AAA has winter home care tips

Cold winter weather can be just as hard on your house as it is on your car, especially if temperatures reach sub-zero levels like they did last winter. To help home-owners cope with the cold—and maybe save some lives—AAA Michigan has the following “winter home care” tips:

- If sub-zero temperatures are predicted and you have reason to believe your water pipes may freeze, turn on your tap to a steady trickle. This will help prevent pipes from freezing.
- If you own a seasonal dwelling, drain the water completely.
- If you wish to install “heat tape” on your pipes, hire a professional. Improperly installed heat tape can cause fires.
- Do not attempt to thaw pipes using an open flame; hairdryers have been known to do a great job.
- Use alternate heat sources, such as kerosene, propane or electric heaters, with care. Follow manufacturer’s guidelines and never leave unattended. Keep heaters away from curtains, corners and walls. Always refuel kerosene heaters outdoors.
- Gas ovens should never be used as an alternate heat source.
- Clean your chimney and have your furnace inspected annually. This service can range between \$50-\$65, but it could prevent your house from burning down.
- Do not overload electrical outlets.
- If planning to purchase a wood-burning stove, have it installed by a professional, meeting all codes and manufacturer installation guidelines.
- Use ceiling fans to distribute warm air more efficiently throughout the home.
- Install and maintain smoke detectors on all living levels.

In their search for comfort, many home-owners unknowingly place themselves and their families at risk,” said Jerry Basch, manager of Community Safety Services. “Improperly used heat sources, frozen plumbing, dirty chimneys—these are all factors that can leave you, quite literally, out in the cold.” In 1992, the second leading cause of residential fires in Michigan was heating sources. This includes furnaces and other heat sources, such as free-standing kerosene or electric space heaters, as well as wood burning stoves, fireplaces, chimneys and flues. According to the Department of State Police, Fire Marshal Division, 55,622 fires were reported in Michigan in 1993. A total 233 people died as a result of these fires and 759 were injured. Property losses for the year totaled \$338 million.

Auto Club takes bite out of winter driving

Dreading the onslaught of hazardous winter weather? Has the prospect of driving with poor visibility or skidding on ice got you down? Take heart. AAA’s “How To Go On Ice and Snow,” a well illustrated and easy-to-read pamphlet, helps take the bite out of winter driving. Available free at AAA branch offices statewide, the booklet contains information on winter driving techniques—starting, tracking and following, steering and stopping—as well as hints and precautions helpful to front-, rear- and four-wheel-drive vehicle operators. “Armed with these tips, Michigan motorists can be better prepared for winter roads by completing a quick driving review and making sure their vehicle is ready,” said AAA Michigan Community Safety Services Manager Jerry Basch. “How To Go On Ice and Snow” offers the following tips to help motorists steer clear of winter driving trouble:

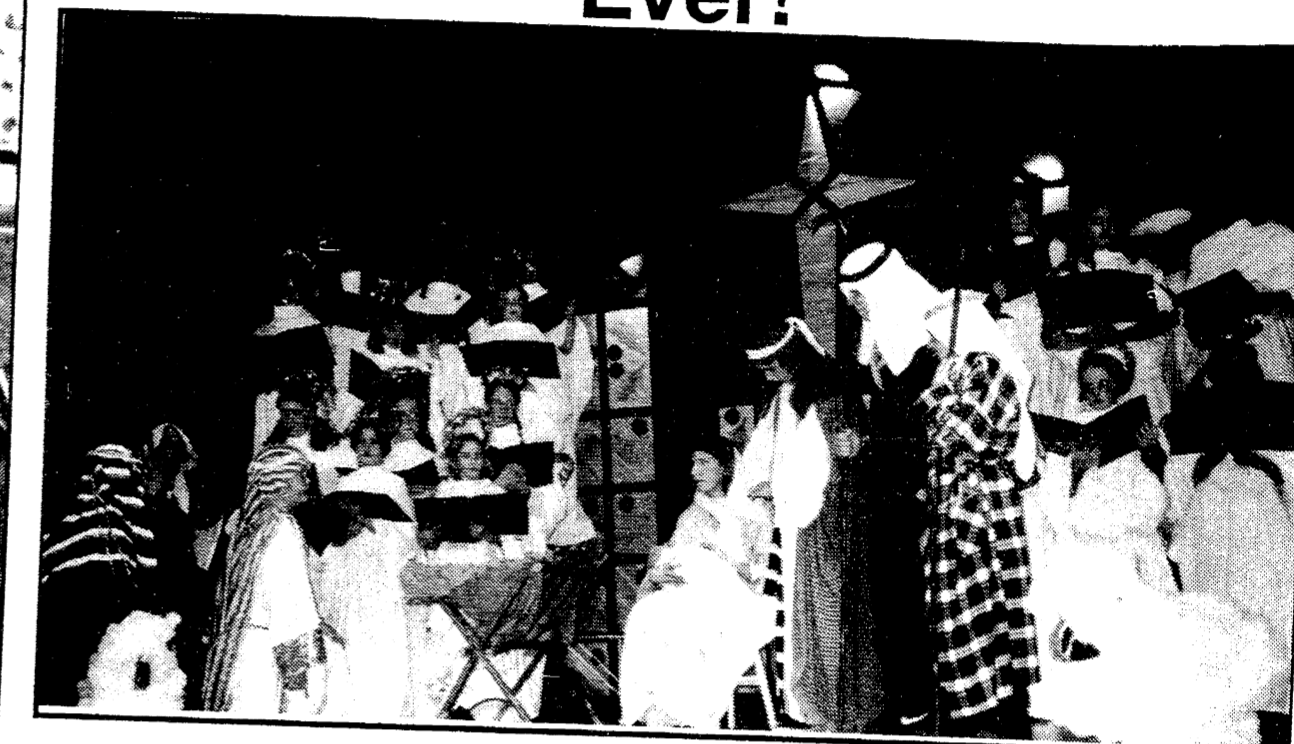
- Improve visibility by clearing all snow and ice from the entire car—hood, roof, trunk, turn signals, tail lights, headlights, windows, mirrors and fender walls. Driving with headlights on low-beam provides better road-illumination in snow and fog than using high-beams.
- Remember that posted speed limits are set for ideal road and weather conditions. Slow down when visibility and road conditions are impaired by bad weather or traffic.
- Avoid sudden starts, stops and turns. Accelerate carefully, so car wheels don’t spin.
- Don’t brake hard. The best technique for braking under icy or snowy conditions is to use “threshold” or “squeeze braking.” This is done by applying the brakes firmly to a point just short of lock up, and then easing off the brake pedal slightly. Applying steady pressure is better than “pumping the brakes” and should be practiced on dry pavement prior to driving on snow. If your vehicle has anti-lock braking, continuous firm braking is usually recommended. Check the owner’s manual for proper procedure.
- Anticipate potential danger such as ice on bridges, snow-covered lane markings, stalled cars and poor visibility. Adjust speed, increase distance between other cars or change lanes to avoid trouble. Watch out for other drivers who may be unprepared for changing road conditions.
- In a skid, ease off the accelerator and don’t lock up the brakes. Carefully steer in the direction you want the car to go and straighten the wheel as soon as the car begins to go in the desired direction.

as well as his own part, did a remarkable job. Each cast member showed a lot of dedication to this production. Many hours of rehearsal time made it necessary to put other activities on hold, and all are to be commended for their loyalty to this particular event.

The highlight of the pageant on Saturday was certainly the stage debut of the youngest cast member. Jacob Lloyd Fielder, son of Curt and Barbara Fielder, played the part of the Baby Jesus. Jacob was born November 18th and gave a magical touch to a very magical evening.

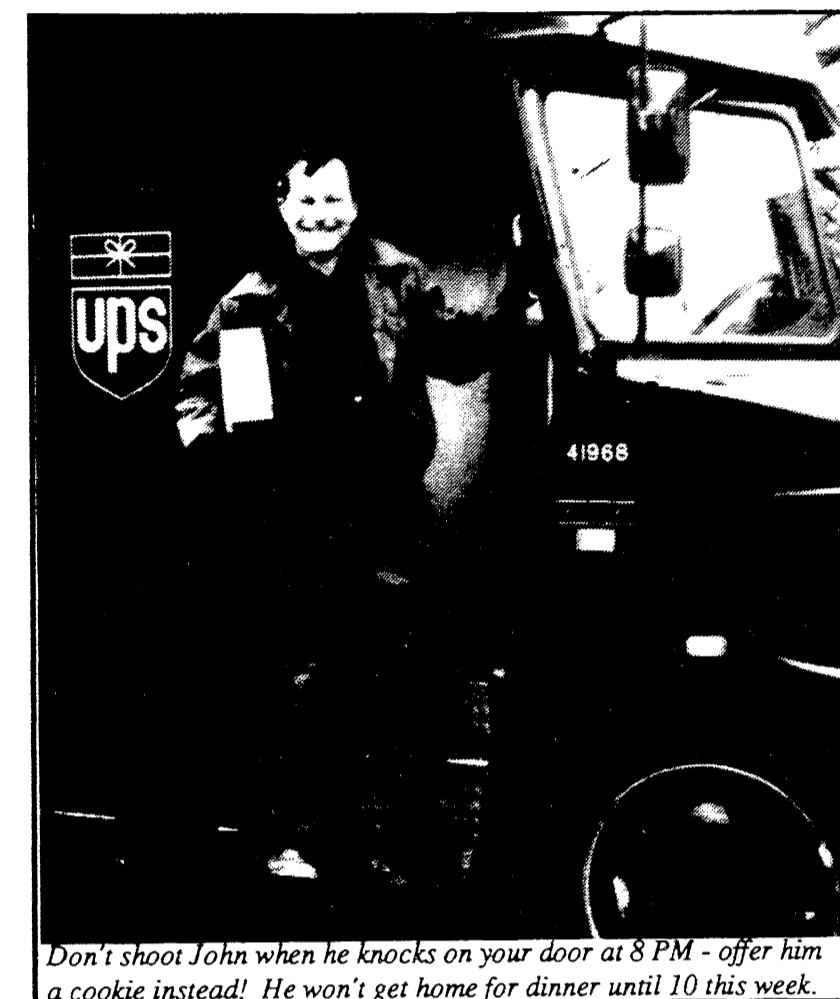

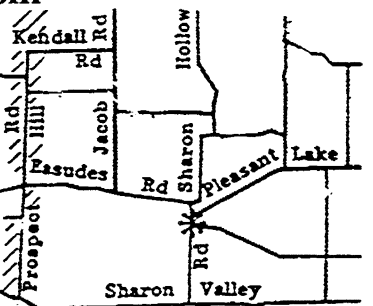

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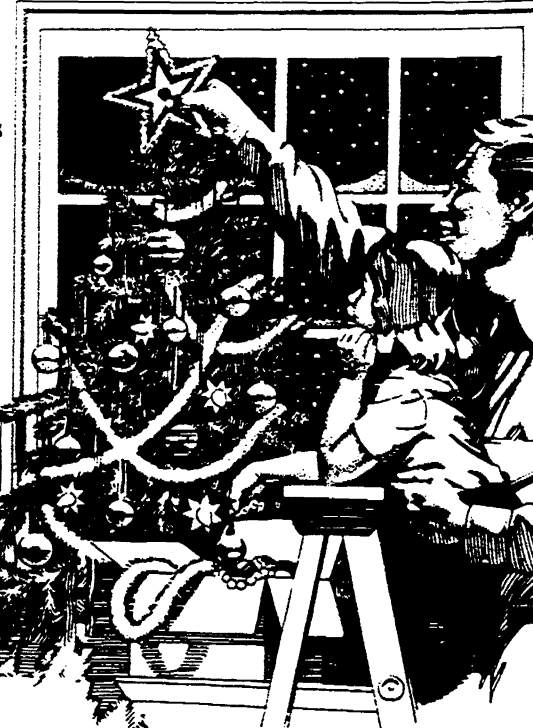

Bridgewater Township Planning Commission and Bridgewater Township Zoning Board of Appeals

November 14, 1994 Summary Minutes

The primary order of business for the evening was a joint public hearing on the request for a Conditional Use Permit by Mr. Scott Nelson.

The Conditional use permit was considered under Bridgewater Township zoning Ordinance section 5.05 Automobile Service and repair stations.

The property has been operated as a commercial business prior to the Bridgewater Township Zoning ordinance therefore, it is a legal non-conforming structure.

Zoning Board of Appeals member D. Parr stated that for the conditional use permit to be issued the Board of Appeals would have to grant two variances; one for setbacks and the other for percent of ground floor coverage.

Using the zoning administrator's analysis as a guide Chairman Fish led a discussion of the items of ordinance Section 5.05 Automobile service and Repair Stations.

The Commission anticipates approval of the Conditional Use Permit at the December meeting, subject to a final draft of the conditions and acceptance of the conditions by Mr. Scott Nelson.

NOTICE TO RESIDENTS AND BUSINESS OWNERS VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER SIDEWALK SNOW AND ICE REMOVAL ORDINANCE

REMOVAL OF SNOW AND ICE. THE OWNER OR OCCUPANT OF ANY PREMISES, OR THE OWNER OF ANY UNOCCUPIED PREMISES OR REAL PROPERTY, IS REQUIRED TO KEEP THE CONSTRUCTED SIDEWALKS IN FRONT OF, OR ADJACENT TO SUCH PREMISES CLEARED FROM SNOW AND ICE WHICH WILL IMPEDE PASSAGE ON SUCH SIDEWALKS.

(1) EXCEPT AS PROVIDED IN SUBSECTION (3) HEREOF, SNOW AND ICE SHALL BE SO REMOVED FROM SIDEWALKS IN ALL BUSINESS DISTRICTS BY FOUR (4) BUSINESS HOURS AFTER THE CESSATION OF ANY FALL OF SNOW, SLEET, OR FREEZING RAIN, OR BY THE BEGINNING OF BUSINESS HOURS OF THE NEXT DAY FOLLOWING SUCH FALL, WHICHEVER PERIOD IS SHORTER.

(2) EXCEPT AS PROVIDED IN SUBSECTIONS (3) OR (4) HEREOF, SNOW AND ICE SHALL BE SO REMOVED FROM ALL RESIDENTIAL SIDEWALKS WITHIN TWENTY-FOUR (24) HOURS AFTER THE CESSATION OF ANY FALL OF SNOW, SLEET, OR FREEZING RAIN.

(3) IN THE EVENT SNOW AND ICE ON A SIDEWALK HAS BECOME SO HARD THAT IT CANNOT BE REMOVED WITHOUT THE LIKELIHOOD OF DAMAGE TO THE SIDEWALK, THE PERSON RESPONSIBLE FOR ITS REMOVAL SHALL, WITHIN THE TIME REQUIREMENTS OF SUBSECTIONS (1) OR (2), HAVE ENOUGH SAND OR OTHER ABRASIVE PUT ON THE SIDEWALK TO MAKE TRAVEL THEREON REASONABLY SAFE. SNOW AND ICE SHALL THEN BE REMOVED AS SOON AS IT CAN BE ACCOMPLISHED WITHOUT THE LIKELIHOOD OF DAMAGE TO THE SIDEWALK.

(4) EXEMPTIONS. IN RESIDENTIAL DISTRICTS ONLY, PERSONS WHO, FOR REASONS OF INFIRMITY, BELIEVE COMPLIANCE WITH SUBSECTIONS (2) AND (3) WOULD CAUSE UNDUE HARDSHIP, MAY FILE A REQUEST FOR EXEMPTION WITH THE VILLAGE CLERK. THE CLERK SHALL APPROVE OR DISAPPROVE THE REQUEST ACCORDING TO GUIDELINES ADOPTED BY COUNCIL. IF APPROVED THE VILLAGE MAY THEN REMOVE SNOW AND ICE FROM THESE SIDEWALKS AT A COST TO BE ESTABLISHED BY COUNCIL RESOLUTION, BASED ON LENGTH, IN FEET, OF SIDEWALK.

FAILURE TO COMPLY. IF THE PERSON RESPONSIBLE FOR THE REMOVAL OF SNOW AND ICE FAILS TO COMPLY WITH THE REQUIREMENTS OF THIS SECTION, THEN THE VILLAGE MAY REMOVE THE SNOW AND ICE, AND THE COST THEREOF MAY BE COLLECTED AS A SINGLE LOT ASSESSMENT UNDER CHAPTER 3, SECTION 1.85 OF THIS CODE. FURTHER, SUCH RESPONSIBLE PARTY SHALL BE LIABLE TO THE VILLAGE FOR ALL LOSSES TO THE VILLAGE OR RECOVERIES FROM THE VILLAGE FOR DAMAGES TO PERSON OR PROPERTY OF OTHERS CAUSED BY THE FAILURE OF SUCH RESPONSIBLE PARTY TO SO REMOVE ALL SNOW AND ICE ACCUMULATIONS IN ACCORDANCE WITH THIS SECTION.

SHARON TOWNSHIP PROPOSED SYNOPSIS REGULAR BOARD MEETING DECEMBER 1, 1994

The meeting was called to order at 8:00 PM by Supervisor Savage. All other Board members were present along with the Zoning Officer, Planning chairman and 3 residents.

Minutes of the 11/13/94 meeting were read. A correction was made in regard to amendments The Board members made to the Fire Ordinance being considered by The Board. The minutes were then approved.

The Treasurer's report was read and approved.

The Fire Ordinance No. 17 as amended by The Board during the October meeting was discussed. Motion made, supported, and carried this ordinance be adopted by the Sharon Township Board. This will be printed in its entirety in the Enterprise.

Motion made, supported, and carried to reimburse Wacker's for paving an area for recycling bins. Trustee Feldkamp reported on the area townships meeting in regard to gravel extraction and a common ordinance for all 5 townships addressing gravel extraction. This has not been fully completed.

Zoning Officer Thomson reported 3 land use permits issued during November and also made various other reports.

Planning Chairman Ward reported a Special Use Permit was granted to Tracy MacDonald for Horse Riding and Boarding. Ward requested the Township Board to approve Gembariski land split. Approved by The Board at this time.

The Planning Commission is working on updating the Zoning Ordinance. Mr. Ward stated it is necessary for him to resign as Chairman of The Commission because he is now a member of the County - Planning Commission and has an increased amount of duties, but he will remain a member of the Township Planning Commission. A new chairperson will be elected by members of the Township Planning Commission.

There was no activity by The Zoning Board of Appeals.

Recycling update for the 3rd quarter was read by the Supervisor. Recycling amounts are still very positive. A recycling meeting in Saline was reported on and the big subject was the enormous number of old tires for disposal.

The Safety Zone area at Sharon Hollow and Bethel Church Roads was discussed. As yet there is no response by the DNR to a letter sent by Mr. Neal requesting consideration for the Safety Zone.
