The business operated in three different locations on both sides of Main Street up to 1941, when the Widmayers built a new, larger building on the south side of Main Street. In that same year, Roland and Herb Widmayer bought the business from their father.

Widmayer Hardware was a mainstay of the Main Street business block until 1972, when Herb Widmayer retired and sold the business to Sam and Joan Beal. They operated Beal's Ace Hardware in the same location until their retirement, when they, in turn, sold the business.

The Post Office now occupies the building.

Herb Widmayer also operated Manchester's movie theatre. He opened it in 1935 on the north side of Main Street. The first feature film starred Jean Arthur, and was shown along with "The Ant and the Grasshopper" cartoon.

Mr. Widmayer has taken pride in his home town throughout his long life. The perpetual tree fund he has created will give both pride and pleasure to Manchester residents and visitors for many years to come.

From The Ground Up

The loveliest of flowers now blooming deserve to be named after the rainbow goddess. Iris have an extraordinary selection and intensity of colors. We are fortunate that our limy, well-drained soil is ideal for "german bearded" Iris. They ask only for a half day of sunlight and some moisture at planting to give us seven weeks of flowers. Imagine Iris in the fall; reblooming Iris are becoming more available.

Iris can be appreciated after blooming for two reasons: the leaves are a good green accent in the garden and the surplus plants lend themselves to exchanges between neighbors.

Clumps of Iris should be divided after a few years. The flowers will increase dramati-

cally in the new plantings. A few weeks after flowering, dig the clump and clean with the hose. Each new plant will consist of a rhizome (a thick underground stem) and a fan of leaves.

Pull the rhizomes apart and let them air dry for a day or two. Plant the rhizome like a duck — halfway out of the soil but with the fine roots completely covered. The clump of Iris will increase in the direction of the fan of leaves. If the fan faces inward in a circle, the future flowers will be well massed but the clump will be too crowded too quickly.

The frequency of the need to divide the Iris will depend upon the variety of Iris and your type of soil. Think of it as an opportunity to inspect the plants for borers or rot, to increase your stock and to share with your friends and neighbors.

A Day at the Burmeister Dairy Farm With Klager Kindergartners

On Friday, June 4, the kindergartners of Klager loaded on a bus and headed for the Burmeister Dairy Farm located on Steinbach Road, Manchester. When we arrived, a sign greeted us, "Welcome, Manchester Kindergartners!" We split up into groups and were off.

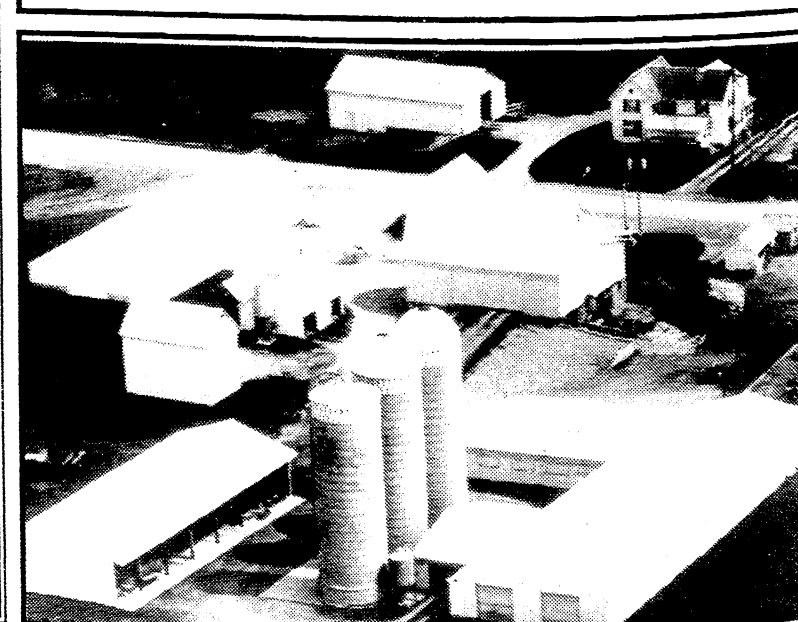
We were invited to pet baby farm animals: a calf, piglets, lambs, lots of ducks and a rabbit named "Cinnamon." We went on a hayride, and all the children were treated to a ride on an 18-year-old pony named Prince. (We were told ponies live to be 30 to 35 years old, so Prince was just a teenager.) We had a tour through the milking house and told by Mr. Burmeister that the bulk tank holds up to 1500 gallons of milk at a time. The Burmeisters have 63 cows presently that have to be milked twice every day at 6:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. We were treated to an ice cream cone before the bus ride back to school.

Leonard Burmeister was born here in 1924. His father bought the farm in 1922 including 100 acres. They now have 500 acres. Leonard married Mary Lessler, originally from Dexter, in 1945. Leonard purchased his first cow when he was 16-years-old. Years back, they had purebred sheep, chickens, hogs, dairy cows, quarter horses, and raised purebred border collies that were sold all over the country. Now the farm is strictly a dairy farm.

This is the third year the Burmeisters have hosted the kindergarten tours. Volunteers Mary Jones and Shirley Haeussler helped the Burmeisters show us around and we all had a great time. Thank you.

Wayne has been a resident of the Manchester School District for 17 years. He and his wife Sandy have three boys: twins Benjamin and James, age 19 who attended BYU for a year and are now serving with a church mission in Germany; and Andy, age 16, a sophomore at Manchester High School. Wayne has been involved with the Manchester Band Boosters for five years as an officer and volunteer.

About the School Board, Wayne states: "My feelings about the administration and staff is that as a group they are competent and dedicated and very concerned about responding to the educational challenges of the school system."

I believe that the community involvement process started by the administration and staff is an important one. We need lots of community input and assistance.

Manchester residents are both independent and community-minded. This has been demonstrated by the financial support the schools have received from both voters and booster organizations.

We have other resources in the community that could improve the quality of education without requiring more financial support. We need to tap these resources, while at the same time making the schools a better resource for members of the community.

Annual School Election

The annual election of the school district will be on Monday, June 14, 1993. Polls are open from 7:00 a.m. - 8:00 p.m., at Manchester High School, 710 E. Main Street, Manchester.

Competing for one four-year team are Bruce Thomson and Paul Kluwe. Wayne Winenz is running unopposed for a two-year term. (See left).

Also a millage proposition is being requested. The Board of Education is asking to renew only 1.4308 of the 1.5 mills approved five years ago. The Board has included in the proposition the phrase about purchasing equipment related to renovating to clarify the fact that the funds may be used for these purposes as well as maintenance renovation and repair.

Passage of this millage will enable the school district to continue with maintenance and improvement of school facilities. The importance of maintaining our facilities has always been recognized by the Manchester community as a priority. The renewal of the 1.4308 mills helps insure continuity.

Seventeen years ago, the State of Michigan paid for over forty percent of our general budget. Today, the State pays nearly nothing. The difference has been picked up by Manchester's local taxpayers. In some districts, the

State still pays over forty percent and this is unfair to the taxpayers of our district. The answers to Manchester's pending financial difficulties lie with the state, not with raising the property tax still higher. This process begins at the local level, and it requires urgent attention. From an educational standpoint, our focus needs to remain primarily on academics. We need to provide adequate facilities, a safe school environment, and the necessary instructional tools to allow our parents, teachers, and students to get the job done. 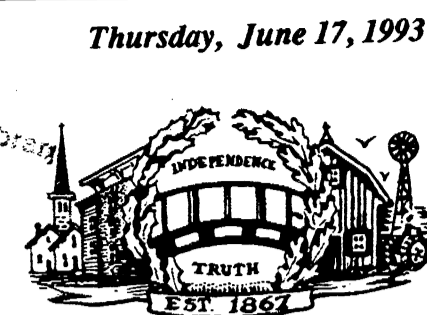
