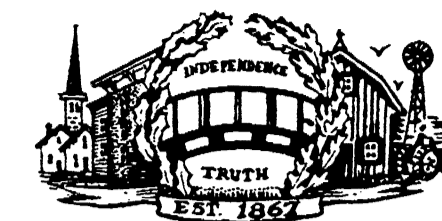

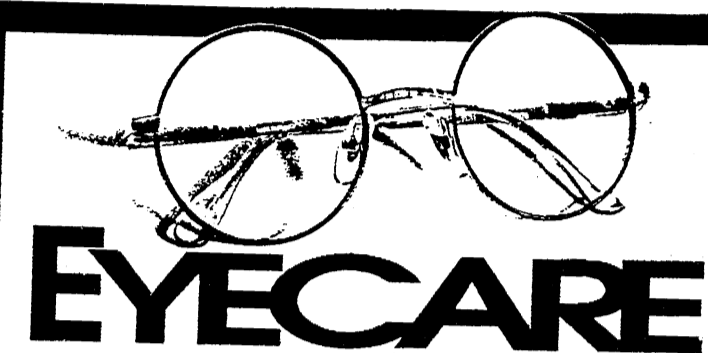

## Wastenaw Intermediate School District — Asks For 1.45 Mil Increase

Local residents will be voting on an additional 1.45 mil increase in property taxes Tuesday, March 9, 1993. This millage will be used by the Washtenaw Intermediate School District (WISD) for State mandated special education programs. The proposed millage will be for a term of five years.

This is the WISD's second attempt, during the past year, to increase its millage which currently stands at 3.5 mil's. Local voters turned down the last request by a 3-1 margin last June, when the Manchester School Building Proposal was rejected.

Manchester School District has a current State Equalized Valuation (SEV) of \$128,829,167.00. This is the frozen valuation of 91/92 & 92/93. 1.45 mil's would produce \$186,802.29 locally, for WISD. According to WISD \$106,368 would be returned to our local district for funding of local district special education programs.

Local district partially funded programs are for: Children with learning disabilities, educable mentally impaired, emotional impairments, preprimary programs ages 0-5 with handicapping conditions, speech and language problems and handicapped young adults to age 26.

There are five county wide or centralized programs. They include programs for hearing impairments, physical and multiple impairments, moderate to severe mental impairments, serious emotional impairments and children with autism.

The proposed millage will buy special education support services. The specialists include: social workers, psychologists, homebound and hospitalized teachers, teacher consultant ser-

vices, orientation and mobility specialists, speech therapists, occupational therapists, physical therapists and administrative services for local school districts. The administrative services would include monitoring, state and federal reporting, state and federal projects, staff development, curriculum development, etc.

Washtenaw County has approximately 42,000 students. Slightly more than 5,000 county students benefit from these programs.

Manchester Schools has a current enrollment of 1133 students and 158 students participating in the special education programs. At the current time our district gets about 40% return of collected funds. It is necessary for our district to fund the additional 60% from local operational millage.

What will the ballot say?

Shall the 3.5 mills\* limitation (\$3.50 on each \$1,000.00) on state equalized valuation on the annual property tax previously approved by the electors of Washtenaw Intermediate School District, Michigan, for the education of handicapped persons be increased by 1.45 mills (\$1.45 on each \$1,000.00) on state equalized valuation for a period of five years, 1993 to 1997, inclusive?

\*(WISD is authorized to levy 3.5 mills for special education, but actually levies only 3.14 mills because of the Headlee rollback requirement.)

Mr. John Dietz, Assistant Superintendent for personnel and business, WISD stated that: "Six Districts; Ann Arbor, Chelsea, Dexter, Manchester, Saline and Whitmore Lake pay more tax dollars than they receive. Linclon, Milan, Willow Run and Ypsilanti School Districts receive more than they pay. These programs are mandated by the Federal and State Governments but they only provide the necessary funding by 11% and 13.5% respectively.

Equalization of fund distribution is a 'physiological' method of spreading the taxpayer load. Therefore it is necessary for some taxpayers to bear a larger portion of the cost than others." John said, "The bottom line is that we must provide the dollars necessary."

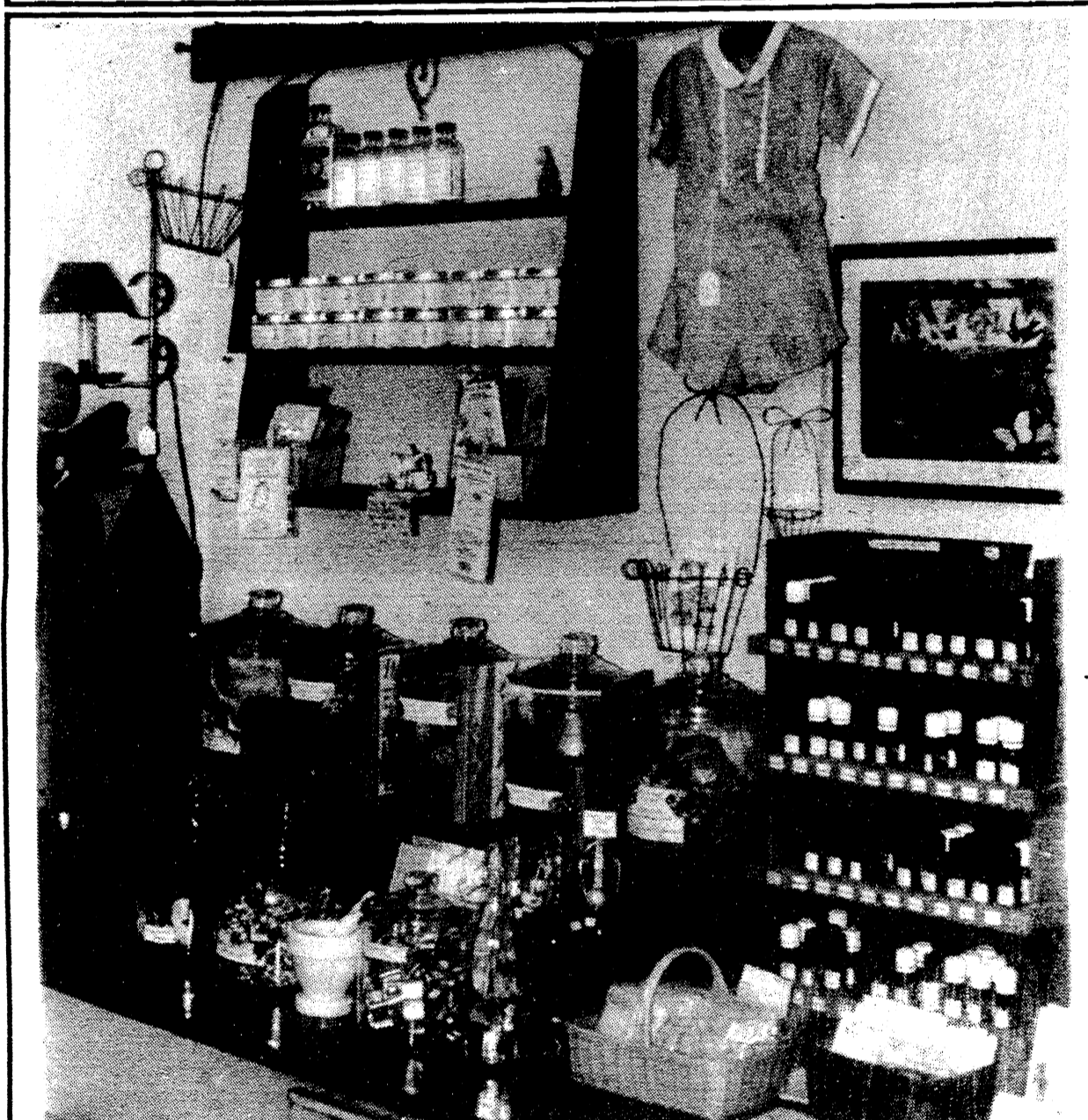

**Taxes - TAXES - TAXES!**  
Are you as confused now, as I am, about what is happening on the taxation scene?

Washtenaw Intermediate School District needs additional millage to pay for programs mandated by the Federal and State Government. The Fed's and the State don't want to pay for what they demand! Is that fair?

The American DREAM has been for everyone to own their home. The NIGHTMARE, is that ownership of a home is rapidly becoming unaffordable. When 2 or 3 percent of home sales of an area determine the value of all homes within that area is not fair or right. What is the solution?

Governor Engler's Property Tax Cut Proposal:

Cut school operating SEV 20% over 3 years.

Limit future school operating assessment increases state-wide to inflation rate.

Extend time to appeal assessment increases to improve due process.

In essence the Michigan Senate passed this proposal with an additional gimmick. The State would make up the difference with some other form of taxation.

Michigan Education Association (MEA) is lobbying to change Michigan's 563 school districts into 14 mega-districts. Ostensibly to improve efficiency in personnel, transportation and administration. They want to maintain the 50% SEV factor but limit millage to a 30 mill cap, on overall millage. Also proposed, the mega-districts could seek additional sources of revenue through enhancement millage or a local income tax.

George thought this would be like having the fox guard the hen-house. I can't disagree with George.

Richard Headlee, of the

"Headlee" Amendment, testified before the Michigan House Taxation Committee last week. He had some good comments. Cut the assessment ratio to 40 percent as the quickest, easiest way to reduce property tax rates across the board and across the state. There may be good reason to apply the reduction only to schools as this is the largest and fastest growing share of property taxes.

The Legislature has a constitutional obligation to properly fund local primary and secondary education. Our taxpayer organization receives far more complaints about tactics of local school districts, such as using of taxpayer money to advocate millage increases; misleading ballot wording; from unusual voting procedures and salary and benefit packages and

overall administrative spending than from other units of local government.

"Michigan schools have a justified claim for hundreds of millions of dollars in costs that the Legislature has forced upon them. The Legislature has a constitutional obligation to fund these programs. The continual flaunting of these constitutional requirements must cease. Schools must be able to plan."

Headlee further pointed out that the wrongful implementation of millage over rides is patently false and the school aid law should be changed to quit punishing school districts who deal fairly with taxpayers.

"Even as we sit here discussing property tax relief, the federal government is preparing to increase our taxes. The citi-

zens of Michigan don't need a burden in the burden, they need the burden lightened and that is not going to come from a fiscally bankrupt federal government. The Legislature should at this moment cut property taxes --- try eliminating the State Board of Education and the Department of Education--- get the fat out of educational administration and focus on quality teachers, results in the classroom and students that are prepared for a career in the private sector." According to Headlee.

Truly friends there is indeed a dilemma on both the State Legislature and our Federal Government levels.

I have read over sixty pages of information, writing and graphs and the solution will be difficult to achieve.

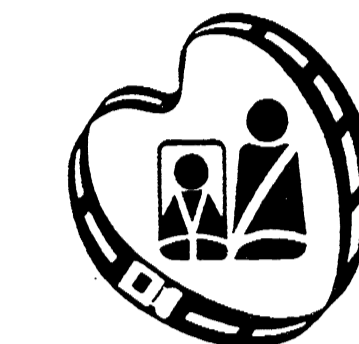
### Claire Turk Chosen For Role in "Broadway"

**Freedom Township  
Ordinance NO. 22  
Consumers Power Company  
Gas Franchise Ordinance**

AN ORDINANCE, granting to CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY, its successors and assigns, the right, power and authority to lay, maintain and operate gas mains, pipes and services on, along, across and under the highways, streets, alleys, bridges and other public places, and to do a local gas business in the TOWNSHIP OF FREEDOM, WASH-TENAW COUNTY, MICHIGAN, for a period of thirty years.

THE TOWNSHIP OF FREEDOM ORDAINS:

**SECTION 1. GRANT, TERM.** The Township of Freedom, Washtenaw County, Michigan, hereby grants to the Consumers Power Company, a Michigan corporation, its successors and assigns, hereinafter called the "Grantee", the right, power and authority to lay, maintain and operate gas mains, pipes and services on, along, across and under the highways, streets, alleys, bridges and other public places, and to do a local gas business in the Township of Freedom, Washtenaw County, Michigan for a period of thirty years.

**SECTION 2. CONSIDERATION.** In consideration of the rights, power and authority hereby granted, said Grantee shall faithfully perform all things required by the terms hereof.

**SECTION 3. CONDITIONS.** No highway, street, alley, bridge or other public place used by said Grantee shall be obstructed longer than necessary during the work of construction or repair, and shall be restored to the same order and condition as when said work was commenced. All of Grantee's pipes and mains shall be so placed in the highways and other public places as not to unnecessarily interfere with the use thereof for highway purposes.

**SECTION 4. HOLD HARMLESS.** Said Grantee shall at all times keep and save the Township free and harmless from all loss, costs and expense to which it may be subject by reason of the negligent construction and maintenance of the structures and equipment hereby authorized. In case any action is commenced against the Township on account of the permission herein given, said Grantee shall, upon notice, defend the Township and save it free and harmless from all loss, cost and damage arising out of such negligent construction and maintenance.

**SECTION 5. EXTENSIONS.** Said Grantee shall construct and extend its gas distribution system within said Township, and shall furnish gas to applicants residing therein in accordance with applicable laws, rules and regulations.

**SECTION 6. FRANCHISE NOT EXCLUSIVE.** The rights, power and authority herein granted, are not exclusive. Either manufactured or natural gas may be furnished hereunder.

**SECTION 7.** Said Grantee shall be entitled to charge the inhabitants of said Township for gas furnished therein, the rates as approved by the Michigan Public Service Commission, to which Commission or its successors authority and jurisdiction to fix and regulate gas rates and rules regulating such service in said Township, are hereby granted for the term of this franchise. Such rates and rules shall be subject to review and change at any time upon petition therefore being made by either said Township, acting by its Township Board, or by said Grantee.

**SECTION 8. REVOCATION.** The franchise granted by this ordinance is subject to revocation upon sixty (60) days written notice by the party desiring such revocation.

**SECTION 9. MICHIGAN PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION, JURISDICTION.** Said Grantee shall, as to all other conditions and elements of service not herein fixed, be and remain subject to the reasonable rules and regulations of the Michigan Public Service Commission or its successors, applicable to gas service in said Township.

**SECTION 10. EFFECTIVE DATE.** This ordinance shall take effect upon the day after the date of publication thereof; provided, however, it shall cease and be of no effect after thirty days from its adoption unless within said period the Grantee shall accept the same in writing filed with the Township Clerk. Upon acceptance and publication hereof, this ordinance shall constitute a contract between said Township and said Grantee. I hereby certify that the acceptance, of which the foregoing, is a true copy, was filed with me as Township Clerk, on the 9th day of February 1993.

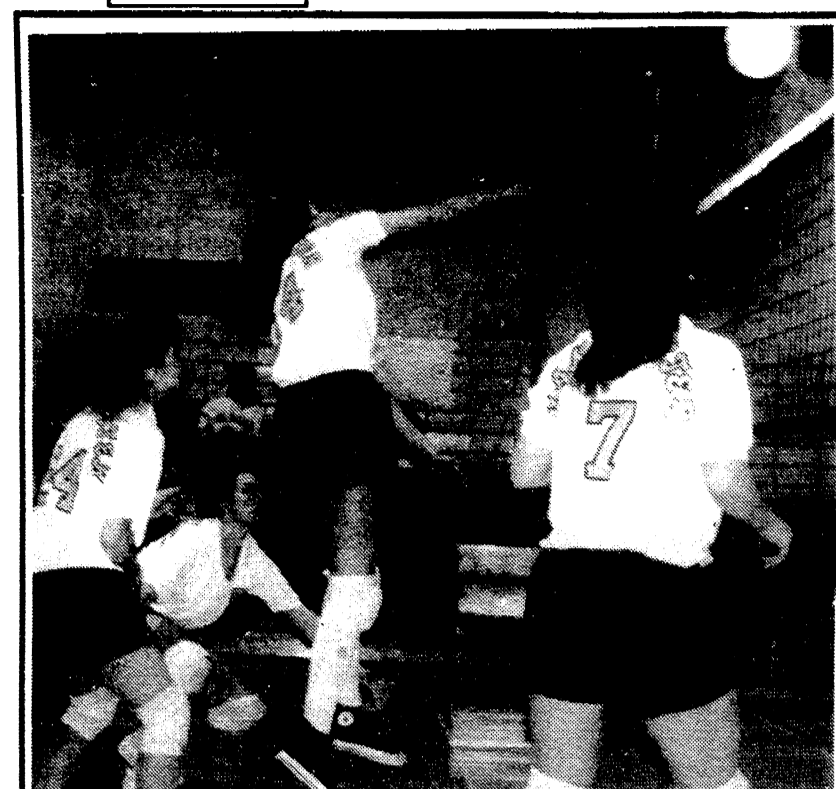

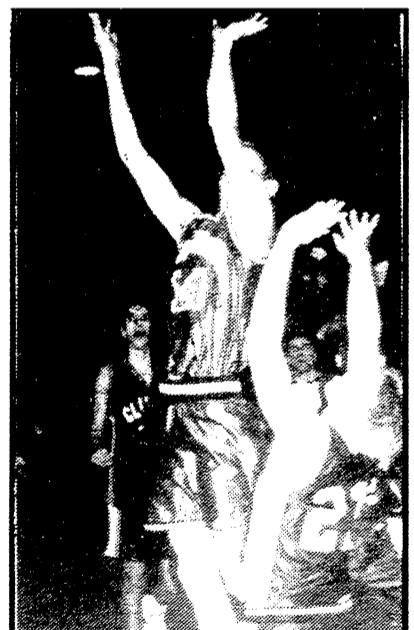

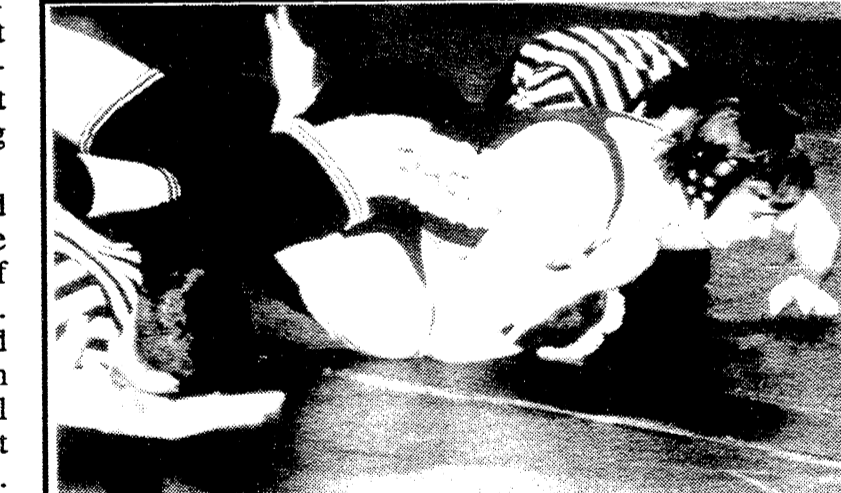
real anxious moments in his first match falling behind early but coming back strong to win his match and his 2nd District Title.

CURBSIDE

Until further notice, curbside recycling for village residents will be the first and third Wednesday of every month. The expanded recycling program now includes newspaper and #2 plastic (milk jugs and laundry detergent bottles), as well as tin cans and clear, green and brown glass.

Recycling Update

Village residents will continue to use three pails for tin cans and glass. Newspaper can be put in paper grocery bags or trash bags (during wet weather). The bags will be put back in pails for further use. Milk jugs should be crushed and the handles can be looped with string and tied to one of the pails, to prevent the wind from blowing them away.

Additional pails can be picked up at the Village Hall or you can use your own containers for now. One pail is for clear glass, one for brown and green glass, and one for tin cans.

Be sure to put your recyclables at least ten feet from your trash to avoid the two being confused by the collectors.
