Saline Community Hospital will present Health-O-Rama Wednesday, April 7, from 7:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. at the Saline Recreation Complex, 1866 Woodland Drive, Saline. Registration closes at 6:00 p.m.

A number of health screenings for such factors as blood pressure, diabetes, cardiopulmonary function, vision, nutritional, podiatry, cancer and blood cholesterol levels will be available. The screenings are free, with the exception of blood analysis for \$12, prostate cancer screening for \$25, and colorectal cancer self-test kit for \$4. A four-hour fast is required for the blood analysis.

There will also be free information on health-related topics.

Health-O-Rama is presented annually by Saline Community Hospital in conjunction with the Health-O-Rama program sponsored by Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Michigan, WXYZ-TV (Channel 7) in Detroit, Washtenaw County United Way and nearly 100 hospitals and other health care providers in southeastern Michigan.

Manchester High School Quiz Bowl Team Wins League Tournament Will go on to compete in State of Michigan Tournament

Manchester High School's Quiz Bowl Team, by virtue of an outstanding performance at the conference championships, has won the Bi-County League Championship and qualified to be a participant in the State of Michigan Quiz Bowl Tournament. This will be held in Port Huron on May 7th and 8th.

Although Manchester has been competing against a number of class A and B schools in our conference at the state tournament we will be in competition with only class C and D schools.

The regular season began very slowly as Manchester's team, very young and somewhat inexperienced, lost its first four matches.

However, the season turned around in a match at Milan when the team, trailing by a large margin, made a tremendous second half comeback and won a close and exciting match. The momentum from this match helped carry the team to victories in five out of their last six matches.

At the end of the season there was a three-way tie for the Bi-County League Championship with Dexter, Whitmore Lake, and Manchester. None of the tie-breaking conference rules removed the tie so it was determined by the coaches that the league champion (and representative to the state tournament) would be the team that advanced the furthest in the conference tournament.

With wins over Clinton and Tecumseh in the tournament Manchester was able to bring home the championship trophy.

Manchester eventually lost in the semi-finals to Pinckney, which in turn, defeated Saline for the tournament championship. Pinckney will also be participating in the state tournament in the Class A-B Division.

Participating for Manchester at the league tournament were captain Justin Ebersole, Mara Bragg, Ben Lowery, Lucas Millheim, Diana Kruse, and Leah Bragg. Other members of the quiz bowl team are SheaAnn Janus, Jenny Nosbisch, Andre Kormenti, Dan Kwolek, Peter Paige, Andrew Schook, Jessica Smith, and Joe Tobias.

Tax Reform Package — No Windfalls Anticipated

The tax reform package that has been put together by the Governor and the Legislature is at best very confusing. Our property tax system of valuations and mandated re-valuations based upon sales of some properties, (in any given year less than 5% of the total) is chaotic.

Over the past 20 years abatements, circuit breakers (rebating some property tax through income tax reduction or rebate returns), valuation freezes, rollbacks and inflated local sales prices based upon a limited supply of available homes have created a wide disparity in property assessments.

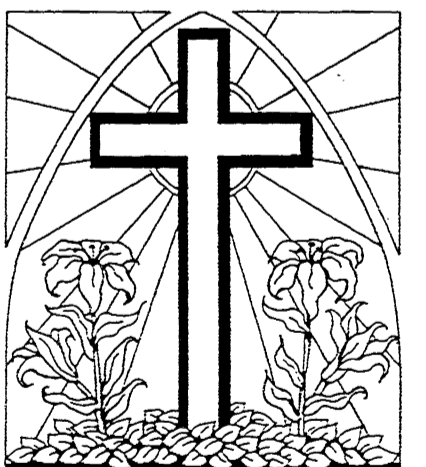
In the same time span local school system's aid formula's were tampered with by the State Legislature. There were a limited number of specific aid categories for transportation, special education and other programs. Those were expanded upon and diversion of funding was made possible such that more affluent districts were able to circumvent the state equalizing formula.

Two things happened across the state. 1. Poorer districts and their students had less than

\$3,000 per student for education while other districts have three times that much. So much for so called "Equal education for all", 2. Unequal property taxes for similar properties with special tax breaks given to business and the burden quite often shifted to the home owner.

Property taxpayers have revolted and the Governor and legislators have responded with a package that will be brought to a vote on June 2, 1993.

As the weather becomes warmer, more plants can be uncovered in the garden. This is a good time to inspect Daisies, Yarrow, Gaillardia, Artemesia, Asters and Chrysanthemums for overcrowding. These plants, all with fibrous roots, will benefit by being divided and you can increase your garden stock.

Attack the overgrown plant by digging up the whole plant and pulling it apart or cutting it into manageable pieces with a knife or sharp shovel. Plant the pieces immediately, giving

them lots of water and protection from the sun and wind for a few days.

Chrysanthemums, especially, can be rewarding by dividing the green shoots at this time of year. That flowering plant that you bought last September can be multiplied by this method. All fall-purchased 'mums are not suitable for this area so when you do buy one that survives, treasure it and increase it. Plant the fist-sized pieces in an out-of-way sunny spot with enough space to grow, water and protect them for a few days. Mulch them well and wait for the fall to move these large

flowering plants back into the garden for some needed color. All perennial plants put into the garden should be accompanied by a label. Instead of buying expensive metal tags, try cutting venetian blind slats into lengths or plastic bottles into nearly flat triangular pieces and using a "Sanford Sharpie" pen for permanent markings.

Next week, hopefully, will be suitable for "hardening off" the plants started under fluorescent lights in February. This will free up space for starting annual seeds and cuttings from Impatiens and Fibrous Begonia plants brought into the house last October.

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

Second Front Page: Tax Reform package

In essence the Sales tax will be increased to 6% from 4%, the property tax will be reduced by lowering the growth of valuation to 3% - 5%. Further school districts will be limited to 18 charter mills with a maximum of 9 additional mills of enrichment. The enrichment mills must be voted on by each district.

Locally we would have 18 mills plus the 4.5 mills currently approved (scheduled to expire in June of 1994) for a total of 22.5 mills. We now are paying 40.13 mills for operating, therefore we would have a reduction

of 17.63 mills. If your home was valued at \$100,000 with a SEV of \$50,000 this would mean a savings of \$881.50.

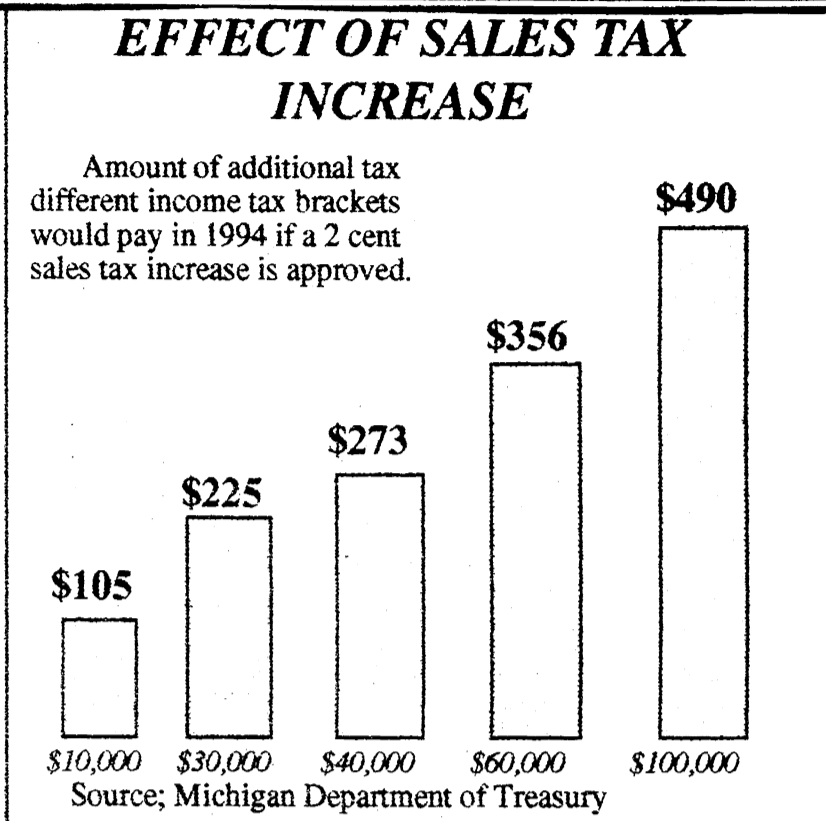
Other millages for local and county debt retirement would not be affected, other than the SEV increases would be rolled back to the 1992/1993 levels with max increases of 3% in 93/94 or possibly 5% 94/95.

Some of the offsets of this will be that items purchased that sales tax is currently assessed against such as automobiles, appliances etc. will increase in cost by 2%. Federal income tax

deduction for property tax decrease will increase your income tax load slightly. If you are in a 15% bracket the increase on the \$881.50 could amount to \$132.50. State income tax could also increase.

By using a sales tax increase it is hoped that out of state consumers will pay part of the costs as they spend in Michigan.

Our school system will have to absorb the full costs of retirement programs and Social Security. This will cost about \$611,142 annually but the funds will come from the state to cover the burden. Superintendent Niedzwiecki thought we may have a slightly negative impact with possible cuts in expenditures anticipated.



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

The Department of Veterans Affairs is searching for thousands of veterans exposed to mustard gas while participating in classified tests of protective equipment and ointments during World War II.

They participated in these tests under an oath of secrecy recently lifted when evidence indicated long-term health effects related to that exposure.

Many of them, or their survivors, may be eligible for VA benefits based upon certain health conditions related to their exposure.

Veterans can contact VA toll free to determine their eligibility for benefits based upon that chemical exposure some 50 years ago.

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Down Memory Lane

A letter from John Emory Irwin's Civil War diary, compiled by Maxine White, granddaughter of J.E. Irwin. The Irwin farmstead is located at 16880 Grass Lake Road

Camp Near Lebanon, KY.,
April 9, 1863
Dear Mother -

I have only a few moments to spare and two or three letters to write but when it comes time for me to write home, that comes first and foremost, 'fore everything else.

Last Thursday we left the place where my last letter was dated and with awful heavy knapsacks plodded over (18) eighteen miles of territory — not square miles but linear miles, though they seemed long enough to be. A man can comfortably enough walk twenty miles in a day, but let him put a load on his back once and try it. A large blanket, overcoat, two pieces of tent, oilcloth, extra shirt, drawers, stockings, towel, a little piece of soap, housewife, Testament, tactics, then add to that a haversack with two days cooked rations, a canteen, partly full of water, a small hatchet, gun and cartridge box with sixty rounds of cartridges in it, as we are now compelled to carry, and you have a very fair idea of a soldier's kit.

We reached Springfield at night, footsore and tired enough.
