Advertising Talks

The Manchester Enterprise March 16, 1911

Reader and Merchant; Both Derive Great Benefit Through Advertising - Some Points to Write About

The purpose of advertising is to sell something. Before writing your ads get this idea firmly fixed and don't forget it while you are writing. Don't try to make your ad a literary gem; don't use your space for typographical decorations; don't try to tell the people everything you have in your store in one ad; don't use a lot of shop-worn technical terms that may be plain enough to you but Greek to the general public.

Use plain, everyday language, which everybody can understand. If your article is one not in general use, make your ad educational in its nature. Tell them how the article is made or constructed and to what use it can be put. If it will save time, tell the people how; if it will make labor easier, tell them why; give them a good description and then tell them the price. If the price is less than usual, be sure and tell them why the reduction in price is made. No matter how much

information you may use in your ad, remember always the main point: the purpose of advertising is to sell something.

Don't try to advertise everything you have in your store in one ad. It is better to advertise one article effectively than it is to advertise a dozen ineffectively. And be sure that what you are advertising is in season. Change your copy so as to keep your ad live and up-to-date. Advertising space is valuable, but you cannot get better publicity, or make a better investment than the purchase of space in a wide-awake paper of big circulation and then using this space to the very best advantage.

Advertise judiciously. You have the goods that the people need. You want to sell and they want to buy, and the advertising columns of your paper is where you want to tell them about your goods and they will read your ad, for they are anxious to know where they can buy at the greatest saving.

A Special Board of Education work session was set for Monday, July 23, 1990 at 7:45 p.m. to develop Board goals and act on personnel matters.





MARCC steering committee members met recently with Tom Walton and mobile home park developers Lou Ciotti and Ken Monicatti to express support for sparing the trees.

The developers left the meeting with MARCC to attend a meeting with Mayor Mary Kallewaard. They asked her to allow an increase in the size of the mobile home park from 116 to 160 lots as the price for saving the trees. The developers say allowing them to have 160 lots is the fair way to compensate for the costs involved: They have to buy the property on which the trees stand, but agree not to develop it, and the site plan will have to be

If forced to limit the park to 116 lots, the developers will keep the site plan they have now, which means destroying the trees. But the developers told MARCC members they will approach council in the future to ask for additional acreage to be rezoned for expansion of the mobile home

The developers point out that they will eventually get the additional units they want, but the trees will already be gone. Tom Walton says if they're going to get more land and more trailers in the future anyway, why not give it to them now and save the trees?





> Although moving may seem an unwelcome prospect, weigh all the pros and cons before dismissing the idea. When contemplating the possibility of relocation, review all the financial implications of such factors as state income tax rates, utility costs, property tax and even climate. In addition, find out if the community offers retired individuals discounts on transportation, heating oil, property taxes or entertainment.

Another way to stretch your fixed income is by being aware of - and planning to minimize - your tax liability. Retiring usually results in substantially lower income and, thus, lower tax rates. But don't forget that pension income and IRA withdrawals are taxable. Take out too much money in one year, and you may end up paying more taxes than you anticipated.


