by gar A year ago, on the 19th, saw the passing of my Mother, Jeanette Garlick. Dad and I were with her to the very end, at the hospital, and although she was sedated for pain it was a very emotional passing. Doctors had advised us in 1988 of her probable life expectancy, about five years, and how, a bursting aneurysm she would leave us, neverthe-less her departure was very traumatic.

Dad and I had talked about what symptoms to be alert for and how we would respond, but when the end comes it is still difficult to accept. In retrospect, although these gifts may have been modest, they were definitely treasures to three pre-schoolers. The real treasures, however, are those photographs. Frozen in time, we are still those little pre-schoolers. Now I see my nieces' and nephew's faces in those pictures, along with the faces of my

My hope for Christmas Future is that the family will continue to be the bedrock of our society. I can't picture Christmas without picturing my family. Many people, for various reasons, don't have "family" to turn to this Christmas. Their Christmas dinner maybe served at a Salvation Army shelter, or it may be picked out of a garbage can. Some people, even if gathered as a family, may have too little food to go around - and that happens all too often in "the land of the free" as well as a Third-World nation. Some people may be eating a microwave dinner in front of their TV, alone for the holidays.

By reaching beyond ourselves, those who are luckiest can perhaps try to make Christmas a time of joy for others. We are all touched by the tales of those less fortunate than we are, particularly at the holidays.

In so doing, we will have redeemed our lives and brought joy not only to others, but to ourselves


