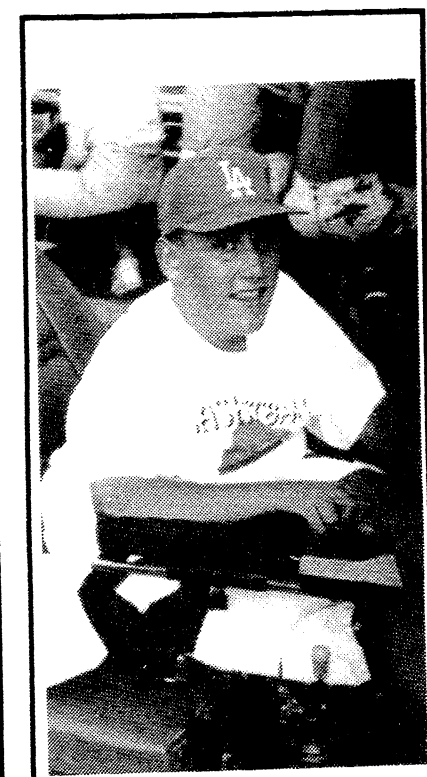

A moment of silence was observed in memory of Chelsea Schools' Superintendent Joseph Piasecki.

The minutes of the regular meeting of November 15, 1993 were approved as presented.

The treasurer's report was approved (correction on entry to Krzyzaniak's for 20 bales of hay) with a cash balance, as of November 30, 1993, in the amount of \$337,205.80; total bills payable of \$526,289.73.

Correspondence included a copy of the Governors' Michigan School Report; a letter to Dave Swanson from Ted Manning of Schoolcraft High School thanking him for the hospitality shown during the playoff football game on November 13, 1993; letter to Russ LeBlanc from Plymouth Officials Association expressing their gratitude of the professionalism and graciousness shown them by Manchester staff during the playoff game against Schoolcraft; announcement from Joseph Wagner, Willow Run Community Schools, about the Third Annual Community Christmas Dinner to be served December 25, 1993; communication from Mary Kallewaard inviting board members to the Optimist Dinner on Monday, January 10, 1994 at which time board members will be recognized; memorandum reminding board

- Possibly, a representative from the State Legislature

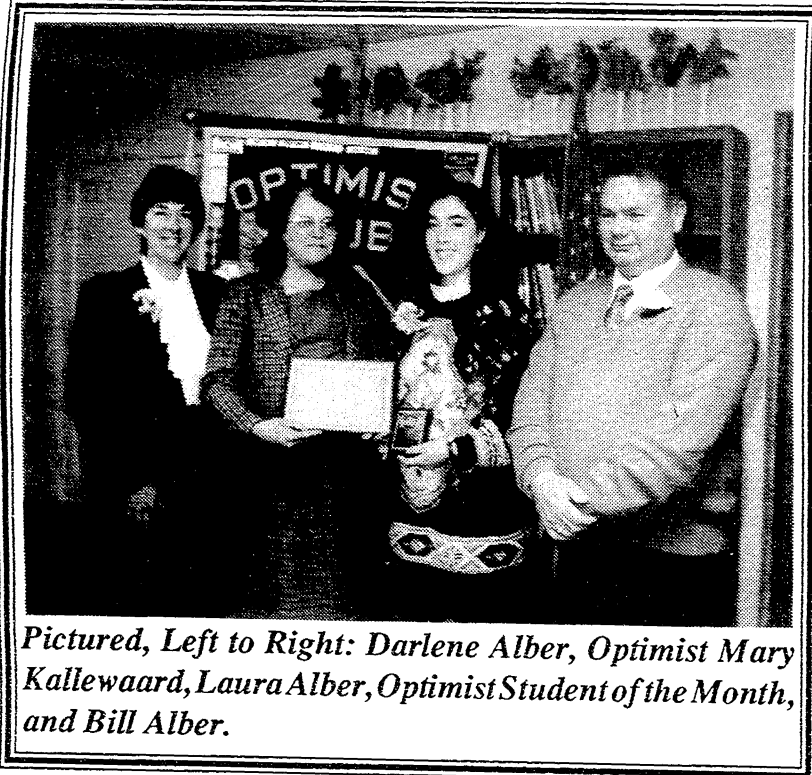

The Country School

For the first eight years of my schooling, from 1928 through 1936, I was privileged to attend Davidter Country School. It was located on Bethel Church Road in Sharon Township. It is now annexed into Manchester Schools. It was fenced in on three sides by woven wire fence with barbed wire on top of the woven wire. In the school yard beside the school was a woodshed. Each farmer that had children in school was expected to furnish three cords of split wood each year, which they brought to the woodshed and piled it in rows in the woodshed. Out back of the school house were two outside toilets - one for the girls and one for the boys. Outside there also was a water pump for our drinking water. There was a cement porch in the front, the full length of the school.

During the last week of August on a bright sunny day, the women and men of our school district would converge on the school loaded with brooms, mops and lots of rags - also rakes, saws and a ladder and hammer and nails, paint brushes and white wash paint. The annual school house cleaning had begun. The women brought ammonia and vinegar and Lysol and lots of soap.

Every inch of the school was scrubbed clean; the windows were washed on the inside and the ladder put up and windows were washed on the outside.

The men raked the yard and sawed up any branches hanging from the trees. They also cleaned the ash pit where all of last year's ashes were. They repaired the roof of the school house and woodshed, replacing any loose or missing shingles. Also, they checked the roof on each toilet. The toilets were scrubbed with a broom and Lysol and then they were white-washed. New catalogues were placed in each for toilet paper. No one had any money to buy toilet paper, and everyone had catalogues from Montgomery Ward and Sears.

At noon, the picnic baskets were opened, and we all sat on the cement porch and had a good lunch. Then back to cleaning.

By 3:00 o'clock every inch of the school was as clean as it could be. Even the pot-bellied stove had a new coat of stove blackening paint and new stove pipes had been installed. All was ready for school next week.

When you entered the school house door, there was an entry room called a Cloak Room. There were spike nails pounded along the walls for us to hang up our coats and hats. There was a large shelf for the water pail and a galvanized wash basin and a roller towel beside the wash basin.

Each home was expected to take the roller towel home once a week and wash it and bring it back. There was also a soap dish for the bar of lye soap, furnished by the parents of the school children.

There were two entry doors into the school room. Usually, the boys went in on the right side of the room and girls on the left side. Desks were on both sides with an aisle for the teacher to walk up and down keeping track of all that was going on the school room. Placed in the middle of the room up front was a woodshed, replacing any loose or missing shingles. Also, they checked the roof on each toilet. The toilets were scrubbed with a broom and Lysol and then they were white-washed. New catalogues were placed in each for toilet paper. No one had any money to buy toilet paper, and everyone had catalogues from Montgomery Ward and Sears.

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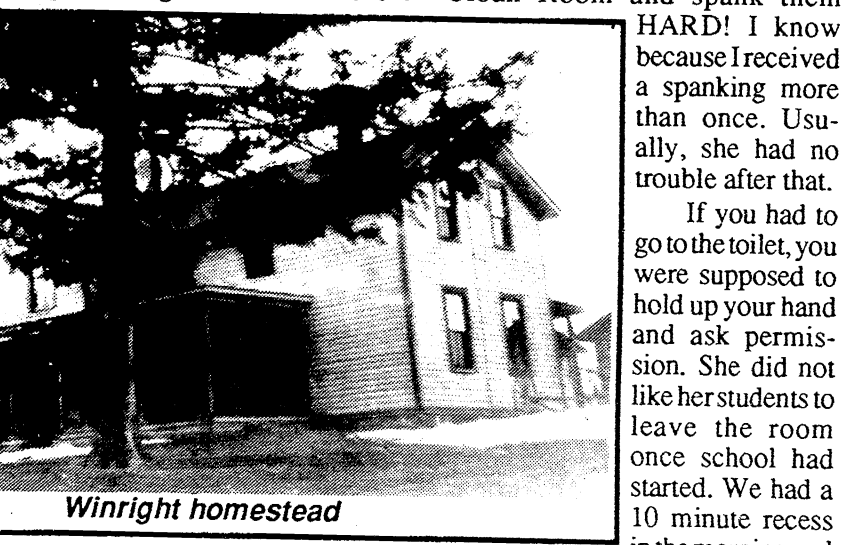

When the bell rang, you marched out to the Cloak Room, washed and wiped your hands, got your lunch and marched back to your desk and ate your lunch. We all had a sandwich of homemade bread, probably most of us had jelly sandwiches. I know I never had bread from a store until I was 12 years old. My mother always made big sugar cookies every week, so

CROSWELL OPENS SECOND HALF OF SEASON With *Inherit the Wind*

The powerful drama "Inherit the Wind" opens the 1994 half of the Croswell Opera house's fall/winter season in January.

"Inherit the Wind" is based on the real-life 1925 trial in Dayton, Tennessee of teacher John Thomas Scopes, who was accused of teaching his students Darwin's theory of evolution—a practice expressly forbidden by Tennessee state law at that time. There was never any question Scopes had done what he was accused of—the battle was over the theory itself versus the Biblical story of creation.

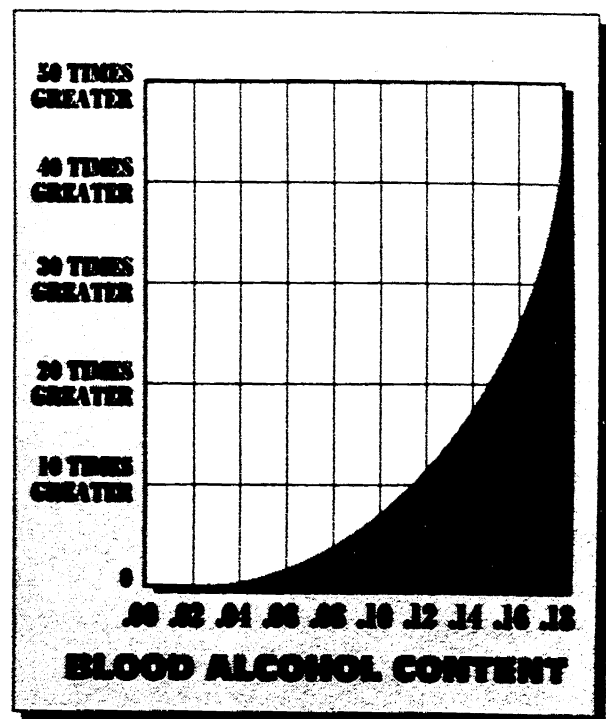
The trial caught the attention of virtually an entire nation, and went on for weeks in the summer of 1925. When the dust had settled Scopes was found guilty in a jury decision which took only seven minutes and he was fined \$100.

Playwrights Jerome Lawrence and Robert E. Lee turned the spectacular trial into "Inherit the Wind" in 1950, although they kept the work under wraps until 1954. It opened in Dallas in January 1955, and was on Broadway by April of that same year. The play was a sellout for 20 weeks and ran for 803 performances.

Although the Scopes trial took place almost 70 years ago, the questions it raised about people's freedom of thought are still as pertinent as ever.

Eleven of the 35 crashes involved alcohol.

According to Basch, the average cost of a drunk driving conviction (fines and attorney's fees) is \$4,000 plus increased insurance, which can add up to three times the current premium for a three-year period.

Popular alternatives to alcohol consumption reduce the risk of driving drunk by 100%. Non-alcoholic drinks and designated drivers provide party-goers with the incentive to drive sober.
