School Board Election: Winzenz, 518 Abbott, 468 Garlick, 420

"This was an exciting election with good voter turnout. Congratulations, of course, go to Mr. Winzenz and Mr. Abbott, but even with a loss at the polls I would never overlook the continued contributions and involvement of Mr. Garlick. As owner of the **Manchester Enterprise**, he maintains the influence and resources to remain a very important factor in our schools," said Paul Kluwe, school board President, in response to the election results.

A total of 809 votes were cast, only 16% of our electorate within the school district. Activity at the polls was "steady all day," according to election workers.

Last year's school board election was combined with a millage election to pass a requested 18 mills on non-homestead property, as required by Proposal A. Since this year the bond issue had already been voted upon, only the decision of the School Board members remained for the June election.

Losing by a mere 48 votes was a disappointment to Garlick and his supporters, but he has pledged to continue to uncover any irregularities occurring within the system and "QUESTION AUTHORITY."

An interesting note is that Garlick received more votes than any of last year's candidates in the board election. All three candidates this year, in fact, received more than 50% of the total votes cast.

"The apparent involvement of the Superintendent's office in misleading the **Ann Arbor News** is very troubling. It's really unfair to all three candidates. Because this incident can be claimed to have cost Mr.

Garlick the 48 votes needed for his election, it has robbed Mr. Winzenz and Mr. Abbott of the clear, unclouded victory any winning candidate deserves. That these three people should be put in such a position is just not right," noted Kluwe.

Niedzwiecki reserved comment on the election results. "No comment," was his response to all questions on Tuesday morning.

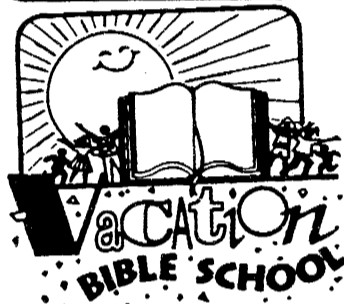

fluence is important to children's development.

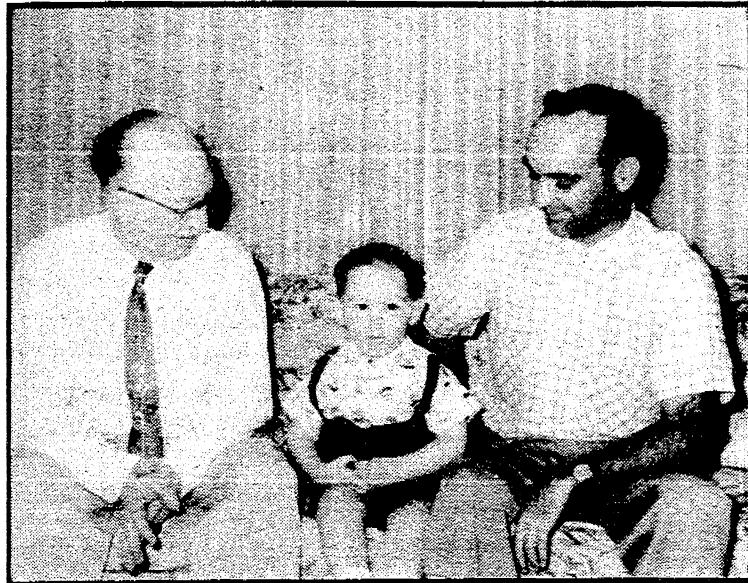

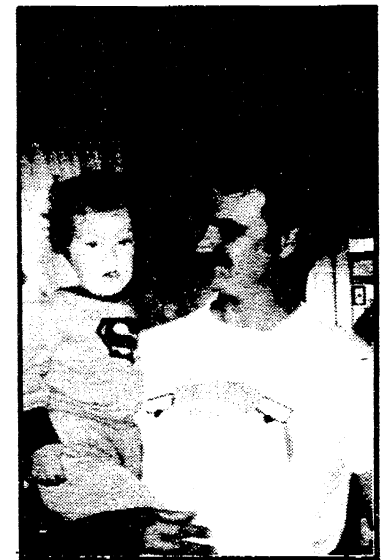


and brawn. The more things change, the more they remain the same!

I'm writing in regards to everyone's concern about the Manchester summer baseball program. I thought since I am the Umpire-In-Chief, I might spread a little light on the subject.

What we have is a case of one bad apple giving the board a bad name. I am presently State certified in both baseball and softball for High school level, and also I'm certified for little league by the ex Umpire-In-Chief for District 3 of the State of Michigan. In order to get certified I attended clinics in which we were told of the rules that changed from the pervious year. I was informed that for safety reasons, nobody could warm up a pitcher other than a player of the same team, (this player also must wear a face mask for protection.) and a bull pen must be set up inside the diamond to avoid possible injury to spectators of all ages.

The reason I bring this up, is at the very first game of the season for the majors I had two qualified umpires (who had attended a clinic which I had put on for anyone who wanted to be an umpire for this league) assigned to each of the two games being played at the same time. In the game where Mr. Roberts was a coach he told the umpires that this league did not have to follow the same rules set forth by the national little league association. This caused the umpire to call me at home that night and tell me what had happened. I then called Mr. Roberts to ask him exactly what happened and he told me that it was none of my concern.

charge of has a problem, they know to contact me immediately so we can resolve it. I then called the vice president of the league and told him of the problem, the intern said that I was correct in my actions and he would talk to Mr. Roberts. The next game in which Mr. Roberts was coaching I had the honor of being the umpire (I set it up this way to try to solve any problems that might come up) and as I expected, Mr. Roberts was not ready to give into these rules. So I told him to either play by said rules or the game wouldn't be played. He then informed me that I wasn't above the league and that he would prevail for he was the PRESIDENT of the league.

If the league is allowed to make their own rules as far as safety and conduct then what is the need for Umpires who go through the training, and the hassles which they are willing to do? Needless to say, I prevailed and the game was played under my rules. NOTICE OF ADOPTED ORDINANCE

TO: THE RESIDENTS AND PROPERTY OWNERS OF THE VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER, WASHTENAW COUNTY, MICHIGAN AND ANY OTHER INTERESTED PERSON:

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that the Village Council of Manchester Village adopted Ordinance No. 222 ("Ordinance") of the Ordinances of Manchester Village, which amends sections of the Manchester Village Traffic Ordinance. A summary of the newly adopted Ordinance is set forth below.

PURPOSE: Acts 448, 449, and 450, Public Acts of Michigan, 1994 ("Act") amended the Michigan Vehicle Code relating to operating a vehicle with a suspended or revoked license and while under the influence of intoxicating liquor or controlled substance. The Ordinance amends sections, and makes all changes necessary and proper to preserve consistency with the Michigan Vehicle Code and to assure that the Manchester Village Traffic Ordinance contains provisions identical to those stated in sections 625 to section 625m of the Michigan Vehicle Code, Act No. 300 of the Public Acts of 1949, as amended, being sections 257.625 to 257.625m of the Michigan Compiled Laws, and makes other appropriate amendments to improve public safety through more effective traffic control.

SUMMARY

SECTION 5.15: OPERATING A MOTOR VEHICLE WHILE UNDER THE INFLUENCE. This section replaces Section 5.15, Manchester Village Traffic Ordinance with a section which changes the means for measuring alcohol content in a person's body from measurement of "blood alcohol level" to measurement of "bodily alcohol content" for the purpose of making presumptions relative to drinking and driving offenses; expands the felony offense of causing "long term incapacitating injury" while under the influence of intoxicating liquor and/or controlled substance to include the use of operating while visibly impaired as a predicate for the felony charge, and changes the injury requirement from a "long term

2) Prescribes the operation of a motor vehicle upon a highway or other place open to the general public, or generally accessible to motor vehicles, while having a bodily alcohol content of 0.10 grams or more per 100 milliliters of blood, per 210 liters of breath, or per 67 milliliters of urine;

3) Prescribes the offense of operating a motor vehicle upon a highway or other place open to the general public, or generally accessible to motor vehicles, while visibly impaired from the consumption of alcohol or controlled substance, or a combination thereof, or while having a bodily alcohol content greater than 0.07 grams and less than 0.10 grams per 100 milliliters of blood, per 210 liters of breath, or per 67 milliliters of urine;

4) Prescribes the offense of permitting an intoxicated person to operate a motor vehicle;

5) Prescribes and defines the offense of operating a motor vehicle by persons under the age of 21 years with "any bodily alcohol content" in the system;

6) Provides for enhancement of penalty to felony for operating a

vehicle while under the influence of intoxicating liquor or controlled substance which results in another person's death;

7) Provides for enhancement of penalty to felony for operating a vehicle while visibly impaired due to consumption, or while under the influence, of intoxicating liquor or controlled substance which results in a "serious impairment of a body function" to another person;

8) Prescribes penalties for all of the above and enhancement of penalties for multiple and/or subsequent violations;

9) Gives the court discretion to assess the costs of prosecution against a person who is prosecuted for violations of the Ordinance;

10) Prescribes the procedure for establishing prior convictions for driving while under the influence of intoxicating liquor or controlled substance, or a combination thereof;

11) Requires the prosecuting attorney to give notice of prior convictions to a person being prosecuted under the ordinance if the prosecuting attorney is seeking an enhanced sentence as provided for in the Ordinance;

incapacitating injury" to a "serious impairment of a body function" for the purpose of enhancing the charge to a felony; and in summary:

1) Prescribes the offense of driving while under the influence of intoxicating liquor or controlled substance, or a combination thereof;

12) Provides that there can be no plea reduction from operating while under the influence or operating while impaired to the offense of operating with "any bodily alcohol content" by a person under 21 years of age;

13) Prescribes that the penalty for conviction of attempt to commit an offense described in the Ordinance is the same as if the offense was completed;

14) Prescribes the form of verdict to be used for violation of the Ordinance; and

15) Requires the court to report convictions to the secretary or state.

SECTION 5.15a: ARREST WITHOUT WARRANT OF INTOXICATED DRIVER: ACCIDENTS: PRELIMINARY CHEMICAL BREATH ANALYSIS: CHEMICAL TESTS TO DETERMINE BODILY ALCOHOL CONTENT: USE OF CHEMICAL TEST RESULTS: PROCEDURES: PRESUMPTION. This section replaces Section 5.15a of the Manchester Village Traffic Ordinance with a section which expands permissible court uses of preliminary breath test results; makes other appropriate and necessary changes to implement new provisions in Section 5.15; and in summary:

1) Provides that an officer may arrest a person without a warrant if the person is involved in an accident and there is probable cause to believe that the person is in violation of the Ordinance;

2) Provides that an officer who has reasonable cause to believe that a person is in violation of the Ordinance may require the person to submit to a preliminary chemical breath analysis and arrest the person in whole or in part based on the results of the analysis;

3) Provides when and for what purpose the results of a preliminary breath test result may be used;

4) Prescribes penalties for refusal to submit to a preliminary chemical breath test;

5) Prescribes the rules and procedures governing the use of chemical breath, blood, and urine test results at a trial for violation of the Ordinance; and establishes rules and procedures describing how samples for chemical test analysis shall be obtained;

6) Requires that the results of chemical test analysis be made available to a person being charged with violation of the Ordinance;

7) Requires that certain legal presumptions be applied regarding the results of a chemical test analysis performed pursuant to the rules and procedures as established in the Ordinance; and

8) Prescribes circumstances when a person's refusal to submit to chemical test analysis may be used in the prosecution of a person for violation of the Ordinance.

SECTION 5.15b: ARRAIGNMENT, PRETRIAL AND COURT PROCEDURE. This section replaces Section 5.15b of the Manchester Village Traffic Ordinance with a section which:

1) Establishes time limits for the occurrence of arraignment, pretrial and trial of persons charged with violation of this Ordinance;

2) Provides a case must not be dismissed or sanctions imposed for a failure to adhere to time limits established by the Ordinance;

3) Establishes conditions upon which adjournments may be granted;

4) Establishes requirement that a person shall undergo screening and assessment to determine if he or she will benefit from an alcohol treatment program prior to sentencing;

5) Requires the court to consider a person's master driving record prior to ordering license sanctions;

6) Establishes license sanctions and conditions upon which a restricted license may be issued to a person convicted of a violation under the Ordinance; and

7) Requires surrender of license to court for violation under the Ordinance, and the court must forward an abstract of conviction to the secretary of state;

SECTION 5.15c: IMPLIED CONSENT. This section replaces Section 5.15c of the Manchester Village Traffic Ordinance with a section which prescribes the circumstances when a person would be found to have given implied consent to chemical tests of his or her blood, breath or urine for the purpose of determining the amount of alcohol, a controlled substance, or both in his/her body.

SECTION 5.15f: FAILURE TO REQUEST HEARING. This section replaces Section 5.15f of the Manchester Village Traffic Ordinance with a section which:

1) Requires automatic license sanctions for person who fails to request a hearing for failure to take chemical test required under the Ordinance;

2) Prescribes procedure and scope of inquiry at hearing for failure to take chemical test;

3) Requires that a record of the proceeding be made; and

4) Prescribes license sanctions for person who fails to prevail at hearing for failure to submit to chemical test required under the

Ordinance.

SECTION 5.15g: CONFISCATION BY PEACE OFFICER OF ACCUSED'S LICENSE UPON FAILURE TO TAKE TEST OR IF TEST REVEALS IMPERMISSIBLE BODILY ALCOHOL CONTENT. This section replaces Section 5.15g of the Manchester Village Traffic Ordinance with a section which:

1) Requires a peace officer to confiscate the license from a person who refuses to take chemical test under the Ordinance, and from a person who takes a chemical test under the Ordinance and the result reveals an impermissible bodily alcohol content;

2) Prescribes the time period for which a temporary license or permit issued under the Ordinance is valid;

3) Prescribes the prosecutor's and officer's duty to report to the Secretary of State any case not prosecuted after a person is arrested for violation of the Ordinance.

SECTION 5.15h: CREATION OF DRUNK DRIVING PREVENTION AND TRAINING FUND. This section replaces Section 5.15h of the Manchester Village Traffic Ordinance with a section that establishes a drunk driving prevention equipment and training fund to be administered by state police for the purpose of purchase and maintenance of breath alcohol testing equipment and to provide training for law enforcement personnel in the use of such equipment.

SECTION 5.15k: ESTABLISHING STANDARDS FOR IGNITION INTERLOCK DEVICE. This section replaces Section 5.15k of the Manchester Village Traffic Ordinance and requires the department of State Police to approve ignition interlock devices which are certified by a department-approved laboratory; requires manufacturers to bear the cost of certification; provides that a list of approved manufacturers and ignition interlock devices shall be distributed to the courts; and establishes specification and certification requirements and standards.

SECTION 5.15l: WARNING

LABEL FOR IGNITION INTERLOCK DEVICE. This section replaces Section 5.15l of the Manchester Village Traffic Ordinance and requires a warning label be attached to ignition interlock devices which states that tampering, circumventing, or otherwise misusing the device is prohibited and sets penalties for such acts.

SECTION 5.15m: OPERATING A COMMERCIAL MOTOR VEHICLE WITH CERTAIN PERCENTAGE OF ALCOHOL. This section replaces Section 5.15m of the Manchester Village Traffic Ordinance and prohibits the operation of a commercial motor vehicle with 0.04 grams or more but not more than 0.07 grams per 100 milliliters of blood, per 210 liters of breath, or per 67 milliliters of urine; prescribes arrest for violation; establishes penalties; and provides for enhancement of penalties for multiple or subsequent offenses.

SECTION 5.62a: DRIVING WITH A SUSPENDED OR REVOKED LICENSE. This section replaces Section 5.62a of the Manchester Village Traffic Ordinance and prohibits the operation of a motor vehicle by a person with a suspended or revoked license, or when no license has been issued to the person; prohibits the owner of a vehicle from knowingly allowing a person with no license, or whose license is suspended or revoked to operate his/her vehicle; establishes penalties for violation; establishes enhancement of penalties for multiple or subsequent offenses.

SECTION 9.6: PLEA OF NOLO CONTENDERE. This section replaces Section 9.6 of the Manchester Village Traffic Ordinance and provides that a plea of nolo contendere under the Ordinance shall be treated in the same manner as a conviction.

A letter to the Manchester Community

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all who participated in the first annual Manchester 24 Hour Relay Challenge.

I was first introduced to the Manchester community in 1989 when I had this plan to involve the Sheriff's Department in this substance abuse program I had heard of called D.A.R.E. One day I walked in to Klager Elementary school cold and asked if I could talk to the Principal. The nice lady in charge of the school, Mrs. Helen Nickerson, said I could.

As a total stranger, I described this program called D.A.R.E. to Ms. Henry. She was already familiar with the program and was very supportive of it, so together we mapped out a plan to present it to the school board and staff at Klager. In 1990 the first D.A.R.E. classes taught by the Sheriff's Department started at Klager.

After having the pleasure of teaching D.A.R.E. in schools all across the County, my career path changed in 1991 when Sheriff Schebil

asked me to coordinate a county-wide traffic safety project that had been awarded to Washtenaw County from the state of Michigan. This project was to focus on the issues of under-aged alcohol use and youth impaired driving. One part of this project was to increase local awareness of the issues of under-aged alcohol use, and to work with local communities to develop strategies to impact this issue.

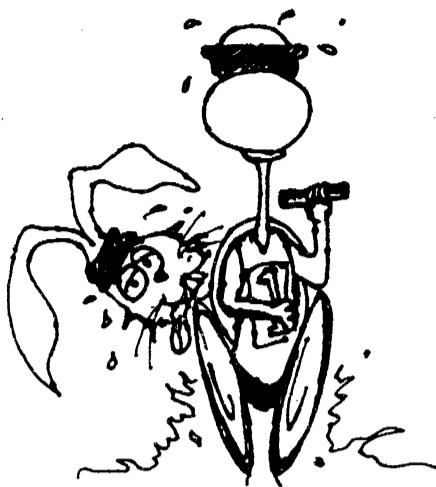
In 1994 as the result of personnel shortages I once again returned to Manchester to teach elementary school D.A.R.E. as well as involve the community in the youth alcohol project. Administering the youth alcohol project was becoming overwhelming, and timing the return to Manchester to teach D.A.R.E. part time was a welcomed escape.

As Ms. Henry and I were planning for the D.A.R.E. graduation she mentioned that funding for the kids' shirts and the other items we liked to give at graduation was

something we would need to think about for the future. It was then that I told her about the 24 Hour Relay Challenge concept. As the coordinator of the youth alcohol project, I was planning to facilitate training for the event in the communities of Milan and Saline, and I felt Manchester was a great place for such an event.

When I shared the idea of the Relay with Ms. Henry she said "let's do it," and the work began. With Yvonne's help and support we began to identify a planning team to attend an October training on how to do the relay. This team consisted of a broad cross section of the community, both adults and students.

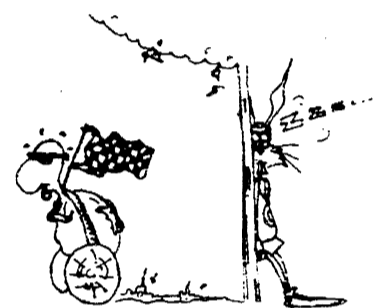

At a May 31st Board meeting of the Historical Society plans were finalized

for the project to create the John B. Swainson Room at the Blacksmith Shop. President Deb Havens has asked me as Chairman of the Swainson Room Planning Committee to make announcement of our plans as well as to request those using the Blacksmith Shop for meetings this summer to bear with us as things are disarranged during construction.

The project consists of installation of new display cases and areas for John's mementos, a rolling ladder to service the upper display levels and a new heating and air conditioning system to assure better preservation of materials which will be stored in the room. The room will finally be completely re-decorated to serve more appropriately as a repository of the treasures of a former Michigan Governor, legislator and jurist. Alice Swainson and her family are working with our Commit-

tee and Board as she sifts and sorts through his things and decides where best to have them displayed. Past President Reno Feldkamp kicked off this project by having the finished room (or 1983 Room as John called it) designated as the John B. Swainson Room shortly after John's death. John's memorial gifts to the Society are being added to regular funds and committed to the project. As is usual in Manchester, we are expecting others to step forward and help with project costs which amount to \$10,000. When we bought the Blacksmith Shop in 1982 the Manchester Chicken Broil Committee contributed over half its cost. The Herrick Foundation contributed \$5,000. Local members made loans and gifts to help also. Last year the Chicken Broil Committee again stepped forward and contributed \$10,000 to cover the expense of a new roof and restoration of exterior masonry. This year local groups have asked us for a list of our needs so they can consider further donations.

It is reassuring to all of us who work in the Historical Society that there is such a reservoir of good will in this community toward our efforts. At least weekly some community group uses the building without charge for one of their meetings or programs. The Board has kept this process simple in view of the support we have received locally. All interested groups need to do is call Tom Walton our Building Committee Chairman at 428-7822 to book the meeting. This summer we should give Tom a little more time to make arrangements and settle for less than we usually have for space. This is especially true if the TV is needed.

Won't it be wonderful when all this is completed and we can hold many of our meetings in the centrally heated and air conditioned John B. Swainson Room?
