

School Board Elects Officers

Wednesday, July 5th the Board of Education conducted its annual organizational meeting. Superintendent Ron Niedzwiecki chaired the meeting and administered the oath of office to reelected members Winzenz and Abbott.

Next order of business was the election of officers. Abbott and Sahakian nominated Wayne Winzenz for president. Wayne promptly declined. Ochs and Hochstetler nominated past President Paul Kluwe. Bruce Abbott was also nominated by Sahakian. After nominations were closed past Board Secretary Pat Sahakian castigatingly spoke against the nomination of Kluwe for President. Speaking

against Kluwe's openness in conducting meetings and listening to district concerns, Sahakian characterized his method's as "Divides and is Divisive", further saying that Kluwe, "Did not support the bond issue by studying alternative uses of existing facilities (Pleasant Lake school?) Sahakian further claimed Kluwe "Deliberately violated the open meeting act by conducting part of the Superintendent's evaluation in an open meeting session." Her tirade suggests to this writer Sahakian wishes for the board to return to her past style of nonleadership, secrecy and no communication.

Bruce Abbott cited a sigthe school system and tried to suggest that it was Kluwe's fault. His remark, "I am tired of the Manure, Ron is exceedingly professional and as Superintendent he cannot possibly continue to put up with that." Hochstetler and Ochs both countered the felonious allegations by pointing out that in the two years that Sahakian was President they had only been contacted by her once or twice at the most. During the past year, under Kluwe's leadership, they had finally been included as a part of the Board of Education.

Both Turk and Winzenz were positive in that the future direction of the board is good and that perhaps the board should

Superintendent Niedzwiecki regained control of the meeting and Kluwe was elected by a 5 to 2 vote. Winzenz, Turk, Ochs, Hochstetler and Kluwe cast the positive ballot.

Abbott was nominated by Turk for Vice President, he declined. Turk was nominated by Ochs and Abbott and Turk was unanimously elected.

Ochs and Winzenz nominated Hochstetler for Secretary and he was unanimously elected.





Sharon Township Proposed Synopsis

Annual Meeting June 29, 1995

The Annual Meeting was called to order at 8:00 p.m. by Supervisor Savage. All members of the township board were present along with 20 residents and guests including Manchester Township Library representa-

The minutes of the July 7, 1994 Annual Meeting were read by the Clerk and accepted.

The Treasurer read the summary of the budgeted amounts and actual expenditures for each line item for the 1994-95 fiscal year. Further amendments to the budget for this period were necessary for Contractual Services and Insurance. Motion made, supported, and carried by The Board these amendments be made.

The budget for the 1995-96 fiscal year was presented. After discussion there were several minor changes which were accepted by the electors. There was concern by some residents that the library budget should be increased. Sharon Township supports the Manchester Township and The McKune Memorial Libraries. Motion made, supported, and carried to raise the proposed budget of \$3500 to \$5000 for libraries. Motion made, supported, and carried by the electors to then accept the proposed budget for 1995-96. These proposed changes will be accepted or rejected by the Township Board when the budget is adopted during the July 6, regular meeting.

Other agenda items acted on and accepted were as follows:

Regular monthly meeting of the Township Board will be held on the first Thursday of each month at 8:00 p.m. at the Township Hall.

Our Depositories for Township funds will remain with First of America and Great Lakes Bancorp.

The Township Attorney will continue to be Bruce Laidlaw of Ann Arbor.

The meeting then turned to other business presented by residents. A possible dog or noise ordinance was discussed with most of those in attendance against this measure.

The status of the Material Extraction Ordinance was questioned. This has been tabled for further study.

A letter was presented to The Board in regard to the private drive servicing property owners of the former Morton Farm.

Being no further business a motion was made and supported to

Proposed Synopsis of Public Hearing and Annual Meeting June 29, 1995

The Public Hearing began at 7:30 p.m. The purpose of this meeting was to present the proposed General Fund budget for the next fiscal year. Revenues and expenditures for the 199596 fiscal year were reviewed and explained. All special funds were also examined. The public hearing closed at 8:05 p.m.

The Annual Meeting opened at 8:09 p.m. Board Members present: Supervisor Mann, Clerk Hakes, Treasurer Turk, Trustee Widmayer, Trustee Macomber. Also present: Fire Chief Gary Wiedmayer, Fire Marshall Mike Scully, Lieutenant Dave Jose, Constable Lyle Moore, Library Board President Patricia Swaney, Library Director Dorothy Davies.

Salaries for the Township board were approved, and compensation was set for the Board of Review and election workers.

The Treasurer's report was accepted as presented.

Former Fire Chief Mike Scully reported that requests for bids for a new truck have been sent out, He reviewed possible equipment needs for the coming year. There were 118 runs in the last six months, with an average cost per run of \$582.66. Supervisor Mann mentioned that the fire truck millage for Truck 702, which was passed in 1989 and was a ten year millage, will be able to be paid off next year.

The Library Report was accepted as presented. The number of patrons has increased by 369 people this year for a total of 1,677 registered patrons. The library joined the Woodlands Cooperative. Funding continues to be a major difficulty, and the Library Board of Trustees continues to work toward becoming a district library. Space is a constant difficulty.

Constable Moore reported on activity for the year. Police and zoning laws are changing rapidly. Zoning duties are constantly increasing. He recommends holding on to the constable system.

The electors present recommended acceptance of the 1995-96 proposed budget.

The three local branches of First of America Bank, Comerica Bank, and Great Lakes Bancorp were approved a depositories of township

The regular meeting day for the Township Board was set as the second Monday of the month at 8:00 p.m. If this day falls on a holiday, the meeting will be held the following day.

There being no further business to come before the Board and citizens, the meeting adjourned at 8:48 p.m.





(Most folks do not realize but there are now more horses in our greater area than there were many years ago. Our primary power and transportation was dependent on horses, mules, oxen and shanks mare, before the turn of the century and up until the time that Henry Ford popularized the horseless carriage and the farm tractor. Draft animals, horses, mules and oxen were used to till the soil and provide transportation into town. Shanks Mare, walking, was a primary mode of transportation.. Some of the old pictures of Manchester show horses tied to the hitching rails in front of the downtown businesses. Even today, if you look carefully along Ann Arbor hill, tall stones with ring bolts, can still be seen where horses were tied. Occasionally stone or concrete curb steps still are around where ladies could mount the carriages, buggies or the occasional side saddle they used when using horses. Our Village still has many carriage barns where horses were kept within the village limits. Most of these carriage houses have been converted into garages for the

horse-less vehicles of today.)



- Your child will be a productive adult help your child find a career he/she will love and don't eliminate careers because of the disability.
- Find an outlet for your stress and your child's stress hit golf balls, walk, run, read or whatever to relieve the stress.
- -Become a problem solver life is not always fair, but we can all learn to do the best we can with what we have.
- Help others and accept help join a support group and talk to other people in the same situation (PASS meets every Wednesday at 7 PM at Klager and we also have lists of other support groups in the county). Get your child in a study group where parents work together or take turns helping 2-4 students study. (PASS will be setting up study groups this fall call and get your name on the list).
- Avoid being over protective we all need to learn from our own mistakes, but help pick up the pieces without criticizing!
- Empower your child search for the right educational environment, good tutors, etc. Show them you will make sacrifices to accommodate their needs.
- -Fight for your child write a letter to a congressman about how schools need more and better accommodations and technical tools have your child read it and SIGN it with you. Speak openly about your child's disability to people so that he/she can learn to accept and speak about it to others.
- Keep your sense of humor we all need to laugh, we need to laugh at ourselves and top laugh at others. Even a smile works wonders try it.





Emanuel's First Croquet Match










It's Chicken Broil Time - Again!

All roads lead to Manchester on July 20th, as the Manchester Annual Chicken Broil celebrates its 42nd year.

A local family tradition for thousands of residents, friends, neighbors and out-of-towners who make the trip each year, the Manchester Annual Chicken Broil was started in 1954 by the Manchester Exchange Club in order to erect a fence around the school Athletic Field. The fence still stands today, as do many other worthwhile projects around the village, as a testimony to the success of the special slow broiling process, the secret coleslaw recipe, and hundreds of Manchester men working together on a project which benefits the entire community.

On the afternoon of the Third Thursday in July, Manchester's population swells sevenfold as traffic begins winding its way along M-52, seemingly in pursuit of the smell of roasted chicken which permeates the air for hours ahead of the scheduled 4 PM serving time. Before the evening is over. some 14,000 chicken halves will be served along with roll, butter, radishes, potato chips, famous coleslaw and coffee or milk. Provide your own dessert - if you have room for it!

What is the secret of Manchester's success with the Chicken Broil? Well, if the entire secret was told the mystery wouldn't have nearly the charm. But it is reported that Dr. Howard Zindel of Michigan State University developed the special broiling process in the early 1950's which continues to be used to this day, with little if any change. Then there is the secret coleslaw recipe which is often imitated, but never vet duplicated. Or, could it be just the Manchester way of pulling together for a special



project? Over the years, the names of the organizations may have changed, but the faces have remained the same. Many men have worked at the Chicken Broil for all 42 years of its existence - starting when the were Boy Scout helpers and still working as chairmen of one of the many standing committees. Second and third generations are now working on the Broil. And there are many more who are remembered on this day for past contributions to the Manchester Annual Chicken Broil.

Life in Manchester today wouldn't be the same without the Chicken Broil. Monies earned over the years have been used for some very special projects in the commu-

nity. Purchases and renovations of park land and park equipment have been pet projects of the Chicken Broil Committee. Chi-Bro Park, Manchester's newest park, was entirely purchased with Chicken Broil funds. On M-52 just north of Main Street, the park includes brand new playground equipment and a beautiful pavilion contributed by the Manchester Men's Club. The Blacksmith Shop, home of the Manchester Historical Society and soon to be the site of Governor John Swainson's Memorial Collection, is another recipient of the Chicken Broil's generosity. Stop in at the Blacksmith Shop and see the forge in action if you need a short walk after eating all that chicken. On Main Street just west of M-52, only a few blocks from the Athletic Field, the Blacksmith Shop yields a treasure trove of Manchester memorabilia and lore as well as an educational experience for those who visit

Everyone in Manchester has their favorite Chicken Broil memories and stories. Often family gatherings are planned around the day. The influx of people makes for some interesting people-watching tales. And newcomers to the community are astounded by the warmth and friendliness of Manchester folk when they come to the Chicken Broil.

Why not make the Manchester Annual Chicken Broil one of your new traditions? There is always room for a few thousand extra people in this little village on the Third Thursday in July. Follow your nose and follow the crowd and make Manchester your destination on July 20th this year. You'll be back year after year.





Hop Aboard the Road to the Manchester Chicken Broil



Thousands of Chicken Halves getting ready to be gobbled up

Dateline: Thursday, June 24, 1954: The Exchange Club has planned functions to benefit the Athletic Field Fence Fund, which include a huge barbecue chicken dinner."

So begins the saga of the Manchester Chicken Broil. This was the earliest printed reference to what would become our Village's largest annual event. Several weeks later came the announcement that, "If you want to taste charcoal-broiled chicken at it's finest, salted, buttered, with well-done meat under a crisp, toasted skin, bring your family and friends to the Manchester Athletic Field, any time after four o'clock, Thursday, August 12."

The Exchange Club and the Jaycees (the latter formed earlier in that same year) were jointly sponsoring the Chicken Barbecue.

A description of the special broiling process which was overseen by the Michigan State College cooks, follows.

"Four experts from Michigan Sate College, headed by Howard Zindell, chief of poultry department, will supervise cooking...Ludy Klager, chairman of the barbecue, announces that he has arranged to buy 700 chickens, each weighing 3-1/2 pounds, which will be dressed and split in halves for cooking by the Michigan State

College team of cooks. People come not only to eat the chicken, but to watch the nationally renowned college equipment in action. There will be crews to serve, prepare the tables for the next sitting, and keep things moving. It will be worth the price of admission just to watch the chickens broiling and to sniff the aroma."

And what was that 'price of admission' in those early days? Well, inflation has caught up with the Chicken Broil, as it has with the rest of us. In 1954, the cost of the feast was \$1.50 for adults and \$.75 for a child's half-portion. This year, tickets are \$5.50 presale and \$6.00 at the gate. Children's portions are not offered these days, but many parents order a dinner for the kids anyway, and polish off what's left themselves! One way or the other, it is still a good bargain for the money spent.

The menu, too has changed little over the years. From the earliest publicity, "The menu, in addition to chicken, is potato chips, relishes, buttered buns." Why mess with success? One addition in the 'relishes' department has been the Broil's famous coleslaw. The secret is in the dressing, the recipe for which is guarded by a few select members of the Chicken Broil fraternity. It has become one of the most famous and popular components of the menu - other than the chicken itself!

That first chicken broil in 1954 was a success - the **Manchester Enterprise** of August 19, 1954 noted, "Nearly a Ton of Chicken Consumed; Civic Project Nets 1.000 Dollars".

And the caption over the photos credited to Earl Alber noted, "Looks Like They Were Enjoying It."

Almost two thousand hungry people from Manchester, many southern Michigan towns, and points as far away as lowa ate charcoal-broiled chicken at the Athletic Field on August 12. Chairman for the day was Luther Klager, assisted by "at least half the grown and able-bodied men in Manchester." Blessed with a full moon, cool weather and high attendance, gross receipts were estimated at \$2,200.

From that success, Manchester has gone on to provide 39 more successful Chicken Broils; through rain, shine, and even a near-tornado. No further comments about a full moon have been located, though! From serving about 2,000 that first year, now the committee plans for approximately 15,000 visitors


to our community each year.

Over the years the date has been changed so that now the Third Thursday in July is our official Chicken Broil Day.

Co-Chairmen of the Chicken Broil are currently Ron Mann and Bob Rhees, heading up 32 committees which accommodate upwards of 500 workers. Ron is the son of Willard Mann, who was one of the original Exchange Club members who coordinated the earliest broils with Luther Klager.

A third generation of Manchester families are now working on the Chicken Broil committees. The Manchester Chicken Broil is a dedicated tradition here in Manchester. The Athletic Field Fence, long ago paid for, has joined the library, many of the village parks, and the Historical Society as recipients of the Chicken Broil Funds in years past.

Enjoy the 42nd annual Manchester Chicken Broil, and stay in town for the Manchester Summerfest on Friday & Saturday-July 21st & 22nd!

Each year the Summer Festival attracts many local artisans and crafters. This year we will initiate several new artists as well as welcoming back favorites from the past.


