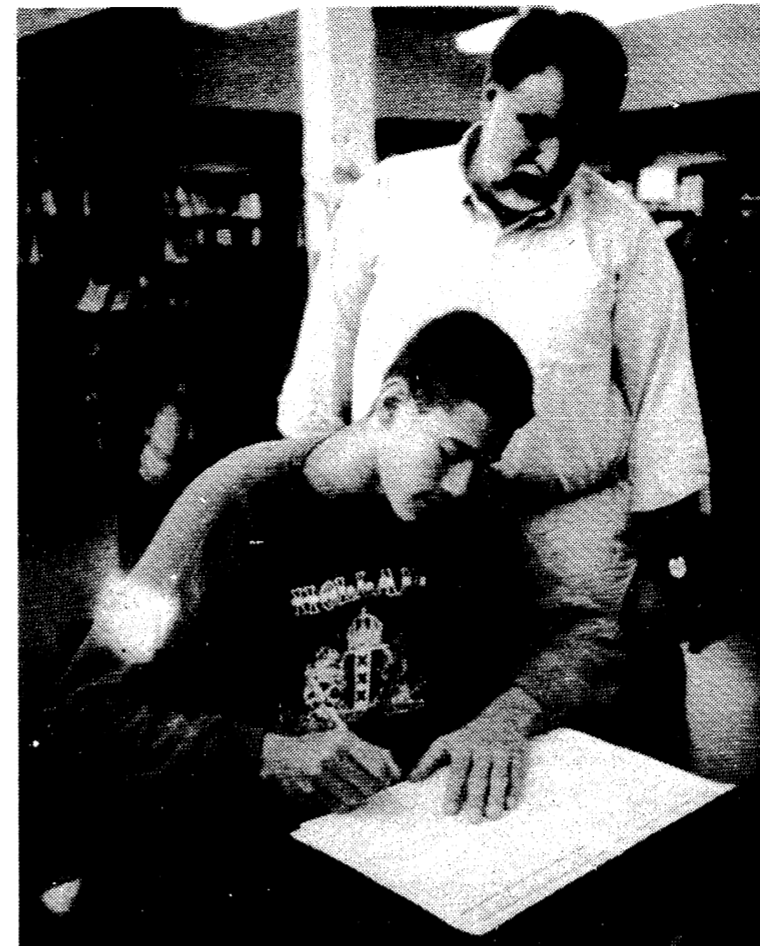

Matt Knul, 6'8" senior forward for Manchester High School, has signed a National Letter of Intent with the University of Northern Colorado. He is the son of Aric and Sonja Knul of Manchester. Matt was an All-League selection in both his junior and senior years in the Cascade Blue division. This past season, he led the team in rebounding (14), blocked shots (6), and was second in scoring (17) averages.

Northern Colorado is a Division II school of about 10,000 students located in Greeley, Colorado. They play in a ten-team conference (North Central Intercollegiate Athletic Conference), with such teams as Morningside and the Universities of North and South Dakota. The Bears won the North Central Conference title with a 24-6 mark and advanced to the NCAA Division II playoffs in 1989. They finished in 3rd place in 1990.

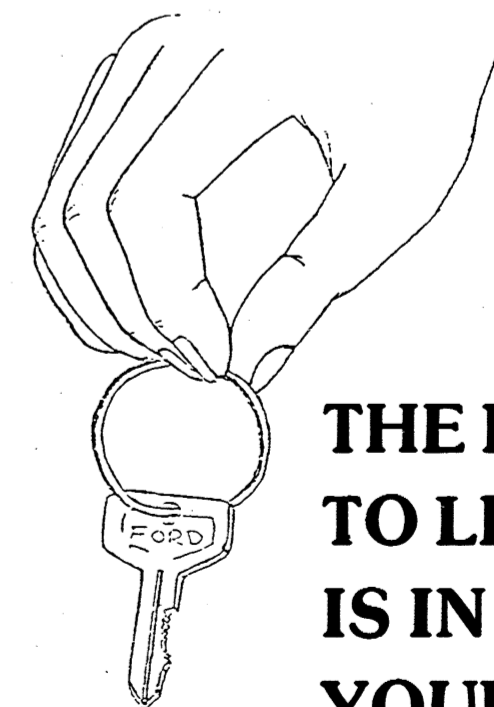

## S.O.S.

The universal SOS distress signal is now being used in a unique program to alert teen drivers to the dangers of drinking and driving. The Labor Council Fraternal Order of Police (F.O.P.) has announced the launching of a statewide bumper sticker and poster campaign directed to all of Michigan's Junior and Senior High Schools, both public and private. The program is entitled, "S.O.S. - Students on Sobriety."

Statistics indicate that 22 percent of all fatal accidents involving teen drivers, aged 16 to 20, were alcohol related," said Labor Council Director Richard Weiler, a former Detroit police officer. "Nationally, 11 teenagers die of alcohol related accidents each and every day."

The four-color anti-drinking poster depicts students visiting a gravesite with the caption "Meeting a Classmate?" The poster further implores, "Don't let drunk driving kill a friendship."

An introductory supply of posters and bumper stickers has been distributed to all 1,700 junior and senior high schools, statewide, with an offer to each

principal from the F.O.P. to provide additional posters and bumper stickers if they would like to expand the program for their students.

More than a dozen requests have already been received from schools. Several "Students Against Drunk Driving" (SAAD) chapters have indicated an interest in developing a program using the visual materials.

The statewide Michigan Fraternal Order of Police is probably best remembered for its popular and successful "Kids Don't Go With Strangers" program, which distributed recordings, coloring books and a bumper sticker throughout the state. The program, dealing with child abductions, was directed to children in kindergarten through the fourth grade.

"Just as the Michigan F.O.P. has worked with youngsters in the past, we find that we also need to direct our efforts, as a police organization, to the problems associated with our teens, namely that of drinking and driving," said Weiler. "Our goal is, very simply, to keep teenagers

aware, through this visual program, of the hazards of drinking alcoholic beverages, especially while driving an automobile.

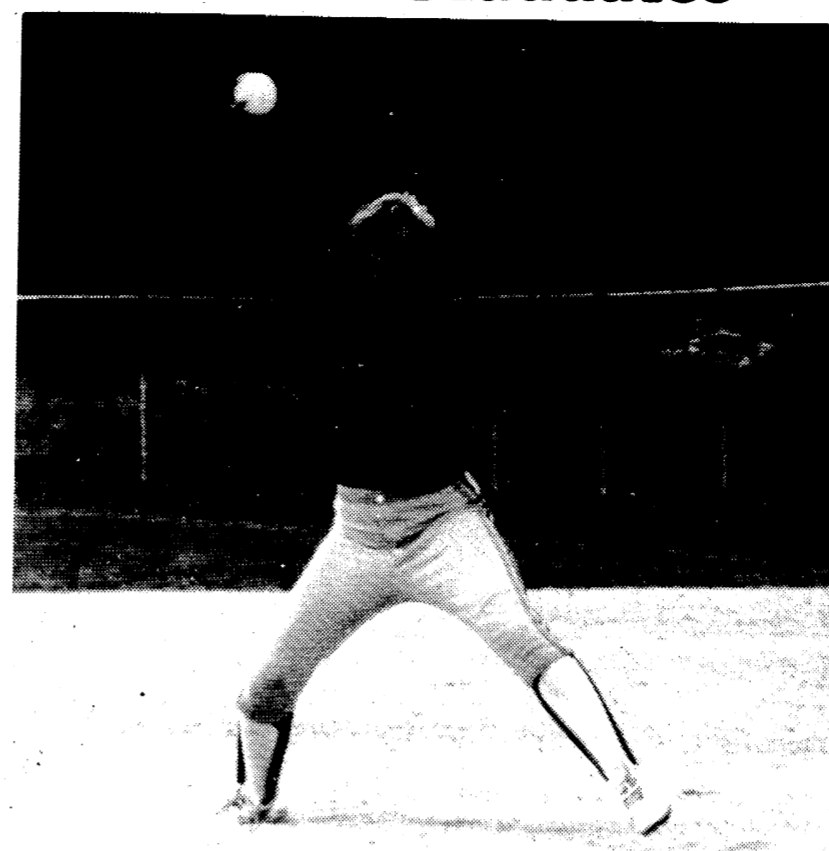

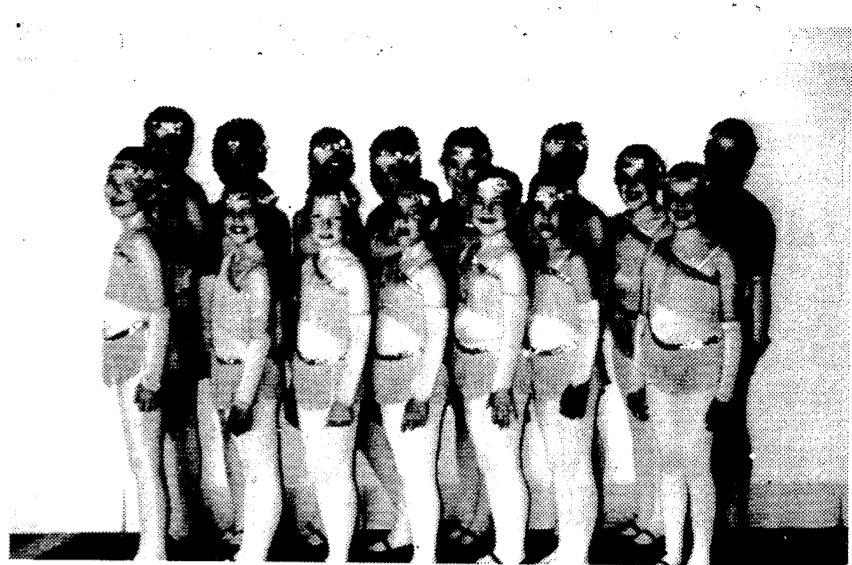

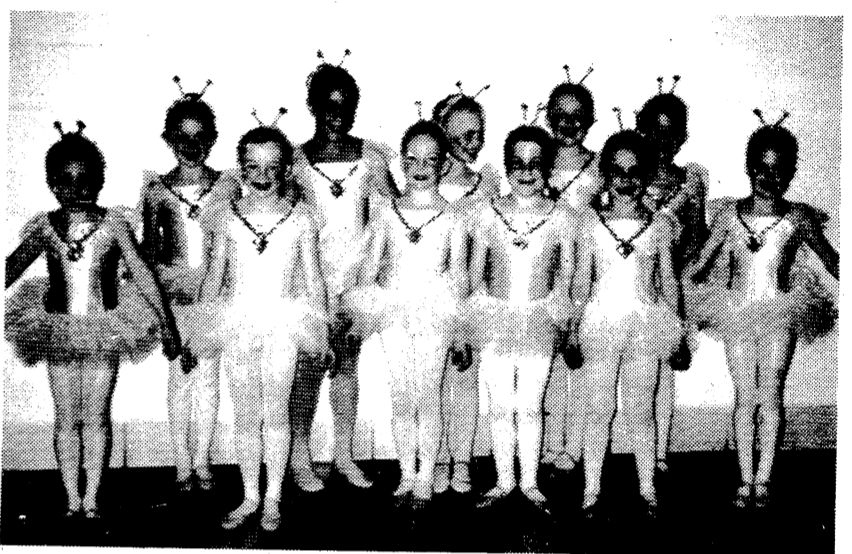

**SOME FINANCIAL TIPS TO HELP YOU PLAN FOR YOUR NEXT VACATION**

Whether your dream vacation is trekking in Nepal, visiting Buckingham Palace or backpacking in Vermont, the Michigan Association of CPAs suggests that you plan your vacation with some financial realities in mind.

### Planning a Trip

To get an idea of the types of discount vacation packages available and their costs, begin by looking at the Sunday travel section of your newspaper. There you'll find a list of some of the current tour packages in the U.S. and abroad, including airfare and accommodations.

If you have the time and patience, you can plan a vacation on your own and even save some money by doing so. But, be prepared to spend hours on the phone to shop around for the best deals. Travel guides, which list hotel rates, restaurant prices and the cost of local tourist attractions, can help steer you to or away from a particular locale. And the airlines will be happy to quote you their discount fares depending on the length of your trip.

For those of you who do not want to make the necessary

number of phone calls to plan your trip, or are even uncertain about your destination, it's a good idea to use a travel agent. They have access to the latest tour packages and updated airline fares and hotel costs.

### Paying For Your Trip

To take the bite out of vacation expenses, try to spread the cost over an entire year by including a travel line in your monthly budget. For example, if you want to visit Hawaii next summer and expect the trip to cost \$3,000, you can pay for the trip in full by setting aside \$250 a month. If you cannot afford to save that much money, try to save as much as you can to offset the vacation's overall cost. Other options are choosing a less expensive trip or taking less frequent vacations.

Of course, saving for next summer's trip will not help you right now. If your heart is set on a vacation that you cannot pay for in cash, you have a few options. You may be able to take out a personal loan, for example, or draw on a home equity credit line. In general, CPAs advise against applying for costly loans for such fleeting pleasures as a Caribbean cruise. A better choice would be charging the vacation to a credit card that charges a low interest rate. In either case, make a

commitment to repay the debt as soon as possible. Remember, interest on consumer debt is only 10 percent deductible in 1990.

### Insurance Considerations

Before you fly off to distant lands or simply venture down to the shore for two weeks, review your homeowner's or renter's policy with your insurance agent and make sure that it will protect your home and your possessions against vandalism or theft while you are traveling. In addition, be sure you have an up-to-date inventory and photographs of your valuables and your household possessions. You may also want to consider putting valuable jewelry and papers in a safe deposit box if your trip will last longer than a few days.

The other insurance option you may need to consider is flight and car rental insurance. You can purchase flight insurance through a travel agent or tour operator to protect you from lost or stolen luggage or trip cancellation. But before you buy extra insurance, check your regular health and homeowner's or renter's policies which may provide adequate flight insurance. In addition, you should find out whether any of your credit cards or your own automobile insurance policy cover car rentals or related travel insurance.

Find out, for example, if any of your Certificates of Deposit (CDs) or Individual Retirement Accounts (IRAs) will mature while you are away. If so, without specific instructions from you, most banks will automatically roll the funds over into another account of its own choosing. To avoid this scenario, leave instructions with an officer at the bank on how the money should be reinvested.

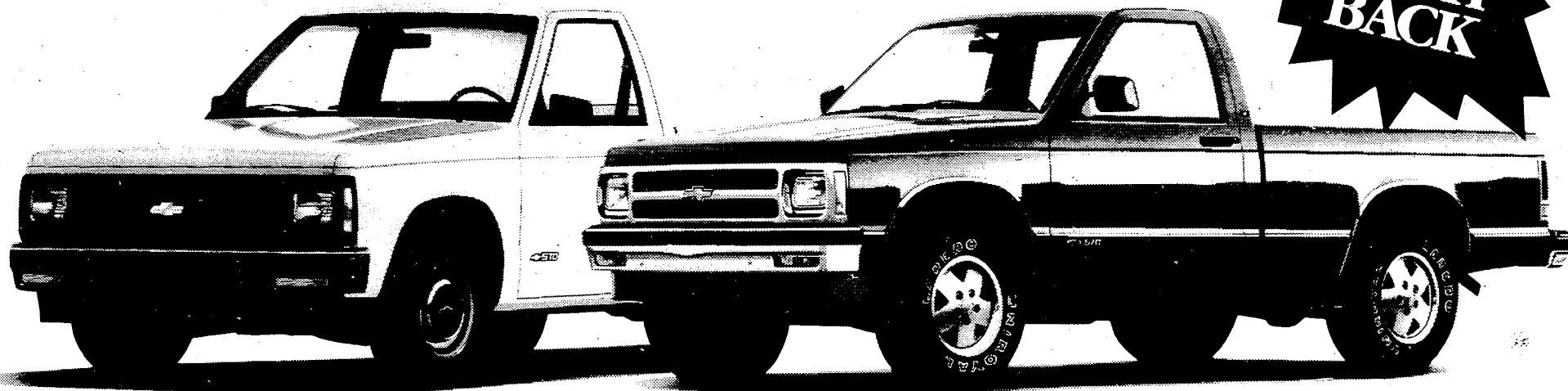
