### **MHS Announces** Class of 1994 Top Students




#### **VALEDICTORIAN:** KURTIS McDONALD

On June 5, 1994, Amie Bryant will graduate from Manchester High School with a 3.083 grade point average. In the three years that she has been a student at Manchester, she has completed four years' worth of high school courses, through the regular school year, summer school, night school and correspondence courses. She plans to attend Washtenaw Community College in the fall and transfer to Eastern Michigan University to obtain a degree in social work and counseling.

The Detroit News has named Amie as one of the 20 "Best and Brightest" students in the state of Michigan, in the Against All Odds cat-

How did all this happen over the course of the last four years?

Amie credits several teachers as the great influences and the "people who didn't give up on me." Among them are Dick Parson, the guidance counselor at MHS, and Char Henderson, special education teacher.

Parson says, "I am flattered that Amie named me as an influence. As a school, we are so proud of her. She has accomplished things that no other student at Manchester has ever done before." He notes that she is a highly motivated student and worked extremely hard to complete school in three years.

Henderson commented. "One thing that really helped Amie is that she made goals,



"My kids are very successful. Hands down, the results are better than anywhere else in the county. I attribute this in great part to Manchester being the kind of place it is. People always want to know what they can do to help, when they hear about neglected or abused children, and I'd like to say, 'You're doing it'. People are doing so much just by accepting these young women." Acceptance is something they have too rarely seen in their lives.

"Amie was on a path to a welfare existence; her drug and alcohol abuse problems were leading her no where. She has broken that cycle, by

graduating from high school and going on to college; she has shown us that the [Social Services] system works. She has found a socially and financially acceptable alternative to the patterns of behavior with which she came into the system.'

Indeed, to meet Amie, one would not easily recognize the young girl she was four vears ago. Reading the profile which she submitted to the Detroit News for the Outstanding Graduates competition, is proof that "truth is stranger than fiction." Her story couldn't possibly be made up, yet is so far outside the reality which most of us

know as to be unrecognizable. Amie has overcome more in the past four years than most of us will face in a lifetime. "It's weird" to think of the changes in the last four vears, admits Amie. And the prospect of what's ahead is, at times, scary. But she knows what she needs to do; and knowing what she has already done to achieve all she has. is obvious that she will end up doing whatever it is that's necessary. She will continue to forge a new path for her-

On Tuesday, May 24 Amie was honored at a dinner at the Henry Ford Estate in Dearborn. Detroit News Publisher Bob Giles presenter her and the other Top 20 Graduates with a framed copy of the page on which her photograph and story are featured. Amie's enthusiasm and anticipation for this were obvious when we spoke to her last week. An opportunity like this comes along only rarely, and to Amie, it is definitely "Against All Odds.'

"I am very proud of Amie," concludes Annette "We wish her the best," say Parson and Henderson. To this, we add, "Congratula tions, Amie - we hope to be hearing more good news about you as time goes on.







### **Board of Education Candidate Profiles, Continued**

What is your opinion of the new school finance reform laws? You want my opinion of 24

public acts? You don't have time, but here's a sampler: House Bill #5111, the "State Education Tax Act" was approved as P.A. 331, to create the "Education Finance Authority" (a new state board). My opinion on it: We're still paying the tax, but now a State board has the authority. We get to pay for that, too. Here's another part of the education package: P.A. 324 provides for taxation of low grade iron ore. My opinion (not serious): Maybe we can tax low grades.

P.A. 336 and related acts don't look like school finance reform to me. They look like a tax shift. A Manchester School Board member isn't going to accomplish much, waiting for the state to fix our finances. We need to take a long look at our own local finances and start reforming there.

How do you feel about the new state law limiting teacher

House Bill No. 5128 is not actually a new law. It is an act to amend sections 1, 2, 6, and 15 of Act No. 336 of the Public Acts of 1947, and to add Sections 2a, 7a, and 17. It does more than limit teacher strikes. Section 2 states that "A public employee shall not strike and a public school employer shall not institute a lockout." Section 2a (4) sets a fine of \$5,000 a day for the bargaining representative. Section 2a (5) sets a fine of \$5,000 a day for the employer and

\$250 a day for each board member. I feel that this four page bill will have a far greater impact on

every teacher, administrator, and board member should read it. It can be found starting at Section 423.201 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.






