CHICKEN BROIL RAINED ON AGAIN

The 39th Annual Chicken Broil is history and almost did not happen. Rain struck the area about 2:00 PM in the downtown area. The first drops were not that significant but as the next hour proved the rain put out the pit fires and but for the providence of the rain prevention committee disaster was averted.

One of the unnamed chairpersons thought the committee was near delinquent in their responsibilities. One can suspect, that in the past four years we have lost one Broil and almost another. Joking aside, we have been fortunate over the years and the law of averages is not in our favor.

Dave Little reported that 7000 dinners were taken out and that 2200 were cooked and ready at 3:15 PM with an additional 4400

stretched across Wolverine Street westerly along Vernon, northerly along Beauport to Duncan and then westerly half the block back to Wolverine again. One person said they had waited two and one half hours to get their chicken, but it was worth the wait.

We took pictures toward the conclusion of the rain and the bedraggled pit crews were sopping wet. The water was standing on the

pit field areas as much as three inches deep. The charcoal starting pits were drenched and those fires were rekindled with great effort to provide the hot coals necessary to cook the chicken. But for the perseverance of the pit crews we may not have had a broil.

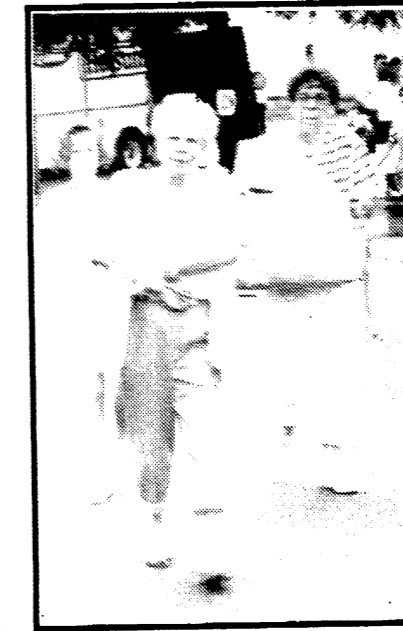
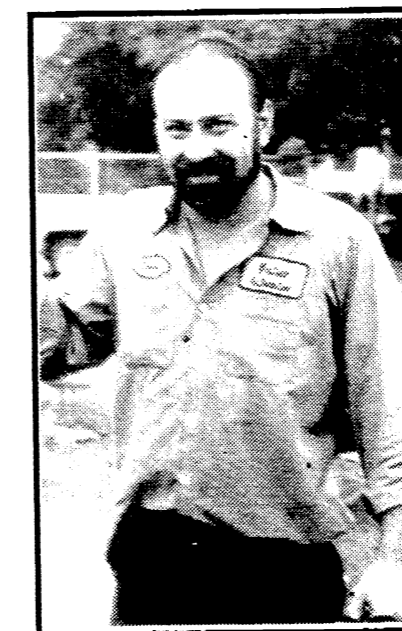
Dave said that all persons in line got at least one chicken dinner. Monies raised will be reduced and

Local Students Attend Young People's Citizenship Seminar

Danny Bihlmeyer, Damian DuRussel and Amy Rentschler were among the 206 students who spent a week at the campus of Olivet College to take part in the annual Seminar. The seminar, which ran from June 15-19, is sponsored by Michigan Farm Bureau and is dedicated to helping prepare Michigan youth for their role as participants in the democratic process.

During the week-long seminar, students had the opportunity to participate as voters, campaigners, precinct delegates and candidates in mock elections for political offices. Speakers in the fields of economics, world cultures and governments, and personal motivation backgrounded the students on their role as citizens of the United States and the world.

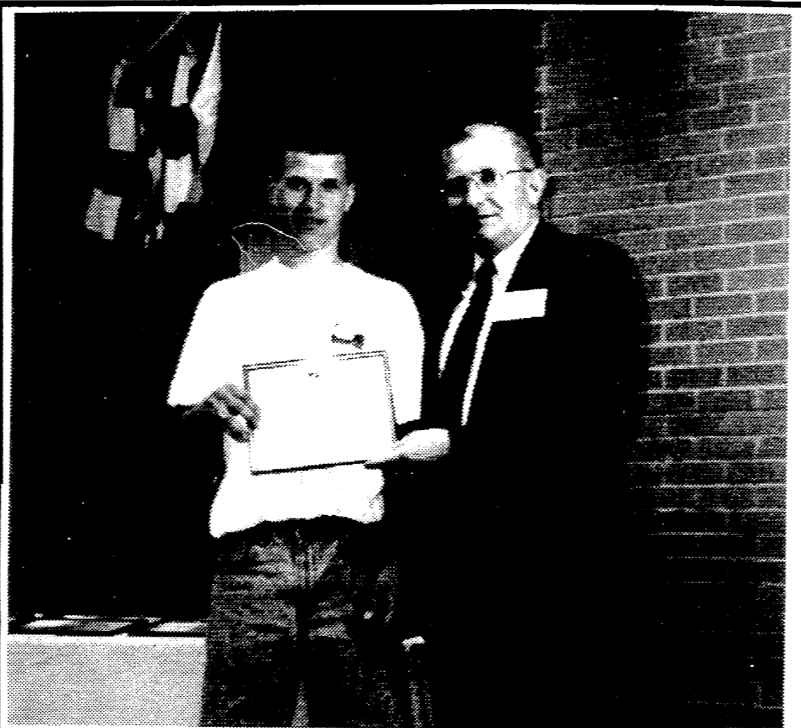
Among the speakers at the seminar were state Senator Debbie Stabenow; Robert Rowland, executive director, Enterprise Square USA; Dr. Richard Ebeling, Economics Professor, Hillsdale College; Maria Schultz, naturalized US citizen and Ukrainian refugee; state Representative Frank Fitzgerald; and Fred Honerkamp, former Vietnam prisoner of war.

Seminar participants also voted on three ballot proposals. Approximately 94 percent voted in support of a mandatory drug testing program for high school athletes. In regards to a special state sales tax to fund environmental research and clean up, nearly 86 percent voted NO. Finally, 82 percent of the students said that prayer should be allowed in public schools.

The students elected Dan Bihlmeyer as chairman of the "Populus Party". In that position his responsibility was to

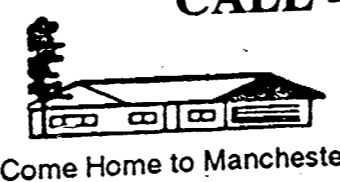

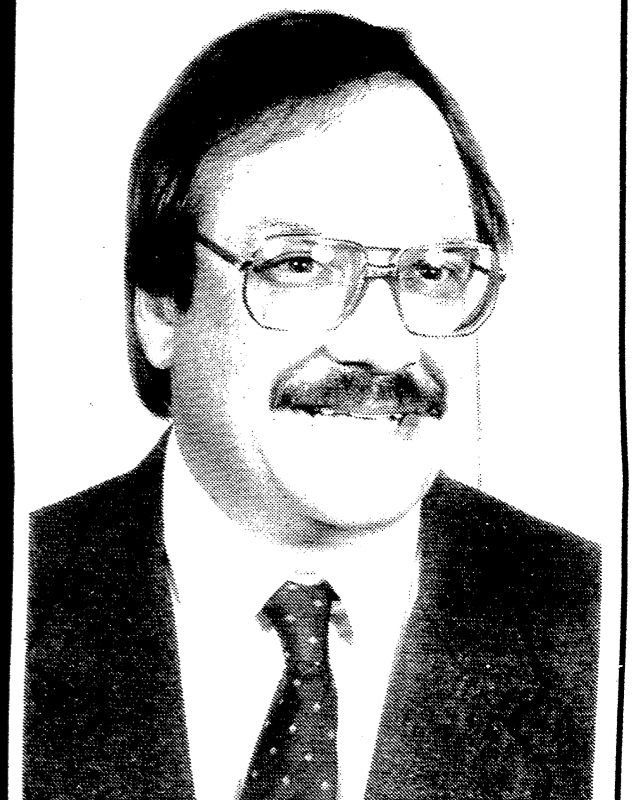

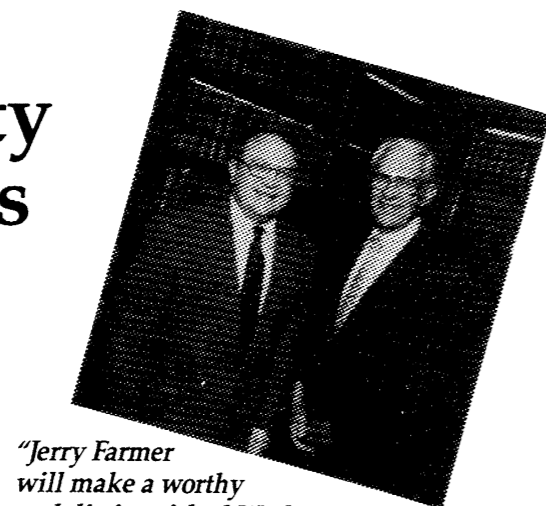

Manchester Girl Sparkles at Interlochen

Instead of frittering away the summer, 10-year-old violinist Annie Hinkley of Manchester spent four weeks fiddling away at the Interlochen Arts Camp.

Annie studied violin at Interlochen from June 21 to July 18. The camp is located in northern lower Michigan and known to many as the premier fine arts camp in the world. Students ages 8 to 18 come from every state and more than 30 foreign countries and can concentrate in music, theater, dance and visual arts.

At camp, Annie played in the junior orchestra, took private lessons and also attended classes in environmental exploration and beginning theater.

"My favorite things about camp are swimming and playing with friends," Annie said. Her mother, Karen, said that Annie heard about Interlochen from a brochure she received in the mail.

"Annie said to me, 'Mom, I'd like to try this.' But I wanted to make sure she knew how long four weeks was before she made a commitment," Mrs. Hinkley said.

"After I thought about it," Annie said. "I told my dad 'I want to go to Interlochen.'"

She began playing violin when she was four and started playing piano two years later. She is a member of the Manchester Community Orchestra and takes violin lessons with Gayle Zirk, of Saline. She will be a fifth grader at Manchester Nellie Ackerson Middle School in the fall.

Annie said she enjoys outside activities like swimming and going to their family's cottage. She practices violin and piano every morning before she goes to school, even on weekends, though it takes a little coaxing.

"My mom reminds me to practice," Annie admitted. "Especially on Saturdays because I like to watch cartoons."

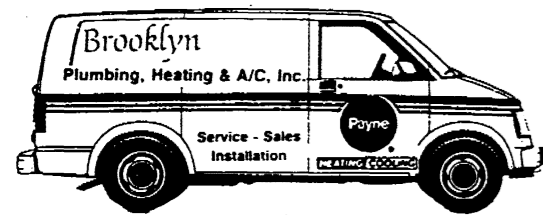

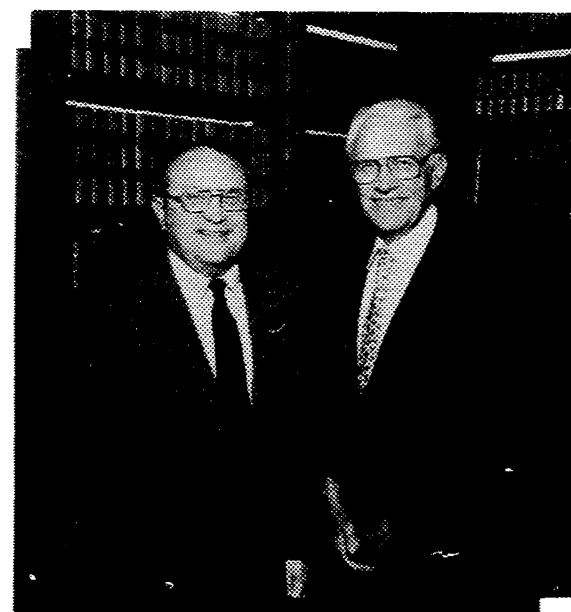
Half of the building expense has been saved up already. The church is building for families and completion should be no later than the end of October.

Daverman read a memo to Wallace concerning Riverbend Subdivision requirements.

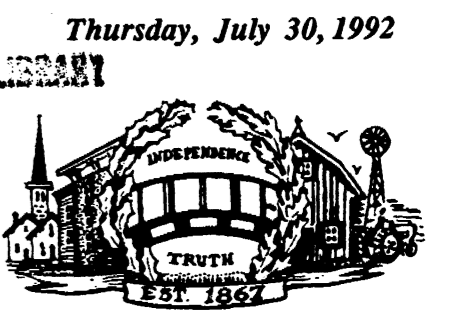

BLACK SHEEP - Past - Present - Future?

Robert Cummins, Ann Arbor News Staff Reporter wrote an article in the Sunday, November 10, 1974 edition, it's title read; 'Rehabilitation' Is Key to Manchester's Past.

That statement is perhaps the most apropos bit of wisdom published. Our area is not a mecca for fast food joints, mega shopping malls or even expansion of limited business interests. Our Main street business district has but two vacant store fronts that will be soon filled when remodeling is complete. We at the Enterprise have moved into 109 East Main, a building that has been empty for at least two years and has had a checkered business use since it's acquisition by Chris Hoover from Don (D. E.) Limpert, the former owner.

I interviewed Don to obtain some background about the Black Sheep; It's inception and Don's business formation. How and why did Don become involved.

The early 1960's found Don looking for a home base and location for business investment. His great grandfather had originally located in Scio Township, along Scio Church Road west of Zeeb

road and this lead to his interest in the greater Manchester area. Being fond of antiques and history, particularly the Civil War period, Don acquired his first of four buildings that make up the Black Sheep complex. That complex starting from the east and going west.

First building contained a bar known at various times as, Sloat Brothers Saloon, Sportsman Bar and Hallers Tavern. All served beer and wine only, liquor by the glass had to pass a village referendum which was approved about 1970.

Next building westward was the old Charles Eisenhour Grocery store that was when Don purchased it an Antique store.

The Great Lakes office, 111 E. Main, was the Site of Hallers Meat Market, later the Manchester Enterprise location when George Macomber owned the paper.

At 109 E. Main, now the Enterprise location, was Hamilton Meat Market, empty and owned by Dick Way. Limpert converted this building into a set of offices used by Becket Insurance and Manchester Township to name but two.

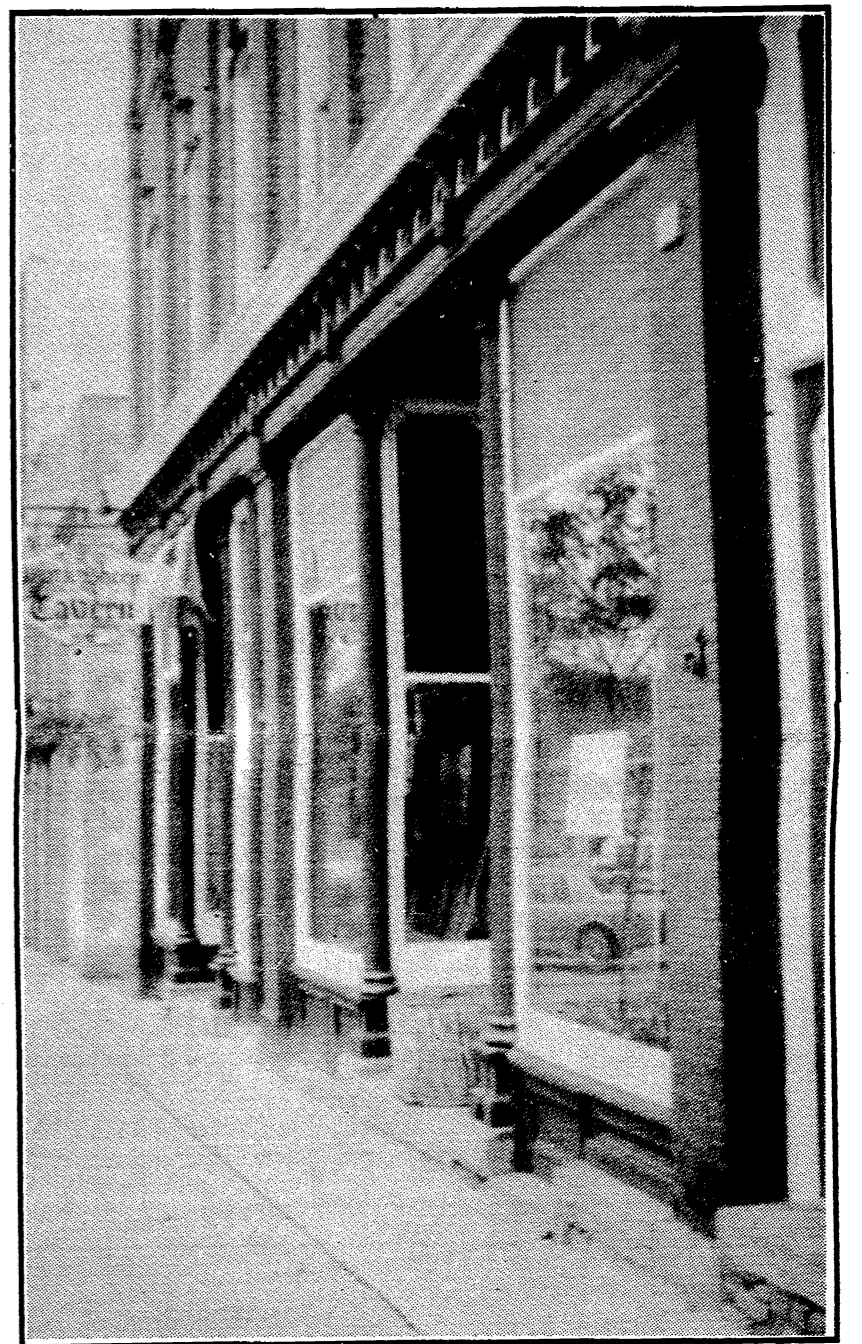
Limpert converted these four buildings through renovation, re-

construction and removal of some dilapidated out buildings that were in the parking area now behind those buildings.

Limpert reminisced about some of his early Tavern experiences. Juanita Jose was his day bartender and Guy Gilbert held forth at night. When he first opened he served sandwiches only and the first night he was overwhelmed by the locals that arrived. Don was the only waitperson and he was unable to serve all the clients. He had obtained a loan from the Union Savings Bank, which Doc Ames advocated and without collateral, to open his doors. Tremendous local support characterized those days. We had a sing a long, beef buffet on Friday nites when 200 to 300 dinners were served. We played old German music on Sunday and many an elderly person came to sing in their native language. One old German couple had their fiftieth anniversary in the Sheep. Lithuanians from the area brought their musical instruments and played to the wee hours of morning. Ken Ichorn, a vaudevillian piano player played many a night music from the 20's and 30's. It was not uncommon for a local person to

bring in a musical instrument, set down and start playing. Kathy Aiuto Cornell started working in the Sheep as a dishwasher when she was in high school and was the last manager of the Black Sheep before it's sale. We had a lot of locals that would frequent the bar during the daytime for a libation, just one and then go home or maybe return to rocky. The under capitalization saw the need for a declaration of bankruptcy in 1981 where by some lenders, mortgage holders and suppliers lost substantial sums of funds.

Chris has stated to this writer that he does not intend to reopen the Tavern and that he hopes to sell the building and business including the liquor license. "If the right party

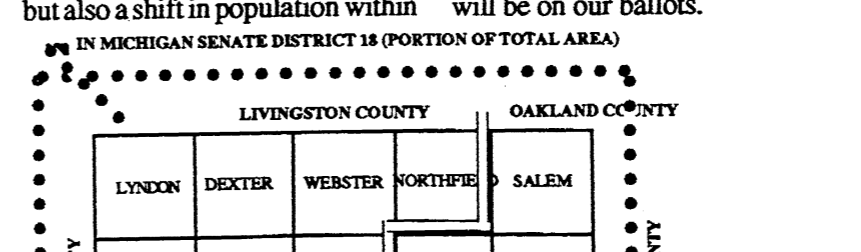
the state. Wayne County, primarily the City of Detroit and the immediate Cities adjacent to Detroit have experienced depopulation.

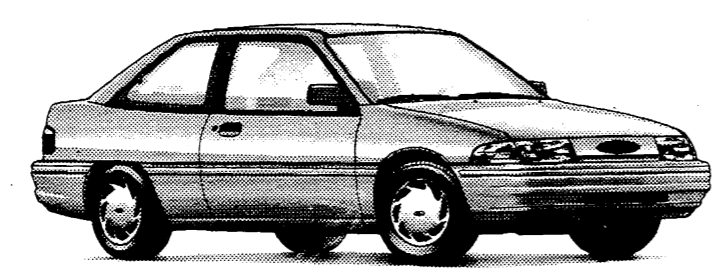
