Manchester Township Looks Toward the Public Hearing

Master Plan Nearly Completed

The Manchester Township Planning Commission met Monday evening for its final time before pulling all the pieces together and presenting the new General Development Plan to the Washtenaw County Planning Commission next week and then to the Manchester community at a public hearing on May 20.

The topic for last Monday's meeting was "Finalize Township/ Village Boundary Land Use Policy," but the discussion keyed off a list of "Planned Land Use Categories—Definitions."

A printed handout, provided by Brian Fleer, consultant to the Manchester Township Planning Commission, listed eleven types of land use.

Some differed from current land use designations, e.g. commercial designations.

The new definitions show two types of commercial: commercial/ office (roughly corresponding to

the old general commercial) and limited commercial (similar to the old local commercial).

The changes are subtle, but it is often subtleties that make up the case for appropriateness or inappropriateness of land use requests.

For instance, there was proposed in the handout a new land use category called "Extraction." This was defined as: "Planned areas designated for the extraction and/ or removal of soil including topsoil. sand, gravel, stone and/or other earth materials for the purpose of disposition away from the premises." In other words, a gravel pit.

Previously, gravel pits operated under conditional use permits on property with other zoning designations such as residential or industrial. In discussing a new Master Plan, the Planning Commission had considered specifying gravel pits as a permitted use under industrial zoning. But, as consultant Brian Fleer explained Monday night, with that designation, "When the extraction is completed, the land could

go to other industrial uses. With this designation, that would not happen. A gravel pit will be a

The "Employment Zone" designation around the Village continued to be discussed. According to the new definition, "this land use category emphasizes 'general industrial' activity with a complimentary mix of commercial/office uses to encourage self-sufficiency of the employment zone by permitting the provisions of commercial/office support services to meet the needs of businesses and employees within the employment zone, but not intended to serve the general public. The 'employment zone' is intended to be designed in such a way so as to serve as a transition or buffer zone between existing industrial activity and the adjoining residential community.'

The area so designated on the proposed General Development map is on M-52 south of E. Austin, on both sides of the road. At the







Manchester Scientist Honored

Dr. Clark G. Spike, EMU Professor Emeritus of Chemistry and resident of the Manchester community, will receive the 1991 Dr. John W. Porter Distinguished Service Award, named for former President Porter who served from 1979 ю 1989.

Spike, a 1944 graduate of EMU, joined EMU's chemistry faculty in 1958 after serving six years as a research chemist with Ethyl Corp. on the development of fuel additives. He was named **EMU Chemistry Department** Head in 1961 and served in that leadership role until he was named interim dean of the College of Arts and Sciences in 1977. He became acting associate vice president for academic affairs in 1979 and returned to teaching full time in 1980. Upon his retirement in 1983, Spike received emeritus professor status from the Board of Regents and continued to teach part time at EMU until

He also worked as a chemist on World War II's super secret Manhattan Project in 1944-45 and was a teaching fellow at the University of Michigan from 1948 to 1952, where he earned a master's



degree and doctorate in chemistry. He is a member of the American Chemical Society, past president of the Michigan College Chemistry Teachers Association, and a member of the Ypsilanti/ EMU Forum, His biography appears in Who's Who in America. With his wife, Avis, he is active in Manchester's Emanuel Church and 20th Century bridge groups.

Many people come back year after year on the 3rd Sunday of May to enter the race again. We collected money through different projects and accepted donations of cookies and rolls.' This year, the project was


chaired by Margaret Goodrich and Sally Anderson. It is the women of the church who put together this project, although the men help

Village Councilman **Attacks Dam Owner**

At last night's meeting, Village Councilman Kwolek verbally attacked Don Limpert, owner of the ates, Inc., who inspected the Vil-Mill and Millpond. Kwolek de-manded that Limpert furnish the Village a safety report on the Millpond dam. According to Kwolek, the engineer inspecting the Main Street bridge for the Village claimed the dam could endanger of the Village Sewer Separation the structural integrity of the piers and abutments of the bridge. Further, stated Kwolek, the swirling waters could create a scouring action and cause collapse of the bridge.

Glen Burkhardt offered that the control of dam inspections was under the jurisdiction of DNR. Limpert invited the Village to conduct their own inspection if objectives of the design and conthey were dissatisfied.

The attack on Limpert appears to be motivated by other undis-

closed reasons. The letter from Spalding, DeDecker and Associlage bridges, April 18, 1991, does not specifically point to any of Kwolek's concerns in their report.

In other reports, Glen S. Burkhardt, of McNamee, Porter and Seely, reported upon the progress Project. The work as of April 25th was 8% completed and going very well. Springs were uncovered in Schaffer Ct. necessitating the use of perforated drain tile to dry the subsurface before the road could be paved. A monitoring system is being set up at the corner of Schaffer Ct. and Territorial to observe if the struction are being met.
