Second Front Page: A peek at 1903 with Mat Blosser

A special thanks to Mr. Harry Ebbert who found a copy of December 25th, 1902, issue of the "Manchester Enterprise". Mr. Ebbert found the copy in the wall cavity of the old Swankauitz farm house on Mull Road, Twin Lakes, in the south west corner of Manchester Township, that he is remodeling.

We find the article, written by Mat D. Blosser, very interesting and prophetic. The Article was titled as:

"The Past and the Coming Year."

The coming year promises to see the United States a more marvelous period of commercial and industrial development than even that of the year 1902. The prediction may be safely made that American trade with the East will/be doubled during the next twelve months and the United States will become the dominant power of the Pacific ocean. It is not beyond the bounds of possibility that within the next decade the empire of trade and commerce will pass from the Atlantic to the Pacific shores.

Having in mind the vast strides taken by our country in comparatively a few recent years, what the volume of our commerce will be in another quarter of a century it would be foolish to predict but it will be enormous. That the influence of America and the American people throughout this world will have increased, so that they will have become not only the great commercial nation of the world, but the greatest in political rank and power and influence and responsibility can be scarcely doubted by those who have an abiding faith in the energy and wisdom and integrity of the American citizen.

Wallace was also selected to the executive committee of the organization for a term of one year.





Camp, 20th Mich., Battery No. 9 December 21, 1864 Dear Mother -

December 21st, 1864 at Petersburg is decidedly a wet, nasty day and therefore we have to sit close in our houses and a bomb proof sheds water like a sieve, making it anything but pleasant in here. However if it keeps me at home and almost compels me to perform my duty by writing to you I don't know but it's a pretty good thing after all.

Perhaps you think I am getting negligentabout writing and I'll have to plead guilty, I know, but there are some mitigating circumstances: Firstly, one day is pretty much like another and there is nothing of any consequence to write only I am well. That's a good deal, I know, but rather unsatisfactory after many repetitions unless connected with something else of interest. Secondly, I've been quite busy: quarterly returns, special reports, ordnance returns, camp and garrison equipage lists, clothing to draw, receipt rolls to make out and requisitions for clothing, camp and garrison equipage, and ordnance all had to be done within the last few days to say nothing of inspections. details, and etceteras to keep me boring 'round all the spare moments

It was this fashion: They bored holes through about fifteen feet in length and stuck sticks through and made sheep racks and brought them out in sections and placed them in a row and wired them together making a long string of quite formidable looking fence. I most wish I had one but I suppose I couldn't get it unless I had some important business, which I haven't, I'm going to send a set of Chess men by Chapman and have him mail them to you from Wayne, where he is going. I meant to send them for a New Year's present but I couldn't do them up to suit me and send them by mail without a little pasteboard box to put them in, and I couldn't get one here very handy, and now this chance is my opportunity. I got a letter from Aunt Olive and a pair of socks, Christmas. Ain't she just the best aunt, though?

Dear Sister -I sat down yesterday afternoon with the intention of writing to you and upon finishing the above elaborate sketch I was unceremoniously called upon to go and draw our ration of wood and distribute it in the rain. Oh! I got disgusted with the idea of trying to write and threw it aside. Now I'll pick it up

prevalent in the army, hardly a and though I haven't a thing to soldier but uses it more or less, write I'll just say I'm well and still generally more, though, and when in the land of the living. I got Mother's last letter the other day,

but I haven't got your last one yet. Mother says you've been sick. I hope you have got well again. I'd have given anything to have been home during the holidays but it's no use. Before I can go I have to get Capt's, permission and then if the Major says "yes", and the Brigade Commander says "yes", and the Division Commander says "yes", most always find him where we and the Corp. Commander says "yes", and then if Gen. Meade says "yes", too, then I can go. They haven't any of them said "yes" yet, because I haven't asked them, but in seven short months if Providence should spare me so long I can venture home without any furlough.

Let me see. What'll I write now? We mustered again the other day and made our Pay rolls and are now patiently waiting for Uncle Samuel to send us our last four months ration of greenbacks. All the boys most, are becoming landholders. An agent for the State, Minnesota, is Chaplain in a Minnesota Regt. in the 2nd Corps, and Chaplain Jones is a sort of agent for him, and for \$20 the soldier gets a duplicate which at the land office draws a deed for 160 acres of land in Martin Co., Minnesota. Four boys of our Co. have taken a whole section; it is the fourth county from the west side and the southern tier of counties in the state. I haven't become a proprietor, yet, but I have thought some about it. You know the dignity of being a landowner would be worth \$20, at least. It seemed so at first thought but I don't really know as it would. Tomorrow is the Sabbath and instead of having preaching, as we ought to, we will have inspection. I haven't heard a sermon in two months or more.

I went back to the rear, Christmas, and found the old 3rd Division Hospital where it stood in June. The little headboard stood there unmolested, and the same old pine tree that holds the sign board keeps guard there, still. And of the fifty or more who were buried there in June, only one or two have been removed. I planted fresh cedar boughs by the grave wondering if I should ever see again the spot hallowed by so many sacred memories. It's getting late and I must stop so Good Night.
