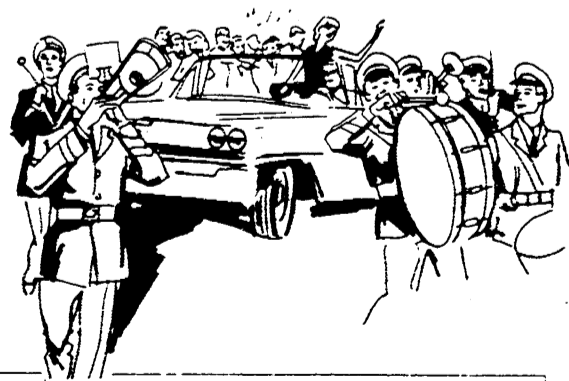

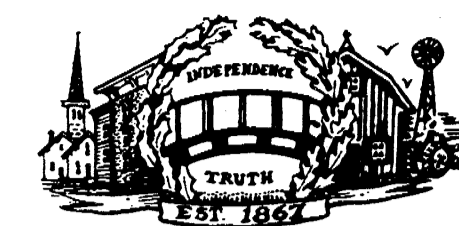

Kevin Deacons to be New COPS Officer

No, you won't see Deputy Deacons on TV in one of those "live action" police shows! Well, you might - someday - but that isn't what COPS means to him this week.

COPS is an acronym for "Community Oriented Policing" or solving local problems on a local level. "I will be doing a lot of ordinance enforcement; as the Village has quite a few complex ordinances and wanted an officer who could focus on this. Part of my task will also be to become a liaison with the schools."

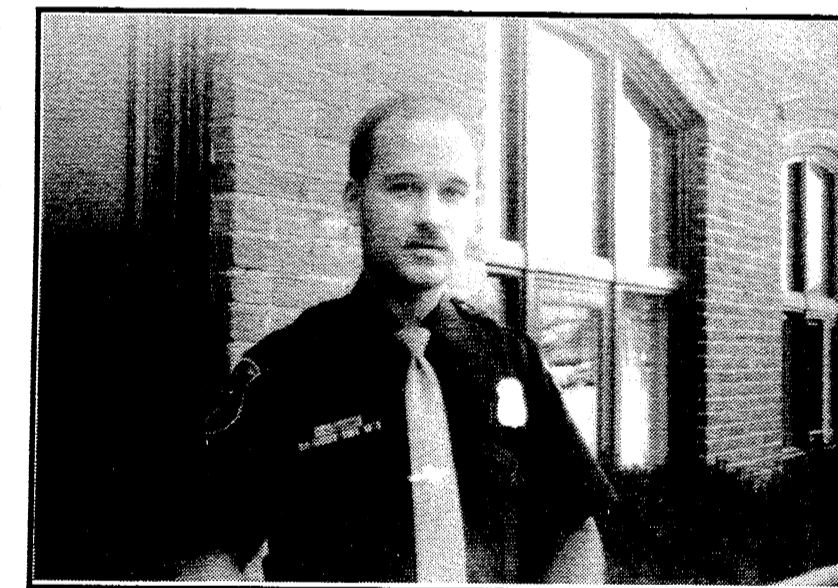
These are all tasks which come naturally to Deacons. He

is already a familiar face in town, having graduated from MHS, worked with the Manchester Police Department, and since his transfer to the Sheriff's Department nine years ago, has frequently been seen on after-noon and midnight shifts. Most recently he's been working a "swing" shift in town (one day shift, two afternoons, and two midnights per week). "My family is really glad that I'm getting a regular schedule," he commented.

Some of the attractive aspects of the COPS position are that he will have a little more

latitude for casual uniforms, be provided with a mountain bike for "personal" patrolling, and be able to switch shifts to monitor problems going on in the Village "after hours". "It's kind of a back-to-the-olden-days policing. We're going back to a small town image in a big department."

Deacons wants the community to know that he is that 'someone' you should come to if you have a police problem. As a local resident for 22 years, he feels comfortable with the people of Manchester and "I think they feel comfortable with

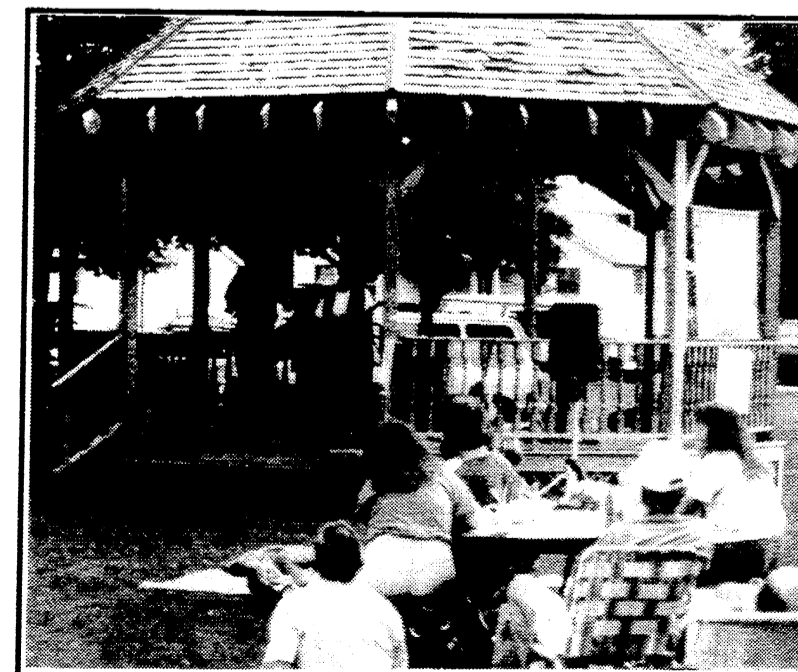


me. I want to be more than an officer to them, but a person - but I can still have a heavy hand when needed." The village having the option to extend Deacons' term or put it back up for bid at that time.

In its second year under the direction of Ms. Cara Weissman, the Manchester High School Marching Band is growing by leaps and bounds. "The band is nearly doubled in size since last year, I'm very excited about this year's band," said Ms. Weissman.

This year's Flag Corps is under the direction of her assistant, Tara Adams. The drum majors for this year are Ryan Haskins, a senior, and Kathy Doyle, a junior.

Ms. Weissman grew up in Vermont, and received her bachelor's degree in Music with concentrations in Performance and Music Education from the University of Michigan. "I've been playing music since the fourth grade." Her main instrument is percussion, with piano second. "I also play trumpet, flute and lots of other instruments," she laughed.

Arriving in Manchester late last summer, Ms. Weissman is grateful for the support and help she received from the band boosters and from the entire community. It certainly made her first year easier!

This fall's ambitious marching band schedule includes all the home football games, "and, of course, if we make the playoffs, we will be playing there, too." They will also be competing in a Marching Band competition on October 15th.

In between all that march-

ing, band members and boosters will be working concessions at U-M home football games. This is the big fund-raiser for the band, enabling them to purchase equipment, uniforms, and pay for band activities; so look for them when you attend those U-M games. Need a Pepsi or coffee? A hot dog or some candy corn? Stop at the concession booth at the southeast corner near Chrysler Arena and look for those friendly Manchester faces when you make your purchases. It's nice to know that at least some of the money you spend at the big game will go back to our community.

The High School band's big news for this year is a scheduled trip to New York City. Plans are not firm yet, but they will attend a performance as well as play a concert or have a clinic. Of course, all work and no play will make a dull vacation, so the band

plishments at Christmas and in the spring.

By seventh grade, the band is ready for the football field at least once during the season. This year's 7th & 8th grade joint performance with the high school band will be on October 14.

Ms. Weissman mentioned that the Boosters will be planning some special fun activities for the 5th-8th graders in band this year, so they won't feel too bad about missing New York. The band trip will be an annual occasion, though, so it's something to look forward to and work towards, even in Middle School.

To encourage the younger students to remain in band, Ms. Weissman uses motivational activities, including choosing music which is familiar to the students as well as some more challenging pieces. "I take requests from the kids, which helps to keep them interested in band - as long as those requests are reasonable!"

Ms. Weissman is also encouraging sports-minded students to join the band. This year there are two varsity football players and a varsity cheerleader in band. Although they don't march, they are still band members. She wants the kids to know that the two are not mutually exclusive. There is more than half a year which is not consumed by football, and band activities continue all year long.

Currently, the High School band is enduring the rigors of band camp. Band Camp often takes place at "Camp", but in Manchester it happens at school. If you pass by the High School any time Monday-Thursday of this week between 9 and 5, you will notice the Marching Band and Flag Corps practicing their routines and their music. If you happen to have a band member in your neighborhood, you may also see or hear them in the evenings, practicing up for the next day's activities.

Band Campers will present a performance for family and friends on Thursday at 5:00. Come on down and see some of the positive work our kids are doing.

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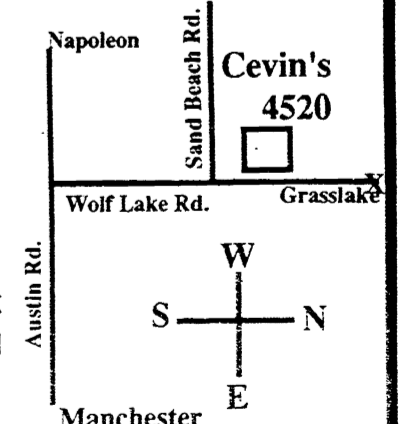


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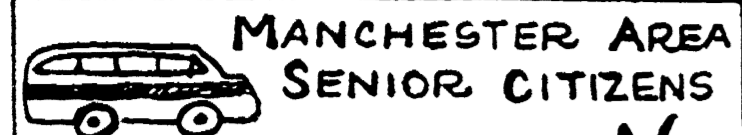

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Local Government

Bridgewater Township Planning Commission Summary Minutes August 8, 1994

Commission Chair James Fish called the meeting to order at 7:32 PM. The primary business of the meeting was a public hearing on the draft of the proposed Bridgewater Township Lot Split Ordinance.

Chairman Fish noted that this ordinance would provide information regarding zoning compliance to property owners who are splitting their property and to potential buyers. He further noted that the Township Zoning Ordinance going back to 1957 has prohibited the creation of illegal lots in the Township. This ordinance will not change the current law.

There was discussion of property owners, sellers and buyers responsibilities in property transactions. One property owner expressed the opinion that the ordinance could create an additional layer of burden on the property owner, and property buyers should be responsible for investigating zoning compliance before the property is purchased.

Carol Peacock, Township Treasurer, reported examples of significant and continuing problems experienced by township residents and buyers in recording split property and getting property taxes billed properly. She indicated that this ordinance would notify owners of the required procedures when they split their land.

Sally Scheer, Township Zoning Administrator, said the purpose of the ordinance was to provide owners and buyers with documented assurances up front in the process. The intent of the ordinance is to have government facilitate the process instead of being hindrance. It was also noted that more mortgage companies are requiring compliance certificates before mortgages are approved.

G. Dull provided copies of the Manchester Township driveway ordinance. He had discussed the ordinance with the Manchester Township Supervisor and Zoning Administrator. They both reported that the Ordinance is working well.

One of the primary concerns with inadequate driveways is fire and safety access. It was agreed that the matter should be tabled until the Clinton and Manchester fire departments could be consulted. The fire departments will be asked to attend the September 12 meeting to give their views.

Meeting adjourned at 9:42 PM. Next meeting is September 12, 1994 at 7:30 PM.

The Freedom Township Planning Commission will meet in a work session to review policies and procedures of the Zoning Ordinance relating to Conditional Use Permits, Article 21; Site Plan Review, Article 22, and A-1 Essential Agriculture District Sliding Scale, Section 10:02. All sessions of the Planning Commission are open to the public. Secretary, Bob Miller

PROPOSED SYNOPSIS of a Public Hearing of the Manchester Township Board on "Truth in Taxation" held August 8, 1994:

Meeting opened at 7:30 PM with board members Mann, Turk, Widmayer, and Hakes present. Macomber was absent. There were no visitors present.

Abiding by "Truth in Taxation" laws, this public hearing was being held to take public comments on a proposed change in the operating tax millage rate, increasing the rate from .09767 to 1.0061 mills, which is less than last year's rate of 1.0243 mills. This action, if taken by the Board, would generate a total of \$2562.76 for general operating funds, or an average of approximately \$1.55 on a \$100,000 home.

As there were no visitors present, there were no public comments. Truth in Taxation will be discussed during the regular board meeting immediately following this hearing, and a decision may be made.

PROPOSED SYNOPSIS of a Regular meeting of the Manchester Township Board held Monday, August 8, 1994:

The meeting was called to order at 8:00 PM with all Board members present. Minutes of the Township Board meeting held in July were approved, and minutes from Planning Commission, Election Commission, Western Washtenaw Recycling Authority, and Washtenaw County Consortium for Solid Waste Management were accepted.

Bills paid since last meeting were reviewed. Treasurer's report was accepted. A business resolution was approved for Comerica Bank. Bills totaling \$12643.33 in the General Fund and \$3458.40 in the Road Fund were approved for payment. An amendment was made to the budget to allow for partial payment for entering assessing cards into the Equalizer system.

Fire Department reported 29 runs in July, including 4 fires, 13 medical runs, 8 personal injury, 2 mutual aid, and 2 miscellaneous (wires down). Keith Johnson was reinstated to the Fire Department. There was some discussion on fire truck specification.

Zoning and constable report for July was accepted. The County Drain Commission and Road Commission will meet with residents and the Supervisor to discuss problems at Iron Creek Dam.

In new business, a resolution was adopted increasing property taxes from .09767 to 1.0061. This is less than last years rate of 1.0243, and amounts to an average of \$1.55 per property.

Robert Kellum was re-appointed to the Board of Appeals. Correspondence presented required no action from the Board, and there being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 9:45 PM.

The next regular meeting of the Manchester Township Board will be held Monday, September 12th, at 8:00 PM A full copy of these minutes can be viewed at the township hall, 275 S. Macomb Street, during regular office hours. Those hours are Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday from 8:30 AM to noon.

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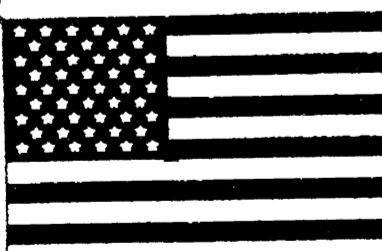

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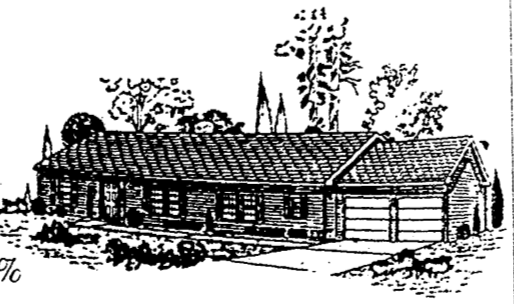

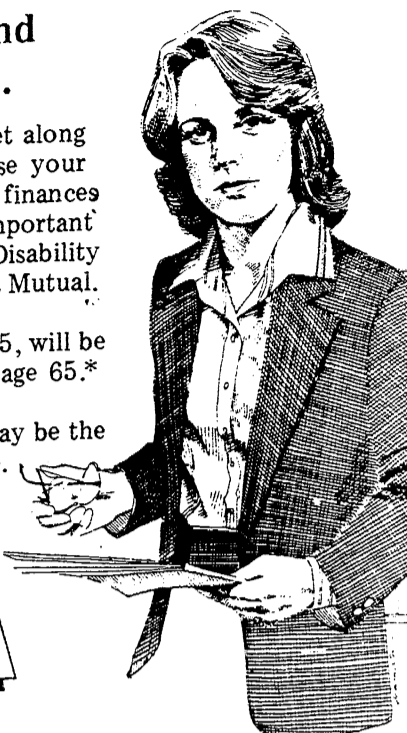

Jennifer DuRussel called the bus garage to see if they could send a bus driver out to talk to the kids about safety before school began, so the children would understand how important the rules are before all the hype of the first day of school. Diane volunteered her time and talked the school into letting her take a bus out to the day care to teach the kids all about riding the "Big Yellow Bus".

I felt this experience was very reassuring to the kids. I never road a bus to and from school; as a city slicker I walked to school (five miles in ten feet of snow- have you heard this before?)

Anyway, it was a terrific education for all the kids out at DuRussel Day Care to learn about school bus safety. Maybe in the future this would be a great lesson at all of our day



cares and pre schools. Diane and Jennifer both appreciate the school for allowing that "big Yellow Bus" to go out to the day care; the kids thought it was outstanding and they feel more confident and knowledgeable for the first few days of school.

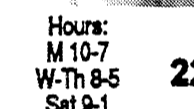

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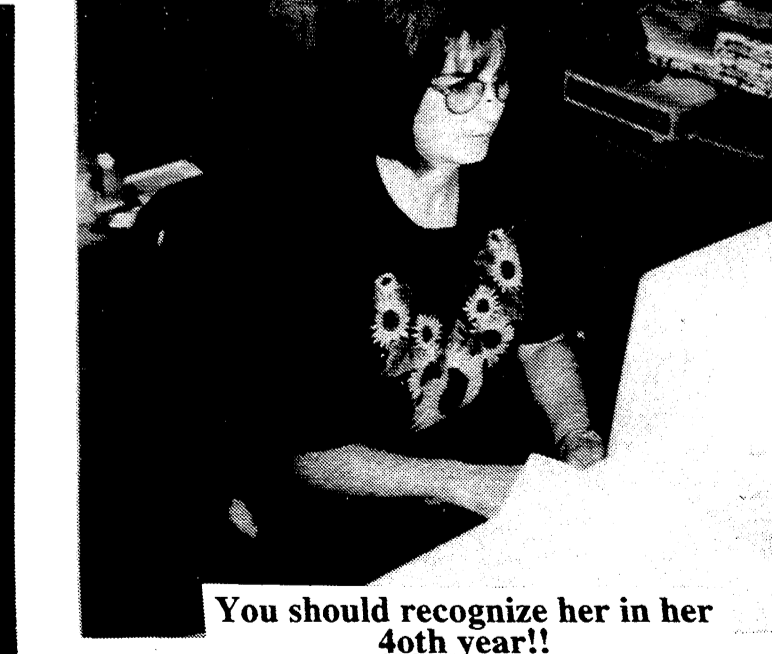

Middle School Ready to Reopen

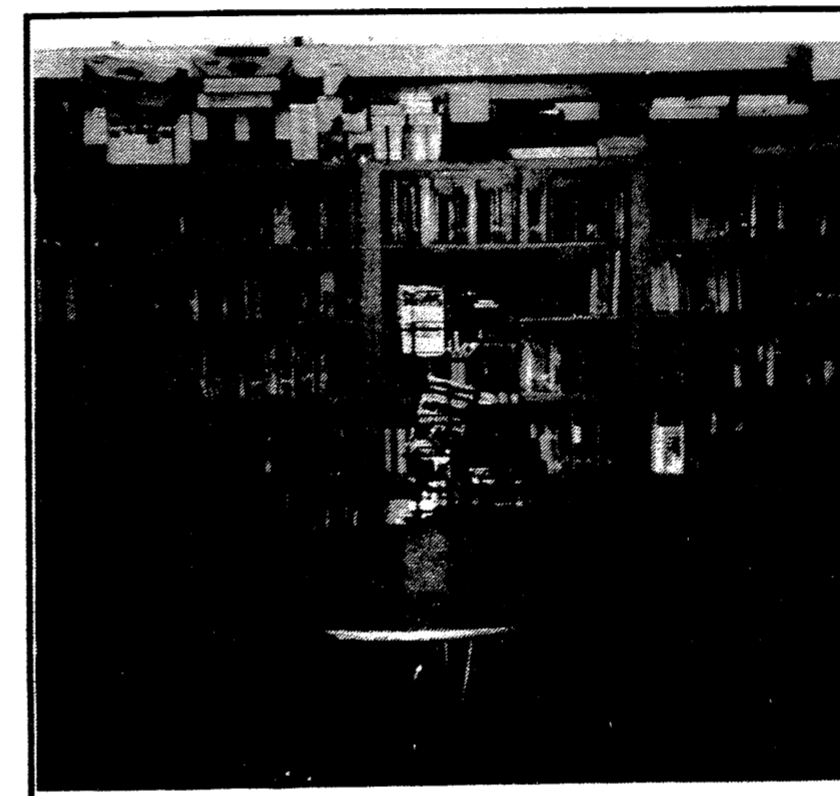
Middle School Principal Brian Schick reports that other than having a new tile floor installed in the science lab, the Middle School is almost ready for opening day.

School lunches have long been either loved or hated, depending on your point of view. Robin Mather of The Detroit News recently wrote about her long love affair with the "apple crisp days" in Grass Lake Public Schools in years gone by.

nutritious and balanced assortment of cold breakfasts - cereal, "graham cracker sandwiches", super donuts, bagel & cream cheese, fruits - fresh and canned, fruit juices and milk. "We will use whatever is available to us, and do our best to have something interesting and fun for the kids," Polly said.

Everyone is eligible for the breakfast program - even kindergartners! Remember when first grade and a whole day of school meant you could finally eat lunch at school - either out of your lunch box or "hot lunch"? Now even kindergartners can have a breakfast sack and sit down at the table to eat with their friends.

At Klager, Sandi Smith will be experimenting with the breakfast sack idea. Packaging things into a brown bag and letting the kids choose fruit, juice, or milk, will enable them to make interesting choices without getting too complicated.

Once the breakfast program gets rolling at Klager, the Middle School and High School will get started. Their programs will offer different choices from Klager's, but still, hopefully, enough interesting varieties to keep the

older students coming back for more.

And as for the adage that breakfast is one of the most economical meals to "eat out", that will hold true for our school breakfast program, too. Breakfast will cost \$1.00 for students, \$1.65 for adults, and reduced cost breakfasts are 30¢; compared to \$1.75/2.40/40¢ for lunches.

The breakfasts will be served in the lunchrooms at each of the schools. Kids who want breakfast will be admitted to the building fifteen minutes before school starts. On rainy days, this could make things a bit crowded at Klager school, but rest assured, kids will not be left outside on cold or rainy days.

How will this program be received? No one knows for sure. Polly indicated that some people have told her it's a great idea, and some have wondered why we're offering a program like this in Manchester.

So the success of the program depends on how it's received by the students. Polly and her staff are looking forward to serving all of the kids at both breakfast and lunch in the coming year!

Not Official Minutes

The regular meeting of Manchester Community Schools' Board of Education was called to order at 7:48 p.m. by Vice President Abbott with the Pledge of Allegiance.

Minutes of the regular meeting of July 18, 1994 and the special meeting of August 3, 1994 were approved as presented.

The treasurer's report was approved with a cash balance as of July 31, 1994 in the amount of \$1,547,819.91; total bills payable of \$270,686.30.

Correspondence included a letter of resignation from Nancy Defever, agri-science teacher for Saline/Manchester school districts; notice of South and West Washtenaw Consortium regular meetings; minutes from June 22, 1994 South and West Washtenaw Consortium

Superintendent's meeting; letter to Principal Yvonne Henry from Arbor House (Ann Arbor's Ronald McDonald House) recognizing Klager Elementary for their contribution.

Mr. Emory Garlick, representing The Manchester Enterprise, was present and inquired about the athletic policy for Manchester Schools not containing anything referring to coaches or spectators. Superintendent Niedzwiecki stated that this policy is for students and other policies are being developed for coaches and spectators.

Resignations have been accepted from Karen Hanson as developmental kindergarten teacher, Mary VanSchaemelhout, high school secretary and Jeff Knasiak as transportation/maintenance secretary.

Nondus Buss has submitted her retirement resignation which was accepted with grateful appreciation.

Coaching appointments for the 1994-95 sport season are as follows: Jason Gillow as 7th grade football coach and Angela Eiss as middle school cheerleading advisor.

Following lengthy discussion, board members directed the superintendent to secure bids on a portable classroom and submit information at the September board meeting. The board will place a bond proposal for additions and renovations to Klager on an election ballot no later than June of 1995.

Prices for the breakfast program have been set at \$1.00 for students and \$1.65 for adults.

The resolution to authorize the 1994 tax levy has been adopted; and the 1994 debt retirement tax levy has been approved and certified.

The Board supported the following candidates for election to the Board of Directors of the Michigan Association of School Boards: Director from Group II = Sheri Davie; At-Large Director = James A. Allen Sr., Forrest M. Meek, and Peter R. Sinclair.

A first reading took place on board policies Athletics #5131.1, Fair Treatment/Non-Discrimination #2600, and Affirmative Action/Equal Opportunity #4500.

Vice President Bruce Abbott has volunteered to be the liaison for the Board of Education and the Manchester Chamber of Commerce.

Waivers of membership have been granted to Mark Kueffner to

attend Columbia School District and Michael Dicks to attend Tecumseh Schools for the 1994-95 school year.

The purchase of carpet from Interface Flooring System in the amount of \$15,674.50 was approved for the middle and high schools.

Board members approved the proposal from Dutch Country Kitchens of \$15,600 for construction of computer countertops for the high school computer lab.

Superintendent Niedzwiecki updated the Board on the current maintenance projects.

Discussion took place in reference to the overcrowding at Klager and middle school and enrollment projections. Further discussion was tabled until the special meeting of August 23, 1994.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:07 p.m.

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
