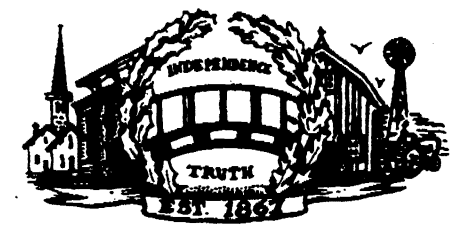

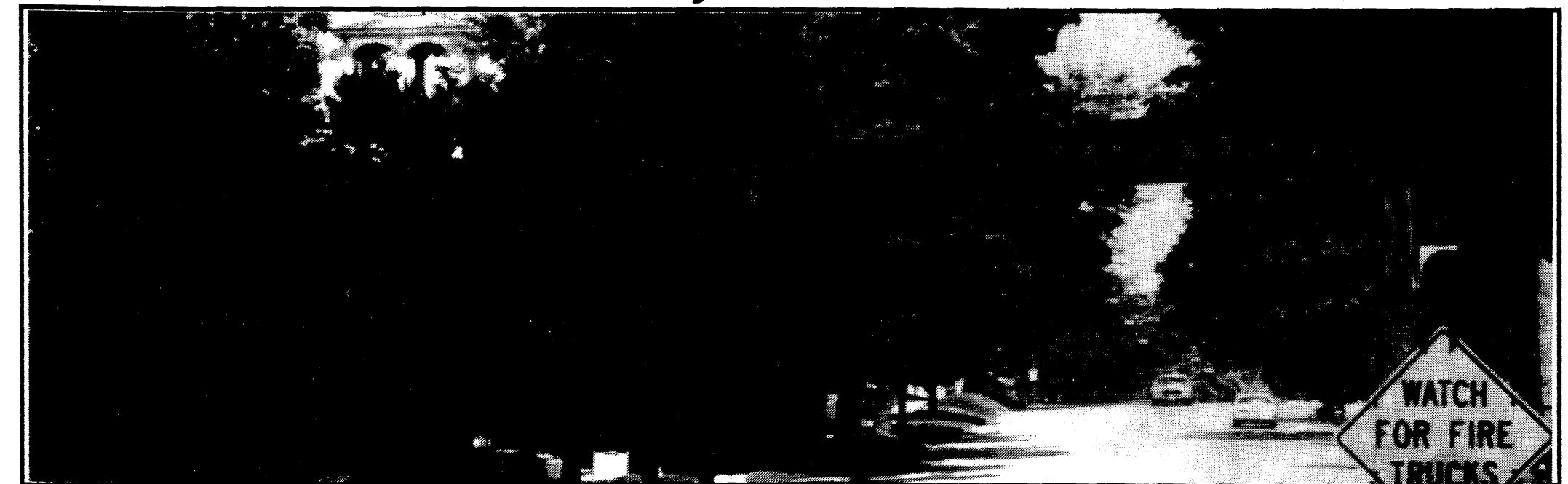

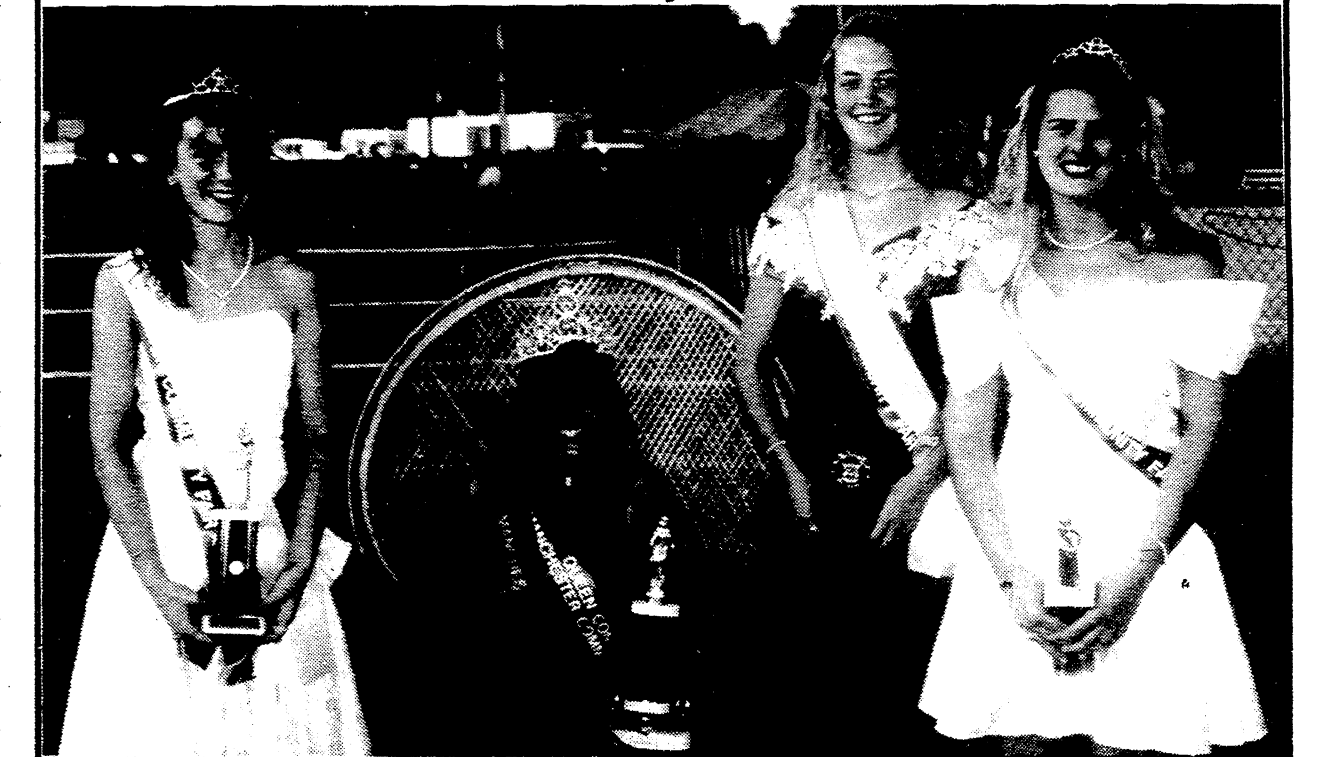
About 25 students have registered for this year's team, coached by John Korican.

## From The Ground Up

If you are thinking about adding new plants to your garden, it would be nice to see them before investing time and money.

A close-by opportunity to view possible plants in a natural setting is Hidden Lake Gardens near Tipton, 5.4 miles west of M-52 on M-50 and four miles south of U.S. 12.

The annual flowers are featured in the large Display Garden of All-American Selections. The perennial beds are new but promising and there are groundcovers and other plants to consider.

The collections of the many varieties of evergreens, trees and shrubs could help in making a decision about that type of landscaping. The excellent labels are easy to read and the available map is helpful.

The gift shop has a good selection of gardening books, including the inexpensive Brooklyn Botanic series. The entry fee is \$1 per person on weekdays and \$3 on the weekend.

Another garden that features mixed perennial beds and new beds with some roses and herbs is free and always open with easy access and close by parking. This little-known gem is located in front of the Extension building in the service complex on the northeast corner of Washtenaw Avenue and Carpenter Roads in Ann Arbor. It features plants that are easily grown and obtainable in this area. This garden is maintained by master gardeners who might be working and available for questions during your visit. For more information, telephone the Cooperative Extension Service at 971-0079.

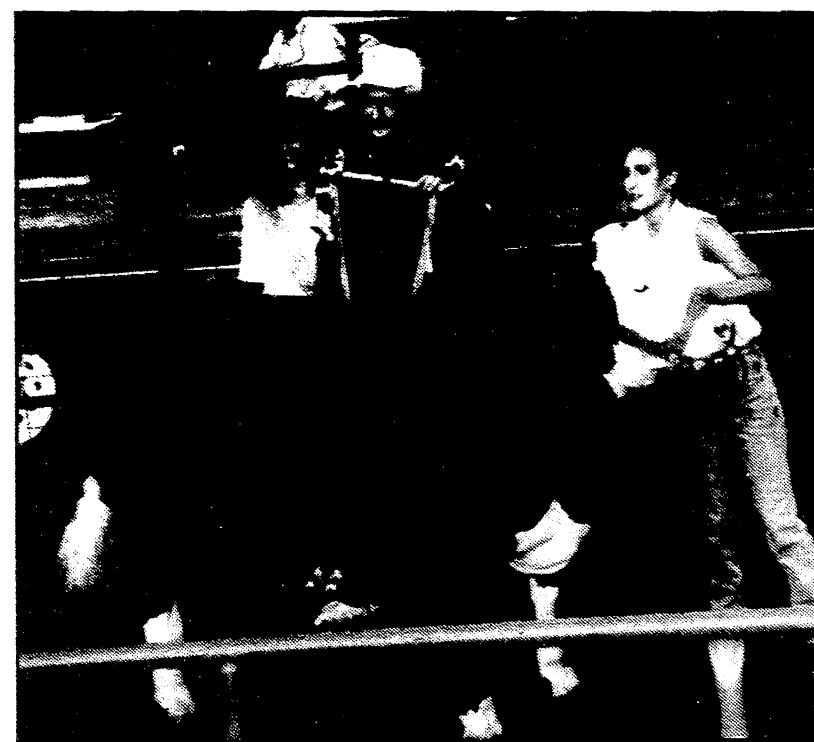

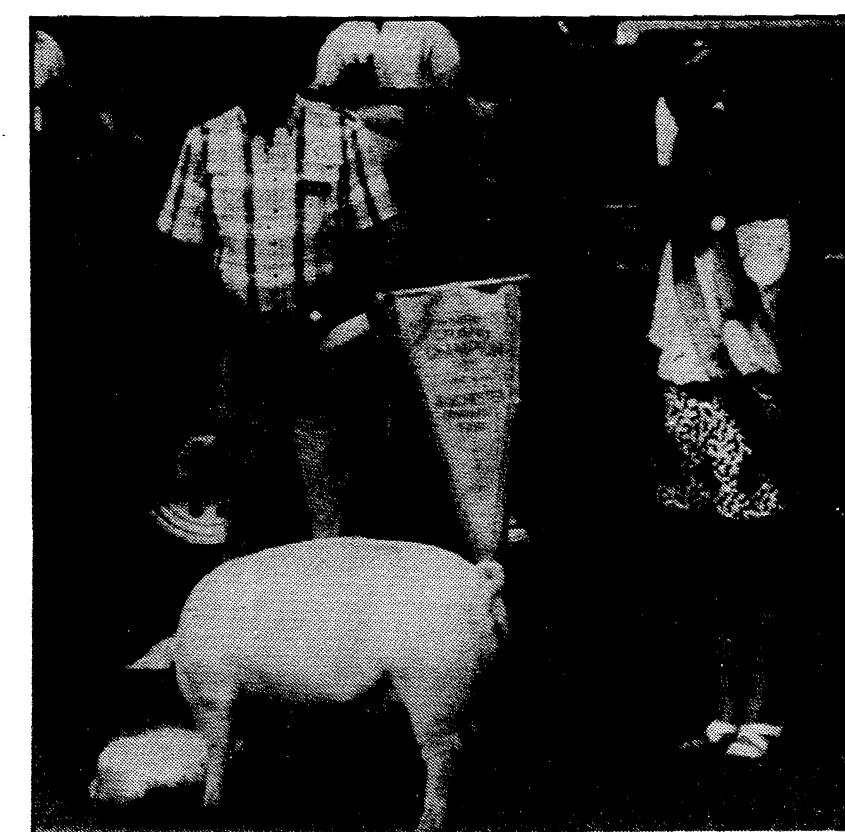

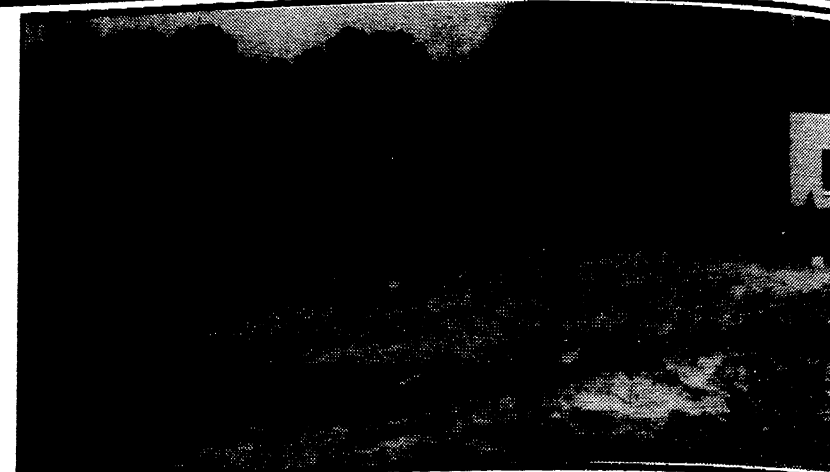

capped with hemlock roof boards and shingles. A three foot overhang will surround the perimeter.

The structure has been two years in the planning stage. Mr. Lou Way appeared before the Village Council at the June 21st meeting asking for authorization to shift the location as shown on the Master plan. Village Council agreed to the change in location at CharBro Park. The Pavilion is located between Ann Arbor Street and the watertower.

Tri-County logging from Clinton is donating the white oak. Mr. Stuart Elliot will assist with the construction of the frame. Chelsea Lumber Company is furnishing materials at their cost for the project. Local contractors have furnished equipment and manpower to grade the site.

Mr. Way mentioned to Council members that the Chicken Broil Committee is concerned about getting this project underway. Mr. Way expressed that should this project not commence that the funds, some \$18,000 would be used for Coach Wes Gall's project. Councilman Brooks with Councilman Gordon moved that the changes to the Parks Master plan be authorized. Council concurred and the project is underway.
