## 40th Annual Chicken Broil

If it's summer in Manchester, the Chicken Broil must be right around the corner.

This year is even more special because it is the fortieth anniversary of the event.

Mark your calendars for Thursday, July 15th, and plan to do no cooking that evening. Let the men of our town do it for you.

Once again, the armies of the Chicken Broil will be out in force to cook up 15,000 or more chicken halves in the time-honored fashion. Radishes will roll, cabbage will be transformed into the famous secret slaw (see related story page two), and if all goes well, the skies will smile down on one of the biggest suppers in America.

On that day of the year, a stranger driving through Manchester can find out exactly what those signs at the village limits mean, the ones that say "Home of the Famous Chicken Broil." The deputies directing traffic and the clouds of smoke rolling from the athletic field are not signs of a major fire, and the horses pulling wagon loads of commuters from the high school are not evidence of a time warp. This dinner, big enough to feed Paul Bunyan, is Manchester's main event, and it is still going strong after 40 years.

You can choose to partake on the grounds or pick up diners to go. The time you spend at the site will be filled with entertainment by roving barber shop quartets, the Sweet Adelines and a variety of stage bands. All this still only costs \$5.00 in advance or \$5.50 at the gate.

So, you fans of chicken and tradition, plan to come out on July 15th, for the annual treat. Serving starts at 4:00 p.m.

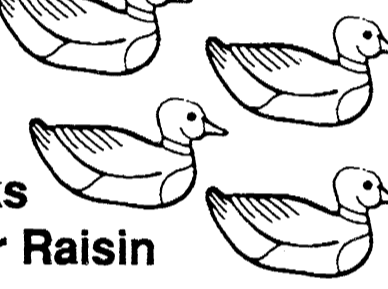
Proceeds from the broil always go toward projects that help Manchester community maintain its small town beauty and charm.

The owner of the winning duck receives \$150, second place wins \$75 and the next twelve ducks each receive \$20. (You do not need to be present to win.) All proceeds will be used for community projects.

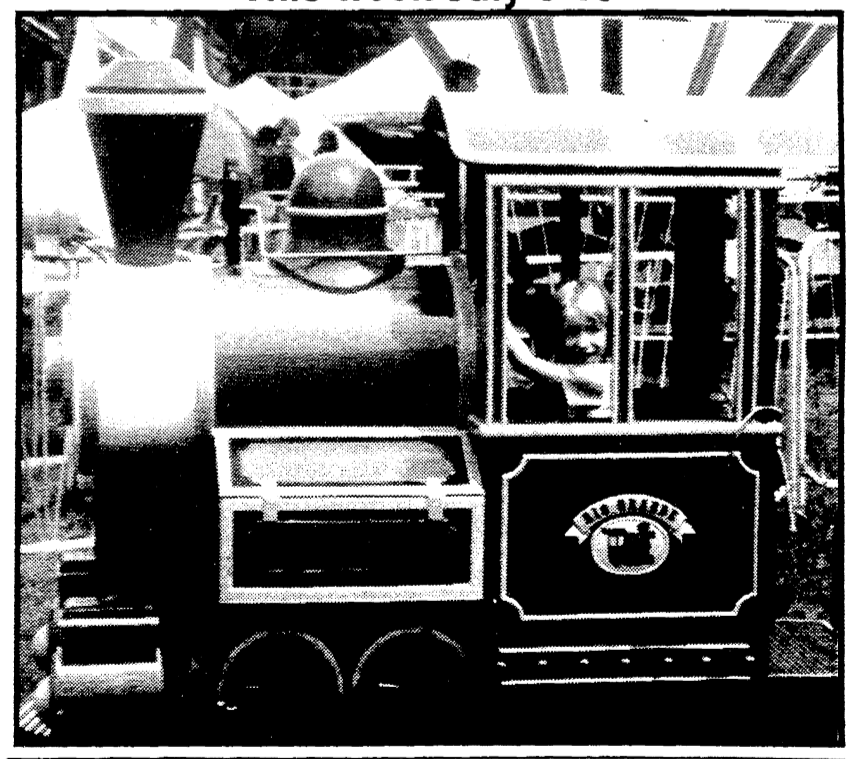

### From The Ground Up

Weeds are a nuisance but they can give you some information about the conditions in your garden. Look around to see what Mother Nature has done with the same conditions.

If you happen to have dandelions or thistles because of seeds from neighboring fields, these ideas won't be appropriate to your situation.

Some weeds, such as Mullein, Knapweed, Yarrow, prefer dry, gravelly conditions. Burdocks, Plantain, Purslane might be found more often in a heavier, more moist soil. Cinquefoil likes a dry limestone gravel.

The plants that we think of as weeds do have "cousins" that are desirable garden plants. Consider these respectable flowers for the same conditions that gave you the weeds. The common Mullein and Moth

Some people think they know it, and some may even come close, but nobody really knows it. "We keep it a secret," says Lyle Widmayer.

Widmayer has been chairman of the Manchester Chicken Broil Cole Slaw Committee for the past 35 years, and the secret recipe for cole slaw is safe in his hands.

A few days before the annual Manchester Chicken Broil, he and seven other members of the committee meet at the Baker's Dozen and spend two hours grinding ingredients, mixing and bottling the secret slaw recipe. The committee refrigerates the 80-gallon batch of dressing in an undisclosed location until that third Thursday in July, when they haul it down to the old athletic field and pour it over two pickup truckloads of shredded cabbage.

every sign of the mixing process is gone. You would never know they'd been there, the Kings say.

In the 40 years that the Chicken Broil has been raising funds for Manchester civic projects, the slaw-making process has been refined and streamlined out of necessity. The men of Manchester now serve about 20,000 dinners, compared to the original 1,500.

Doc Jones offered to use his slaw recipe the first year of the now-famous annual event but, in spite of the requests from the "customers", never gave the recipe.

Jones has long since retired to Florida from his dentistry practice in Manchester, but the 33-man committee has kept the secret. Through the years they have been asked repeatedly for the secret recipe.

Requests, cash offers and pleas for the recipe still go unheeded. Some people even say that the eight committee members who make the dressing each know only a portion of the recipe.

Widmayer says let them think whatever they want. The recipe Doc Jones cooked up 40 years ago is one of the best-guarded drawing cards to the annual fund raising event, and he intends to keep it that way.

Mullein, both considered weeds, have close relatives, Verbascum Phoeniceum, "Pink Form", Silver Lining", chaixi and olympicum that are sold as plants and seeds in nurseries.

Even Purslane, a miserable weed, has a member of the family that we all buy and use extensively and that is Moss Rose or Portulaca.

Knapweed is related to the cultivated flowers Centaurea, Mountain Bleuts, Sweet Sultan, perennial Comflowers, all of which will do well in the same conditions.

Yarrow is another with more respectable cousins, "Coronation Gold", Cerise Queen", "The Pearl", "Cloth of Gold", all familiar and desirable garden flowers.

Labels become very important with these "cousins" because it is hard to tell the good guys from the bad guys while weeding in the early spring.

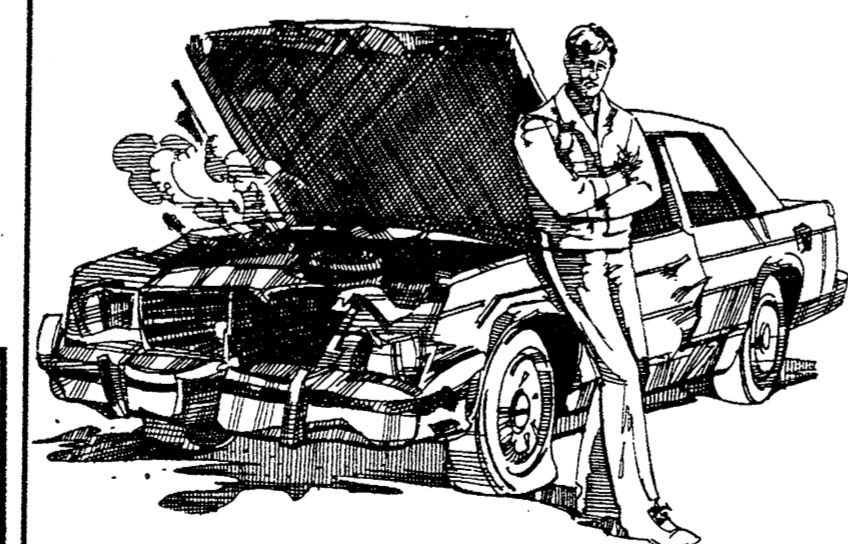

Compact size first aid kits, produced by Manchester area Boy Scouts, are now available at locations throughout our community.

The kit is packaged in a waterproof, floatable plastic cylinder about 1.5" in diameter, 5.5" high, with a push-and-turn plastic lid. Each cylinder is packed with items proven to be useful in common emergencies and the contents are clearly identified on an exterior label:

Two antihistamine capsules for the relief of allergy symptoms

Four tablets of pain reliever (Tylenol)

A tube of anti-inflammation cream (Cortaid)

Three blister packs of antibacterial ointment (Bacitracin)

Two blister packs of alcohol swabs

Four 1", four 3/4", two 1/2" butterfly, two 3/8" butterfly, and one extra large adhesive bandages

Profits from the sale of these kits are earmarked for the purchase of sorely needed camping equipment. The scouts of Troop 426 are hopeful for a strong response. Area businesses are encouraged to order a quantity for sale to employees.

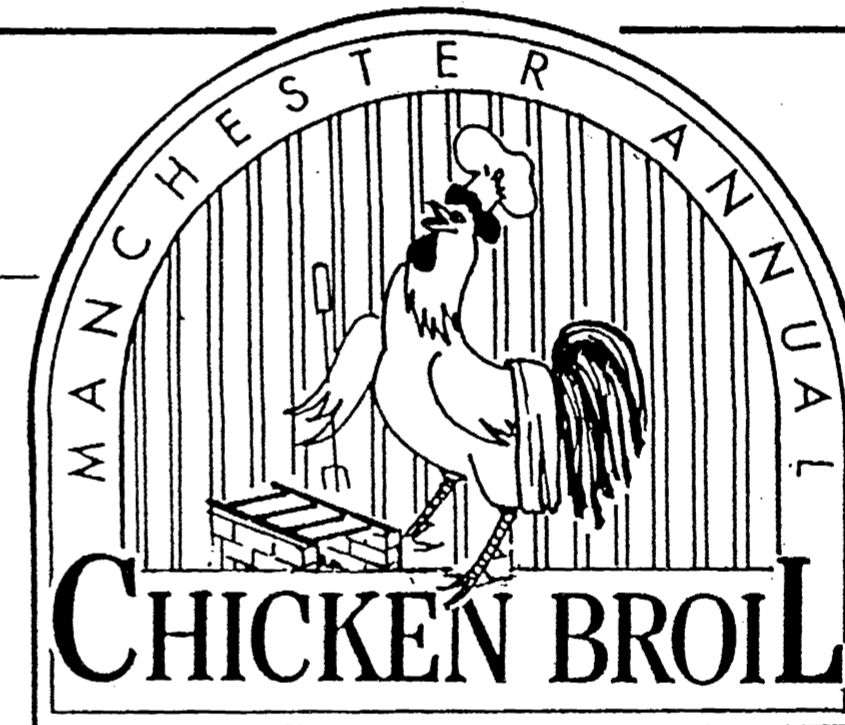

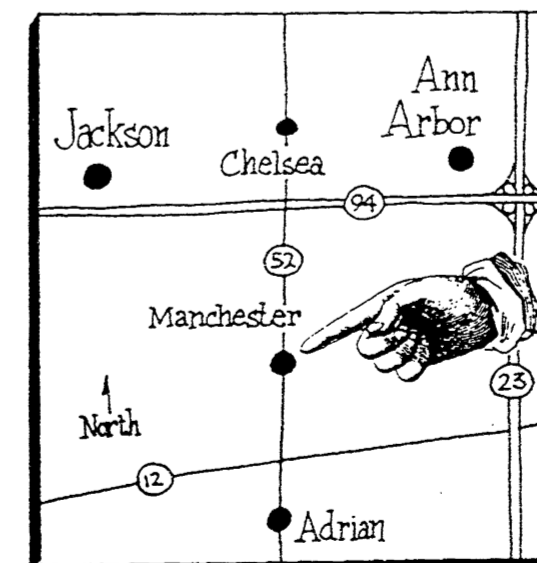

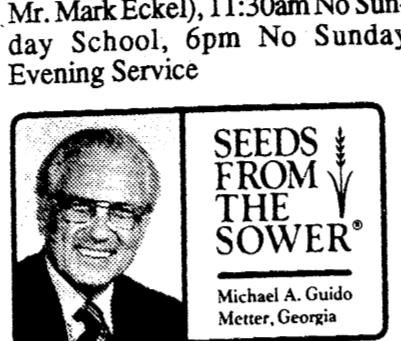

Upon returning to open session, the meeting was adjourned at 9:40 p.m.

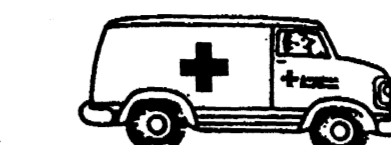

There are cards in these boxes which you can fill out and you will then be signed up. Not hard at all, is it?

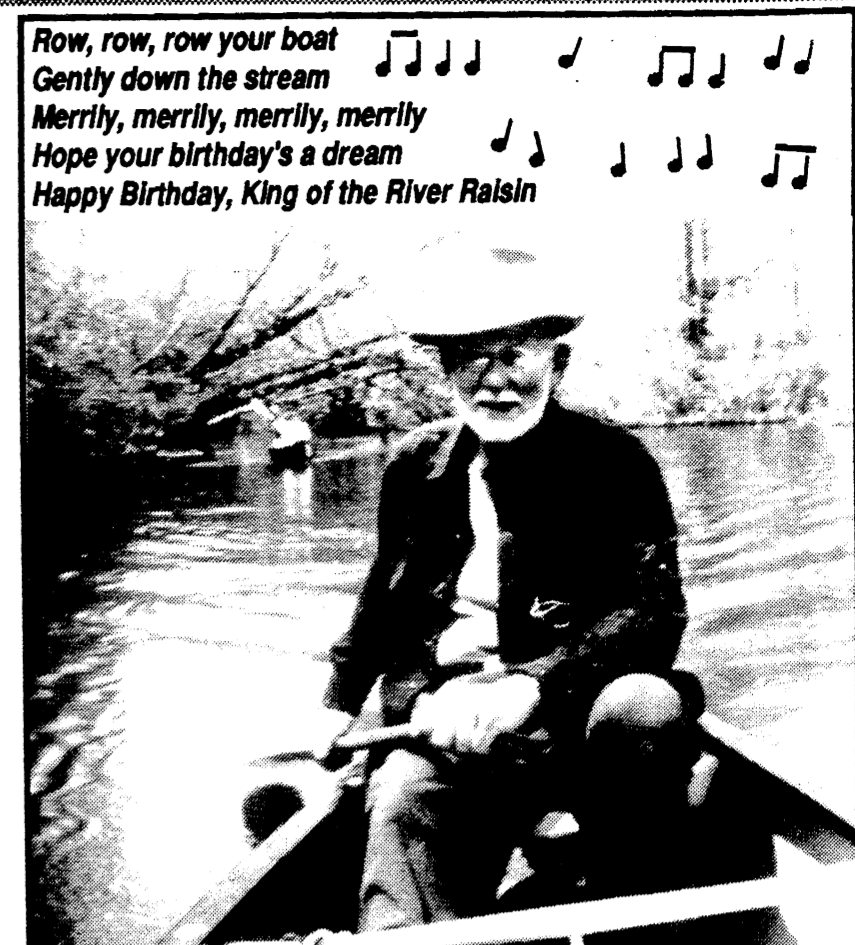

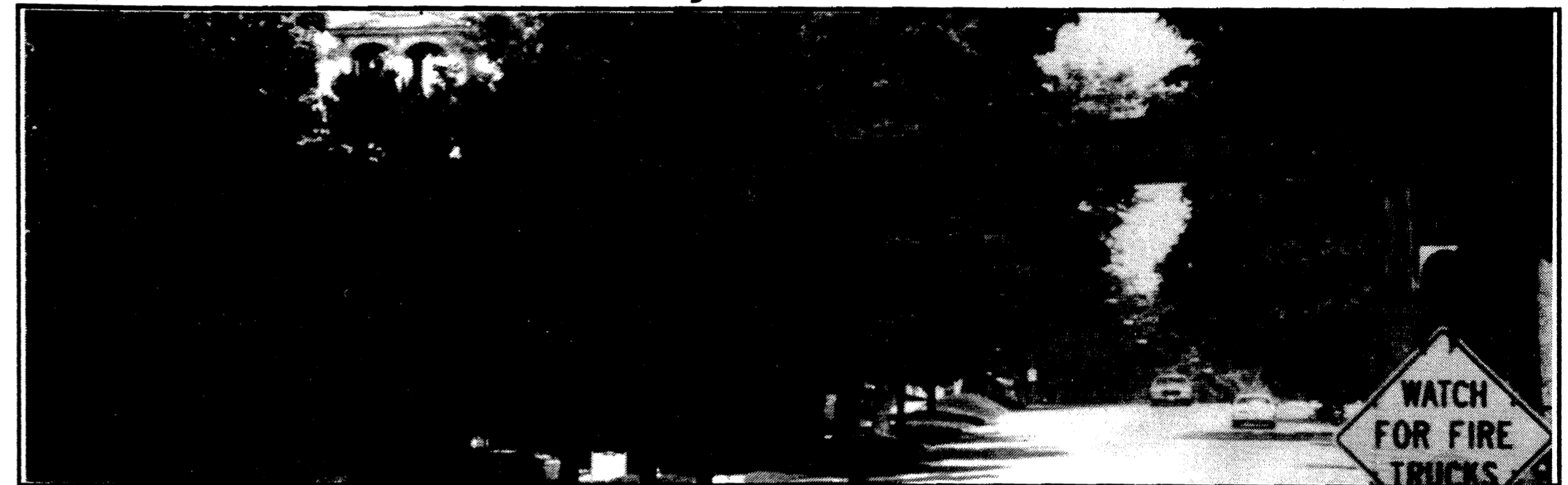

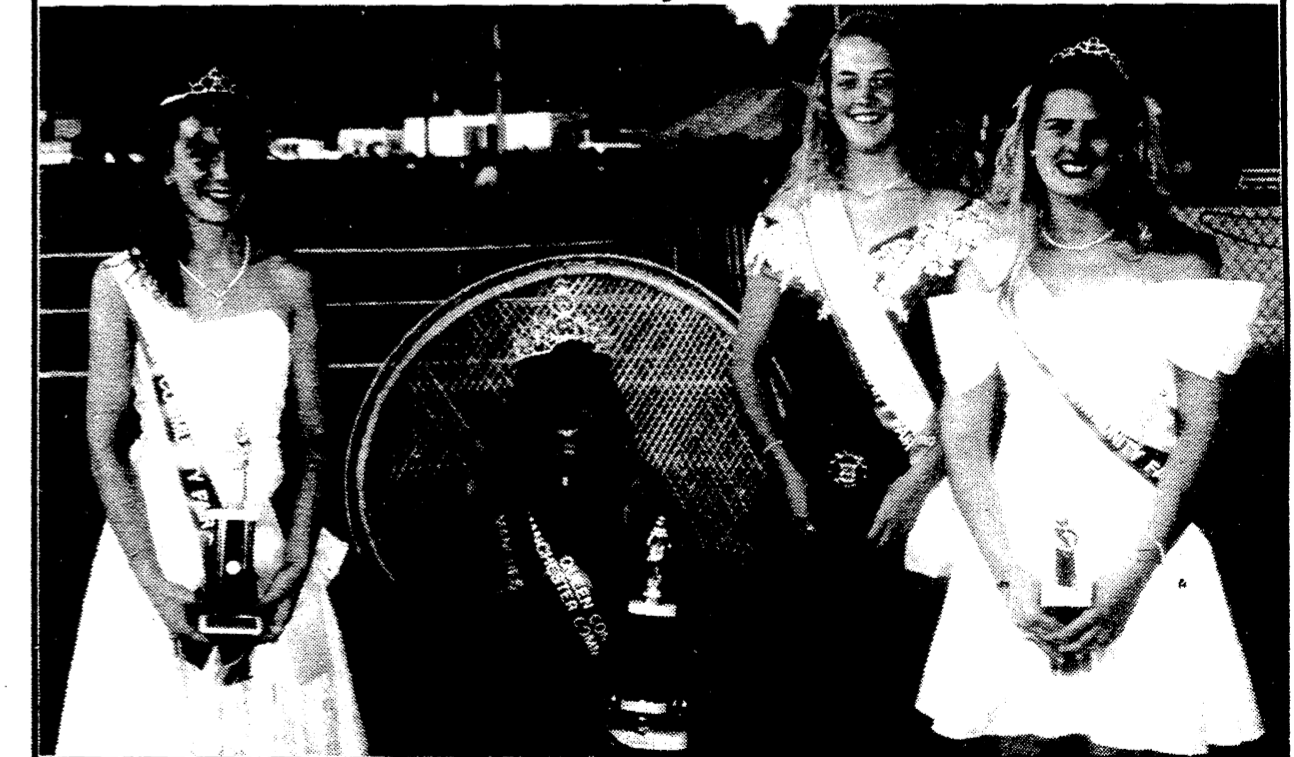
About 25 students have registered for this year's team, coached by John Korican.
