## Memory Lane

Our readers have requested that we continue the column, "Down Memory Lane", and articles by John Emory Irwin whose family helped to pioneer this area.



Camp, 20th Mich., Battery No. 9 December 21, 1864  
Dear Mother -

December 21st, 1864 at Petersburg is decidedly a wet, nasty day and therefore we have to sit close in our houses and a bomb proof sheds water like a sieve, making it anything but pleasant in here. However if it keeps me at home and almost compels me to perform my duty by writing to you I don't know but it's a pretty good thing after all.

Perhaps you think I am getting negligent about writing and I'll have to plead guilty, I know, but there are some mitigating circumstances: Firstly, one day is pretty much like another and there is nothing of any consequence to write only I am well. That's a good deal, I know, but rather unsatisfactory after many repetitions unless connected with something else of interest. Secondly, I've been quite busy: quarterly returns, special reports, ordinance returns, camp and garrison equipage lists, clothing to draw, receipt rolls to make out and requisitions for clothing, camp and garrison equipage, and ordinance all had to be done within the last few days to say nothing of inspections, details, and etceteras to keep me boring round all the spare moments I could find.

I haven't got through yet, but today there is less pressure than

usual and I had planned to go over to the burying ground, but it rains so, I can't today. I don't know how far it is but I think it can't be more than three or four miles and before many days I mean to go!

The rebs desert and come over every night, most. Here now, last night, three or four came over between here and the river. One who came in to our Regt. wanted the pickets to let him stay on the line till a couple of his comrades came in and he did stay an hour or more, but no more Johnnies came in there and he was sent away. When they come over they are taken, generally, to Regt. Hdqrs., then Brigade, then Division, and so on, finally they are put in the Bull Pen at City Point and thence North, some into government service driving teams and one thing or another and some to Canada. Night before last, two or three came in, too.

Our pickets are on very friendly terms with the Johnnies Pickets, although no intercourse is allowed on either side. Often when ordered to fire they sing out "Lie down Yanks" and then shoot; so do ours, but both parties take care to keep out of sight, though. We have shot away over 20,000 rounds of ammunition since we came here, just our Regt. alone, so you can judge that it costs our venerable Uncle something for projectiles; a great many of them are foolishly thrown away, too.

It's really necessary for a great deal of random firing though, especially in the night for one night after we had been here about a week we tried the experiment and during the night they threw out half a mile of abater or "chevere de frire", I believe is the scientific name for the particular kind they made. It was this fashion: They bored holes through about fifteen feet in length and stuck sticks through and made sheep racks and brought them out in sections and placed them in a row and wired them together making a long string of quite formidable looking fence. Since that we have special orders to fire on working parties when we can hear them and as the lines are so close together we most always can, but can't always stop them. I thought when we came round here that we would get so little wood we'd almost freeze but the Col. keeps the Brigade teams drawing steadily every day except Sunday and rainy days and we have a nice regimental wood pile but have to keep it guarded day and

night. Every afternoon the Officer of the Day is charged with the duty of issuing to each company according to its needs and we have plenty by husbanding it.

Speaking of the Colonel—Cutchon I mean - it is said he is promoted to a full Colonelcy and assigned to the 27th Mich. and I guess it's so and Captain Lounsbury is Brevet Major. It creates some jealousy in the Regt. among the line officers as it promotes him over the heads of Capt. VanCleve and Capt. Porter. There was reason for it though. I think Lounsbury is a fine fellow and more than that, a Christian man and gentleman. He has also been in 3 mos. service with Gen. Wilcox and spent several months in prison with him, which is perhaps a secret of his promotion; a prisoner twice and wounded three times.

The mail has just come and brings another letter from under date of Dec. 15th. I've acknowledged receiving the socks twice already but I've got them all right and the Northwesters and the pins and tonight the postage stamps. Much obliged a thousand times. I get twenty-four dollars per month I thought I told you before. But we have tattoo and roll call and my candle has gone out and I can't write by firelight very well so I quit. Write to me often, as you do. We are not consolidated that I know of, though there were some rumors to that effect. We have got a new stand of colors from Uncle Samuel, a splendid new National Flag, Red White and Blue. But I must stop. Good Night, once more. Write often.

Camp, 20th Mich., Battery No. 9 December 26, 1864  
Dear Sister -

I've been threatening to write to you for several days but when I get just ready something would turn up to prevent and I ain't sure now, that I'll write half a dozen consecutive lines. Chaplain Day's Father of Capt. Day of our Regt., came to the Regt. today and brought a large package to the Regt. consisting of tobacco and stationary which he distributed to the Regt.—or rather to the Orderly Sergeants. & this is one of the sheets. It ain't very good but is very acceptable. So is the tobacco, the use of which is very

prevalent in the army, hardly a soldier but uses it more or less, generally more, though, and when they get out of quids it's always the first thing provided for.

We had another lively time this forenoon, cannonading. The rebs threw their missiles with more than usual accuracy. Several burst over the fort and some came in without bursting at all and none of them did any injury. It is said we have new men in our front, some of Longstreet's Corps we most always find him where we go. The rebs were deserting every night, like sixty, and I guess they were relieved and sent to some place where desertions were less handy. Seven came in to our Brigade in one night and the same night there came eighteen and one officer into our Div. They say that into Butler's line they came by the dozen. We can see Butler's look-out from here in fair days, looming above the trees. Really, my pen is getting so poor I'll have to have a new one and write with a pencil till I get one and to cap the climax, my portfolio fell off the bunk into the dirt and lay there half the night for ought I know, but I can't afford to throw away this sheet of paper and commence on another. Chaplain has a furlough to go home for twenty days. I most wish I had one but I suppose I couldn't get it unless I had some important business, which I haven't, I'm going to send a set of Chess men by Chapman and have him mail them to you from Wayne, where he is going. I meant to send them for a New Year's present but I couldn't do them up to suit me and send them by mail without a little pasteboard box to put them in, and I couldn't get one here very nandy, and now this chance is my opportunity. I got a letter from Aunt Olive and a pair of socks, Christmas. Ain't she just the best aunt, though?

20th Mich. Vols., Battery No. 9 January 6, 1865  
Dear Sister -

I sat down yesterday afternoon with the intention of writing to you and upon finishing the above elaborate sketch I was unceremoniously called upon to go and draw our ration of wood and distribute it in the rain. Oh! I got disgusted with the idea of trying to write and threw it aside. Now I'll pick it up

and though I haven't a thing to write I'll just say I'm well and still in the land of the living. I got Mother's last letter the other day, but I haven't got your last one yet.

Mother says you've been sick. I hope you have got well again. I'd have given anything to have been home during the holidays but it's no use. Before I can go I have to get Capt's permission and then if the Major says "yes", and the Brigade Commander says "yes", and the Division Commander says "yes", and the Corp. Commander says "yes", and then if Gen. Meade says "yes", too, then I can go. They haven't any of them said "yes" yet, because I haven't asked them, but in seven short months if Providence should spare me so long I can venture home without any furlough.

Let me see. What'll I write now? We mastered our pay rolls and are now patiently waiting for Uncle Samuel to send us our last four months ration of greenbacks. All the boys most, are becoming land-holders. An agent for the State, Minnesota, is Chaplain in a Minnesota Regt. in the 2nd Corps, and Chaplain Jones is a sort of agent for him, and for \$20 the soldier gets a duplicate which at the land office draws a deed for 160 acres of land in Martin Co., Minnesota. Four boys of our Co. have taken a whole section; it is the fourth county from the west side and the southern tier of counties in the state. I haven't become a proprietor, yet, but I have thought some about it. You know the dignity of being a landowner would be worth \$20, at least. It seemed so at first thought but I don't really know as it would. Tomorrow is the Sabbath and instead of having preaching, as we ought to, we will have inspection. I haven't heard a sermon in two months or more.

I went back to the rear, Christmas, and found the old 3rd Division Hospital where it stood in June. The little headboard stood there unmolested, and the same old pine tree that holds the sign board keeps guard there, still. And of the fifty or more who were buried there in June, only one or two have been removed. I planted fresh cedar boughs by the grave wondering if I should ever see again the spot hallowed by so many sacred memories. It's getting late and I must stop so Good Night.

Summary Board of Education December 19, 1994

Not official minutes

The regular meeting of Manchester Community Schools' Board of Education was called to order at 7:47 p.m. by President Kluwe with the Pledge of Allegiance. Minutes of the regular meeting of November 21, 1994 and special meeting of December 5, 1994 were approved as presented. The treasurer's report was approved with a cash balance as of November 30, 1994 in the amount of \$678,028.39; total bills payable of \$639,675.68.

Correspondence included a thank you note from Pat Sahakian; letter from Jill Randall regarding the use of Pleasant Lake School; MASB Boardmember Certification/Award Program; letter from Linda Klepaczyk regarding the music room; and a thank you note from Trustee John Ochs for thoughtfulness during his recent surgery.

The resignation of Carl Willits as boys high school track coach has been accepted. Superintendent Niedzwiecki notified Board members that his contract should be reviewed by April 1, 1995 to determine the extension of the three year contract.

The bid for two complete buses from Transportation Equipment Sales Corporation (TESCO) of \$53,520 per bus was accepted as presented.

The Board approved the application for preliminary qualification of bonds for renovations and additions to Luther C. Klager Elementary and Nellie Ackerson Middle School.

The agreement between financial consultant Erickson and Associates Limited and Manchester Community Schools has been approved as presented.

The fall athletic report was reviewed by Board members. Principal Russell LeBlanc made the following introduction to Deb Havens for her outstanding work in initiating and coordinating the development of the VISA volunteer program:

"I am really pleased that Ron asked me to make this introduction tonight. The 1993-94 school year began with Deb Havens asking me if we had any need for a volunteer in the high school office. I indicated that we did. She came to the high school office and began working with Dave Swanson. One fateful day, she asked if I had a minute. We sat down in my office and she said, 'Have you ever thought about having a volunteer program in the high school?'"

I responded, "No, not really. But I think it's something we really need and something that's very important." So we talked for about half an hour or forty-five minutes. Little did I know that those forty-five minutes were going to turn into

a movement, with Deb's leadership, that would have such a great impact on the high school and middle school and in such a very, very short period of time. Here's what often happens with these kinds of discussions. The people go out the door and the idea kind of ends, it's over. Well, this didn't end. Deb was persistent. She came back again and we continued to talk. Through her leadership, we brought together a group of people from the community. She took the leadership in all aspects of organizing the group. She took care of advertising for volunteers, writing the minutes of the meetings and communicating with The Enterprise and to the community about the progress of the program.

The evidence of her success is with some of the people that are sitting right here. The majority of the people in this audience tonight are part of that movement. They were either on the original steering committee or they now have become part of our volunteer program. It's still in its infancy, but that infant never would have been born had it not been for Deb. She planned with these people to start looking into how other schools started their programs. I guess I had this idea in my head that all we had to do was say, "We have a volunteer program. Let's get going!" Well, it wasn't that easy. Our steering committee began to investigate. They came back to the group and indicated that training must take place. The process slowed down for a bit and then we had a group of people who went to the training.

We came back from the training and again Deb stayed right in the middle of all of the action. She made sure that every step was taken care of. I'm very, very pleased that she did so. The movement is on its way and I'm convinced that had it not been for Deb's action and leadership, it never would have happened. I would have sat back for another year and said, "Well, yea, it's a good idea. Let's get into it." No action would follow.

Unfortunately for our school community, Deb has received a new position at Belleville High School in the Van Buren School District. So we no longer have her leadership with us as we continue the movement.

But, because she insisted on training others, we have people who have taken over that leadership and are keeping VISA going in the middle school and high school. VISA is now a reality and for that I'd like to present to you for recognition by the Board for her great work, Deb Havens."

Following Mr. LeBlanc's introduction, President Paul Kluwe presented Deb with a plaque.

The meeting adjourned at 8:05 p.m. with a reception for Deb immediately following.

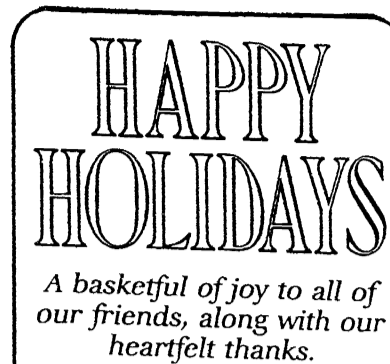
Tough loss for 7th Graders

The home owner said, they "selected the contractor because he was cheap and sounded sincere". When asked if they had seen any of his previous work or talked to anyone for whom the contractor had built a house they

said, "No, we hadn't checked; but he seemed to be such a nice guy".

The house was started in 1992 and was not able to be occupied until mid 1994. It could have and should have, been built in no more than 6 months. This builder had a builder's license issued by the State of Michigan. I don't take much stock in that, however.

Recently there has been a rash of phone solicitations for windows, siding and other remodeling services. There is no direct relationship between the phone calls and whether the services might be truly needed.

Case in point; I was called by two different companies recently. One wanted to install siding and the other one new windows in my house, which is not yet two years old.

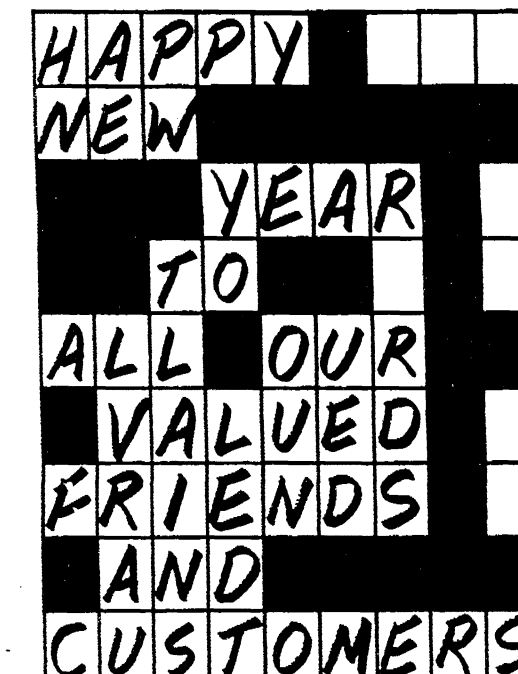
I asked the caller if he had seen my house and if he knew how old the house was? Answer, "No, but if you don't have our siding you don't have a good house." My answer to him was, "Sorry, buster, but my cedar siding is better than your ultra light, non-insulated vinyl siding."

The window salesman said his all metal windows with storms were the very best. My question of him was, "Is it better than wood core, surface clad and wood spaced thermal-panes that I now have?" To this caller's credit he responded, "No, your windows are better but mine are a lot cheaper and with the storms they're almost as good."

Moral of the story; Beware of nice guys without experience or high pressure salesmen trying to make a buck.

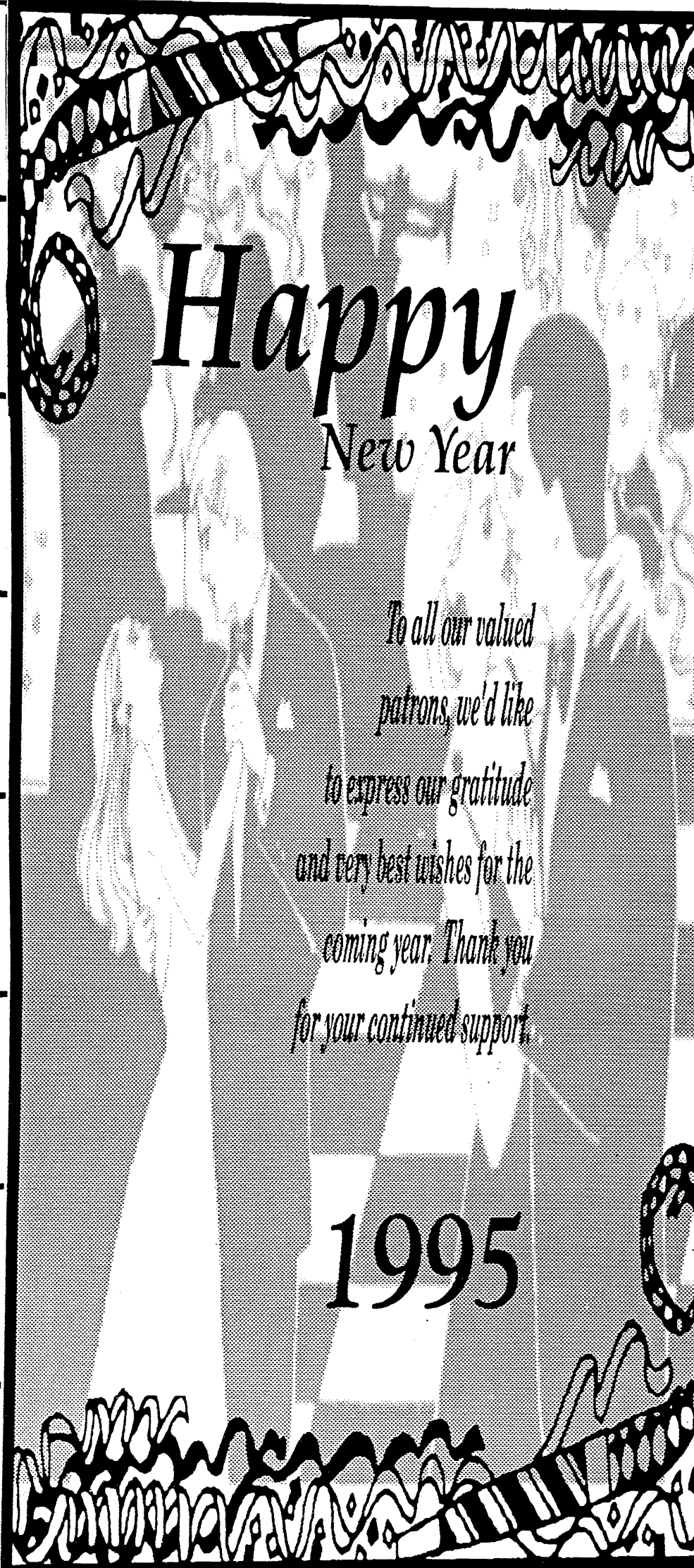


