With John Emory Irwin



The Death of a President

President Abraham Lincoln was assassinated at the conclusion of the Civil War. Irwin wrote home to his sister and she wrote back. The following are excerpts from those letters about Lincoln's death.

Ford's Farm, April 17th, 1865.

Dear Sister....Enclosed in this I am going to send you a branch of the fabled mistletoe-a real genuine, bona fide "Mistletoe Bough". Did you ever see one? I never did that I'm aware of till tonight, when one of our little corporals -- a Hollander, by the by, and a man (youth), who seems to be josted-- climbed to dizzy heights in a majestic oak and plucked the dainty sprig from among its topmost branches.

You may get the first volume of Longfellow and read the poem commencing: Balder the beautiful is dead -- is dead.

The lines have occurred to me a dozen times today in connection with the death of the President yesterday. I felt as one of the boys expressed himself, madder and madder the more I thought of it, but today, resentment toward the despicable

villain -- I know no word expressive enough -- is lost in grief at the great misfortune that has come upon us all in the loss of the Nations head -- a noble, honest and true man who was a hero in life and in death a martyr. No man since the death of Washington has had so deep a hold on the affections of the Nation. I haven't shed a tear for months but who will not weep that it's noblest and best of the apostles of Liberty should be struck down in the hour of benignant triumph by a foe whose best friend he was and would have treated with more leniency and kindness than any other man will do in all the North. The cry for vengeance we want to utter is drowned by a wail of sorrow that no vengeance can allay and whatever we might do to the cowardly, despicable thing that perpetrated the foul deed, we could only turn from our impotent jury to the mournful realization that true noble man -- most beautiful in his honest, upright integrity is dead; is dead!

Hattie's reply:

Sharon, Michigan, April 24th, 1865

Dear Brother- I have managed to get propped up in the big chair and will try to write to you a few lines, once more....I can fully appreciate your feelings about the President's death. I felt as if I had lost a personal friend. Father and Mother went to the funeral at Grass Lake but I was not able. May the Lord help us! If such a man can be assassinated. It's worthy of the Confederate wrenches, however. It's just what is to be expected of every one of them, perjury, treachery and murder. Their paroles are never regarded and now they have paroled Lee and his whole army and what does their capture amount to? If the heads


of our government don't hang about forty of the rebel leaders or find them, they deserve to be hung themselves. Maybe you think I'm rather radical but I can't help it. There is no safety for anybody in the future as long as such men live (not live at large but live at all).

It was a great mercy that Seward, Johnson, Stanton and Grant were not murdered, too, as there were evidently plots against them. Well God rules yet and I believe will bring all right if we have faith and patience to wait. I hope the fighting will not be prolonged by this last calamity.

I wrote you a long foolscap more, so high the crows won't letter that you have not acknowledged, I hope you get it. Father and Mother are well. I got your letter with the mistletoe. Thank

Your Sister, Hattie

News traveled slowly during that time and though Irwin's letter dated April 17 said Lincoln was assassinated 'yesterday', actually it took place the night of April 14 at Ford's Theatre in Washington DC. An attempt on the life of William H. Seward, Lincoln's secretary of state, was also made on the 14th.

Crime Prevention Makes a Local Connection

Manchester area residents will be learning more about crime prevention over the next two years, with the help of Sheriff's deputy Lisa King.

King, a three year veteran of WCSD, will be working out of the Zeeb Road substation and her assignment covers all of Western Washtenaw County. She is charged with helping residents of the area initiate local neighborhood watch programs. Although this is her first priority, she also plans to educate residents on home security, personal property identification, gang awareness, Personal Safety, Project Identification child and more.

Are you saying, "We don't need this in Manchester"? King says, all the more reason to start it now. "People here [in Manchester] feel very safe. But it is out there, and awareness of a problem is he best step to prevention. You don't have crime here? Good - let's keep it that way."

And King's priority is prevention. She hopes to keep reiterating to local residents the importance of stopping these crimes before they start.

King is especially interested in seeing a Neighborhood Watch program set up in Manchester. She explained the importance of residents pulling together by telling of a house in Scio Township where drug activity was taking place. By receiving tips from members of the Neighborhood Watch Committee, the WCSD was

able to shut the house down. Now the residents feel they have a safe neighborhood once again. "They made a difference by taking a few simple steps," says

Since Manchester Village is the largest contractor of police services on the west side, with four Deputies assigned here, Village Manager Jeff Wallace was a member of the panel who selected King for this post. Wallace believes it is important that the Sheriff Department has someone out here who can share their expertise with the community members

and businesses.

King is not a new face in Manchester. She has formerly been stationed in the Village for three different shift bids over the last few years when she has served on road patrol. Her new position is a two year commitment and her partner, Deputy Chuck Mullins, has a full time assignment to Ypsilanti Township.

A business watch in the downtown area is also a project King would like to see implemented during her tenure. A business watch is organized similarly to the Neighborhood

Watch program, where business owners band together to prevent fraud, report suspicious incidents and persons, thereby improving security for the small businesses which make their homes in the downtown district.

King and Mullins are available to make presentations to schools, businesses, neighborhood watch committees, senior citizens and community organizations, to teach prevention tactics. "I'd like to educate the public in the number of different ways to prevent themselves from becoming by Marsha Johnson Chartrand

crime victims," King says. There is also a special gang awareness program which can be presented to parents and citi-

King says she became involved in police work because she likes to help people and become directly involved in local community crime prevention. A native of Chelsea, she has received two meritorious service awards and two unit citations. A youthful and energetic officer, King's input can be a valuable asset to extend local police coverage in our area.

Neighborhoods roughly 60% participation may organize a Neighborhood Watch in their own areas. whether it be the Village or a rural neighborhood. "We even have the potential to begin a mounted Neighborhood Watch program in the rural areas," comments King. Interested residents may contact Deputy Lisa King at 994-8098.



What happened to Walco Foods Expansion?

Last May 19th, The Manchester Enterprise reported that Walco Foods was "growing with the community". Owner Jerry Wallace told us about planned additions of a full hot and cold deli, a Value Center, and added frozen foods section in a 5000 square foot addition to the front of the store. A new 750 square foot entry way was planned. A 1700 square foot addition to the rear of the store would house a video

Exterior improvements were also planned - added lighting in the parking lot, trees, sidewalks, and other "aesthetic" improvements.

The Enterprise has recently learned that the site plan,

approved with revisions last May 16th, gave Walco Foods 180 days to pull a building permit, or their entire approval would be revoked. The building permit was never applied for. Therefore, all these great plans for an expansion are null and void.

Many messages have been left at Walco Foods' corporate office in Pinckney and no calls have ever been returned by Jerry Wallace. It has recently been published that all Walco Foods stores have been purchased by Busch's Valu Land - except the Manchester store.

Manchester? Will we not only choose to, but be forced to, shop outside of town for our groceries? Rumor has it that all is not lost. Partners Jerry and Jeff Daub are reportedly buying the local Walco store. What plans do they have for their store? Why was the Manchester store excluded from the Busch's deal? What changes will we see in the familiar faces at the grocery store? Are improvements planned for the quality of merchandise offered here?

These questions have yet to be answered. No one seems to be talking on the record. The Enterprise will welcome learning the answers to these Is this the end of an era in questions and more in the weeks to come - and we will keep you posted.

Week of April 9-15 honors Those who Answer 911

Have you ever wondered what happens when you dial 9-1-1? Your call is immediately routed to the appropriate communications center where dispatchers send paramedics, firefighters and police directly to the scene, depending on the type of emergency. National Public Safety Telecommunications Week, a time to honor the thousands of dedicated people across the nation who staff public safety communications lines 24 hours a day, is being celebrated April 9-15, 1995.

If you live in Washtenaw County, western Wayne County, or parts of Lenawee County and need an ambulance, your call may be routed to the Huron Valley Ambulance Communications Center, which is staffed by Emergency Medical Dispatchers. At HVA, the enhanced 9-1-1 computer system will display your address so the closest paramedics can be immediately dispatched to the scene.

While one dispatcher confirms the location of the emergency and asks you questions, another dispatcher sends a paramedic advanced life support ambulance, and, in Manchester Township Fire Department response areas, firefighters who are medical first responders. Dispatchers also instruct callers on what to do until help arrives.

"Be prepared to answer

questions. The ambulance is already on the way, but we need to know more about the problem so the paramedics will know what equipment they'll need on the scene," explains Margaret Shedlock, HVA communications super-

You can help 9-1-1 dispatchers by remembering the following:

- Teach everyone in your home how to dial 911
- Speak loudly and clearly when you explain the prob-
- Do not hang up until so instructed by the dispatcher.
- If possible, send someone out to direct emergency vehicles to the scene.




The first spring blossom is as glorious to the eye as is the meaning of the Resurrection






Freestyle Wrestling






