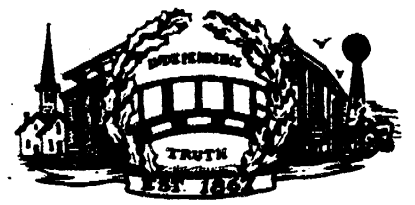

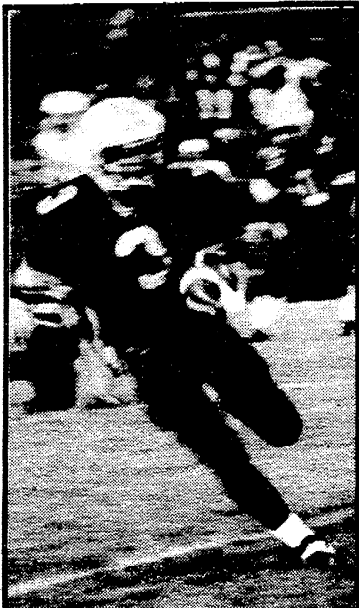

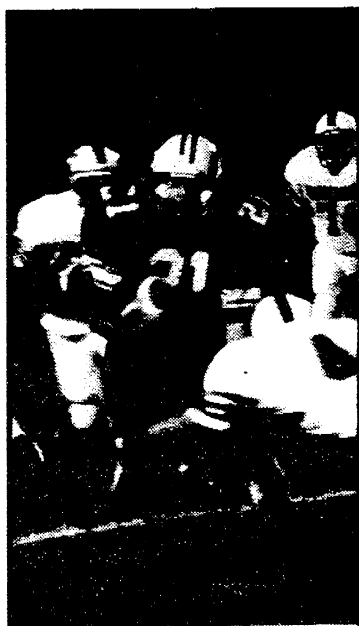

For the Homecoming game the JV cheerleaders joined the Varsity cheerleaders. It was a good-looking combination and they executed some fantastic mounts.

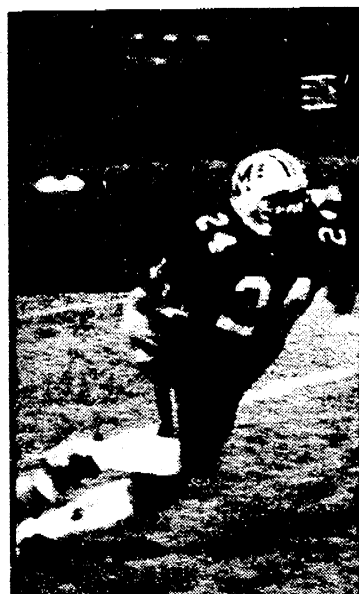

Out & About

I was asked what the difference was between this column and an Editorial column. For a moment I was rather perplexed. I guess Out and About can be of many unrelated things that may, or may not have merit. Musings, memories, foibles, spoofs and in some cases just rambling to see if I can stir the pot. However; there are on occasions some things that need to be said without pontificating. This happens to be one of those times.

Elected officials, whether elected or appointed, serve the populace. Sometimes we public servants lose sight of that point. As your building inspector I have to interpret the building codes that are being revised almost constantly. Building codes are the minimums by which a building can be built for fire, safety and structural integrity.

Some of the older building construction practices have been substantially altered. A case in point, the apartments being reconstructed as townhouses at the end of Washington Street. The construction practices, materials and standards initially used are fortunately no longer permissible.

The Black Sheep Tavern is another good point in question. Tom Ellis has purchased the building from Chris Hoover. The building suffered a fire that could have destroyed the business section of Manchester without the intervention of our area Fire Fighters. Tom is trying to rehabilitate the Sheep and has appeared before the Planning Commission and the Village

Council. His plans, as submitted to Council, need refining. With the Village's past experience with Tom refurbishing the old Methodist Church there appears to be reticence on Council's part.

To Ellis's credit he recently did an excellent job in restoring the old Brooklyn Hotel.

Our downtown area has experienced the neglect of the Sheep not being rebuilt or redefined for other uses. Hoover has been an absentee landlord, and the neglect of his holdings leaves a lot to be desired. (Stop in some day and look at the leaking sewer pipes in the ceiling of the Enterprise or over Calamity Jane's merchandise area. Hoover owns these buildings also.)

What's the point? Council may have to delegate the responsibility of the Black Sheep plan submittals and compliance to the Village Manager, Jeff Wallace, to get the Black Sheep fiasco reconciled. Tom, as he readily admits, has made mistakes and is rather hard to deal with at times, but...who else was willing to undertake the rebuilding of the Black Sheep buildings, spending the exorbitant amounts of money necessary to bring them back as a viable business in Manchester?

I can't think of anyone who lives in this community who would not like to see something POSITIVE happen to the Black Sheep building which has placed such a blight on our Main Street.

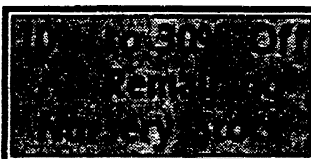

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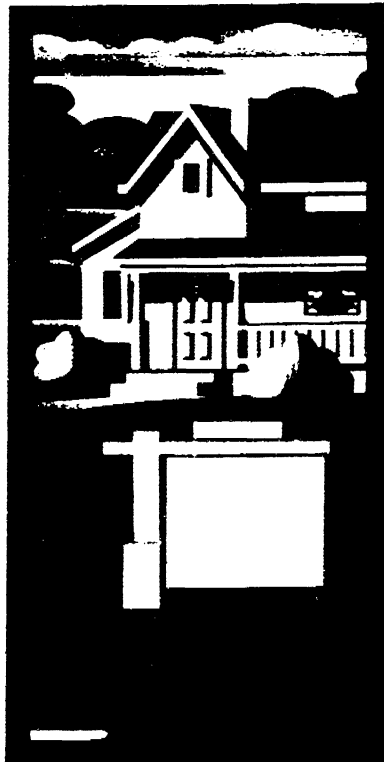

**PROPOSED SYNOPSIS
Regular Meeting of the
Manchester Township Board
Monday, September 11, 1995**

The meeting was called to order at 8:00 PM with Board Members Macomber, Widmayer, Turk, Mann, and Hakes present. There were also several visitors present. Minutes from the Board's last meeting, held August 14, 1995, were approved as printed. Minutes of the Planning Commission and Library Board were accepted.

Bills paid since last meeting were reviewed. The Treasurer's report was accepted. Approval was given to pay bills totaling \$978.19 in the General Fund.

Several residents of the Iron Creek Millpond area presented a petition for the County Drain Commissioner requesting reevaluation of the current recommendation and rationales for the Iron Creek Millpond project under consideration. A meeting will be scheduled.

The Board accepted the recommendation of the Fire Truck Committee and the Fire Department, agreeing to purchase a KME Custom 148 Streamliner fire truck from Payette & Associates for \$191,711, contingent upon receiving proper financing. A Special Meeting was scheduled for Monday, September 18, 1995, at 8:00 PM to authorize signing of the contract and review financing options. Estimated delivery date on the new truck would be 240 to 300 calendar days.

Fire Chief Wiedmayer reported that department membership now included 8 First Responders, 7 EMT's

and 1 paramedic. Recently, Karl Schook and Eric Beuerle passed the EMT course and have received their certificates. Fire Department activity for August included 1 fire, 6 medical runs, 6 personal injury and 4 miscellaneous, totaling 17 runs.

Constable/Zoning Administrator Moore's report included 1379 miles traveled as constable, with 35 complaints and other miscellaneous activity. Zoning permits or inspections included 2 new residences, 3 remodels, 3 garages, and 20 property inspections. 316 miles were traveled for zoning.

A proposal for repair of the flat portion of the township hall roof was accepted for an estimated total of \$13,025.

The new phone system for the township offices will be installed next week.

Routine correspondence required no action from the Board. There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 9:37 PM.

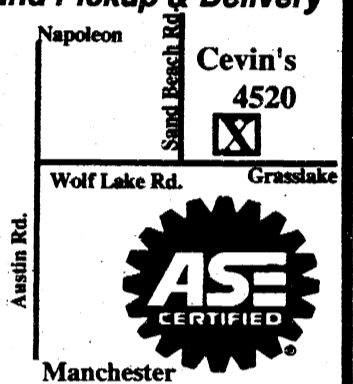

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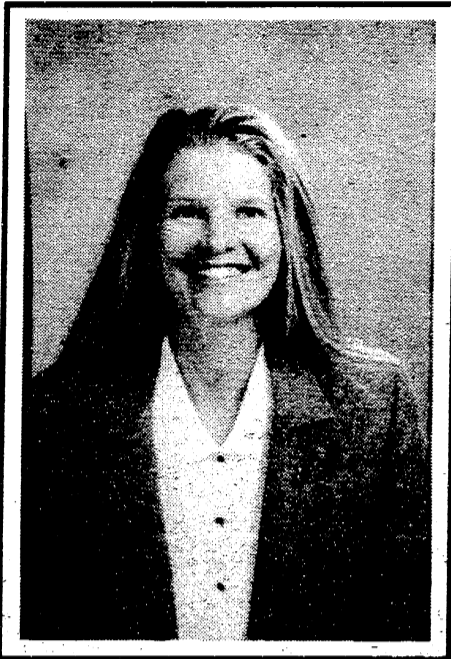
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Dr. Kathy L. Guerreso joins Chiropractic Clinic

The meeting adjourned at 8:55 PM.

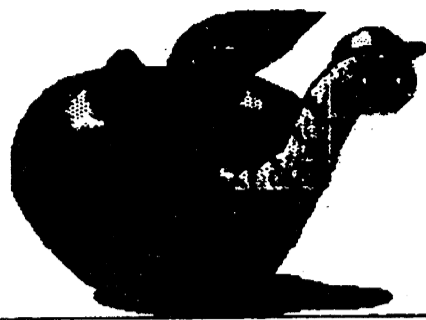
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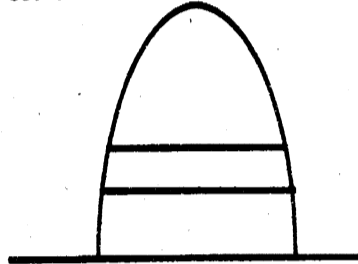
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"We're All in This Together"

This was the topic for a program given by Dr. Nora Martin who is a Professor at Eastern Michigan University. The program was very inspirational and was presented to give teachers and parents some ideas for helping students start the school year out right. She started out by asking, "What is this a picture of?":



The idea that came to my head immediately was a finger with a bandage on it. The first person Dr. Martin called on, answered "a hat". Immediately, I perceived that as a better answer than the one I had thought of. I was called on next so I didn't have enough time to think of a clever answer so I just said "a finger with a bandage on it". Her response was "Good", the same response she had given the first answer. I immediately felt better! After a half dozen different responses (one was "a thumb with a bandage on it"), she told us that she had heard all of these answers before. *The lesson from this exercise was that we need to teach kids to teach each other to see their viewpoint.*

Here are some other points she made:

1) **We need to teach students to - 'read teachers'.**

Each teacher has his/her own classroom style (discipline, motivation, expectations, etc.). Students who do not pick up on this style (as is the case with

many special needs students) tend to behave or perform in a way that may be perceived as inappropriate. This is especially important in middle school and high school where students have a different teacher for each class - and - is an invaluable asset in the work force.

2) **Not all people learn effectively through all of their senses.**

Auditory/verbal learners and visual learners are common. As parents and teachers we need to identify each person's learning style and accept the process they need to go through to learn. For example, auditory/verbal learners appear to talk to themselves - when in fact, they are verbalizing material so their ears can hear it.

3) **Don't use the words, soon or later to motivate students.**

Students need closure - where the task is going and what is the meaning (or purpose) of learning the material. For long range goals, Dr. Martin suggested using holidays in the following way: "If you use your student planner every day from now until Christmas, then you will know whether is this organization skill is helpful to you." Some students (especially elementary students) also need mini closure, "When the clock looks like this, the small hand is on the 10 and the big hand is straight up (for auditory/verbal learner and a picture of that time for visual learners), we can all get our snacks."

4) **Her final point was that we need to empower our children and students.**

Teach them:

IF YOU CAN'T CHANGE THE SITUATION - THEN CHANGE THE WAY YOU REACT TO IT- YOU CAN CHOOSE YOUR REACTION!

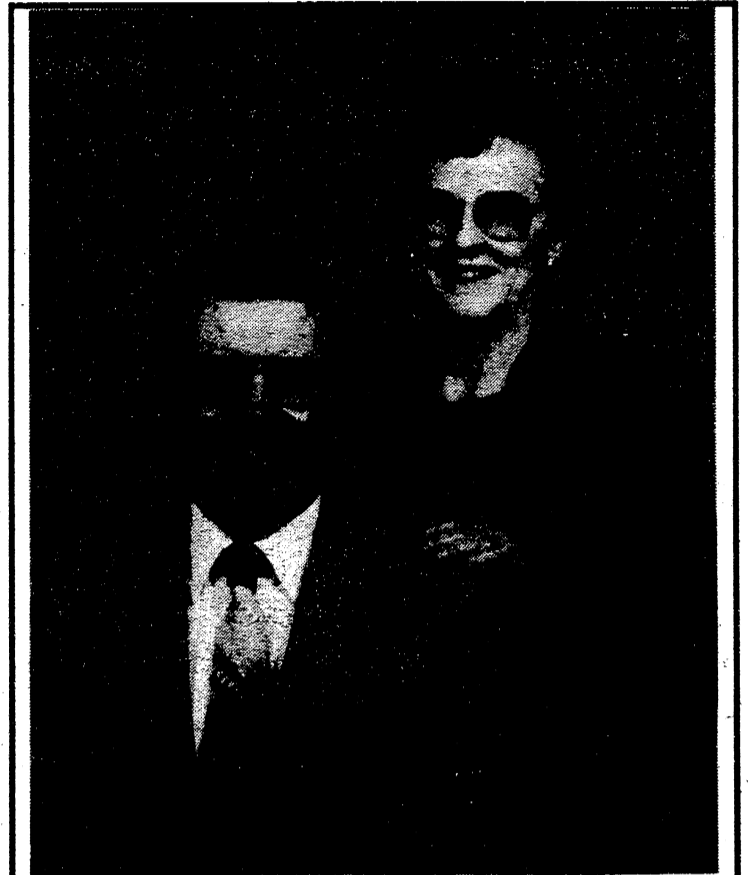
Manchester Team Raises \$600 for The American Heart Association

Manchester Area Historical Society



The Manchester Area Historical Society met at the Blacksmith Shop on Tuesday, September 19.

Loring and Linda Ebersole presented a program on granite ware. They brought a variety of coffee and teapots dating between 1878 and 1899. Early granite ware was grey. Chemists in England developed a formula for Britannia or white metal. They brought it with them when they came to the United States. This metal resembles pewter, but it is much harder and does not dent as easily. Sometimes, it is nickel or silver plated and is shiny.

Pearl white agateware was developed next. Creamers, sugars, and sugar syrup pitchers were also made of this material. It is heavy. Most pieces have scenes, flowers, or birds on the

sides. A process called decalmania was used to put them on the pots. Tinted agateware was next with fancier designs and more colors. Many of the pots had fancy handles, spouts and lids. One series featured sprouts shaped like the torch of the Statue of Liberty.

Pots came in a variety of shapes and sizes from tall, straight sided pots to small, squatty ones. Some were oval shaped.

These pots were popular for about forty years - between pewter and sterling silver or silver plating. These pots should never be placed directly on a stove.

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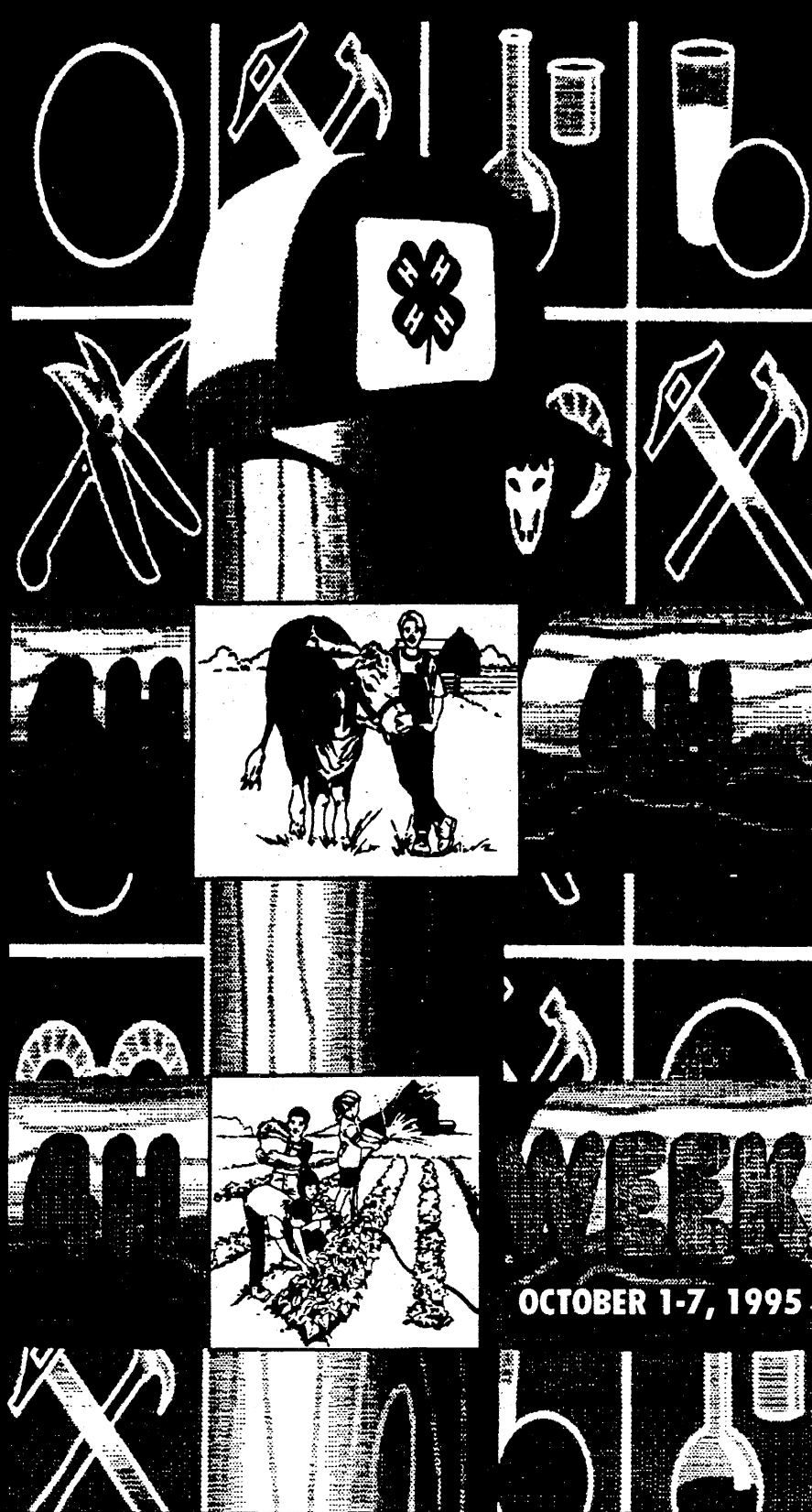
