Brief Board of Education Meeting Raises More Questions than Answers

meeting for the purpose of approving the Resolution for the planned Bond Election, seemed like a cut-and-dried issue. The ballot language was written as state mandates required. On a motion by Sahakian, seconded by Abbott, the Board unanimously approved the bond issue request.

The hiring of a social worker, Ms. Randi Friedman, for an At-Risk program as funded by the state, was also approved unanimously.

Although the meeting was officially called to discuss the language of the bond issue, a potentially more interesting topic lay beneath the surface of the agenda. Superintendent Niedzwiecki had sent a memo to Board members notifying them that the company through which the district's new bus was being ordered was shutting down their Wayne Bus plant. Our half-completed bus was in limbo. On top of concerns about the recent bus inspections rating our fleet as "poor", the school board seemingly had some momentous decisions to make.

However, this discussion, 00, was very cut and dried.

A special school board Niedzwiecki informed the board that the company is committed to complete production of the buses which have been ordered, and to honoring the warranties on these buses. Or, the plant may be sold and then production would continue anyway.

> "The status of our order is currently through engineering and delivery is scheduled for the end of March." reported

Niedzwiecki. Based upon the fact that a sizable cancellation fee would be involved, and the fact that starting the ordering process over again would mean no new bus before the beginning of the '95-'96 school year, the superintenrecommended maintaining our order with

The only discussion on the matter ensued when Hochstetler questioned, "Who makes the spec sheets for the buses?" The answer to this seemingly simple question, which was partially answered during the meeting, was that each district has a separate set of specifications for school buses. The executive Committee of our coming order of two school buses to arrive early next school year.

Subsequently, it was learned that the process of ordering a school bus is an art and not a science. There is no specific formula for the manufacture of a school bus. Every single district in the state is handicapped in this process by having to develop its own set of specifications, then sending it out to bid, then having a (roughly) twomonth engineering process, for which, of course, they pay

dearly. All this prior to ever thinking of actually BUILD-ING a school bus.

As discovered by Board President Kluwe there is no such thing as "buying a bus". You can go to a dealer and purchase a car or a truck. From the options available, you can choose one which meets your family's or your business' needs. No such system exists for purchasing school buses. As Kluwe commented, "There is no Wal-Mart of buses out there." Each district in the state is paying large amounts of money and spending great amounts of time to have custom designed school buses developed for them. Even if we wanted to use, say, Chelsea's specifications, Kluwe found it would be impossible. All districts pay for this "tweaking" (to use Trustee Ochs' terminology) equally, whether they are Ann Arbor buying 50 buses at a time or Manchester buying one or two. Thus, trying to compare bus bids may be compared to apples and oranges. Who benefits? Do our children or our schools benefit from these policies?

The state of Michigan, School Board is already who takes such a great interworking on specs for our estinhowourbonding request ballot is worded, whether we have an At Risk program for students, and how well our bus fleet is maintained, has yet to get interested in how our bus fleet is OBTAINED. It would seem that here is an issue for which it would benefit our district (and any other district) for the state to become involved.



Winans Finds a New Generation

Rob Winans is part of a family tradition which began in Chelsea 115 years ago. In 1880, Rob's great-great-uncle, Louis Winans, started a jewelry and optometry business in the building now occupied by Johnson's How To in Chelsea. Louis shared the space with the Armstrong Drug Store, and ran his business there for 18 years.

Upon Louis' death, however, his nephew Albert E. Winans purchased the business, moving it in 1898 to its present location. Albert's cousin, Elmer, who was Rob's grandfather, became involved in the business after he returned from WWI.

A grandfather clock has stood in the window at Winans' for close to 80 years - a treasured antique brought back from Germany by Elmer. Everywhere Rob looks today he sees remnants of family history and tradition.

The desk in his narrow workshop is the original used from the business' earliest days. Its massive size dwarfs the modern tools Rob uses in his jeweler's trade.

Rob has been involved in the business for 20 years, and has owned it for the past two years. Taking over the reins from his father, George, who still lives in Chelsea, must have been an intimidating job. "Some people still come in and call me 'Robbie'," he grins. And though







If bidding and specifications for school buses became more standardized, individual districts would not have to become bogged down with the ordering process. The districts would benefit by knowing what needed to be purchased, what options were available, and what is the best price for the bus they need. If there were statewide bidding and an industry standard available, our children and our schools would benefit, and the process would be much shorter and simpler.

President Kluwe has acknowledged that the bus fleet

problems require ongoing attention. Included in this problem is the realization that even ordering two more buses this spring will not put us back on our originally contracted replacement schedule. However, that issue was skirted during the Board meeting on February 6th. Kluwe has stated: "The real issue is that the schools, for whatever reasons, have done poorly on the recent bus inspections. The buck stops at the administrative and board level, and we need to provide precise answers, direction and leadership to correct the situation that has led to this. (Emphasis added).

"There have been many side issues raised. We will investigate these issues...but we must not let them divert our attention from the real issue here. As board president, I shall see to it that the board will deal with this at the next regular meeting on February 20, 1995."

At some point, the tough questions will have to be answered. What will the board and the superintendent do about these problems in the Transportation Department? We have the pledge of the Board President that this issue will be addressed.

MICHIGAN CONSOLIDATED GAS COMPANY GAS FRANCHISE ORDINANCE ORDINANCE NO. 18

AN ORDINANCE, granting to MICHIGAN CONSOLIDATED GAS COMPANY, its successors and assigns, the right, power, and authority to lay, maintain, and operate gas mains, pipes and services on, along, across and under the highways, streets, alleys, bridges and other public places, and to do a local gas business in the TOWNSHIP OF SHARON, WASHTENAW COUNTY, MICHIGAN for a period of thirty years.

THE TOWNSHIP OF SHARON ORDAINS:

Section 1. Grant of Gas Franchise and Consent to Laying of Pipes, Etc. Subject to all the terms and conditions mentioned in this ordinance, consent is hereby given to Michigan Consolidated Gas Company, a corporation organized under the laws of the State of Michigan (the "Company"), and to its successors and assigns, to lay, maintain, operate, and use gas pipes, mains, conductors, service pipes, and other necessary equipment in the highways, streets, alleys, and other, public places in the Township of Sharon, Washtenaw County, Michigan, and a franchise is hereby granted to the Company, its successors and assigns, to transact local business in said Township of Sharon for the purposes of conveying gas into and through and supplying and selling gas in said Township of Sharon and all other matters incidental thereto.

Section 2. Installation and Extension of system. If the provisions and conditions herein contained are accepted by the Company, as in Section 6 hereof provided, then within not more than one (l) year following the later of the date upon which this ordinance takes effect and the date upon which the Company receives such regulatory approval as may be necessary for the Company to convey gas to the Township of Sharon and to construct and operate its facilities therein, the Company shall determine the area within the Township of Sharon to be served initially and commence the installation of a gas distribution system within such area, and the Company shall thereafter proceed to complete said initial installation as soon as reasonably practicable; provided, however, that the Company shall not be held responsible for delays due to weather or labor conditions, inability to procure necessary materials, or other causes beyond its control; and provided further that such initial installation and any extensions shall be subject to the Main Extension provisions, the Area Expansion Program provisions (if and where applicable), and other applicable provisions now or from time to time hereafter contained in the Company's Rules and Regulations for Gas Service as filed with the Michigan Public Service Commission or successor agency having similar jurisdiction.

Section 3. Use of Streets and Other Public Places. The Company, its successors and assigns, shall not unnecessarily obstruct the passage of any of the highways, streets, alleys, or other public places within said Township of Sharon and shall within a reasonable time after making an opening or excavation, repair the same and leave it in as good condition as before the opening or excavation was made. For three years after any opening in highways, streets, alleys or other public places, the Company, its successors and assigns, shall be responsible for maintaining the repair to the opening. The Company shall repair and replace any vegetation damaged or destroyed in connection with any opening of highways, streets, alleys or other public places. If any tree in any highway, street, alley or public place is destroyed or dies within two years of any activity of the Company, in connection with this franchise, the Company shall replace it with a suitable tree or trees having a total d.b.h. (diameter at breast height) equal to or greater than d.b.h. of the tree that died or was destroyed. The Company will insure that none of the openings or repairs will cause a soil erosion, drainage or sedimentation nuisance. The Company, its successors and assigns, shall use due care in exercising the privileges herein contained and shall be liable to said Township of Sharon for all damages and costs which may be recovered against Township of Sharon arising from the default, carelessness, or negligence of the company or its officers, agents, and servants. The Company, its successors and assigns, shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless the Township, its officers and employees regarding any claims arising out of its activities in the Township including the excavation, use or repair of highways, streets, alleys or other public places pursuant to this franchise. The Company its successors and assigns shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless the Township, its officers and employees with regard to any claim regarding the validity or propriety of this franchise. No road, street, alley, or highway shall be opened for the laying of trunk lines or lateral mains except upon application to the Highway Commissioner or the Township of Sharon or other authority having jurisdiction in the premises, stating the nature of the proposed work and the route. Upon receipt of such application, it shall be the duty of the Highway Commissioners or the Township Board, or such other authority as may have jurisdiction, to issue a permit to the Company to do the work proposed. Issuance of the permit may be conditioned upon payment of a fee to compensate the authority having jurisdiction for necessary inspection and enforcement of the franchise standards.

Section 4. Standards and Conditions of Service: Rules, <u>Regulations and Rates</u>. The Company is now under the jurisdiction of the Michigan Public Service Commission to the extent provided by statute; and the rates to be charged for gas, and the standards and conditions of service and operation hereunder, shall be the same as set forth in the Company's schedule of rules, regulations, and rates as applicable in the several cities, villages, and townships in which the Company is now rendering gas service, or as shall hereafter be validly prescribed for the Township of Sharon under the orders, rules, and regulations of the Michigan Public service Commission or other authority having jurisdiction in the premises.

Section 5. Successors and Assigns. The words "Michigan Consolidated Gas Company" and "the Company", wherever used herein, are intended and shall be held and construed to mean and include both Michigan Consolidated Gas Company and its successors and assigns, whether so expressed or not.

Section 6. Effective Date: Term of Franchise Ordinance: Acceptance by Company. This ordinance shall take effect the day following the date of publication thereof, which publication shall be made within thirty (30) days after the date of its adoption, and shall continue in effect for a period of thirty (30) years thereafter, subject to revocation at the will of the Township of Sharon at any time during said thirty (30) year period; provided, however, that when this ordinance shall become effective the Township Clerk shall deliver to the Company a certified copy of the ordinance accompanied by written evidence of publication and recording thereof as required by law, and the Company shall, sixty (60) days after receipt of the above documents, file with the Township Clerk its written acceptance of the conditions and provisions hereof.

Section 7. Effect and Interpretation of Ordinance. All ordinances and resolutions, and parts thereof, which conflict with any of the terms of this ordinance are hereby rescinded. In the case of conflict between this ordinance and any such ordinances or resolutions, this ordinance shall control. The catch line headings which precede each Section of this ordinance are for convenience in reference only and shall not be taken into consideration in the construction or interpretation of any of the provisions of this ordinance.







Mary Ann Fielder



Collections galore filled the classrooms of Klager School on Monday, February 6th. And every one of those collections numbered - you guessed it - one hundred items.

In celebration of the 100th day of school each year, the Klager Kids in first and second grade classes round up their collections of 100 articles and carry them to school. Emily had been well trained for her participation in 100th Day - her grandmother, Mrs. Janice Little, was one of the originators of Hundredth Day at Klager School, along with Mrs. Teddy Groeb, in 1983.

"The kids love 100th Day because they say we don't do anything that day," laughs Mrs. Little. In reality, they are accomplishing a great deal. All activities on the 100th day of school are planned around the number 100. This helps the students not only to count to 100, but to have a clear grasp of what "A HUNDRED" really means.

During the day, classes get a chance to show off their assorted collections to visitors, other Klager Kids, and the staff. You can tell the younger kids' gears are turning, trying to decide what they'll bring Next Year on 100th Day!

In 1987, Mrs. Little and Mrs. Groeb published a book entitled, "Hooray for The 100th Day" as a part of the manipulative mathematics curriculum called "Math Their Way". This widely circulated book was the basis for many workshops the teachers collaborated upon throughout the state of Michigan.


Mrs. Little has carried on the 100th Day tradition at Klager since Mrs. Groeb's death five years ago, and although she no longer actively
