FIRE DESTROYS FREEDOM TOWNSHIP RESIDENCE



Fire Fighters were summoned to 9131 Pleasant Lake Road this Monday morning at 7:15 AM. The residence of Mr. and Mrs. William Guenther was engulfed in flames when the Firemen arrived. Fire Departments from Chelsea, Dexter, Saline and Manchester fought the stubborn blaze.

Chelsea Fire Department provided one unit at the scene and furnished backup at Manchester's fire barn. Manchester had five units on the scene. Saline Fire Department responded with four units and Dexter supplied two. Chelsea provided backup at our station during the blaze.

Water was at a premium and the tank trucks refilled with water from the Burmeister gravel pit on Steinbach Road south of Pleasant Lake Road. Washtenaw County Sheriff's Department Deputies detoured east bound traffic north on Steinbach Road to Spies Road and then back to Parker Road. Saline Fire Department diverted west bound traffic south on Parker Road.

The Fire apparently started in a garage work shop area adjacent to the house. A car in the garage was totally destroyed. Fire spread along the breezeway and connecting garage to the house. A strong south-westerly wind fanned the flames and the fire penetrated the second floor of the house. Flames burst through the roof and fire fighters had to pull hoses up a ladder onto the roof in order to knock down the fire. It took almost three hours to bring the blaze under control. It was estimated the house was about 80 percent destroyed. No injuries were reported.

During this time when we pause to give thanks, please remember the Guenthers.

State Police take a "Temporary Leave"

Rumors floated around the village that the State Police would be deserting Manchester as of December 1. Not quite so, according to 1LT Garry Kregelka, Post Commander at Ypsilanti.

"With transfers within the department, we are temporarily short of officers. We examined activity levels around the county and determined that it would be necessary to leave the Manchester station empty for about six weeks. During this transition, officers from the Chelsea Outpost will be covering Manchester." Troopers David Koetsier and Brad Breedveld, both familiar from being "our" troopers, will be the ones covering the Manchester area.

Right now, probationary officers are in training and when their probationary period is completed, will be staffing the Manchester station once again. "I'm glad to be able to clear up these rumors," commented Kregelka, "and WE'LL BE BACK by the first of next year - hopefully before."

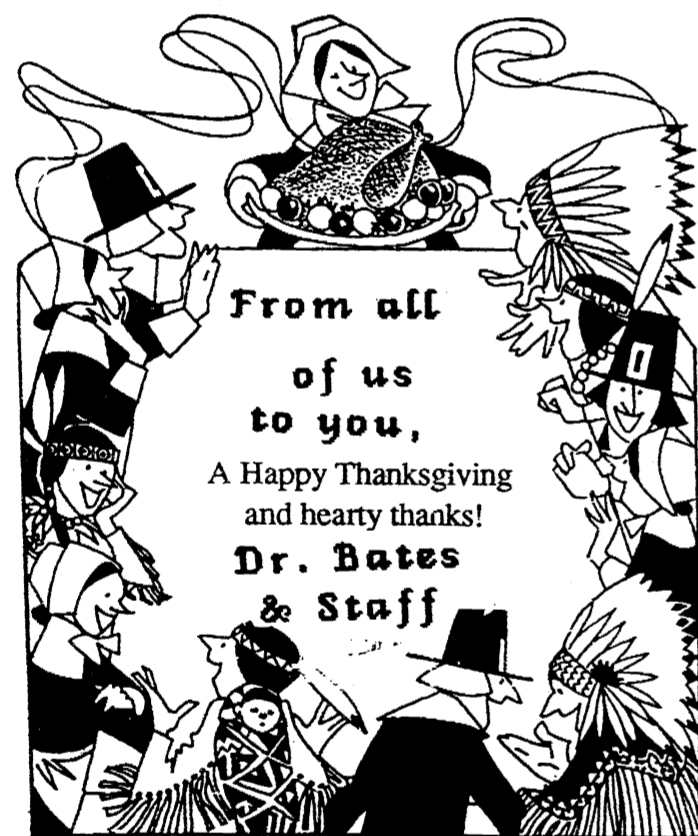
Fire had apparently started

A Thanksgiving History

Thanksgiving Day, as a national religious festival celebrated on the same day throughout the country, dates from 1863. Mrs. Sarah J. Hale of Boston promoted the idea of the observance of a uniform day throughout the country for the expression of thanks for the blessings of the year.

The first New England day of thanks for the harvest was in the autumn of 1621 under orders from Governor Bradford. The colonists went out into the forests and shot a number of turkeys and took them to the settlement to be cooked for dinner. A number of Indians heard of the celebration and then entered the settlement carrying with them several deer. The Indians and the settlers feasted together. It was 23 years later when the governor of the Dutch colony of New York issued a Thanksgiving proclamation.

The first Thanksgiving proclamation by any President of the US was made in 12789 by President Washington when he called for a day of thanksgiving for the adoption of the Constitution.

President Madison set a day to give thanks for peace in 1815 and President Lincoln recommended special days of thanks for victories in 1862 and 1863.

Thanksgiving has been observed by official proclamation (presidential and by the governors of the respective states), since that time.

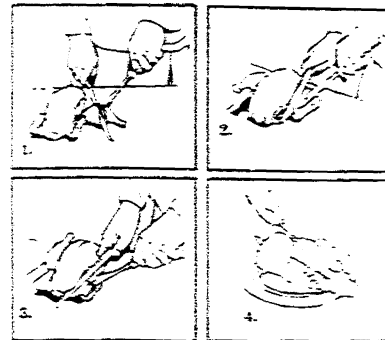

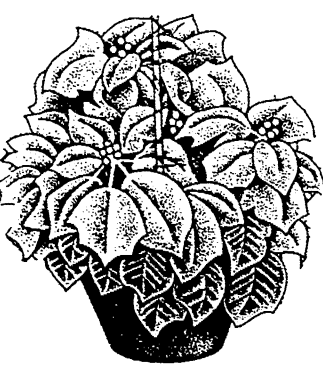

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Reaping the Harvest - Of Christmas Trees

As always, following close on the heels of Thanksgiving, comes the time to think about Christmas. And how many people celebrate Christmas without a Christmas Tree?

Not too many, hope the owners of the many Christmas Tree Farms around the area. And they certainly hope that most of those who do celebrate with a tree will join the increasing number who "Cut Your Own" at a local tree farm.

With thousands of trees to choose from at each farm, it is almost a certainty that you can pick exactly the size, shape and variety that you want in your own tree.

There is both an art and a science of Christmas tree growing. You can't just plant a bunch of evergreens and hope in a few years people will come out and cut your trees and pay you lots of money. Most of these tree farms are family owned and each family takes great pride in their trees and in the work involved in growing the Ideal Christmas tree for YOU. The work of a tree farm continues year round.

April is planting time for the new Christmas trees. Each year, trees are planted to keep the ground covered where old trees were harvested the previous winter. Because Christmas trees grow best in sandy soil, it is important to keep the fields planted to prevent soil ero-

sion. From late May to June, and even into July (depending upon the weather and the number of trees on the farm), comes the heavy job of shearing the pines.

A large machete is used to prune the long-needled evergreens, right after the candles of new growth come out. Come October, it is time for the spruces to be trimmed. And, of course, November and December are the busy tree harvesting months.

Michigan is the nation's largest tree-producing state. This should come as no surprise to those who are familiar with the country roads north, south and west of Manchester. The majority of Christmas trees for the entire nation comes from our state.

The ecology of tree farming is an important aspect to Reno Feldkamp of Feldkamp's Tree Farm. "The trees are a completely renewable resource," he tells us - unlike the artificial trees which rely on petroleum-based plastics and metals for their manufacture. Feldkamp's is our local Manchester tree farm, and has over 13,000 trees - both pines and spruces in all sizes, including oversize. They also sell wreaths which are made at the farm from their own trees by Reno's wife, Nancy. To arrive at Feldkamp's, take Pleasant Lake Road (west of M-52) to Smythe - turn north and watch the signs.

Some families make a

traditional "day" of Christmas tree cutting, and many area tree farms provide amenities to make it a total experience. For example, Christmas Tree Lane, a 150 acre farm with over 20,000 trees, is based on a family theme. "We have had the same Santa here for many years," said Lynne Schroen. "He is very popular and we have families returning year after year just for Santa." Christmas Tree Lane will provide saws if you need them, and sell wreaths, roping, centerpieces and grave blankets as well. You may select Norway or Blue Spruce, or Scotch or White Pine. Bring your camera along! Take Sharon Valley Road west to Prospect Hill and follow the signs.

Fodor's Christmas Tree Farm offers eight varieties of pine, spruce and fir trees. You may cut a tree or they offer potted trees, too, which you may want to plant in your own yard to enjoy year after year. Fodor's also sells roping and wreaths, and to add to your family's holiday enjoyment offers free wagon rides, animals, a toy house and a gift shop. To reach Fodor's, go west on Austin Road, north on Wolf Lake and "follow the signs". Do you get the impression there is a sign on every corner for one tree farm or another?

At Hillside Farms, on US 12 just four miles west of M-52, they have pre-cut trees

available as well as allowing you to choose from scotch pine and spruce on the farm priced from \$8 - \$29. There you will also find wagon rides, as well as a "tot tree lot", a play area for the kids, a fireplace-warmed barn with food, beverages, crafts, and Santa Claus.

Arend's Tree Farms has two farms - either in Chelsea or in Brooklyn - so there is a farm close to Manchester residents no matter where you live. With 400+ acres and 400,000 trees, Arend's is the largest tree farm in southeastern Michigan. This is a year round occupation for the Arend family, and the quality of their trees is important to them. They specialize in Spruce and Douglas Firs, will bale and shake your tree to provide easy and less messy transportation, and are open daily from 9-5. Follow directions in the ad to arrive at the closest farm to your home.

Tefft Tree Farm and Landscaping has several thousand scotch pine trees which you can cut yourself to choose from on their farm. Other varieties are available pre-cut. They will wrap your tree for a small extra charge. Tefft's have added wagon rides this year and are easily located by traveling west on Austin Road, just past Case Road on the left. They are open from 3:00-dark weekdays, and dawn to dusk on weekends.

All tree farms are opening this weekend so you can have an early pick of beautiful trees.

For those who choose not to cut their own tree, the Manchester Men's Club will once again be holding their Christmas Tree Sale on Adrian Street next to Tirb Chevrolet. Opening on Sunday, November 27, the Men's Club will have Blue Spruce, Scotch and White Pines, priced from \$20-25. The Men's Club will deliver a tree to you if circumstances prevent you coming out to choose your own, and by supporting their sale, you are also assured that 100% of the profits will be channeled back into our community through the Men's Club projects which continue year-round.

And for those of you who may be unable or unwilling to have a live tree in your home, there is the alternative and convenience of an artificial tree. No watering, shedding or dropping; after Christmas, pack it up and put it in your basement or attic until next year. Locally, artificial trees are available at Kleinschmidt's True Value Hardware on Sharon Valley Road at M-52. Their large selection of trees is on sale NOW.

Whatever type of tree you choose, and where ever you purchase it, may it bring you and your family many hours of pleasure this Christmas.

The items this month were: Manchester Arbeiter Society ballot box (voters used a white ball for a yes vote or a black ball for a no vote - thus the term blackballed), Edison phonograph, Manchester Village Ballot box, Victorian inkwell from Manchester Village Hall, Swainson lapel pin from one of his campaigns, picture of Nellie Ackerson at the Bessac Memorial Pipe Organ, picture of the interior of Dresselhouse and Davidter Hardware, Manchester Public Schools 1948-49 Catalog and Announcement, defaced die for 125th Manchester commemorative coins.

The program was "A Story of a House." Deb Havens, Rosemary Whelan, Sharon Curtis, Norma Every, and TV And Del Ludwick told some interesting stories about their houses and the people who used to live in them. Rosemary and Ed Whelan had lived rather anonymously in cities before they moved to Austin Road. They continue to be surprised at the people they meet who add to the history of

their farm. Through the Register of Deeds, they traced their property back to the original owner. The house was built about 1890 and has many interesting nooks and crannies.

Sharon and Carl Curtis own the Nollar house on Sharon Hollow Road. They are happy that very little structural change was made since the house was built around 1880 by George Heimerdinger. We will get a chance to see the house on December 20 when they host the annual Christmas party, which is open to the public.

Del Ludwick told about the time a hive of bees did not make enough honey to last over the winter. The hive was brought inside and placed in an upstairs bedroom. A pan of water and a bag of sugar were provided and the bees made it through the winter. The hive was returned to the out of doors in the spring.

Board of Education presented with revised proposals for Klager, Pleasant Lake and Middle Schools

Monday, November 21st, 1994. Manchester Community Schools Board of Education was presented with the two basic options requested at the November 7th meeting.

Option A.

Pleasant Lake Plan.

Adding 12,890 Sq. Ft. to Klager School; which includes 8 rooms, (Kindergarten [3], Chapter I, Music, Special Ed., Media Center, Computer Lab, PLUS: Rest rooms, Hall ways and Storage).

Adding 8,960 Sq. Ft. to Pleasant Lake School; which includes 6 rooms, (Class rooms [4], Science, Special Ed., PLUS: Administration, Restrooms, Hall way, Mech/Elect.

Option B.

"Big School Plan"

Adding 22,550 Sq. Ft. to Klager School; which includes 13 rooms, (Kindergarten [3], Class rooms [4], Science, Multi-Purpose, Chapter I, Music, Special Ed., Serving, PLUS: Rest rooms,

Conference, Hall ways and Storage. (This will about Double Klagers size)

Adding 4,300 Sq. Ft. to the Middle School; which includes 3 rooms, (Technology Classroom, General Classroom, Computer Lab. PLUS: Hall way

Comparisons:

The "Big School Plan" involves massive construction at Klager Elementary school as well as a new addition at the Middle School. That plan would cost around \$4 million, depending on whose figures you believe. It is being heavily promoted by the Superintendent.

That plan would result in kindergarten through fourth grade students being housed in one large complex at Klager, and fifth through eight grade students remaining in a larger complex at the Middle School.

Positive side of this plan (if you like big schools) is that a very large mass of students is housed in two buildings resulting in fewer transportation issues.

Downside of that plan is its very large initial cost, and (if you don't like large schools) the fact that large numbers of students will remain together in two big complexes.

The Pleasant Lake Plan involves adding a smaller number of classrooms to Klager, and additional classrooms to the seven existing rooms at Pleasant Lake School. This plan would cost less than the big school plan because seven classrooms and some support facilities are already in existence, and paid for, at Pleasant Lake.

This plan is favored by school board President Paul Kluwe and other members of the school board.

The Pleasant Lake Plan would still result in moving kindergarten students from the Middle School to Klager, and would move fourth graders from Klager as well as fifth graders from the Middle School to the Pleasant Lake facility. Thus Pleasant Lake would become the

"Fourth and Fifth grade school".

Positive side of the Pleasant Lake Plan is that it costs substantially less, utilizes existing facilities and also opens a block of classrooms at the Middle School eliminating the need for another building program at the Middle School.

Additional point often made by parents is that it removes fifth graders from the social influences often associated with other much older Middle School students. It also gets plus marks from parents who live in or moved to Manchester so their children can attend smaller schools.

Downside of the Pleasant Lake Plan is that it could result in higher annual operating costs.

Keep in mind that regardless of which option is ultimately chosen by the board, the VOTERS will decide what will or will not be done.

Elections are the process wherein citizens educate

public servants -- not a process where public servants educate the citizens. Washington was recently reminded of that fact at the last election.

Operational Cost Analysis:

Superintendent Niedzwecki presented an operational cost analysis for the two plans. Operational cost's as presented indicate a higher cost using Option A, Pleasant Lake School, Klager addition. Mrs. Joanna Vanraden, Special Ed. Teacher at Klager, presented 31 points of concern the teachers at Klager had. The Board took notes on all expressed points of view presented by visitors.

The Board of Education concluded its meeting by agreeing to review all the information given at the meeting and returning for a work session in the first week of December.

The consensus of the Board seemed to be that the figures must be reviewed and believable or the voters will not respond to the Schools needs.

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
