## Rolling into May

### Manchester Township Looks Toward the Public Hearing Master Plan Nearly Completed

The Manchester Township Planning Commission met Monday evening for its final time before pulling all the pieces together and presenting the new General Development Plan to the Washtenaw County Planning Commission next week and then to the Manchester community at a public hearing on May 20.

The topic for last Monday's meeting was "Finalize Township/Village Boundary Land Use Policy," but the discussion keyed off a list of "Planned Land Use Categories—Definitions."

A printed handout, provided by Brian Fleer, consultant to the Manchester Township Planning Commission, listed eleven types of land use.

Some differed from current land use designations, e.g. commercial designations.

The new definitions show two types of commercial: commercial/office (roughly corresponding to

the old general commercial) and limited commercial (similar to the old local commercial).

The changes are subtle, but it is often subtleties that make up the case for appropriateness or inappropriateness of land use requests.

For instance, there was proposed in the handout a new land use category called "Extraction." This was defined as: "Planned areas designated for the extraction and/or removal of soil including topsoil, sand, gravel, stone and/or other earth materials for the purpose of disposition away from the premises." In other words, a gravel pit.

Previously, gravel pits operated under conditional use permits on property with other zoning designations such as residential or industrial. In discussing a new Master Plan, the Planning Commission had considered specifying gravel pits as a permitted use under industrial zoning.

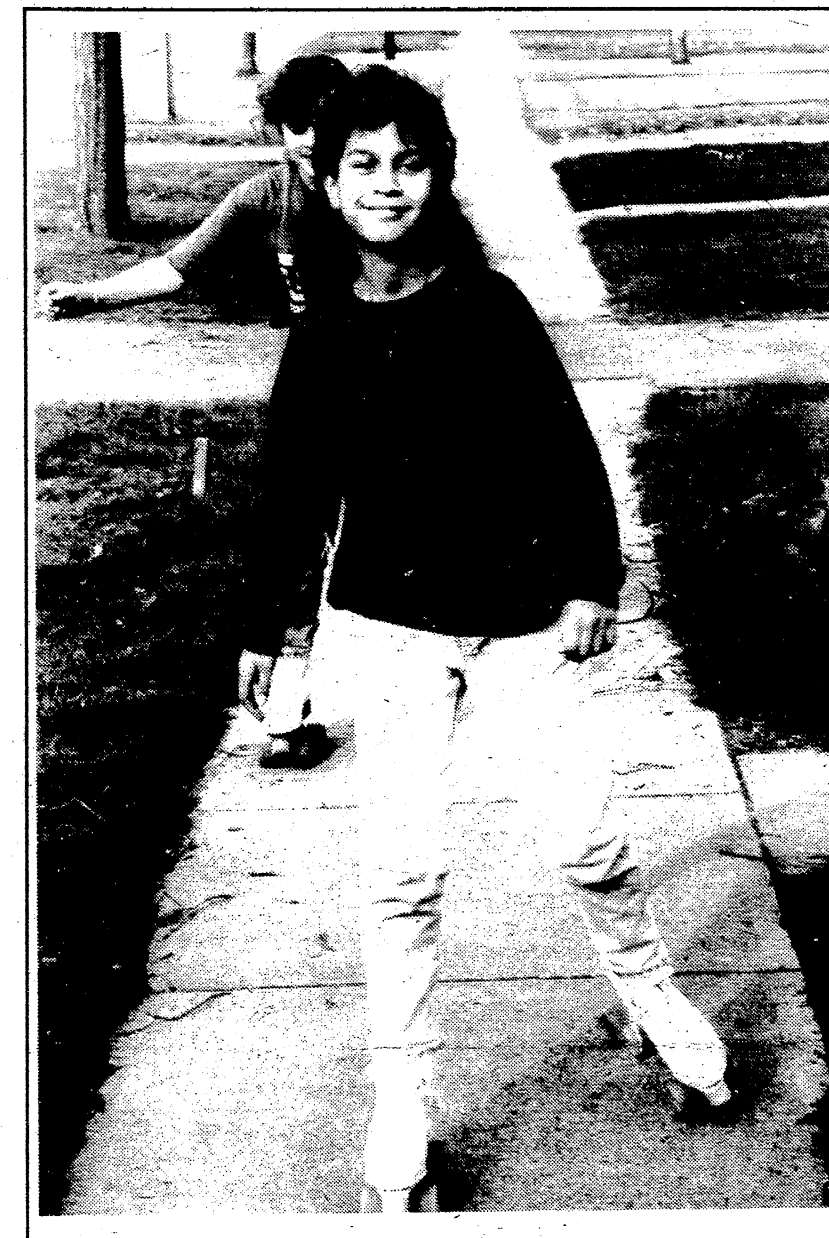
But, as consultant Brian Fleer explained Monday night, with that designation, "When the extraction is completed, the land could

go to other industrial uses. With this designation, that would not happen. A gravel pit will be a planned area."

The "Employment Zone" designation around the Village continued to be discussed. According to the new definition, "this land use category emphasizes 'general industrial' activity with a complimentary mix of commercial/office uses to encourage self-sufficiency of the employment zone by permitting the provisions of commercial/office support services to meet the needs of businesses and employees within the employment zone, but not intended to serve the general public. The 'employment zone' is intended to be designed in such a way so as to serve as a transition or buffer zone between existing industrial activity and the adjoining residential community."

The area so designated on the proposed General Development map is on M-52 south of E. Austin, on both sides of the road. At the

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The following letter is reprinted here for reference with respect to the letter from Paul Kluewe on page 3. Please see page three first.

Dear Janet,  
Thank you, Janet, for showing me Mr. Kluewe's 4/4/91 letter and allowing me to respond.

First, please accept my apology to you, the editor, for the quality of my "rip-off" page. I wasn't trying to "tear apart" Mr. Kluewe's efforts. I'm sorry it left a "ragged edge".

The "rip-off" page was given to me by Mr. Kluewe in response to my board meeting question about student movement "between schools". My question was addressed by Mr. Niedzwiecki. What I got from the superintendent's answer was that procedures are fundamentally similar for either inward or outward movement throughout the state. Tuition and release are required. The single "rip-off" page described incoming admissions, not the whole policy, and not the whole process that Mr. Niedzwiecki was talking about. In my son's case, the arrangements were claimed to have been made through two superintendents. No tuition. No release. No board action claimed. I am not positive about the school's policies, but it still seems to me that they're not always followed. I don't think Mr. Kluewe's letter accurately represents the "policy in question".

The superintendent didn't claim that ANY policy was always followed. Mr. Kluewe's letter makes no actual claim that ANY policy was always followed. Policies don't have to be followed. I think the issues here are honesty, ethics, education, credibility, procedure, co-operation, humane treatment of students, accuracy, and some kind of action.

Mr. Kluewe has publicly introduced my son into this, regarding a long telephone conversation between Mr. Kluewe and myself, that I will not comment on. It's too easy to warp, and too difficult to prove. Let's get accurate.

State citations for school district violations of code (1979 AACCS 340.1701) involving my son were issued in three of the four years that Mr. Kluewe was a board member. As an example, one of these citations (case C-2132-88) was issued for the distribution of inaccurate "DUE PROCESS HEARING" information. These citations had nothing to do with Mr. Kluewe, the newspaper, nor with board meetings. My point is: School personnel have been inaccurate and uncooperative often. Did those two board members approach the newspaper because they were concerned about inaccuracy, or was it because they thought my article was a threat to their "IMAGE"?

I thought Mr. Kluewe's comments on "biteness" were in "bad taste". (Sorry, Janet.) Parents who experience difficulty with school administrators are often labeled as bitter, or school-baiters, or anti-education. Giving parents an "ignore" label takes much less effort than to research the difficulty, and to attempt to resolve it. Biteness never helps. Neither does co-operation, once trust has been breached. We must work to restore ethics in Manchester education.

Mr. Kluewe has done much work, and has spent much of his valuable time for Manchester Schools. He has done what he thinks is right. I sincerely thank Mr. Kluewe for his efforts. I'll also remember him as one guy who "really gave a rip".

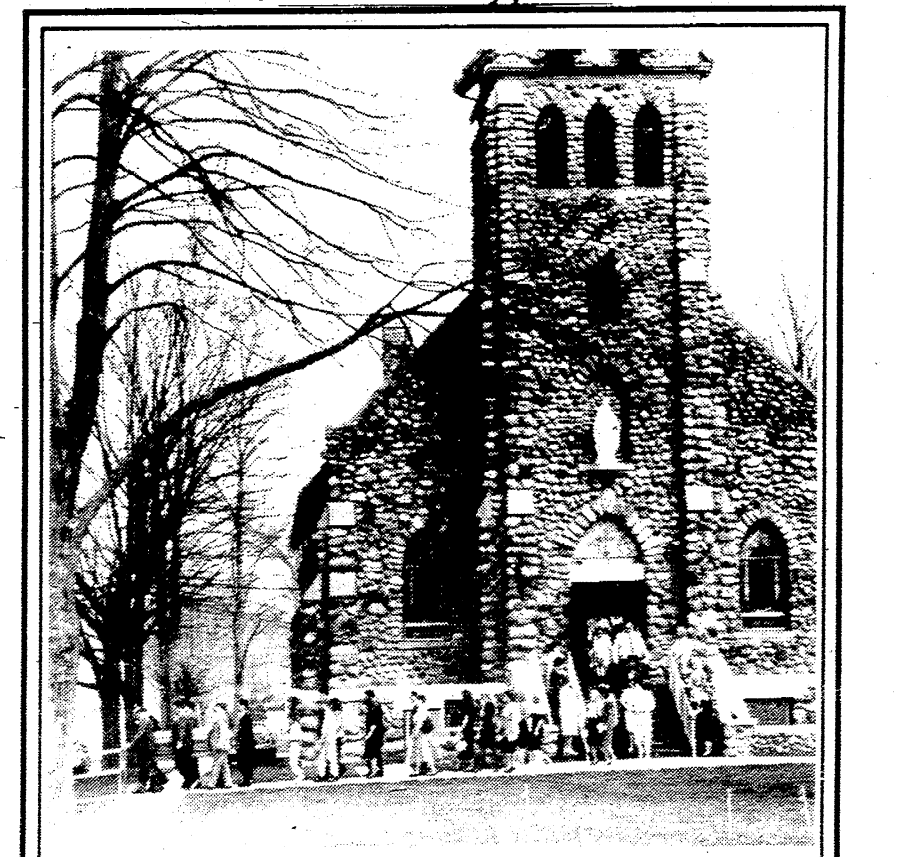

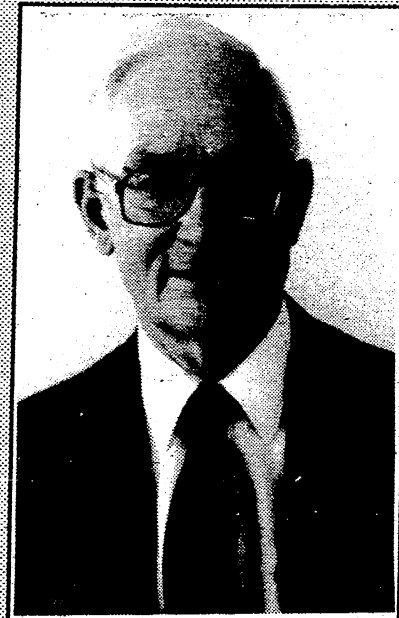

Manchester Scientist Honored

Dr. Clark G. Spike, EMU Professor Emeritus of Chemistry and resident of the Manchester community, will receive the 1991 Dr. John W. Porter Distinguished Service Award, named for former President Porter who served from 1979 to 1989.



Spike, a 1944 graduate of EMU, joined EMU's chemistry faculty in 1958 after serving six years as a research chemist with Ethyl Corp. on the development of fuel additives. He was named EMU Chemistry Department Head in 1961 and served in that leadership role until he was named interim dean of the College of Arts and Sciences in 1977. He became acting associate vice president for academic affairs in 1979 and returned to teaching full time in 1980. Upon his retirement in 1983, Spike received emeritus professor status from the Board of Regents and continued to teach part time at EMU until 1989.

SMRS Offering Free School

Have you ever wanted to be a railroad locomotive engineer? Well, here's your chance. The Southern Michigan Railroad will be offering a free school for three weekends during April and May in preparation for resumption of passenger service beginning June 1. Instruction will be provided for engineers, conductors, brakemen, flagmen, "Gandy dancers", ticket agents, etc.

Southern Michigan Railroad is an offshoot of the Erie and Kalamazoo Railroad, Michigan's first railroad and the first built west of the Allegheny mountains. An E&K subsidiary, the Palmyra and Jacksonburg Railroad was built north from near Lenawee Junction in 1837 reaching Tecumseh in 1838. Ownership changed to Lake Shore and Michigan Southern and later to New York Central. As passenger and freight traffic declined in the thirties and forties, revenues fell. Then during the 1960's the rails were removed north of Clinton. A small amount of freight service was provided by NYC and then its successors Penn Central and then Conrail.

This small railroad has served thenation in some very historic ways. It has carried presidents such as Lincoln and others in the days of whistle stops. The line also transported soldiers to and from war from the beginning of the Civil War through WWI.

The Society is looking for people interested in railroading. They need people to attend the training school and learn the jobs of conductor, flagman and engineer. The school will be held in Clinton at the SMRS offices beginning on Saturday and Sunday April 20-21, April 27-28, and May 4-5. You must attend one session each weekend.

The Society is also interested in finding former railroad employees, of any railway line, to provide information to the SMRS on what your railroading experience was like in former days. HELP KEEP RAILROADING ALIVE BY VOLUNTEERING YOUR TIME OR INFORMATION.

Artists, sculptors, musicians, poets! Actors and dancers! Camera, lights, music. Action!

Coming soon to the old Widmayer Hardware (aka old Iron Horse) building next to the Post Office — the Arts Academy of Manchester!

Susan Morey, who moved to Manchester recently after finishing up studies at the University of Michigan, is organizing this endeavor which will provide classes, studio space, and performance opportunities for children as well as adults from the Manchester area.

Susan is not new to this sort of thing. She had a similar academy in an old schoolhouse in Lapeer, Michigan for several years. Then she decided to return to U. of M. to add to her list of degrees. She now holds

degrees in Fine Arts, English, Music and Dance.

Although she has had "lots and lots of teaching experience," Ms. Morey emphasizes "I don't want this to become a one woman show!" She is looking for teachers, exceptional teachers. She puts it this way: "I hope to find people who can be responsible for what they say, and then give it away."

She is looking for teachers who "love children and adults, because this is for both." And she is looking for teachers for advanced ballet and jazz.

Ms. Morey stood in the open space with brick walls and wooden floors that once housed all sorts of hardware and household goods. She gestured around the room, indicating where the potters wheels would be, where the partitions, mirrored for dancers, would be placed.

"The dance space will be here," she said, explaining

that you have to treat the floor differently for dancers.

She said they are taking bids for putting a small balcony in the back for guests at theatrical and musical performances. She is looking for an old wooden staircase, to try to "keep it all as historical as possible."

"In the summertime, we will be performing outside, too," Ms. Morey added.

The Arts Academy is scheduled to begin registering students by phone on Thursday, May 9th, with a formal registration period at the Main Street building on May 15th.

Group classes will begin June 3rd, and a summer camp for the kids will start on June 17th.

25 Years of Canoeing

The 25th Annual Canoe Race will be held in Manchester Sunday, May 19, at 1:00 p.m. There will be 5 classes: adult/child, women, man/woman, choose partner, and competition.

Box 433, Manchester, MI 48158. Forms must be returned by Friday, May 17, at 1:00 p.m. Late registration will be \$10 per person on Sunday, May 19, 11:00 at the starting point. To receive information by phone call 313-428-7722.

Trophies will be awarded for 1st, 2nd and 3rd place in each class.

Pre-registration is \$7.50 per person. Two people are allowed per canoe. Registration fee includes a commemorative patch. Children 5-12 are free. When the Manchester Centennial committee planned the first canoe and boat race as one of the events for the summer of 1967, they did not know that 25 years later the event would still be one of the highlights of activities in Manchester. The race has had several different sponsors through the years and is now under the guidance of the Manchester Recreation Task Force.

Originally, both rowboats and canoes could be entered in the race, but now only canoes can be entered.

Many people come back year after year on the 3rd Sunday of May to enter the race again. They really enjoy paddling as hard as they can to beat their last year's time or to beat the time of the other contestants in their class. The course on the River Raisin is approximately 3-1/2 miles. Record time of a few canoes has been 35 minutes.

The race begins at Fellows Bridge on Sharon Valley Road and ends at the Main Street Bridge in downtown Manchester. The racers are started one canoe at a time. Their starting and finish times are recorded and posted to a stats board at the finish line.

Some people allow their canoes to drift with the mild current and bask in the sights and sounds of the

countryside. Turtles, ducks and an occasional jumping fish can be observed along the river. Nature lovers can watch for white tail deer, a squirrel, or a cow. Canoeists can listen to the cacophony of frog serenades and bird scoldings. Race participants will feel the gentle rush of the water as canoes pass them with the paddles swirling the placid water. They need to be alert for a turn in the river, a hidden log or a low-hanging branch.

Refreshments are available for friends and family to enjoy at the finish line as they wait and watch for all the canoes to complete the race.

After the racers have completed the regular race in their class they can participate in sprint races in

the Manchester Mill Pond. Three or four canoes at a time will start at the Mill Pond finish line, race around a buoy about 100 yards upstream and race back to the finish line. After several heat races, the winners will race for a sprint race championship trophy.

When all the canoes have crossed the finish line, and the times are all calculated, the awards are presented for the first 3 places in each class, plus the sprint race championship trophy.

Sunday, May 19, will be a fun-filled afternoon in Manchester for all who enjoy watching or participating in this water sport on the River Raisin.

The bulletin board in the church shows pictures of the preparation, delivery, and serving of the food. The voices of the women from the Manchester Church tell of the depth of the blessings which surely seem to go in both directions through this act of charity.

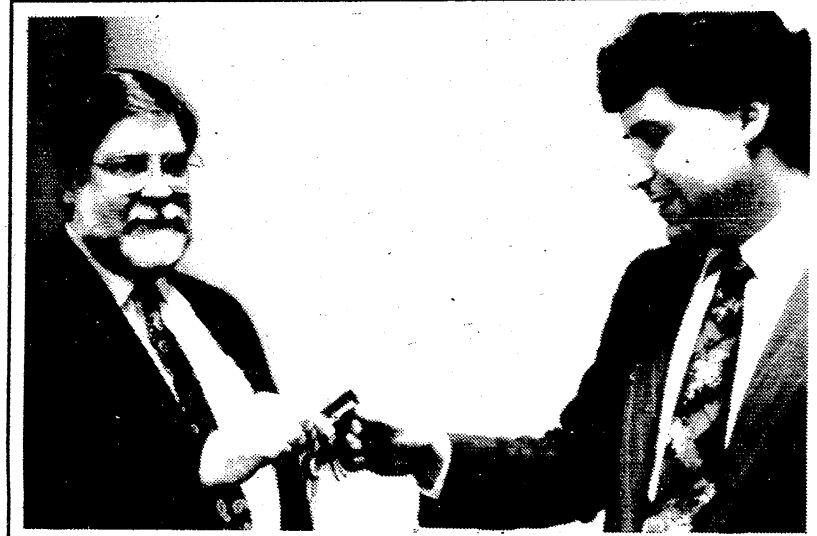

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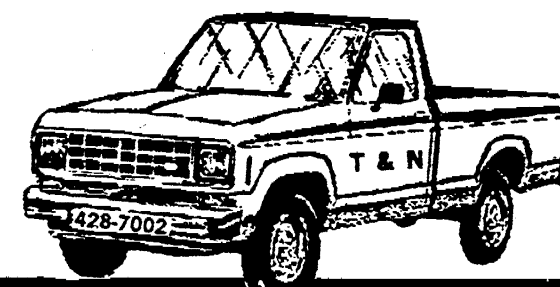


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Frederick O. Wiedmayer

beginning of the meeting, the map also showed the employment zone as hooking around to the west of the Village's industrial, park area toward the mill pond.

However, a citizen questioned the wisdom of bringing this zone there. Why not just have it continue down M-52 with access from Hogan Road or Logan Road, he asked? And why not have the area near the Mill Pond designated for housing?

Several members of the Planning Commission agreed, and after some discussion, the map was changed to indicate that.

The Employment Zone now appears on the map as entirely east of Parr Road and extending south to about halfway between Hogan and Logan Roads.

Other than the employment zone, no other areas in the township are designated for general industrial. Both the employment zone and general industrial will show on the map, but they will be color keyed the same.

According to Chairman Bob Kellum, this overlapping designation will indicate that in the employment zone, the primary use would be industrial, but the township would look favorably on commercial/office if it serves the industrial development. It would also serve as a buffer area.

Other discussion focused on looking at all the areas previously mapped out for the new Master Plan with the old category names and applying the new category names to them.

When the Planning Commission looked at Manchester Stamping, they were asked by Consultant Fleer if this should be designated under the new definitions as limited industrial, which reads: "This designation is intended to facilitate a specific range of commercial activities that have a minimum impact on adjoining property or roadways. Uses operating within normal business hours, requiring a minimum number of parking spaces or that produce minimum off site traffic congestion are considered appropriate use within this district."

But as Commissioner Ann Smith stated, "We'd have to

designate them 'limited,' otherwise we'd be granting them what they didn't get."

The proposed categories of land use are: agriculture, residential, commercial/office, limited commercial, limited industrial, employment zone, general industrial, natural resource/fragile lands overlay districts, recreation, public or quasi-public, extraction.

The final meeting for the Planning Commission to "summarize" the Township Land Use Policy will be held Monday, May 6th, at 8:00 p.m.

Then on Thursday, May 9th, the plan will go before the Washtenaw County Planning Commission for their review and recommendation.

The last step will take place on Monday, May 20th, when the Public Hearing will be held.

Planning Commission Chairman Bob Kellum reminded this reporter and other citizens that the General Development Plan is "all very conceptual. It means that when there is pressure for growth, this is the direction it would be encouraged. But at this time, no zoning changes are anticipated." —JLS □

Good to be home. The May-June edition of the Trumpeter is ready and you may pick up a copy at senior meals, or at the Center when open.

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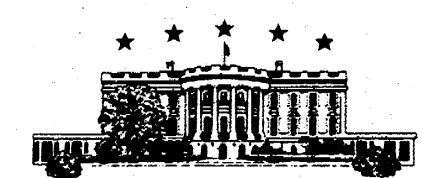
