## The Second Front Page— Women on the Fire Department

## "It's Important to Me"

Two weeks ago the Enterprise published a letter to the Editor detailing one woman's struggle to become involved as a volunteer firefighter. Amy Schnearle believes that she has been discriminated against and is seeking legal advice. We have learned that Schnearle has not been the first woman to apply for a position on the Manchester Township Fire Department.

We spoke to Schnearle, to Brooke Acree, and to Township Supervisor Ron Mann to determine the extent of the problem. We also spoke to firefighters and members of the community to get public reaction to this situation. Should women be allowed to volunteer for the Manchester Township Fire Department? The answer here seems obvious. In theory, everyone agrees that women would be an asset to the department. The reality, however, becomes apparent no matter to whom you

Schnearle applied to the Manchester Township Fire Department and was told she was next in line. She had understood there were vacancies on the department; that there were currently 28 men on a department which unofficially sets 30 as their limit. Ron Mann verified this statement, when asked how many people are authorized for the department. "We do not have a preset amount, but currently 30 members seems to have the right balance."

Schnearle was completely trained as an EMT and awaiting her license when she learned that someone else had been hired - someone who was further "down the line" on the waiting list than she. When she asked why someone else was hired before the person at the top of the list, she says she was told that the man was more qualified. He is a full time firefighter elsewhere and has a schedule of 24 hours on, 48 hours off. "We therefore had a fully trained, experienced person available 2 out of every three days," Mann commented.

The rationale by Township and Fire Department officials is one of financial consideration. Of course we all hope and trust that our tax dollars are being wisely spent. And it is expensive to train and outfit a firefighter. According to Mann, training for firefighter I and II (I being the basic amount needed to respond to a fire run) costs about \$1,000. EMT training, costs an additional \$2,000. Basic equipment needed to outfit a firefighter for response costs about \$3,000. So, Mann maintains, "the minimum costs to the department is \$6,000 which does not include their pay."

In years past there were not the number of experienced and trained firefighters and first responding EMTs for medical emergencies. Most of the members of the fire department received on the job training from

more experie n c e d firefighters as circumstances required. As time went on and commu-

nity needs were considered, many of our current firefighters went in for advanced training. Now we have a large proportion of highly trained, semi-professional men on our fire department. Most of these guys started out as just your regular fellow next door and have become highly capable to deal with nearly any type of emergency.

A woman who tries to volunteer for the fire department, however, probably starts out at a disadvantage. The men-only character of the MTFD has developed over a long history and will not be easily changed. Neither Schnearle nor Acree were acquainted with the procedure that to become a member of the fire department, a sign of your commitment to volunteering was that you attend several fire department meetings. This, the man who was hired had been doing for several months before his recommendation to the Township Board for approval. Schnearle, in fact, believed that the Department meetings were "closed" to members only - a mistaken assumption since as a public body the Fire Department is subject to the Open Meetings Act. Acree also indicates that she was not informed that attending meetings was a prerequisite, otherwise she would have

Perhaps these mistaken assumptions and misinformation could be rectified if a written policy existed for hiring volunteer members of the MTFD. Mann says, "No, we have no formal written policy. We however use the Michigan Township Association guidelines. We have the appropriate forms which are filled out by those persons in the community who wish to serve on the fire department. We keep a list of the applicants on file. We currently are working on by-laws; although this is on a volunteer time available basis.

"The fire department members review each applicant and their training and prior service, if they have any, and that recommendation is given to Manchester Township Board. The board then confirms the choice made by the fire department members." It seems that unless you know the unwritten rules you cannot easily become a member of the Manchester Township Fire Department volunteer squad. What criteria does the fire department use? "They recom-

mend the best person available based on training and availability," Mann replied.

It is reported that the average fireman is unaware of the number of people on the waiting list, or their identities. When a candidate is presented at a meeting for recommendation to the Township Board, it is not necessarily indicated where that candidate's name may fall in relationship to other applicants.

Brooke Acree took action rather than sit back and wait for her name to come up on the list. While she was still in training, she met the Chief of the Sand Lake Fire Department at a class. Although she had already talked to the Chief and submitted her application in Manchester, "[They] had no interest in me; I could tell. I do believe someone was hired while I was waiting." She was offered and accepted a job at Sand Lake, although her license was still pending at the time

"Sand Lake is very happy to now have two women on their department," indicates Acree. "There are things that women are better at handling than men." Although she is still within her one-year probation period, Acree says that she is "treated with respect as a fully-qualified member of the department."

Although many have told her that the are not surprised at the indifference displayed to her application in Manchester, "I had no clue that they would be like this," maintains Acree. "I went into this trusting I would be treated as a fellow professional."

Both Schnearle and Acree are now fully trained and certified EMTs who took the training at their own expense. Schnearle indicated her training cost her about \$600, but believes that perhaps she could have received the training even less expensively if trained by the HVA personnel utilized by the Township. This is still about \$1400 less than Mann indicated it would cost the taxpayers to train an EMT.

The issue of cost raises another question. When a firefighter receives \$3,000 worth of gear, as noted by Mann, what happens when he leaves the

Department? Who owns the gear, the individual or the Township? Obviously turn out gear for firefighters is sized to fit an individual, yet it would seem that used gear might be available to a probationary firefighter.

What gear is needed for a first responder EMT? Would someone who is already licensed, already own some of the basic equip-

ment? And it would seem that the Township or the Fire Department would necessarily have equipment on the truck which could be used by whomever responds to a particular call.

Is the \$6,000 figure an elaborate cop-out? Obviously a pre-trained firefighter/EMT would save the township \$1,000 over someone who was only a licensed EMT. Other than that, what actual costs would be incurred? A pre-trained firefighter may cost an equivalent amount in gear to an untrained one unless he or she brings their own equipment.

Asked point-blank why we don't have women on the Fire Department, Mann responded, "The majority of the department is in favor of having a woman to respond to medical needs. It would be a lot nicer in some cases and be better for some of the people who need care. We however have not had a fully qualified person apply that could handle both the fire needs of a burning building and a medical

response need. We may be able to have just a medical response team but as yet we have not been able to put that type of unit together. In the past we were able to put an ambulance service addition in our department. We had people that were willing to get the training and pursued getting qualified.


"We do the best job we can with the resources we have. Those resources are people and dollars."

The commitment, professionalism and high level of service demonstrated by the Manchester Township Fire Department is unquestioned. Their ability to think quickly under stressful circumstances, their capacity to save lives and property, and their courage under fire is of prime importance in each and every call, at any hour of the day or night. We are all aware of the high quality of service we receive here in Manchester. In fact, our insurance rates locally are lower just because we live in close proximity to such a highly rated fire department.

Would the addition of women to this formula be a detriment or a complement? Most firefighters and community members agree that a woman on the department would probably enhance their service, especially to other women and to children. At least two women have applied. And more will apply in the future.

So whom will it be, and when?

To the Manchester Community:

On June 21, 1989, the Supreme Court took away the American people's right to pass laws protecting our nation's flag from physical desecration, a right "We the people" have exercised judiciously for more than a century.

The Senate is scheduled to vote on SJR-31, the Flag Protection Amendment, this month (although the date is not yet certain) which, when passed, will return to the people the power to protect their flag from physical desecration. It will then be our decision - as it should be - and we won't need the permission of Congress or the Supreme Court to do what we know is right.

But there are those in Congress who think the American people should not have the right to protect their flag, even if the vast majority of us know that it's the right thing to do. In fact, on Flag Day Senator Paul Simon of Illinois held a press conference in Washington D.C. He was asked by a reporter if he thought the flag-protection amendment would be ratified if it was sent to the states. Senator Simon said tat the amendment has the overwhelming support of the American people and "That is why we must stop it in the Senate!"

Are those the words of a US Senator sent to Washington to represent the will of the people? Such arrogance is unpardonable. Does Simon believe the American people are not wise enough or smart enough to govern themselves? Has he forgotten that "We the people" are the government and we have the right, the power, and the duty to determine the laws that will govern our society?

On June 28, 1995, the House of Representatives debated,

930-2250

voted 312 to 102 to approve adding these words to our constitution: "Congress and the states shall have power to prohibit the physical desecration of the Flag of the United States."

This amendment does not protect our flag. This amendment does not infringe on any freedom. It returns to the people the freedom to pass flag-protection laws if they choose to do so. It is an "enabling amendment" which reverses a bad Supreme Court decision because it is the will of the people that the freedom to protect our flag be restored to us.

Now the Senate vote is imminent. According to Gallup Surveys, more than 80% of Americans want the flag-protection amendment passed and sent to the states for ratification. Polls taken in individual states show that among registered voters, at least 60% say that this issue alone will determine whether they vote for a candidate in the next election. Americans want this amendment passed.

As Veteran's Day approaches, I ask you to help honor those who have served our flag by helping make a final push to get the votes needed to pass the Flag Protection Amendments. Neither Levin nor Abraham have announced their stand on this issue. There is no better time than Veteran's Day to show your support for our flag. Your efforts are appreciated!







## Manchester Teacher named "Washtenaw County Farm Bureau Educator of the Year"

David Mellor, Agriscience Teacher and FFA Advisor, was named "1995 Washtenaw County Educator of the Year" by Washtenaw County Farm Bureau at their annual meeting and banquet held at Farm Council Grounds in October. The Farm Bureau recognition is open to all teachers in Washtenaw County and is bestowed upon the educator who best develops agriculture awareness and literacy in the classroom. By my count this country had seven wars from the Revolution to the end of WWII, a period of 170 years. In 1950 we started on the road to "police actions" and this surely has complicated the way we define Veterans and publicly honor them. The police action in Korea is still going on after 45 years and there is little appreciation asto why we went there in the Manchester's Seniors. first place and just what the efforts of our soldiers have accomplished during those long years. Since then we have had a "Bay of Pigs" action, policed Vietnam, saved Somalia from hunger, helped with Granada, Panama and Iran, carried out Desert Storm, restored "democracy" in Haiti, flown over and bombed Bosnia, etc. There have been more of these actions in 45 years than we had real wars in 170.


We certainly have set ourselves a horribly complex task of explaining each of these varied missions in terms most of us can understand, let alone accept. I wouldn't be surprised if many of our youngsters have simply turned the whole mess off and are concentrating on something else. And, I don't really blame them.

Maybe MacArthur was right when he stood up to President Truman about the Korean War-and got fired for it. Do we use an army as a police force without many, many complications? As he said, an army's mission is to fight to reach its military objective with the least possible damage to itself and then, to get out. An army doesn't do well with its hands are tied

with political chains which keep it from reaching its objective quickly and in the best strategical manner. Often such armies lose their sense of mission, suffer horrible casualties and are forced to do things which many people and even the soldiers involved cannot respect or justify. But it is never the fault of the soldier in the field who will be doing and stuff like that. become our next generation

> I hope we can still render proper respect to what all our Veterans have done for us in America as we honor them in Veterans Day celebrations in 1995. I also hope we can start to re-think what our military missions should be today and make corrections which will restore a truer purpose to the exercise of military power. Maybe there are enough people who would like to volunteer as members of peacekeeping forces for the hot spots around the world. This might let the military revert to its true mission and also create a different class of "Veterans" we could honor for their successes at peace-



#### <u>DUTCH FOOTBALL</u> SEASON CLOSES 35 - 8



## Introducing Americorps Member - Laurel Reimann

Michigan's fifteen USDA AmeriCorps members, will be working with local landowners, primarily farmers, to evaluate their structures and management practices for potential sources of groundwater pollution.

Laurel will work out of the Ann Arbor Natural Resources Conservation Service Office, formerly the Soil Conservation Service. She will use the Farm\*A\*Syst program adapted for use in Michigan by the MSU Extension. Farm\*A\*Syst is a risk assessment checklist that helps determine the potential for groundwater con- ing. tamination.

"Identifying potential sources of ground and surface water pollution is an essential first step in the

Laurel Reimann, one of effort to reduce non-point source pollution," said Steve Olds, a District Conservationist for the Natural Resources Conservation Service.

AmeriCorps is a domestic Peace Corps program designed to engage Americans, especially young people, in community service work across the nation. Patterned after the Civilian Conservation Corps which helped to restore our nation's economic health and civic spirit after the Great Depression, AmeriCorps offers opportunities for Americans age 17 and older to serve their country and earn educational credit toward college or vocational train-

"I am excited about the prospect of helping people prevent groundwater contamination and The AmeriCorps voucher I'll earn will

allow me to further my college education," said Laurel, who plans to become a Urban Forester.

The Natural Resources Conservation Service is the USDA agency that, working with local conservation districts, is responsible for helping farmers and others to protect our nation's water and food producing resources.

President

AmeriCorps, Clinton's national service program, passed with bi-partisan support from Congress. It engages and meets critical community needs in return for an educational award, which may be used to pay for college, job training, graduate school, or to pay back student loans. The majority of AmeriCorps members are working in partnerships with states, local governments, and nonprofit organizations.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture is running 3 types of AmeriCorps teams in 38 states. composed of approximately 1200 members: an Anti-Hunger Team, a Public Lands and Environment Team, and a Rural Development Team. Many of the AmeriCorps projects are sponsored by community-based organizations and all projects are designed to get things done, while boosting community, opportunity and responsibility.



## Teens & Smoking

## Time for a Smoke Out

The issue of teens and tobacco is much in the news these days. November is the month for the "Great American Smoke-Out," and this year's date is Thursday, November 16. In preparation for this occasion, here are some thoughts and some facts about teens and tobacco use.

"The other day, I was reading an article which was very enlightening, but at the same time, very disturbing to me," says Kristin Warner. Kristin is a registered nurse employed by Herrick Hospital, a Manchester resident and amother of three boys - Daniel and Andrew are students at Klager and Carl is 21. The short, well written article entitled "Fire and Smoke" appeared in the September 1995 issue of Business and Health magazine. "It addresses the issue of teenage smoking, and the statistics are very alarming."

"Did you know that 3,000 13-17 year olds take up cigarette smoking in this country per day? Nicotine is a very powerful, addictive substance, and was recognized as such in the 1980's by most major tobacco companies." Warner goes on to say that although the number of adult smokers has declined dramatically (from about 50% of the population to about 20%) from the 1950's until now, teen smoking is on the rise. "A University of Michigan study just last year found that 18.6% of the eighth graders surveyed had smoked during the prior month. That's up almost 6% from a survey done in 1991."

Today's teens have grown up in a culture permeated with


attractive images of smokers and cigarettes. These images mesh perfectly with the psychological and social needs of young people: social acceptance, sex appeal, persona, independence, athletic excellence, and weight control. Current ads for popular cigarette brands play into these needs of teenagers.

People who start smoking at an early age have more difficulty quitting, are more likely to become heavy smokers, and are more likely to develop a smoking-related disease. Teen smokers are 100 times more likely than nonsmokers to smoke marijuana and are more likely to use other illegal drugs, such as cocaine and heroin in the future.

Did you know that it is illegal for teenagers to light up in public? The Michigan Youth Tobacco Act prohibits the purchase or use of tobacco products by persons under 18 years of age, as well as the sale of tobacco products to minors. Despite this law, cigarettes are readily available to underage smokers.

According to the Washtenaw County Cardiovascular Health Coalition, in compliance checks around Washtenaw County, 60-70% of retailers illegally sold tobacco products to minors. Free tobacco samples are often distributed at rock concerts and sporting events, and vending machines make it easy for underage smokers to purchase cigarettes.

The Washtenaw County Sheriff Department takes tobacco use seriously among young people under the age of



town areas.

Teenage tobacco use is not limited to cigarettes, either. Spit tobacco (snuff or "chew") is no safer than cigarettes; tobacco need not be smoked to cause cancer. These products can inflame the gums, loosen teeth, and cause pre-cancerous mouth sores. Nicotine from spit tobacco is absorbed twice as much as that from cigarettes, making snuff and chew highly addictive.

Kristin Warner adds that between \$100-200 billion in health-care dollars is spent each year on smoking-related illnesses.


How can you, as a concerned citizen, help? Warner suggests these steps:


- 1. Get state and local governments to pass or enforce stricter laws governing the sales of tobacco products to
- 2. Sponsor a community or school-based program which educates young people to the risks of smoking. Targeting not only 13-17 year olds but younger children as well, will help in the prevention ef-
- 3. Remember, children learn best by example and imitation. If you smoke, now is the time to stop. Offer or attend smoking cessation classes.

'There are many other ways to decrease the amount of teen smokers," says Warner. "I believe education is the key to healthy young adults.

"The best way to stop smoking, is never to start."





## A Special Tribute to Veterans Day

One of the defining traits of our country is the readiness of our citizens to defend their borders. Whenever we have been threatened, U.S. patriots have willingly gone to battle on behalf of their homeland. We are also the country other nations turn to first when they need defenders. And these defenders are the millions of United States Armed Services men and women, bona fide American heroes.

It disturbs me that many young people today call movie stars, athletes or rock singers heroes. They may be famous, but they are not heroes. Real heroes,

such as our veterans, have made substantial contributions on behalf of humanity. It is because of THEIR vigilance, efforts and sacrifices that movie stars, sports stars and rock singers are able to live in a secure country and attain the good life.

November 11 is when American citizens show their collective appreciation and respect to these millions of veteran heroes who have defended our freedom, and made it possible for the rest of us to take our birthright for granted. And this Veterans Day is especially notable because we marked some important occasions this year.

The big one was the 50th anniversary of the end of World War II. It started with V-E Day, when we defeated Germany and its maniacal dictator. Many Americans sacrificed life and limb to free Europe — and to ensure that America's native tongue would not become German.

Then came V-J Day, which officially ended WW II. This victory over Japan also cost many U.S. lives. Our defenders understood, however, that America's freedom was at stake; and they gave their all to make sure that America's language would not become Japanese.

Much too soon came the Korean War, another test of tyranny vs. freedom. Brave Americans answered the call to defend a country they never knew and a people they never met. Again, we paid a big price in human lives during this shamefully dubbed "forgotten war.".

This past August, our Korean veterans were rightfully honored with an impressive U.S. Korean War Veterans Memorial in Washington. This "fanfare to the common soldier" includes 19 larger-than-life-size steel soldiers; and a black granite wall etched with the faces of nearly 2,500 servicemen and women.

1995 also marks the 20th anniversary of the end of the Vietnam War. Like that terrible conflict that divided our nation in the 1860's, the Vietnam War divided our country in the 1960's. Because of controversy over America's place in Vietnam, we failed as a country to support our service people when they most needed and deserved it. And for too long afterward, we failed to honor their efforts and great sacrifices. Only in the last few years have we collectively acknowledged how shamefully we behaved, and begun showing those veterans the honor and respect we owe them.


The Persian Gulf War was our last major battle - and God willing, our final battle. Again, this brief but intensive war was characteristic of what the United States stands for: a willingness to launch an all-out effort to help a smaller country regain its freedom from a tyrannical and barbaric dictator.

Through all of these terrible military struggles, courageous and dedicated American men and women answered their country's call to help preserve freedom. Regardless of the cause, regardless of its popularity, regardless of the "hell holes" they fought in. our veterans served valiantly. They are the reason that Veterans Day must NEVER be allowed to diminish. And that is something that concerns me, for Veterans Day events are drawing fewer and fewer crowds. Too many people simply consider it another vacation day.

As veterans of WW I and II. the Korean War and the Vietnam War age or pass away, these terrible - but terribly important times will have less meaning to the younger generation. They live secure lives, untouched by the fear, pain, sacrifices and tragedies that war years bring. Few of them truly grasp that these men and women ensured their freedom and security, and that our country owes them an eternal debt.

Therefore, it is up to all of us who DO understand these things to make sure that those coming after us never forget. We cannot let this important day diminish through ignorance or indifference.

We thank God for all of our veterans. A grateful nation salutes them for the work they have done to keep America free and strong, and to make the world a safer place.
