High Winds Cause Local Power Outage

This past weekend's win- not have regular crews availextended power outage when a tree fell on a primary distribution line on Fahey Road in Manchester Township. According to John Hall, spokesman for Consumers Power, 'The power interruption began at 1:48 PM on Saturday and affected 106 households. We restored power to 85 customers at 10:19 PM and the remainder were restored at 11:02 PM."






Timber Frame Home begins construction. The home will be occupied by Wayne and Sue Tervo

During the past summer, our area has experienced significant growth with many different building constructions. We will outline a few.

Manchester Township has several houses in progress. One of those is a Timber Frame house. What is timber framing? Simply put, the house is constructed around a frame made of oak or hardwood timbers which support the walls and roof. These framing members are generally exposed so their structural components can be viewed from the inside.

Occasionally the same framing members can be seen from the exterior if desired. Members are joined by a mortise and tenon joint held together with hard wood pegs. (A mortise is a cavity cut into a beam. A tenon is a finger shape in the end of another beam which fits the size of the mortise cavity. Holes are bored through the mortise and tenon, through which a wooden peg is driven and that holds the two together). This method was used to construct many of our local barns and houses in the past.

In the Village several interesting projects have developed. The old apartment building on Washington Street is in the process of being reconstructed and will be sold as condominiums.

Also on Washington Street is a manufactured home located in a vacant lot south of the river. This particular unit used a basic package of two halves delivered to the site and set on a basement. In addition, a stick-built master bedroom and bath was added. The lower basement contains the garage and the finished unit has been very attractively finished.

In Riverbend a very beautiful Ranch style home was constructed by Proctor Contracting. This unit features a walk out basement exposed to the rear of the house. A south facing deck wraps around the main level with an attached two car garage.

In Bridgewater Township, several homes are being built. On Clinton Road a modular home was built using a wood basement. This basement is different than most in that even the basement floor is constructed of treated wood. After the basement excavation a layer of stone is placed on the native soil. An envelope of visqueen, heavy duty, is placed and the treated sills for the basement walls and the floor joists are laid on this plastic barrier. Treated plywood was used for the walls and floor. The modular home was set on this basement. A conventional stick-built garage was added.


Back in the Village, Tom Ellis is converting the old Black Sheep building into apartments on the second and third floors. The second floor will have two apartments in each building and

the third floor will have one apartment in each building. The commercial portion of the building is being rehabilitated. The old dining area and the kitchen area is being converted into a retail area.

Some of the more unique aspects of this building is the fact that the exterior walls are of twelve-inch thick brick construction. The floor joists go from wall to wall; they are of native oak and hard as a rock from age. Ellis has built new walls inside the brick walls, has

sound insulated the old ceilings and drywalled them with fire rated materials. The spaces between the sills and the walls are filled with gypsum to prevent fire transference.

Sheet metal has been placed under the strategic walls as a fire stop before the walls are set. All wiring, heating, plumbing and air-conditioning has been removed from the existing building and will be replaced with new. We will keep you up to date on this project as it progresses.

Japanese Bank crisis on horizon - Financial experts fret that collapse could trigger global depression. Bernard D. Kaplan The New York Times, reported in the Ann Arbor News, Sunday, November 12, 1995.

Clinton, GOP refuse to budge - In budget battle, deadline looms for U.S. shutdown of some nonessential services. Detroit News, Sunday November 12, 1995.

Government on the brink - Budget fight leading to shutdown tonight. USA TO-DAY, Monday, November 13, 1995.

There appears to be a common thread in each of these stories. That thread is overspending, charging on credit and bad debt! Oh, we can add the baloney about politics between Congress and the President but the simple fact is that the national debt for borrowing is about raising the limit from 4.9 TRILLION DOLLARS TO 4.967 TRIL-LION DOLLARS.

I am no math wiz but Webster says a trillion is a number followed by twelve zeros. that computes to, \$4,900,000,000,000.00; interest computed at 5% equals \$245,000,000,000 (two hundred forty five billion dollars per year, of taxpayers dollars, that is.)

Now in the case of a credit card user, (that would be you or me), the interest rate is 18% or 3.7 times what the government has to pay. In the case of credit card users 7 out of every 10 households carry an average

balance of \$3,900. That is up from \$3,300 two years ago. The other 30 percent of the users pay in full every month. "Total consumer debt stands at a record 4.8 trillion. That means 92 percent of what income families have after paying taxes is needed to pay debts," according to the American Bankers Association.

What does all this mean to you and me? WE probably are broke and don't know it yet. The politicians sent to Washington and Lansing haven't gotten the voters' message. "Quit your damn bickering, posturing for next year's election and get down to the job of governing, LOGI-CALLY AND REALISTI-CALLY.

We are sick and tired of your political crap. Get to work and do the job you were elected to do.



U.S. Treasurer Withrow Explains New Rates for Savings Bonds

What is a "Treasury-based rate of interest"?

TREASURER: The interest rate for Series EE Savings Bonds purchased on or after May 1, 1995 is tied directly to

the yields of Treasury securities trading in the government securities market. And Savings Bonds have two kinds of rates?

TREASURER: Yes. Short-term Savings Bond rates apply to Bonds for the first five years. We average six-month Treasury security yields for the three months prior to the announcement dates of May 1 and November 1, then take 85% of that average. Long-term Savings Bond rates are earned on Bonds after five years. We average fiveyear Treasury security yields for the six months prior to the announcement dates, then take 85% of that average.

Where can Savings Bonds be bought?

TREASURER: You can buy Bonds through most financial institutions and employer-sponsored Payroll Savings Plans. I would recommend

asking your employer about saving with the Payroll Savings Plan if you're looking for an affordable, easy way to save money.

And for long-term rates?

TREASURER: Long-term Savings Bond rates are earned on Bonds after five years. The long-term rate is 85% of a five-year Treasury security rate. This becomes the longterm Savings Bond rate for the next six-month earning period.

How long do Savings Bonds earn interest?

TREASURER: Series EE Savings Bonds earn interest for 30 years from the issue date.

What about tax advantages?

TREASURER: The interest Savings Bonds earn is exempt from state and local income taxes, and federal income tax may be deferred until a Bond is cashed or reaches final maturity 30 years after the purchase date. And if Series EE Bonds are exchanged for Series HH Bonds, the deferral can be extended for 20 more years.

Do the new rates signify a risk to the holder's investment?

TREASURER: While we can't control what Treasury-based rates will be, Savings Bonds are guaranteed safe by the United States. This means holders will never lose their initial investment or any interest earned.

REGULAR BOARD MEETING NOVEMBER 2, 1995

The meeting was called to order at 8:00 PM by Supervisor John A. Savage. All other Board members were present. Planning Chairman Lavender, Planning Secretary Cole, Zoning Inspector Thomson and several township residents were also present.

Minutes of 10/5/95 regular meeting were read by the Clerk and approved.

Treasurer Dunny read the report of the Treasury. This report was approved by the Board. The appeal from the \$200 fee for a rescue run by Mrs. Ann Klepi was then considered by the Board. Motion made, supported, and carried the fee be waived because of the circumstances of this incident.

Trustee Feldkamp reported on the land use program he and Supervisor Savage attended at the Farm Council grounds on November 1.

Zoning Inspector Thomson reported 7 zoning compliance per-

mits issued during October, being for 3 houses, 2 barns, and 2 for miscellaneous construction. He stated there have been complaints of excavating and hauling of gravel, top soil, etc., from the Mary Marsten property which was originally a parcel from the Hi-Tech properly on M-52. Motion made, supported, and carried Thomson and Attorney Laidlaw continue whatever is necessary to stop all excavating at this site. Also attempts to get some property owners to clean up was outlined by the Zoning Inspector. Mr. Thomson advised the Township Board he wishes to resign as soon as a replacement is available. Also Sandra Thomson plans to resign as a member of the Planning Commis-

Planning Chairman Lavender reported on a complaint that was referred to the Zoning Inspector. He stated a Public Hearing was held on October 19, and a Public Hearing will be held on November 16. Both were for proposed amendments to the

NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING Bridgewater Township Planning Commission

A Public Hearing will be held on Monday, December 11, 1995 at 7:30 PM at the Bridgewater Township Hall, 10990 Clinton Road, Clinton, MI 49236.

The purpose of the Public Hearing is to receive comments on a proposed change in the Bridgewater Township Zoning Ordinance. The change is in Article 8 Conditional Uses, Section 8.08 Conditions of Approval. The proposed change is the addition of the following language:

"Unless otherwise specified in the resolution approving a conditional use permit, all permits approved after [date of approval of amendment] shall be void unless the following occur within one year of the date of the approval of a permit:

A. The applicant submits written acceptance of conditions imposed by the Planning Commission, and

B. The applicant submits evidence showing that use of the conditional use permit has commenced."



Thanksgiving travel expected to equal last year's numbers

The number of Michiganians who hit the roads and the skies during the upcoming 102-hour Thanksgiving holiday weekend will equal or slightly surpass last year's levels, according to AAA Michigan.

"Traditionally, about 20 percent of Michigan residents—or 1.8 million people—take a trip of 50 miles or more during the upcoming holiday weekend," said AAA Michigan Travel Director Bill Best. "That includes residents driving to grandmother's house up north for dinner as well as those flying home for the holiday."

Since Thanksgiving is primarily spent with family and friends, no one destination is surfacing as the only holiday "hot

spot," Best said. But airline bookings to most domestic destinations have been brisk.

"For those not visiting relatives, Florida and Caribbean bookings have been high, as they always are during the winter months," Best said. "Las Vegas is also popular destination this holiday because of the inexpensive four-day charters available."

The best airfare deals still available for Thanksgiving may be for those willing to travel during off-peak times, such as Thanksgiving Day or the day after the holiday. Travelers are urged to scan newspapers or online computer services daily for sales or airfare wars and don't forget to check with their travel agent.

Detroit Metropolitan Airport is expected to be congested during the holiday weekend, particularly on the Tuesday and Wednesday before (Nov. 21 and 22), and the following Sunday (Nov. 26). The Auto Club urges travelers to arrive at the airport at least 1 1/2 hours before their flight to find parking and check baggage. Metro Airport maintains a 24-hour parking hotline (1-800-642-1978) and offers updates on radio dial 920 AM when travelers are within three-to-four miles of the airport.

AAA Michigan also offers these tips for holiday fliers:

• Carry a photo I.D. Security has been increased at airports and passengers ages 18 and over should be prepared to present identification at the ticket counter or at the boarding jetway.

• Limit luggage to one suitcase and one carry-on bag. Do not wrap gifts until arriving at your destination, as they may be opened for inspection at the airport. Pack valuables, such as medicine and airline tickets for the return flight, in the carry-on bag.

• To avoid long check-in lines, get a boarding pass from the airline or travel agent ahead of your flight date and check luggage at the curb when you arrive at the airport.


• If picking up or dropping off someone at the airport, park in the short-term or deck lots instead of idling in front of the

terminals. Curb congestion backs up traffic and delays everyone.

Thanksgiving Day traffic will also be heavy on the roadways so the Auto Club urges motorists to leave earlier than usual for their destination. During last year's holiday weekend, 21 persons died in 19 crashes on state roads, down from 29 killed in 21 crashes in 1993. Of 17 victims with safety belts available, 12 were not buckled up and five of the deaths were alcoholrelated.

Holiday drivers will find gasoline prices lower than they were last Thanksgiving. A gallon of regular self-serve unleaded currently averages \$1.076 statewide, compared to \$1.107 last year.



Parents - Are You Energizing Yourself?

Parenting is tough job. It doesn't matter if your children are toddlers or if they are teenagers; it takes a lot of energy to do a good job of parenting. Many parents experience "burn out". What can you do to prevent this? Here are three daily activities that you should be doing to keep your energy high:

- 1. Spend time thinking every day set aside 30 minutes a day just to think. Some call it meditation, some call it quiet time, either way it is very important. This is a time without the TV and without the radio or stereo. Many people find it is worth getting up early or going to bed later to have some thinking time.
- 2. Exercise every day again set aside at least 15 minutes a day to exercise. Take a walk, climb up and down the stairs, dance to your favorite music, take an aerobic class. Exercise is a great way to counteract stress.
- 3. Keep learning spend at least 15 minutes a day learning something new. Read a book, take a class, go through some how-to tape, video or book. Your mind needs fresh and new input every day. YOU MAY LAUGH AT THIS AND SAY YOU DON'T HAVE AN HOUR A DAY TO SPEND ON YOURSELF. There are 24 hours in every day find the time. Start small if you have to; spend 15 minutes on yourself this week and add 5 minutes every week.

Next: Keep stress under control. Here is a Stress Control Test (from "Coping Resources" by Lyle Miller). The more "yes" answers, the less vulnerable you are to stress:

Yes NO I eat one hot, balanced meal per day.

Yes NO I get seven-eight hours sleep at least four days per week.

Yes NO I give and receive affection regularly

Yes NO I have at least one relative within 50 miles whom I can rely on.

Yes NO I exercise to the point of exertion about twice per week.

Yes NO I smoke less than one pack of cigarettes per day.

Yes NO I do not drink alcohol to excess.

Yes NO I am the appropriate weight for my height.

Yes NO I have an income adequate to meet basic expenses.

Yes NO I regularly attend church.

Yes NO I regularly attend club or social activities.

Yes NO I have a network of friends with whom I an acquainted.

Yes NO I have one or more friends to confide in about personal matters.

Yes NO I am in good health (including eyesight, hearing and teeth).

Yes NO I am able to speak openly about my feelings when angry or worried.





Estimate Miscellaneous Deductions Now For Big Tax Breaks Later

(Prepared by the Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants)

You may be able to deduct the cost of purchasing work uniforms, obtaining career counseling, or hiring a CPA to assist you with year-end tax planning. The Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants explains that these seemingly unrelated costs fall into the category of "miscellaneous expenses," which are deductible to the extent that they exceed 2 percent of your adjusted gross

income (AGI), provided you itemize deductions on your tax

The only way to determine whether you'll qualify for the miscellaneous-expense deduction on your 1995 tax return is to tally all qualified expenses for the year. Do it now. Here's why: If you're close to the 2-percent threshold, you can move some miscellaneous expenses into 1995 and take full advantage of the deduction. To do so, however, you need to understand what qualifies as a miscellaneous expense.

> **Employee Business Expenses**

What makes such diverse items fall into a single category is the Internal Revenue Service's (IRS) definition of "miscellaneous expenses," that is, employee costs that are "ordinary" and "necessary" to the conduct of your business. These costs include the following:

Work clothes and uniforms — The cost and upkeep of work clothes, including laundering and cleaning, are deductible if the clothing is required as a condition of your job and the clothing is not suitable for street wear or everyday use. This definition prohibits you from deducting items such as suits and jeans that you

purchased for your job.

Union and association dues— Membership fees paid to unions and professional societies directly related to your employment are generally deductible. However, you may not deduct dues paid to social or athletic clubs.

Books and publications-Uncle Sam also will help to subsidize your efforts to keep up with information in your line of work. For example, you can deduct the cost of subscriptions to trade journals, professional magazines, and research books.

Job hunting expenses — You may deduct the cost of

obtaining job counseling, preparing your resume, and traveling to and from job interviews, even if your job-hunting doesn't result in a new job. To qualify for the deduction, your job search must be limited to your current field of employment.

Educational expenses — The cost of education to maintain or improve skills required in your employment or necessary to meet the expressed requirement of your employer as a condition to retaining your job status are deductible.

Expenses Of Producing Income

Expenses incurred for the production or collection of income or management of property held for the creation of income qualifies as a deductible miscellaneous expense. Since you can control the timing of many of these costs, if you're near the 2-percent threshold, you may want to boost your expenses before the end of the year. Deductions for the following generally have been allowed:

- Safe-deposit box rentals that are used to store taxable income-producing bonds and stock certificates.
- Legal expenses incurred to help you keep your job, produce income, or deal with a
- Investment publications or software that help you track and manage your investments.
- Investment management fees.
- Travel and transportation to inspect income-producing property.
- Custodial fees for your individual retirement account and other holdings.

Tax Return Preparation And Assistance

Fees you pay for tax advice and tax-return preparation also may be deductible as miscellaneous expenses. Eligible expenses also include costs for tax-planning books and seminars, as well as fees paid to professionals to help you respond to an IRS audit.

Limitations On Your Deduction

CPAs point out that miscellaneous deductions are subiect to certain phase-out rules. All taxpayers with AGIs above \$114,700 (\$57,350 if married, filing separately), must reduce itemized deductions by 3 percent of the amount by which AGI exceeds this limit, up to 80 percent of otherwise allowable itemized deductions. Be aware, too, that excess miscellaneous itemized deductions may subject you to the Alternative Minimum Tax.







The Manchester Area Historical Society invites friends and neighbors to join us on the evening of Tuesday, November 21, 1995, at 7:30 PM in honor of the dedication of the John B. Swainson Room inside our local Blacksmith Shop Museum.

We are honored that Frank Kelley, Attorney General of the State of Michigan, will offer remarks remembering his good friend, John Swainson.

The John B. Swainson Room will be used as a small meeting room and museum to house the many artifacts of John's life as a U.S. Soldier, a Michigan Legislator, State Supreme Court Justice, Governor, and finally, a friend to Manchester.

The planning of the Swainson Room began over a vear ago, shortly after John's death. 



PARTNERS IN HEALTH

HOME HEALTHCARE PART III

This is the last of my articles on home healthcare. Once you have started care in the home you should be aware of both your rights and responsibilities. Rights are those actions or services your homecare company must provide legally. Responsibilities are those actions which you must comply with for quality care to take place. All homecare providers should explain rights and responsibilities at the opening interview and should provide a clearly written copy for you. This is your first

Patients have a right to have their property treated with respect and have a relationship with their homecare provider based on honest and ethical standards of conduct. You have the right to be informed of care that is to be furnished, the discipline of the employees furnishing the care and the frequency of visits and for this care to be furnished as prescribed by your physician. Any information about your health, social or financial circumstances, and what takes place in your home is confidential and can only be released as required by law or by authorized consent of the patient. If changes are made in this mutually agreed upon care plan, you have the right to be informed in advance. Always remember that patients or their representatives have the right of participation in the planning of care and the right of refusal of care at any time without fear of reprisal or discrimination.

Patients also have the right to receive care of the highest quality. If your first interview reveals to the Case Manager that their agency cannot meet your need they have a responsibility to care for you until an appropriate agency can be found. This issue is to insure safety for you. You have a right to be cared for only by appropriately trained individuals under supervision of a Registered Nurse or other qualified Home Health professional. you also have the right to be informed of what to do in case of an emergency.

When payment is an issue you have the right to be informed of the extent to which Medicare, Medicaid, or any other payor will cover expenses and what expenses you will be liable for. Any changes in charges should be reported to you in writing within two weeks of the company becoming aware of these changes and immediately through oral communication. You also have the right to access to all bills for services received regardless of whether they are paid out-of-pocket or by another

Lastly, you have the right to be informed of how to register complaints against your homecare company. They should provide you with a name

and number for this purpose. You have a right to know about disposition of the complaint and to voice complaints without fear of reprisal of any kind. It is also mandated that the number for the State of Michigan Hotline to receive complaints of questions about homecare be clearly furnished to each patient. That number is 1-800-882-6006. There is an answering service for complaints 24 hours a day.

Responsibilities are important because they help insure your happiness and the quality of your care. You are responsible for providing all information regarding functional limitations, illnesses past and present, hospitalizations, medications, allergies, and any other facts to the best of your ability. This includes information about any family or friends and their ability and availability to perform support services. It also includes cooperation in adding to the safety of your home and provision of needed utilities to provide adequate healthcare

Participation in and compliance with your Plan of Care is a responsibility. If you do not understand your diagnosis, treatment, alternatives, risks, of Plan of Care you should immediately inform the staff. Keep asking questions and repeating them until you feel comfortable. Some things are hard to grasp. Don't ever keep silent because you don't want to appear silly or by Tracy R. MacDonald RN

stupid. You are also expected to keep the Case Manager informed of any changes in medications, treatments, nutritional guidelines or any other changes made by your physician.

Finally, if you have any religious beliefs, ethnic customs or prejudices which might interfere with healthcare or your comfort tell your Case Manager at the first interview. They will make every effort to assign staff and devise a Plan of Care around your comfort. In addition, if you must cancel a scheduled appointment let your homecare company know in advance.

Home healthcare is a positive move toward better and less costly medical care. I believe patients can recover well in a comfortable home environment, take more responsibility for their ongoing healthcare and remain out of long term care facilities longer when appropriate home healthcare is provided. In many cases guidance can be given by the Case Manager in other community services available at little or no cost. Emotional support can be given during difficult personal and family crisis insuring a higher degree of personal dignity and comfort for the patient with long term or terminal illness. Homecare is not just for the aged or handicapped. It is for anyone with an immediate medical need. If you think you may be in need of homecare discuss this with your physician or call me with your questions at 428-1482.




