MANCHESTER ENTERPRISE Second Front Page: A Christmas Parable

I wonder if this incident would have had the same meaning it had not been for the fact that it happened a few days before Christmas.

I was on my way home from Lansing, cruising down M-52 headed for Chelsea. About the time I got to Green Lake, I noticed the air making a funny noise on the right side of the car. I thought maybe it was the wind coming off the water and blowing through the guard rail as I went by the lake. However, once I was by that spot, the noise continued. Then I noticed the car steering funny as I started to bump along.

Then it hit me - and it wasn't so funny. I had a flat tire. Actually, upon inspection, I didn't have just a flat tire, I had an annihilated tire.

I pulled off the road not too far from the sign that reads, "Prison Area - Do Not Pick Up Hitchhikers", and was grateful to see a couple of houses nearby. A knock on the door of the first house proved fruitless. No one was home.

As I approached the second house, I thought to myself, "This doesn't look good. No tire tracks in the driveway." But, being desperate and not knowing what else to do, I walked up to the back door and knocked. Pretty soon a rather wary-looking lady came to the door and opened it just enough to see who, or what, was standing on her back porch.

Speaking through the closed storm door, I explained my plight and asked her if she could call a tow truck or me. She went

to see if she could see my car on the road - which she couldn't because of the trees in her front yard - and then came back to the door. She asked me if I wanted to come in, and I asked in return if she wanted me to. At this point she said that I looked like a good person and she let me in.

In the space of walking across her kitchen and living room to reach the phone, I told her as much as I could about myself, short of my Social Security number, in an effort to make her feel at ease.

Once I explained that I was the minister of St. John's United Church of Christ in Chelsea and also worked for Individualized Hospice in Ann Arbor she relaxed, told me she was also a Christian, and handed me the phone book. We sat and chatted in her living room for an hour-and-a-half while I waited for the tow truck.

I never did find out what her name is. I left rather quickly when the truck arrived, after many "thank you's" and "I really appreciate your hospitality".

It was while I was standing on the side of the road, toes frozen and nose dripping, watching another stranger change the tire, that I began to relate this experience with the first Christmas story. Granted, Mary and Joseph did not blow a tire on their way to Bethlehem, but their trip there was anything but smooth and predictable.

That trip was an interruption in the routine of their lives that they could have done without at that point in time. And, as

donkeys don't come with climate control or shock absorbers, the ride for Mary, fully pregnant with child, could not have been an easy one. It isn't all that great when not pregnant!

Then, having arrived in Bethlehem, Joseph must have had to knock on many doors trying to find a place to stay, for the city was filled to capacity and then some, both with travelers on legitimate business and tricksters looking to make good

on other people's innocence and generosity. Fortunately, he was able to find an innkeeper who could direct him to a place to stay. There he and Mary, and eventually the Babe, found shelter, warmth, and companionship; all God's blessings to these weary travelers on the road.

Mary and Joseph, and I, had to rely on the good graces of a stranger to provide safety and shelter during a trying and difficult time. We all had to trust that others would know how

best to help us in a time of need. We had to realize our vulnerability and rely on prayer and God's presence to see us through.

Um, seems that is just the reason God sent the Christ-Child to us, and to the world, in the first place: to be just that person for just those reasons. Christ may have been born in a stable in Bethlehem, but he was certainly present in a living room on M-52. This is a Christmas gift I will remember for a long time to come. -Rev. Nancy M. Doty

PROPOSED SYNOPSIS

of a regular meeting of the Manchester Township Board held Monday, December 12, 1994:

The meeting was called to order at 8:00 PM with all Board Members present. Also present was Fire Chief Mike Scully. Minutes of the Board's last regular meeting were approved, and the Board accepted minutes from the Planning Commission, Board of Appeals, and Library Board. Bills paid since last meeting were reviewed. The Treasurer's report was accepted. The Treasurer was authorized to appoint an assistant to collect taxes. Bills totaling \$2514.55 in the General Fund were approved for payment.

Chief Scully was present to report on the Fire Department. Fire runs for the month included 3 fires, 2 medical, 13 personal injury, 1 mutual aid, for a total of 19 runs. As a result of the MIOSHA investigation, the township has received a citation and notification of penalty. The Supervisor was authorized to negotiate with the Michigan Department of Labor to reach some kind of settlement.

The Constable/Zoning report for November was accepted. Constable Moore will be on medical leave for several weeks after heart bypass surgery.

The Road Commission met with residents concerned about conditions on Grossman and Herman Roads, and the Drain Commission and Road Commission met with residents of the Iron Lake Area to discuss findings resulting from their study of the dam site.

Approval was given to sign the Washtenaw County Central Dispatch Authority contract for 1995. Monthly rate for dispatching services will be \$345.81.

Under correspondence, the publication "Trash Wrap", from the Washtenaw County Public Works Department, included information on the "Green Backs for Green Acts" grant program. The county is looking for unique projects that contribute to solid waste prevention, reuse and recycling. Individuals, businesses and local governments are encouraged to apply.

There being no further business requiring action from the Board, the meeting adjourned at 9:50 PM.

Meeting called to order at 7:32 PM

Others Present: Jeff Wallace, Lou Way, John Davison, Michael Kennedy, Ron Milkey, Mark Ames, Craig Fielder, Jack Conaway, Doug Schaffer, Joe Fitzgerald.

Amy Fielder has resigned from the Planning Commission because she no longer lives in the village.

We approved the minutes of the November 15th meeting.

At 7:45 PM, we held a Public Hearing on the Davison Rezoning Request. Mr. Davison is requesting that part of his property be changed from agriculture to R-1B, so that a house could be built. He has traded some property with Consumers Power Co. and provided us with an updated drawing. Several residents expressed concerns about this request. Some concerns discussed include: possible drainage problems if land is developed, future expansion of the power station and its close proximity to existing and future homes, the fact that this land is designated "conservation" in the Village G.D.P. not R-1B, and wetland drainage.

A motion by Tucker to approve the Davison Re-Zoning was passed.

Ron Milkey has requested a Variance at 223 Riverside Dr. to add a deck and a garage on a non-conforming lot. He presented drawings and answered questions. No one was present to object to his plans.

A motion by Way to approve the Milkey Variance was passed.

We reviewed the Riverbend Site Plan Amendment. We discussed the gravel access drive, utility locations, road shoulders & width, lot size, sidewalks, trees, etc.

A motion by Muccio to approve the Amended Riverbend Site Plan was passed.

It has come to our attention that several properties in the village have not met requirements of their final site plans. Letters will be sent reminding property owners to complete their projects.

Our meeting was adjourned at 10:08 PM.

The regular meeting of the Manchester Village Council was called to order by President Pro Tem Brooks at 7:00 PM. Council members present: Brooks, Conaway, Marshall, Schaffer, Taepke, Vought. Absent: Becktel. Also present: Jerry Haensler, Christi Clark, Clerk Tucker, Manager Wallace.

The minutes of the November 21, 1994 meeting were approved as presented on a motion by Marshall, support by Vought. Vote: Ayes-all.

The proceedings of the November 21, 1994 meeting were approved as presented on a motion by Conaway, support by Taepke. Vote: Ayes-all.

The Agenda was approved as amended on a motion by Schaffer, support by Marshall. Vote: Ayes-all.

Motion by Marshall, support by Vought to accept the Treasurer's Report for November 30, 1994 as presented. Vote: Ayes-all.

Motion by Taepke, support by Vought to approve the payables in the amount of \$47,135.06 as presented. Roll Call Vote: Ayes-all.

Motion by Brooks, support by Vought to approve up to \$1,000 for scraper blades for snow removal. Roll Call Vote: Ayes-all.

Discussion was held on power problems in the village. Wallace suggested that a representative of Consumers Power attend a future meeting. Schaffer suggested that the newspapers put an article in their papers by January asking residents if they have any problems or complaints that they would like addressed. Consumers Power will be put on a March or April meeting agenda.

CLEAN-UP OF ENVIRONMENTAL ACCIDENTS ORDINANCE AND RESOLUTION Motion by Vought, support by Marshall to adopt the resolution that adopts Ordinance No. 218, An Ordinance for Cleanup of Environmental Accidents. Vote: Ayes-all. The ordinance becomes effective 30 days after publication.

GARBAGE CONTRACT/COMPOSTABLES - Council determined that the bid would be for the following:

- The Village would continue to provide residents with chipping service, one time per month from April through October.
- Grass Clippings and yard waste would be the responsibility of the homeowner.
- Leaf Pickup bids would be based on curbside pickup, 4 events per year, not guaranteed, instead of using a cubic yard basis for the bid.
- Education of residents would also be a required part of the bid.

Out and About

A year ago, on the 19th, saw the passing of my Mother, Jeanette Garlick. Dad and I were with her to the very end, at the hospital, and although she was sedated for pain it was a very emotional passing. Doctors had advised us in 1988 of her probable life expectancy, about five years, and how, a bursting aneurysm she would leave us, nevertheless her departure was very traumatic.

Dad and I had talked about what symptoms to be alert for and how we would respond, but when the end comes it is still difficult to accept. Mom was a person who wanted everything to be as perfect as possible. She was a practical nurse at Wayne County General Hospital and was given the most difficult care patients to attend, mostly the children. With them she was conscientious, caring and understanding. 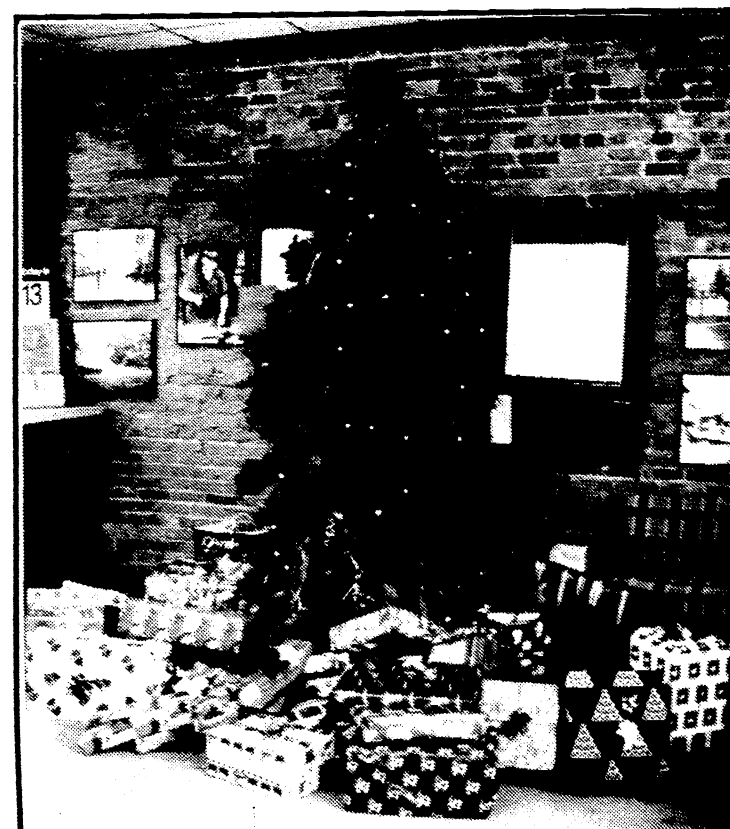

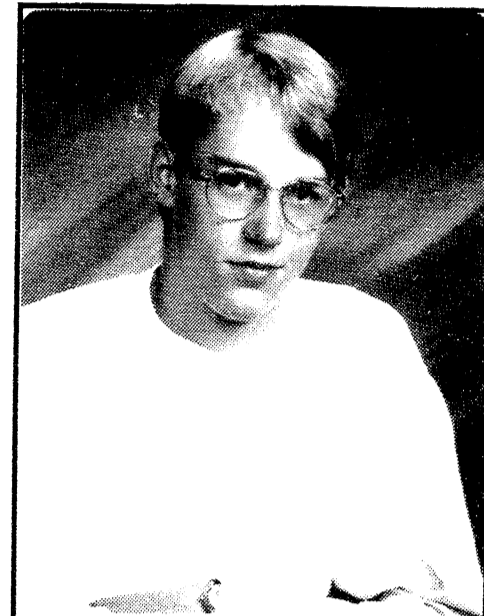


Andrea Clark Chosen as DAR Good Citizen

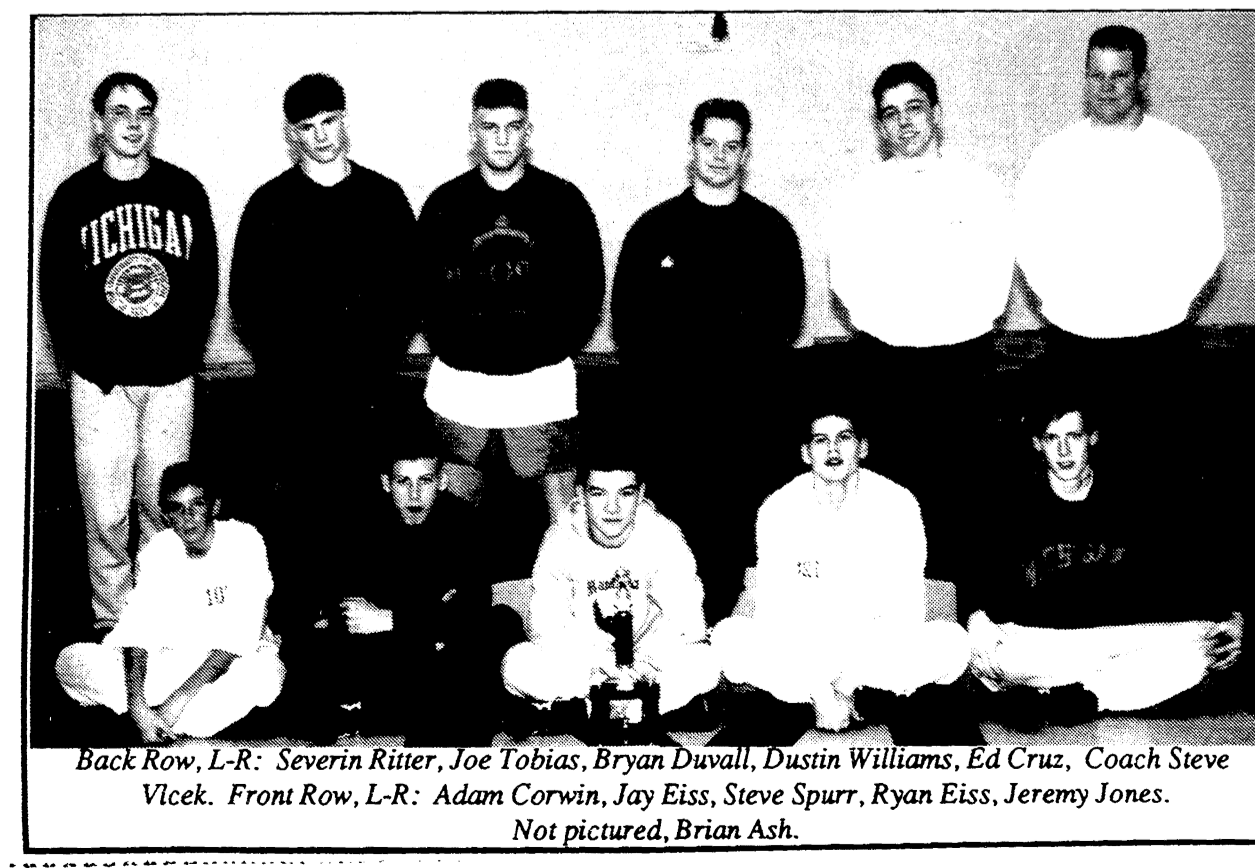

Joyce Stein reported a successful Christmas gift shop at V.A. Hospital. Also, Christmas cards are being sent to all area military personnel.

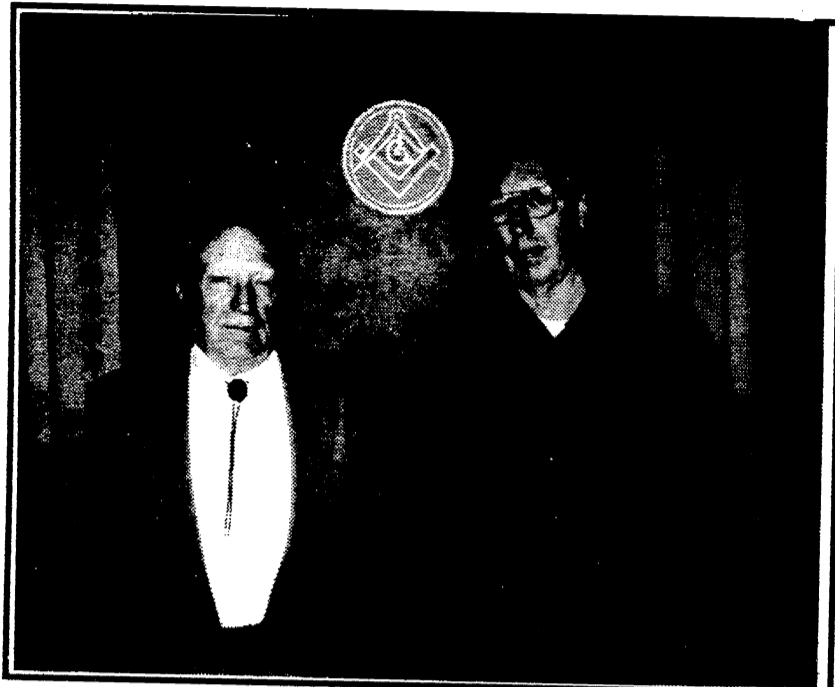
