

# "Sharon House of Manchester" to Open as Bed and Breakfast



One of Manchester's Castle Houses: Sharon House of Manchester Bed and Breakfast, will open soon.

Manchester will have its own Bed and Breakfast house starting late this fall, if all goes as planned. At their recent meeting, the Manchester Township Planning Commission passed a conditional approval to Sharon and Carl Curtis on Sharon Hollow Road.

Planning commission requested that a new septic and drain field be installed as well as a new 5" well. The permit will be subject to annual review by the Planning Commission. Curtis' hope to fulfill these conditions by the end of October and be ready to open one guest room well before the end

of the year

The Sharon House of Manchester Bed and Breakfast, affectionately called simply "The Sharon House," will officially open in Spring of 1996 with four guest rooms. In an 18 room house, there should be plenty of room for guests!

Many will remember Carl and Sharon Curtis as the "Crank Organ People." Their wide collection of mechanical musical instruments will provide an interesting backdrop to the traditional be and breakfast fare. Their quiet hospitality will welcome people to Manchester who

enjoy this special type of lodging.


Bed-and-Breakfasts are growing in popularity all across the country. They provide homelike accommodations and a particular ambience. Each "B&B" has its own style and personality. Sharon House will be no exception to this rule. Although, Carl says, "Eclectic is the word to describe our furnishings. We won't have a particular theme in our guest rooms."

Built in the late 1880's, the Sharon House has an interesting history. The classic Victorian style house was built for George Heimerdinger, whose grandson (and namesake) still lives in Clinton. Later owners, George and Frances Nollar, ran a dairy operation there during the depression years.

When the surrounding farm land and houses were purchased in the late 1960's by George Macomber, there was a permit out to burn the house down. Instead, it was saved and restored to some of its original beauty by Del and Shirley Sparks, Macomber's daughter. Later owners were the Gillies and Potter families, and Curtis' purchased the house in 1994.

"We are excited about the potential, but we have a lot of work to do in the meanwhile," says Sharon Curtis. The Sharon House will be a welcome addition to the Manchester community.

# Watch Out For School Buses!

Next week, October 15-21, is Bus Safety Week - a fitting time to remember the basic rules of bus safety, for students and drivers alike.

Students should always remember bus safety rules. Basic rules for riding the bus safely and cooperatively are posted in the front of every Manchester school bus. Bus drivers participate four times per year in random bus drills so students have an opportunity to practice exiting the buses safely in the event of an emergency. (Two drills are for rear exits only and two are for front and rear emergency exits combined) The Transportation Department publishes a manual of rules and safety guidelines each


year which is distributed to each family in the district.

So it seems that our children should be safe on the buses. They are aware of the rules, we have dedicated bus drivers who enforce these rules and look out for the students' safety. Why then, do we need to re-hash these rules?

According to the Washtenaw County Sheriff Department, Manchester Station and the Manchester Schools' Community Transportation Department, our students ARE in potential danger - not because of disciple or unsafe buses, but because of careless drivers who don't obey the simple and basic rules of sharing the road with school buses: STOP WHEN YOU SEE THE RED LIGHTS FLASHING on a school

At least five tickets have been handed out over the past two weeks to the owners of vehicles who have passed a school bus with its flashing red lights on. As a civil infraction, this means you will be ticketed for this offense. A fine of \$75.00 will be levied, two points will be added to your license, and the judge also has the option to assign you to 100 hours of community service work at the school as a further deterrent.

Bus drivers are eager to



see these drivers ticketed and will gladly take license numbers and descriptions of offending vehicles to report to the WCSD. They don't want to see their kids endangered by thoughtless drivers.

When the red lights are flashing and the stop sign is extended, it means that students are getting on or off the bus. At that point, they are in danger from oncoming vehicles who do not pay attention to the warning lights on the school bus.

Even police cars and other emergency vehicles are obligated to stop for school buses to avoid causing danger to children whether on a busy thoroughfare, a quiet rural road, or a village street.

During this coming Bus Safety week, please pay particular attention to the buses on the roads, transporting the youth of our community to school. From 7:30-9:00 AM and 3:00-4:30 PM each day, be especially aware of the potential

of meeting a bus on the road. Remember to follow the basic rules for the safety of those bus riders. And if you have an opportunity, be sure to express your appreciation to the bus drivers in our district whose ultimate concern is the safety of these young people.





# Kirk Park & Chi-Bro Park






Pictured are the new pavilions here in Manchester. One is at Kirk Park and the other is in Chi-Bro Park.







#### **United Way Campaign Continues Through October**

Each of us is affected by the community's donations to the United Way...and most will benefit in numerous ways from United Way subsidies. The United Way Board makes direct allocations to eight Manchester recipients, as well as to eight more county-wide organizations which also benefit Manchester residents.

Many United Way of Michigan member services also provide benefits to local community members, and yet reach out beyond our local needs to assist others whom we may be unable to help in more conventional ways.

This week, the Enterprise continues its series spotlighting area services and organizations which benefit from United Way funds which are raised locally each fall. This week we look at Manchester Family Service and the Manchester Salvation Army.

The United Way of Manchester includes Manchester Family Service in its budget each year. This year the United Way will make a grant of \$3,630 to Family Service.

Manchester Family Service is a completely volunteer organization. Its calls are received in the home of Dee Dee Sahakian (call 428-8852 for

information or to report a need). Family Service was incorporated "To be of temporary assistance in all area emergencies, such as fire, accident and disaster, to be of temporary aid to hardship cases..."

This group of nine area residents meets regularly to determine long-term policies. The day-to-day decisions are made by individual board members as the needs arise.

During recent years, the majority of requests for assis-

tance involve temporary aid caused by unemployment or illness. Treasurer John Sahakian reported last year that United Way donations were used for fuel (\$750), transportation (\$50), utilities and appliances (\$260), and rent (\$1575). The remainder helped with food purchases.

Each year individuals, businesses, civic groups and churches support Manchester Family Service with donations of money, food supplies, and other in-kind items. Funds are used for the monthly food distribution and for the annual Christmas "shop." Each recipient family is remembered there with food and gifts; many fami-

lies are adopted by local groups through referrals by Manchester Family Service.

How many people realize that there is a Salvation Army branch right here in Manchester? Certainly some of us did not realize that a portion of the funds allocated to the Salvation Army are utilized locally. But the Salvation Army is, indeed another service-oriented charity supported by the Manchester United Way.

A small committee, with Ted Tapping serving as treasurer, determines the use of the funds. Salvation Army grants usually pick up the large needs which Family Service cannot meet. For example, recently a request for past-due rent was covered by the group so a local family could remain in their home while the mother was between jobs.

When you make your annual donation to the United Way of Manchester, you can see that you are reaching out to not just your neighbors and friends, as evidenced by last week's featured recipients (Manchester Township Library and Manchester Area Senior Citizens), but also you are reaching those whose needs are beyond your ability to help alone.

#### WHAT I'VE LEARNED As the Parent of a Special Ed Student

FIRST, I learned special education includes VERY intelligent people.

When one of my own children was diagnosed as learning disabled in 3rd grade, the recommendation from the evaluation team was special education. I was devastated! I resisted - I didn't want my child in a special education room - but finally I agreed to let my child try it. I expected my child to come home the next day, crying, because of being put in a special education room. I was wrong! My child loved it. My child's stomach aches, which had occurred daily for half of the third grade, disappeared that very day. Two semesters later my child was back into the regular classroom. Those two semesters - with a very special, special education teacherin the special education room had worked wonders!

#### SECOND. I learned to truly appreciate teachers.

Their classrooms are filled to capacity. At least ten percent of the students have some combination of learning disability, no two the same combination and they all need different accommodations. Another ten percent suffers from attention deficit (many undiagnosed and untreated) and tend to disrupt the classroom or appear to have no idea

what is going on. Teacher consultants help with these special students but the teacher consultants are programming for many students, evaluating other students and team teaching. Most teachers and teacher consultants seem to have a real talent for fulfilling each students needs. Some are such wonderful, caring individuals that they call parents when they see a student is "slipping" to try to find a solution. I am truly, truly grateful to these very talented teachers. I try to always remember to thank them for their special ef-

THIRD, I learned I am responsible for maintaining a good educational environment for my child. School does not always go well for my child. We have many crisis situations. It is the responsibility of my child and me to work with the teacher consultants and the teachers to find the solutions, not only to resolve the crisis, but also to demonstrate to my child that asking for accommodations works. (My child will have to do this in college and in the work force.) Alone the teachers may find a solution eventually. Alone my child and I may find a solution eventually. BUT, together we find a solution SOONER. I know my child better than the teachers; I know my child's history better. My child and I are an important part of the team.

FOURTH. I have learned that my child and I are pioneers and need to accept progress at a slow and steady pace.

Inclusion of special education students is relatively new; in the past most quit school by high school. Assistance for attention deficit people is new; in the past these students were seen as behavior problems and were often expelled from school. Parents are helping the school develop inclusion programs that worked for these students. I've learned a lot from the school staff. The school staff has learned a lot from me (me = all parents of special needs students who are involved in their child's education). But mostly we are all learning from students like my child. The students that face the learning disability every day of their life. The student that strive ahead, handle failures and beam with success. The students - who I know deep in my heart - will be wonderful and very successful adults because of all the special efforts all of us are making.





# Kiwanis Fall Activities

On Saturday, September 30, six members of the Manchester Kiwanis spent their day beautifying M-52 north of Manchester.

"This time we only picked up ninebags of trash," commented President Dianne Schwab. "We found everything from towel to a water decanter." The first time the club "Adopted" this stretch of highway, they picked up 32 bags of trash. "But still, it's discouraging to drive by the next day and realize there is already new trash alongside the road," said Schwab.

Further activities of the Kiwanis organization in Manchester include the club joining thousands of other Kiwanis clubs around the world in observing Kiwanis Worldwide Service day on October 21. This day will be used to increase public awareness of Iodine Deficiency Disorders (IDD) and collect donations to help eliminate this major world health problem by the year 2000.

Deficiency of this essential micronutrient is rare in the industrialized nations where iodized slat is generally used. But in the rest of the world, about 1.5 billion people are at risk of IDD, and 500 million of them are children.

In partnership with UNICEF, Kiwanis clubs have pledged to raise \$75 million to help IDD-affected nations produce and distribute iodized salt, provide remedial medical treatments, and educate at-risk populations about the value of iodized salt.

"IDD has been documented for ate lest 4,000 years," says Lorraine Mahrle, chairman of Manchester Kiwanis' IDD Campaign Committee. In order to raise funds for this project, the local Kiwanis are in the process of creating a special Manchester coverlet (50" x 70") which will be available this winter. Watch for details as the project takes shape.



# **Equestrian Team Begins Fall Season**

The Michigan Interscholastic Horsemanship Association (M.I.H.A.) began its fall season of competition on Saturday, September 9. The M.I.H.A. has been in existence since 1974. This year the M.I.H.A. is comprised of teams from 60 high schools in the state of Michigan with over 1,500 students who meet in competition against one another in various areas of horsemanship - saddle seat, hunt seat, stock seat (western), trail and gymkhana (gaming) classes. The association is divided into Districts comprised of six to twelve teams. Schools within each district compete against each other at meets held in various locations. Every team competes in three meets against schools in their districts. At the end of these three meets, the team which has the most cumulative points is the District Champion and qualifies for the State Championship.

Due to the difference in the sizes of the schools and number of riders within each district, teams are labeled either Division A, B, or C teams; based on the number of riders competing from the school. A Division A team has 11 or more riders, a Division B team has six to ten riders and a Division C team has five riders or less.

The Manchester Equestrian Team is in its eleventh year of competition in this association. The Manchester Equestrian Team competes in District VII which is one of the toughest districts in the state. Schools competing in District VII are: Ann Arbor -Greenhills. Ann Arbor- Huron, Ann Arbor Pioneer, Carleton - Airport, Chelsea, Grosse Ile, Manchester, Milan, Monroe, New Boston -Huron, Saline, and Ypsilanti -Lincoln.






