

We felt like we'd stepped back in time when we walked out on Main Street last Friday. Eighty nine of Henry Ford's 15 million Model T's arrived in town on a leg of the 14th Annual Michigan Jamboree of T's. The Washtenaw Nau'Ties and Huron Valley Cranks were the hosts for this annual event which stopped in Manchester after visiting Sharon Mills Winery and the Manchester Blacksmith Shop. Members of the two clubs had lunch and displayed


their vehicles in the Village.

We were privileged to share lunch with Hans Jens, International President of the Model T International, his wife Mary Kay, and their lovely daughter Rebecca. Hans, Mary Kay and Rebecca were driving a beautiful Black 1912 Roadster with a Mother-In-Law seat behind the main seat. This magnificently restored T was typical of the era in that it had a brass radiator shell, headlamps, and split windscreen surround. The windscreen (windshield nowadays) has upper and lower halves so the top can be folded down. The dashboard is of wood, as are the spokes of the wheels.


White tires, yes all white, set off the beautiful black paint job, highlighted with red stripes and red leather upholstery. The Jens had their black fold-down top up to provide some shade on the road.

With the Jens was Past President Bill Barth and his wife Jean. Bill and Jean Barth originated the first Jamboree and the tales they shared were wonderful to hear. Jean told of Bill and the first T that he brought home. Apparently it was a 1926 four door sedan that was in very poor condition. Jean laughingly related

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

There were about 15 million Model T's built starting with the production run in 1909. About 325 were built before 1909, according to Bill. "I had vehicle #90 of the


1909 production run. Those first T's weren't very good and until Henry Ford got the production rolling and worked the bugs out, the first models were not very reliable." According to Jean,


has gone on over the past year. The men swap lies about their leads on vehicles."


They told of some Model T club members from Sweden who have come over here

Manchester Township Proposed Synopsis Regular Board Meeting August 14, 1995

The meeting was called to order at 8:01 p.m. with Board Members Widmayer, Turk, Mann, and Hakes present. Macomber was absent. There were several visitors present.

Sealed bids for the new fire truck were opened, recorded, and turned over to the Fire Truck Committee to review for accuracy and to assure that they meet specifications.

Minutes from the Board's last meeting, held July 10, 1995, were approved as presented. Minutes of the Planning Commission and Library Board were accepted.

Bills paid since last meeting were reviewed. The Treasurer's report was accepted. Approval was given for payment of bills totaling \$4305.18 in the General Fund and \$285 in the Special Housing Fund.

Raisin Valley Land Trust Board Members were present to explain conservation easements as a way to control land development and answer questions.

Fire Department activity for the month included 3 fires, 8 medical, 8 personal injury, 5 miscellaneous and 2 mutual aid, for a total of 26 runs. Eric Beuerle has qualified as an EMT. Permission was granted to investigate purchase of vacuum and traction splints. Chief Wiedmayer has been contact with Sand Lake Fire Department regarding renewal of the contract with them. He also reported that physicals will be conducted this month.

School Board Approves New Pay Increases

At their August 21 meeting, the Manchester Community School Board approved a 2.5% wage increase for Administrators. This is in line with the 2.6% increase in State Equalized Valuation (SEV) for our area and what the teacher contract called for, according to one board member. Last year's increases were in the neighborhood of 6%.

In other financial actions, the Michigan National Bank interest rate on \$850,000 State Aid Notes was approved at 4.05%. This will cost the district some \$30,695.63 in Interest expense. Borrowing of funds is common in practically all school districts until local and state tax monies are collected and disbursed to the respective districts.

A Tuition rate of \$207 for elementary and \$404 for secondary students was approved for out-of-district enrollees. This, in addition to the full grant from the State, comprises equivalent income for the district. Chelsea School District raised their Type "A" cost of meals to the district by twenty cents. This is being passed on to the participating students. New lunch prices will be \$2.00.

Cara Weissman, band director, presented a three day schedule for May 24, 25, 26 for the Manchester High School band trip to Chicago. The cost will be covered by fund-raising and individual students. The Board approved. The Superintendent will be reviewing and correcting, past policy of counting students as absent from school when they are on a school sanctione trip.

The Athletic Boosters Walkway Project at the Athletic complex was reviewed and the approximate 10% projected cost overrun at the Klager School Building was discussed. Alternatives are being reviewed to reduce the overrun.

Resignations were accepted from Roger Marrison, Jeff Etzel and Russell LeBlanc. John Korican was appointed as Interim High School Principal. Additional appointees included John Eisley, Director of Student Services and Athletics. Craig Vitale, Cross Country Coach. Lorie Kosinski, part time High School Math/Computer Teacher. Corinne Kastel, part time Middle School Math/Social Studies Teacher. Mary L. Fielder, Second Grade Teacher.

The Substitute Teacher daily rate was increased to \$50 / day. Cynthia Sewell and Gwen Shrock were given additional responsibilities and corresponding wage increases.

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

PARTNERS IN HEALTH

ATTENTION DEFICIT DISORDER

Attention Deficit Disorder (ADD) seems to be a popular topic these days. Formerly hyperactivity, called hyperkinesis, minimal brain damage, and minimal brain dysfunction, ADD received its current label in the late 1970's. With our children returning to school parents and teachers will become more aware of learning difficulties in certain students. Some of these children may suffer from ADD. Children normally vary in their level of activity. Some are naturally more active than others, and boys tend to be more active than girls. In general, young children are very active. These variations are not abnormal!

According to recent research, about 3% of children, more often boys than girls, are excessively active. These children are not necessarily less coordinated or less intelligent. The difference lies in how organized or purposeful the activity is and whether it can be stopped on request. Attention Deficit Disorder sufferers tend to act without regard to punishment, results, or other people's reaction's. They cannot direct their activity, nor can you or their teachers.

Children with ADD often make life difficult for themselves and everyone around them. They can produce chaos in the classroom or turn a family into a home battleground. Exasperated parents and teachers may regard them as irresponsible, lazy, and arrogant; other children often find them obnoxious and avoid them. ADD children who do not suffer from hyperactivity may be daydreamers who appear unhappy and fail in school. This set of symptoms seems to be more common in girls. Diagnosis may be difficult. A child may be a terror in the classroom but no problem on the playground. Homework may be perfect one week and ignored the next. While activity levels may diminish with age, experts now agree that two-thirds of suffers will have symptoms as adults.

Blame for ADD has been placed on everything from allergies to fluorescent lights. However, none of these "causes" are accepted today. Most experts agree that Attention Deficit Disorder is a brain disorder with a biological basis. Diagnosis includes medical exams, tests of vision, hearing, speech, IQ, academic achievement, and laboratory tests of impulsiveness and attention, and most importantly, interviews with parents, teachers, and the children themselves to provide a detailed history of symptoms. Treatment often includes medication and dietary control.

Parents and friends of ADD suffers, take heart! Sure, most of us push our kids to be straight A students and perfect social

and family people. The truth is that there is nothing wrong with "average," and maybe society in general needs to focus more on

rewarding an honest effort versus the graded outcome of the

Who couldn't benefit from eliminating sugary treats and caffeine products from their diet? By setting guidelines for bedtimes, TV hours, predictable mealtimes, etc, you may find more free time for yourself. Be sure to include a set time for oneon-one help with schoolwork or games - not just with the ADD child, but with each child in the family. Admit it when you are frustrated and tired out and take time for yourself before anger takes over. All these simple measures can make life with ADD more tolerable.

Perhaps the most destructive outcome of ADD is low self esteem. If each of us takes the time to compliment small as well as by Tracy MacDonald, RN

large achievements on a daily basis and mixes in a lot of hugs for all our children then we have given them the greatest weapon against failure- self esteem. ADD sufferers are not in control and cannot be held responsible for some of their annoying activity. It isn't easy to practice love and understanding in the face of constant unpredictability and upheaval, but if we can master this most of the time it will enhance our relationship not just with the ADD child. Some of the rewards are bound to spill over into other areas of

If you think your child may suffer from ADD, talk to your teachers, school counselor and family physician. Get the answers and help you need. You can write to me at the Manchester Enterprise for a list of books and support groups. Chances are your child is just a little friskier than most!

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

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
