Going to Dacotah
Dec. 1879
by John Emory Irwin

If only we get to Dacotah



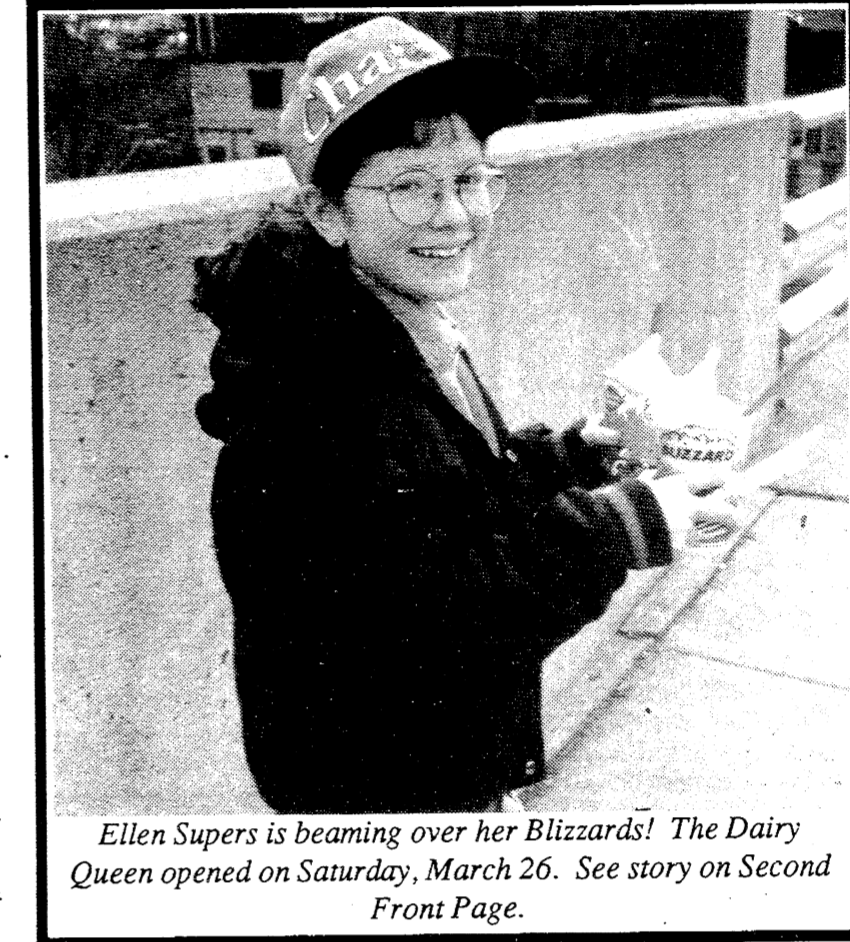
John Emory Irwin, 1917

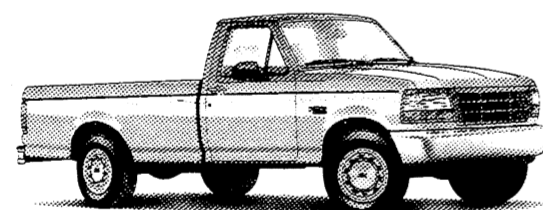

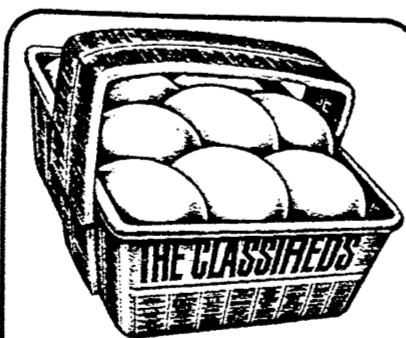

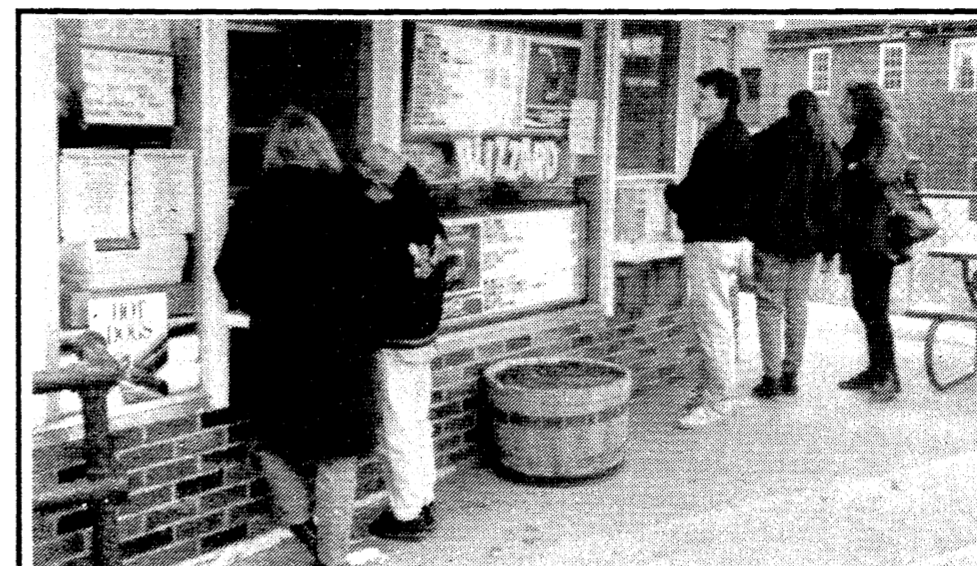
Dairy Queen Opens!

The Dairy Queen is a 46-year-old institution in Manchester. Started in 1948, just eight years after the Dairy Queen Corporation began their operations, our own "DQ" must rank among the oldest continually operating franchise.

Back in 1956 or '57, Francis Heckaman built the riverside building for the purpose of opening a Dairy Queen business. Prior to this time, Norm Higgins, who was a Dairy Queen Representative living in Manchester, had built a DQ in front of his house on Austin Road, just east of the current Atlas Feed Mill. This building was later sold and moved to Wampler's Lake. It was then that Higgins approached the Heckamans about operating a new Dairy Queen in Manchester.

Heckaman had been looking at the property by the river, which was owned by Mann's Feed Mill. The Manns were unwilling to sell the property, but the building was erected by Wilbur Shadley, a local carpenter, and was leased to the Heckamans. At some point, the building was sold to the business owners, but not while Heckaman had the business. They sold it in the spring of 1960, to an airline pilot who bought the business as an investment and had a

manager run it. In between, it was owned by Dorothy Moore and the Niehaus family, among others; the Niehaus' probably ran the business the longest.

An interesting sidelight which Francis Heckaman mentioned, was that originally, he had received permission from the village to remove the section of the bridge at the east end, to provide more sidewalk space. In the end, they decided to leave it as it was. "Must be everyone else has decided, like we did, that it provides a little bit

of privacy." Not to mention safety from the street, and, for older kids, somewhere to sit while they eat their ice cream!

Now owned by Jeff Fahey and managed by Jeff Knasiak, who continues his managerial duties of the past nine years, the Manchester Dairy Queen was purchased in 1993. The "Jeffs" have big plans for their DQ. A "face-lift" is scheduled for the near future which will include new serving windows and counters. They would also like to expand to a second

story and add deep fryers to increase their service.

Customer service is #1 at the Dairy Queen. Fahey & Knasiak promise to do a lot of promotions this year as they did last year. Weekly specials and coupon specials will continue to be featured in the Enterprise, so watch for their ads!

Fahey & Knasiak have purchased the United Trust Bank building in Clinton to open their second Dairy Queen. Their plans are to be open by July 4th - another ambitious venture. Both attended a two week intensive training course, complete with exams, in order to transfer the franchise of the Manchester DQ, so they've "passed the test".

A matter of pride to the Jeffs is the receipt of a "Golden Cone Award", which they won for increasing their soft serve sales and customer service. This is a distinguished award given out by the International Dairy Queen,

and is a very impressive accomplishment for their first year in business. They credit their staff with helping them increase their sales so dramatically. They've also increased their community involvement and visibility, donating to Senior Citizens, Summer Recreation, Co-op Preschool, Manchester Township Library, Canoe Race and Summer Festival.

A surer sign of spring than the robins, red-wing blackbirds, or longer days, is seeing people lined up outside the Manchester Dairy Queen for their soft-serve "Fix." On Saturday, March 26, you could see just that! "It was just like a busy Saturday on a hot day in July," said Jeff Knasiak. The cooler spring weather did not seem to inhibit the loyal DQ fans, who flocked to opening day and enjoyed their first taste of SUMMER! Although on Monday evening it felt more like snow, the DQ was still humming at 7:45 p.m. and jam-packed with customers, according to an Enterprise reporter who just had to have a Dairy Queen!

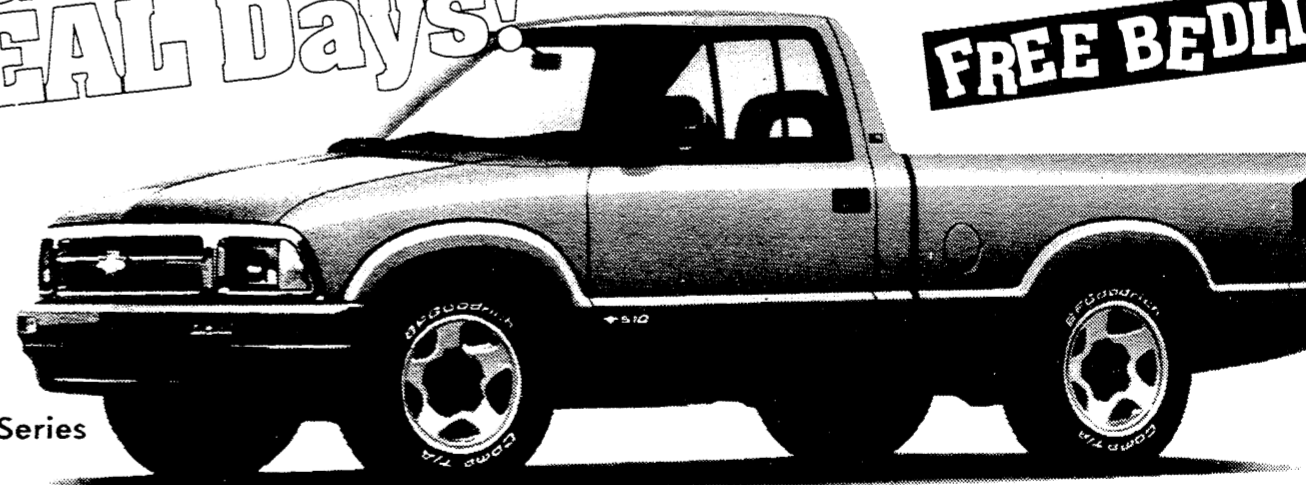
Keep that summer feeling coming - leave winter behind at the Dairy Queen! Hours will increase proportionately to the weather...so stay tuned.

Dear Editor,

"Nursing home" is really a misnomer in many of the Michigan facilities that agree to care for the most vulnerable citizens. The reason? They provide so few nurses and nurse aides.

All of Michigan's families would benefit if the Senate adopts a bill to improve care in nursing homes across the state. H.B. 4441, adopted in the Michigan House in January, requires more nurses for each nursing facility, and sets minimum ratios of nurse aides to residents and nurses to nurse aides. People who live in nursing homes can tell you, the staff makes all the difference between good and poor care.

This issue affects all families — virtually any adult can find themselves in a nursing home after a few days of care in a hospital if he/she needs more care and has no one at home to provide that care.

Your readers can underscore the importance of this legislation by writing to their state senators, and to Senator Pridnia, Chairman of the Senate Health Policy Committee. Ask for public hearings on this issue and quick passage of H.B. 4441 as it was approved by the House.

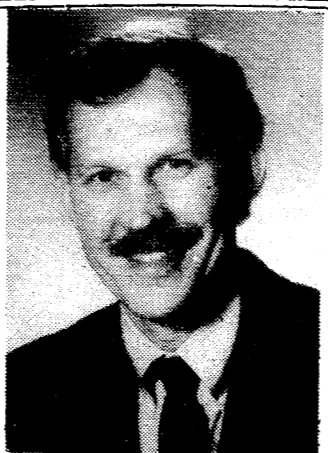

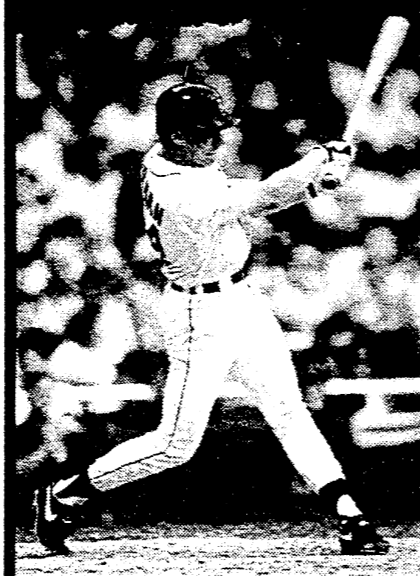

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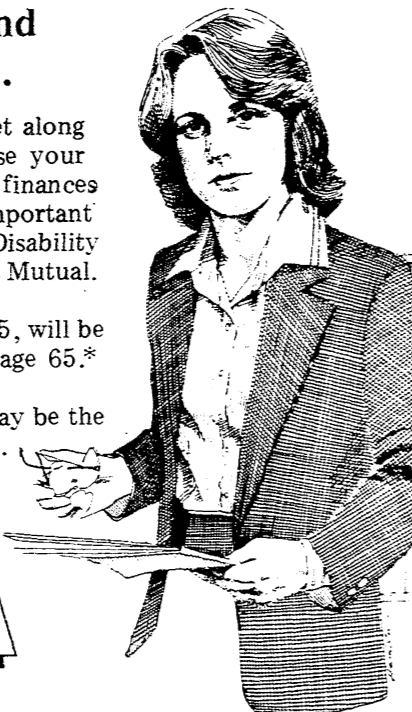

Proposed Synopsis

of the regular meeting of the Manchester Township Board held March 14, 1994:

The meeting was called to order at 8:00 p.m. with the following members present: Mann, Hakes, Turk. Absent: Widmayer, Macomber. Also present: Gary Wiedmayer, Kris Kensler, Dale Berry from Huron Valley Ambulance.

The Board approved the minutes of their last meeting and accepted the minutes of the Library Board, Planning Commission, and Western Washenaw Recycling Authority. Bills paid since the last meeting were reviewed. Treasurer Turk's report was accepted. Bills totaling \$10980.47 in the General Fund, and \$5880.00 in the Fire Equipment Fund were approved for payment. The Treasurer was authorized to purchase up to 75 zoning books.

The Board accepted the recommendation of the Fire Department to appoint Jacques LaRocque and Todd Knepper as probationary members of the Fire Department. The Dutchmen Firefighters Association has purchased new pagers and donated the old ones to the township in exchange. Fire Department activity for the month included 2 fire runs, 7 personal injury runs, 13 medical runs, for a total of 22 runs. Supervisors of other townships have received the draft of the new fire contract. Dale Berry of Huron Valley Ambulance was present to answer questions on the proposed ambulance contract.

Constable Moore's report for February was accepted.

A request for dust control will be made to the Road Commission, asking that the application be made the last week in May, if possible.

The Supervisor was given the authority to dispose of the old voting machines.

Various correspondence was presented, requiring no action from the Board.

There being no other business, the meeting adjourned at 8:50 p.m.

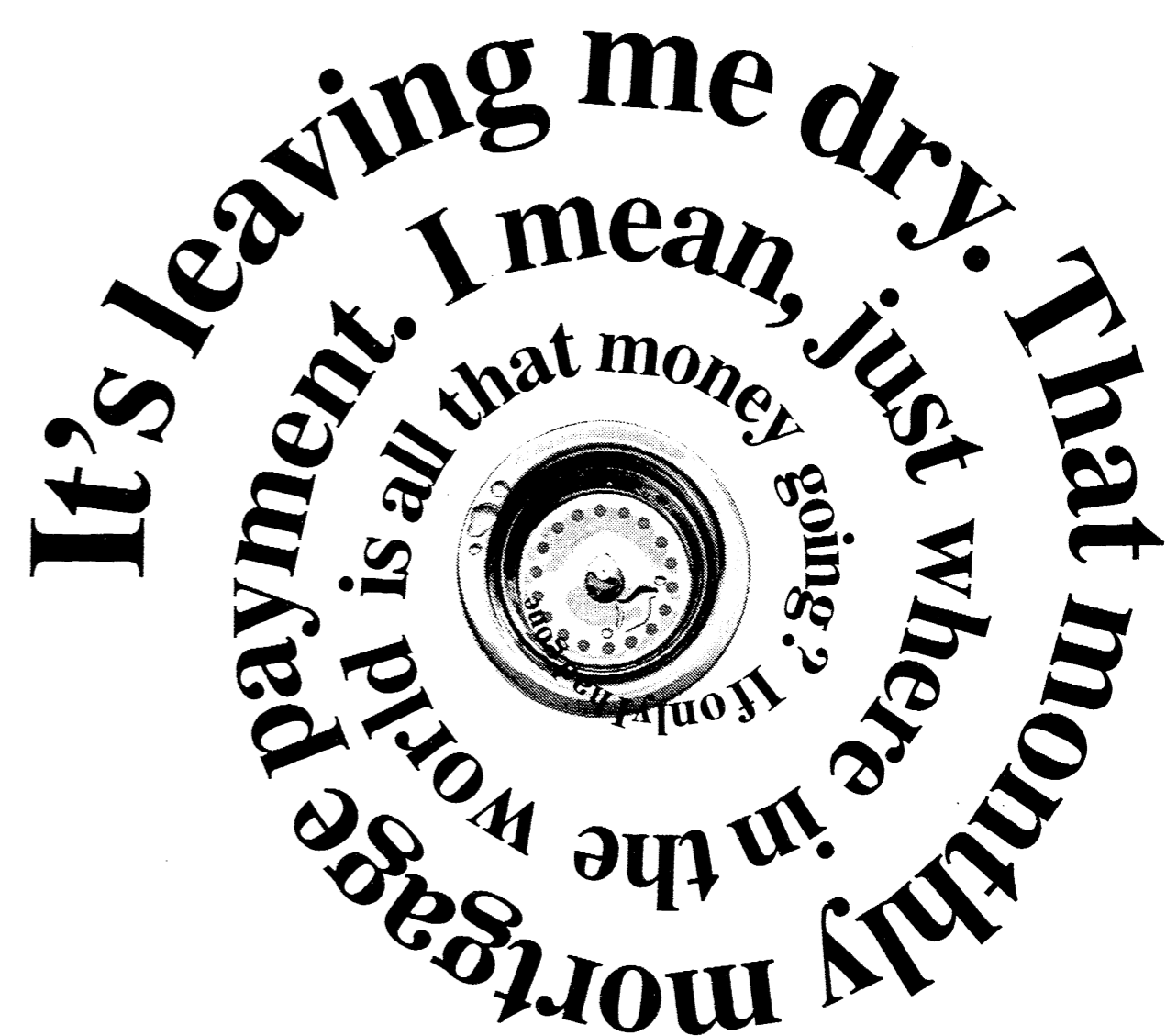

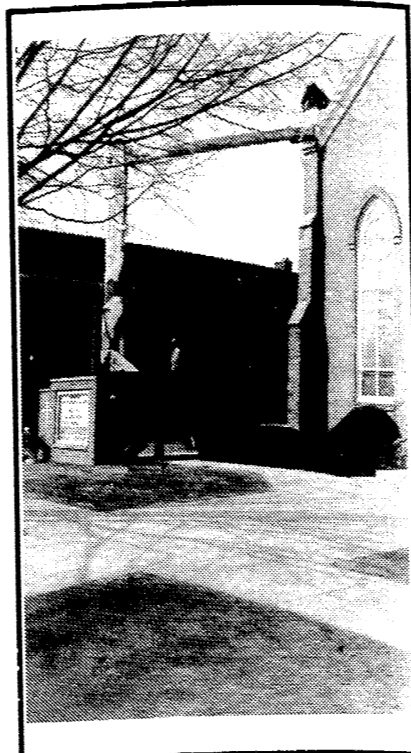

Western Washtenaw Recycling Authority

In 1992, a matching fund grant was received from the state of Michigan Department of Natural Resources (Protecting Michigan's Future). This paid for equipment and start-up cost. Day-to-day operations are funded by the sale of materials and special assessments. This is \$17.00 per year per household in the townships and \$30.00 per year in the villages. The reason for the higher amount in the villages is that curbside collection is provided to residents. The special assessments run through 1996.

The original plan was to take 3,100 tons per year from the Solid Waste Stream within a five year period. In 1993, the first year of operation, 3,164 tons were removed from the Solid Waste Stream. This would cover an area 121 feet by 121 feet that is 20 feet high! This is from the participation of the residents in the Western Washtenaw Recycling Authority jurisdiction. Thank you, and keep up the good work in recycling.

1993 Graduate Follow-up Survey

The annual survey of high school graduates of Chelsea, Dexter, Manchester, Milan and Saline begins this month. Callers will contact by phone graduates of the class of 1993. The survey purpose is to determine what high school graduates are doing approximately a year after graduation and to obtain their input for school improvement.

The Survey of 1992 Graduates conducted last spring (1993) provided the following information:

- three of ten graduates (29%) entered the full time work force.

- seven of ten graduates (71%) continued their education.

- one of three grads continuing education did so at Washtenaw Community College.

- more than six of ten grads (64%) continuing education also

worked.

A recently conducted Five Year Survey showed that one in three (35%) of the graduating class had completed a college degree program five years after high school graduation.

If that data is accurate today, and the majority of 1993 graduates will not acquire a college degree, then "Education for Employment" is a phrase that applies most appropriately to high school education. The data received points to a need for technical and employment related education at the secondary level.

Summary Board of Education

March 21, 1994 Not official minutes

The regular meeting of the board was called to order by President Sahakian at 7:47 p.m. with the Pledge of Allegiance.

President Sahakian welcomed all parents/guardians and students to the MEAP Awards Presentation. One hundred and twenty-three Manchester Community Schools' students were recognized by the Board of Education for their outstanding achievement on the Michigan Education Assessment Program tests. President Sahakian presented those in attendance with a certificate. A brief reception was held after the presentation for all students and their parents/guardians.

Upon reconvening, the board approved the minutes of the regular and closed sessions of the February 21, 1994 meeting as presented.

The treasurer's report was approved with a cash balance, as of February 28, 1994 in the amount of \$3,116,997.72; total bills payable of \$458,487.65.

Correspondence included: information from the Michigan Association of School Boards on the National School Board Association Membership; MESSA Insurance response to a report of the Mackinac Center for Public Policy; information on the Legislative Relations Network from MASA; letter to President Sahakian from Johnson Controls, Incorporated referring to their services in assisting schools reduce operating costs; letter to Superintendent Niedzwiecki from a concerned parent regarding the location of a bus stop.

The resolution calling for the annual school election to be held on Monday, June 13, 1994, was adopted as presented.

Board members approved the renewal of the Cooperative Adult Education Agreement between Willow Run Community Schools and Manchester Community Schools for the fiscal year

1994-95.

Resolutions expressing official approval of the application for "Candidate Status" in the North Central Association for Luther C. Klager Elementary, Nellie Ackerson Middle School, and Manchester High School were adopted as presented.

Ms. Deb Havens and Ms. Patricia Sahakian presented a status report to Board members on the new volunteer program, V.I.S.A. (Volunteers Investing in Student Achievement).

Superintendent Niedzwiecki updated the Board on the incident that occurred near the end of the varsity basketball game on Friday, March 4, 1994. Following the report, the Board instructed the Superintendent to: 1) conduct a review of the code of conduct for student athletes, and propose comprehensive changes that focus our athletic programs on sportsmanship, true teamwork, character building, responsibility, scholarship, and the perspective to have a good time playing sports. This should apply to all of Manchester's athletic programs; 2) compile a code of conduct for spectators at all athletic events, and 3) compile a coaches' handbook to further these goals of our athletic programs.

The Board moved to enter into closed session for the purpose of discussing and evaluating the performance of the superintendent, Ronald Niedzwiecki.

Upon returning to open session the Board determined the overall performance of Superintendent Ronald Niedzwiecki to be a "strong performance".

Board members moved to extend Ronald Niedzwiecki's contract as superintendent of Manchester Community Schools to June 30, 1997.

The meeting adjourned at 10:53 p.m.

Next meeting will be the fourth Tuesday in April the 26th at 6:30 in Klager School. Meeting Adjourned at 8:08 pm.

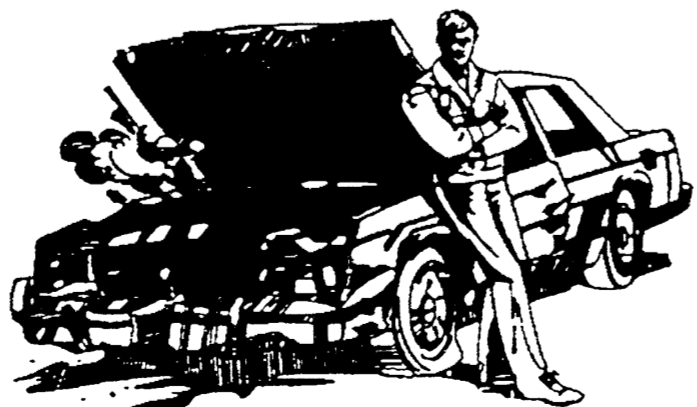

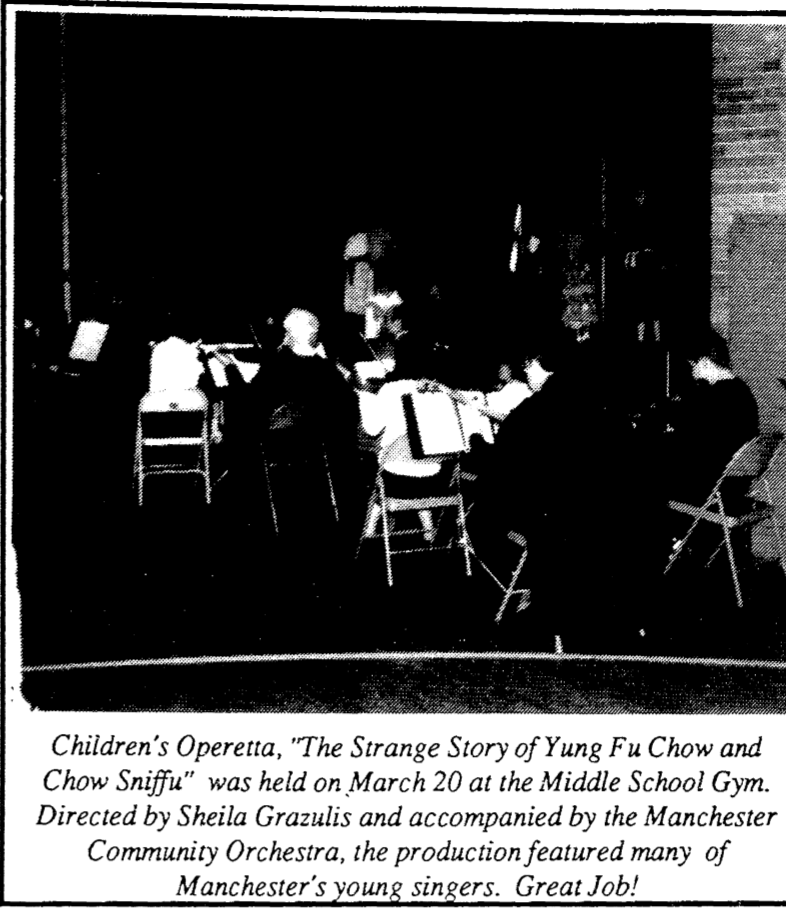

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
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
