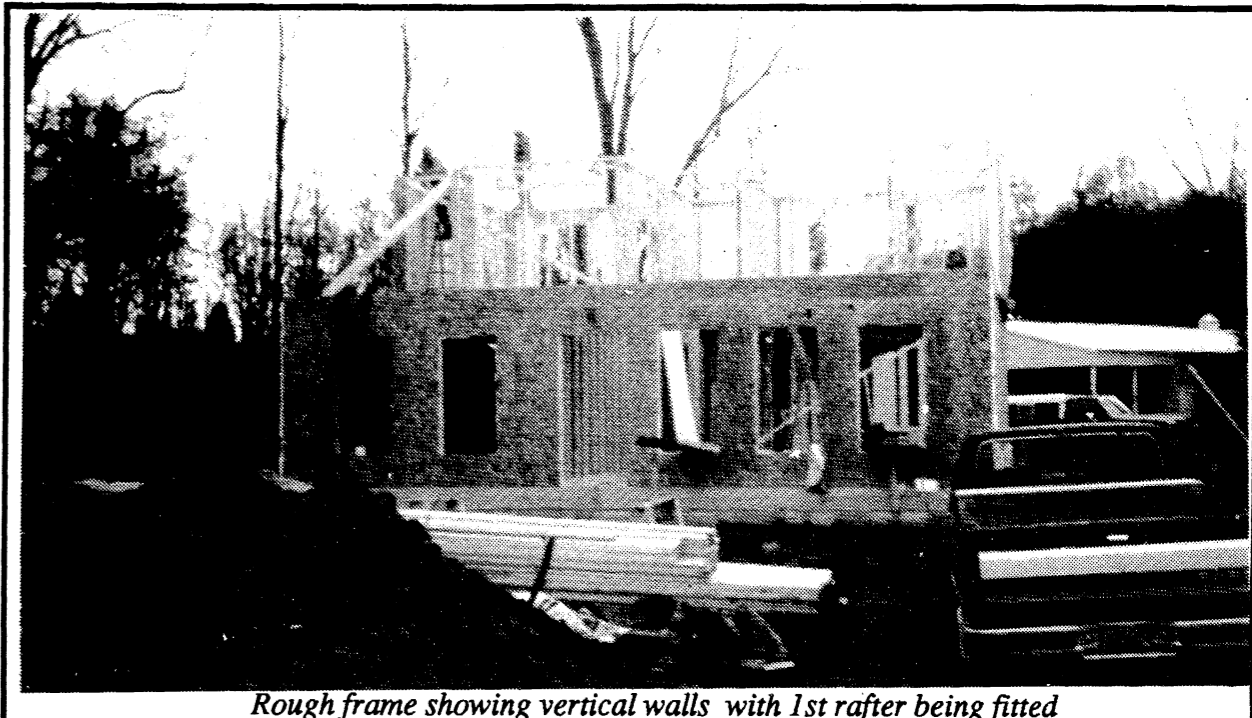

MANCHESTER ENTERPRISE The Second Front Page: Building a House Part 8

Update: I am writing this article on Saturday, December 26th. One trade, tile setting, is holding up the interior completion of my house. The master bath tile and floor for the stool has to be finished before the painting, carpet, vanity mirror and vanity light's can be finished. One week golf vacations can affect many things. Exterior siding is 85 to 90 percent finished, we gave all siding and trim a coat of paint in the barn. Second coat in the spring when weather permits. Bob Lowery has been doing the building inspections and with his many years of experience he provides the eye necessary to catch details. Take advantage of someone other than yourself, lead carpenter or builder to help with overlooked details.

When exterior walls are fitted with windows and doors take some of the insulation and pack around the casings. Use a wood shingle and place the insulation from the inside using firm even pressure. DO NOT USE EXPANDING FOAM. Expanding foam will distort the window and door frames and apply pressure to the frames and units. Nothing worse than a window or door that cannot be opened or closed. Floor and ceiling joist headers should be packed with insulation. Cut pieces of the insulation just slightly larger than the openings and staple the paper to the adjacent wood. Rafter openings need to have an air space between the insulation and the roof sheeting. Preformed cardboard and plastic panels are available. If you have a vaulted ceiling, where the drywall is attached to the bottom of the rafter each cavity should be vented. Use either a continuous ridge vent or roof vents. I prefer a ridge vent system. Insulation comes in a variety of products. Fiberglass both sided and unsided. Sided gives an additional air barrier if properly attached. Foam is available in sheets or applied on site in the cavities. Cost is higher but the insulation factor is much higher because the air cells are closed little bubbles of air. Blown cellulose, paper or plastic nodules can be used in ceilings that are open to the attic, effective cost and insulation value. A good carpenter will always check the square of wall

components before they are erected. This is nothing more than crossing corners with a tape measure so that the diagonal measurements are equal. Bridging of floor and ceiling joists on all spans of 12 feet or more is a must. Spans less than 12 feet should have bridging if there is a question about moisture content in the lumber. Bridging is simply using cross pieces connecting the top of one joist to the bottom of the next joist, both ways. Bridging increases strength and helps to eliminate warpage of joists. A common building practice is the use of particle board for sheeting. Glue and nail this in place. Construction grade adhesives are available that can be water proof when dried. Waterproof glue should be used whenever moisture could be present. If insulation board is used then diagonal bracing cut into the joists needs to be done. Your house is at the mercy of a competent builder and carpenter. All interior walls should be chalk lined before they are nailed in place. The interior dry wall that you will look at is at the mercy of a straight and true wall. Insist that all walls are chalk lined and plumbed with a good four foot level. A good carpenter will chalk line the floor, plumb vertically the ends and chalk line the ceiling so that the walls are true. Your finished house will only look as good as the rough framing is true and square. Next week: (C) Finish Framing

"Dear Ann: My Father was the most beloved man in town. We buried him a few days ago. In his desk drawer was a framed quotation he that must have looked at very often. It said;

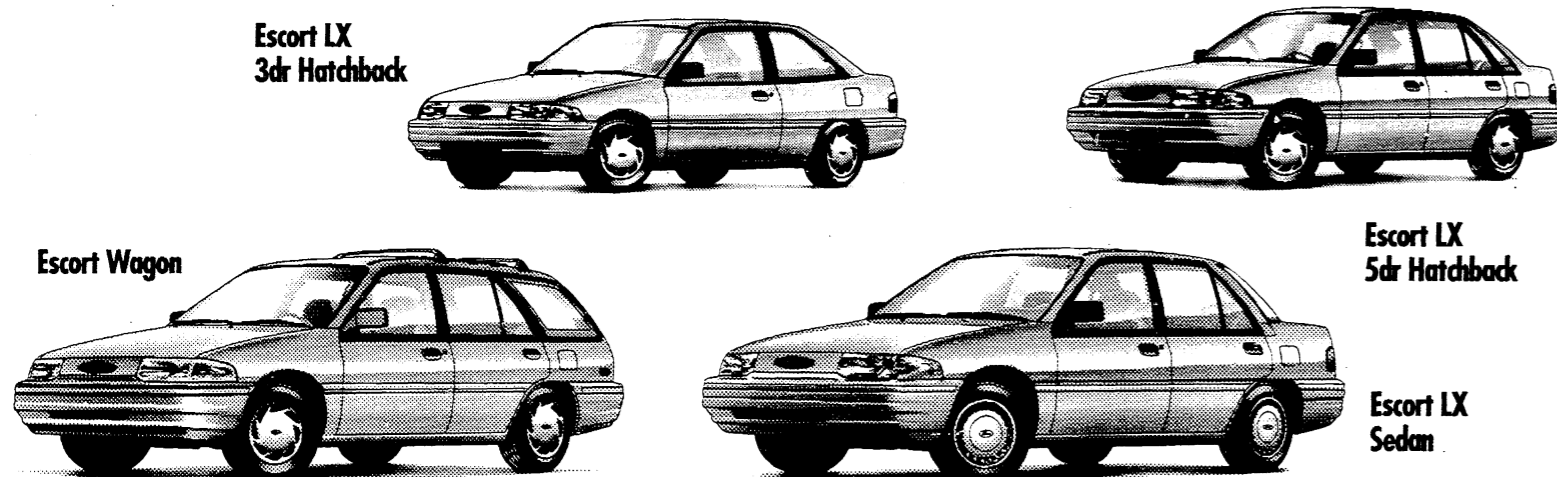
'I shall pass through this world but once. Any good that I can do, or any kindness that I can show another human being, let me do it now and not defer it. For I shall not pass this way again.'

Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 7:40 p.m. by Chairman Daverman in the Council Room of the Village Hall.

Approval of Agenda

A motion was made by Hinkley to accept the agenda. Lowery seconded the motion. The motion passed on a voice vote.

Minutes of the Previous Meeting

Hinkley made a motion to accept the minutes. Palms seconded the motion. The motion passed on a voice vote.

Reports from Administra-

tion, Council, Commissioners and Public

Residents living on Riverside questioned the proposed inclusion of the east side of Riverside between Main Street and Duncan in the Master Plan as an Office Service Transition area. They would like to see the entire block kept residential.

New Business

Preliminary Site Plan Review: Woodhill Senior Apartments, The Oakwood Companies Property owner: Dr. Glen Lehr, Site: Territorial Road between Main and Elton; Present Zoning R-3 Multiple Family.

Tom Kostosky made the presentation for Oakwood Companies. He noted they had revised the site plan presented at last month's meeting.

Exit Palms at 8:40.

The Fire Chief's recommendations were reviewed.

Comments and recommendations from the DPW were reviewed.

Daverman made a motion to recommend Preliminary Site Plan approval with the following recommendations:

- 1. All underground utilities and the sidewalk be extended to the south property line for the purpose of future development beyond.
2. Variances must be filed and approved by the ZBA prior to final site plan approval for both Phase 1 and Phase 2 rear yard setbacks (35 feet for Phase 1 and 25 feet for Phase 2 considered adequate).
3. A variance request must also be filed and approved by the ZBA prior to final site plan approval for parking. The code requires 48 spaces and the Commissioner recommends 36 be accepted based on the general statistics of this type housing. This would also provide more green space.
4. Due to the cost of topographical engineering, item 12 of the Preliminary Site Plan requirements is not necessary for Preliminary Site Plan approval, but must be addressed in the Final Site Plan.
5. The Commission received the comments and recommendations from the Fire Chief and the DPW and passed this information on to the developer.
6. The developer will work with the Village in bringing the sidewalk out to Main Street, which may not necessarily be by the shortest route. Way seconded the motion.

The motion passed on a voice vote. When Kostosky (The Oakwood Companies) purchases the property from Dr. Lehr, and he is forced to move the parking lot of the dental/day care offices off the premises, Dr. Lehr will have to file for a site plan approval process to

establish a new parking lot for the dental/day care offices.

General Development Plan

The Public Hearing for the General Development Plan will be held at the regular December meeting.

A letter was received from Village Council which supports the General Development Plan as presented. Other comments received from Council members included the following concerns:

- 1. Eliminate mention of a bypass on M-52.
2. Question areas of high and medium density within the central residential district.
3. Concern expressed over changing sections along M-52 and West Main Street to Commercial.
4. Need to check the section in the General Development Plan book which covers the DDA to make sure it is worded properly.

A letter was received from Richard Carlisle concerning tasks the Planning Commission should do to follow up on the General Development Plan.

Adjournment

Daverman made a motion to adjourn the meeting. Way seconded the motion. The motion passed on a voice vote. The meeting adjourned at 9:45.

We thought this the perfect opportunity to bring the community up to date on the students from Manchester High School who are now playing basketball for Kentucky Wesleyan. If you're a sports fan you may want to keep your eye on this pair. Their team is 8-0 with a chance to make it into the playoffs this year.

When Matt, the oldest, graduated he received a full athletic scholarship from Northern Colorado. He played basketball there 1-1/2 years before transferring to Kentucky Wesleyan College. Kentucky offered Matt the same full scholarship with the opportunity to get more playing time. Matt is majoring in accounting with 2-1/2 years left before graduating.

Stephan attended a prep school in the east to pick up a few extra credits before attending a full time college. He was offered two full scholarships to play basketball, one from a Division I school in the south, the other from Kentucky Wesleyan. Kentucky Wesleyan College, a Division II school, is located in Owensboro. Playing basketball on a full scholarship or any sport for that matter, is not all that easy. The student must receive 12 credit hours to remain eligible. 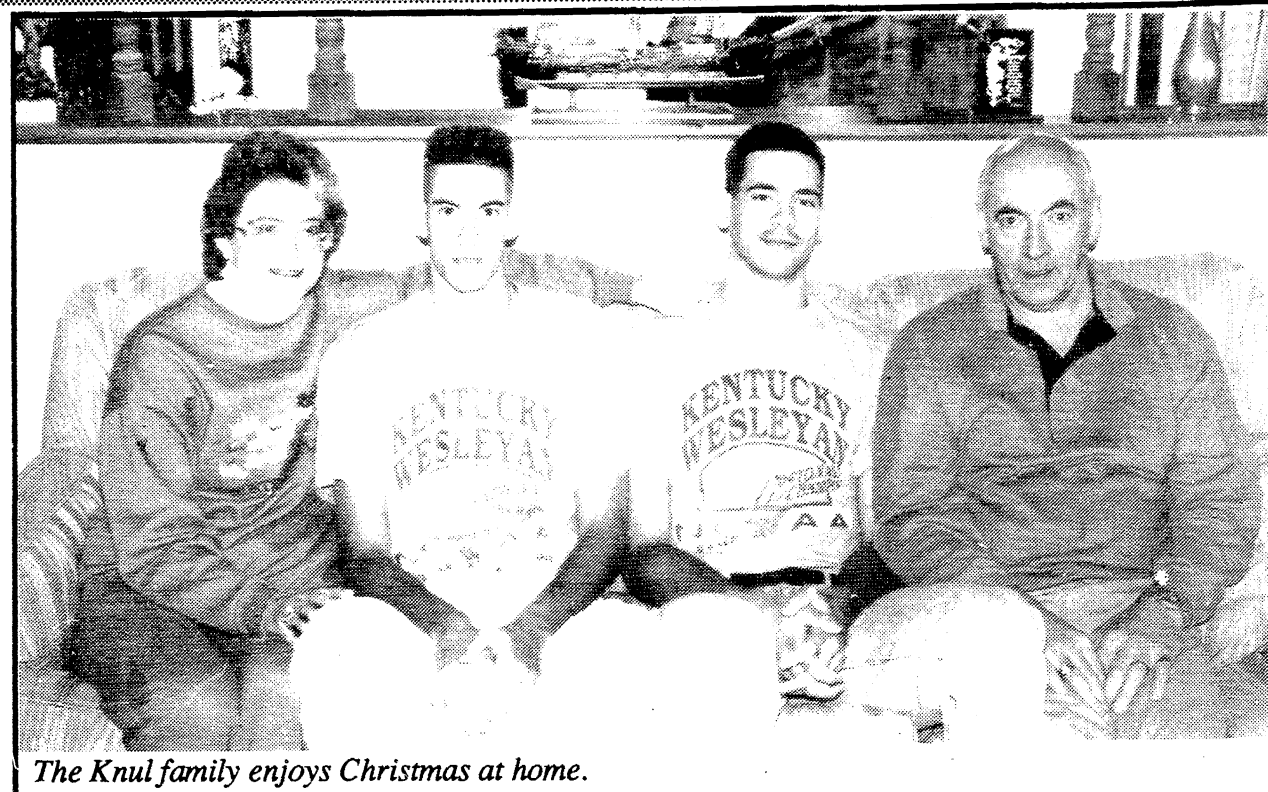
