I am sending a copy of this letter to every Congress person representing my district. Hopefully there are others who feel and will do the same.







Around Town Charitable Contributions: When Giving Also Means Receiving

(Prepared by the Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants)

Charitable contributions are not only good for the soul, they also are good for the tax return. According to the Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants, charitable giving is a smart year-end tax move for individuals who itemize on their tax returns. Generally, if you make a contribution to a charity by December 31, 1995, you may deduct the amount on your 1995 tax return and thereby reduce your taxable income.

Qualified Organizations

To claim a deduction for a charitable contribution, you must contribute to a qualified organization. These include: churches; nonprofit schools, hospitals, and volunteer fire companies; veteran groups; and medical research organizations, such as the American Heart Association and the American Cancer Society.

Political contributions are non-deductible. 
Deferred Giving If you typically make large charitable contributions each year, consider establishing a charitable lead trust or a charitable remainder trust. These enable you to reduce your current taxable income and also can help you to minimize estate taxes.

In a charitable lead trust,

property is donated to a trust. creating an income interest in the property to the charitable organization for a certain number of years, or for the life of the individual(s). At the end of the term, the remaining trust assets pass back to the creator of the trust (you), or other designated noncharitable beneficiaries (your heirs).

In a charitable remainder trust, property is transferred to a trust that provides for a specified distribution, at least annually, to one or more beneficiaries (you or your heirs). REMOVAL OF SNOW AND ICE. THE OWNER OR OC-TO KEEP THE CONSTRUCTED SIDEWALKS IN FRONT OF, OR ADJACENT TO SUCH PREMISES CLEARED FROM SNOW AND ICE WHICH WILL IMPEDE PASSAGE ON SUCH SIDE

(1) EXCEPT AS PROVIDED IN SUBSECTION (3) HEREOF SNOW AND ICE SHALL BE SO REMOVED FROM SIDE NESS HOURS AFTER THE CESSATION OF ANY FALL OF SNOW, SLEET, OR FREEZING RAIN, OR BY THE BEGIN-NING OF BUSINESS HOURS OF THE NEXT DAY FOL-LOWING SUCH FALL, WHICHEVER PERIOD IS SHORTER

(2) EXCEPT AS PROVIDED IN SUBSECTIONS (3) OR (4) HEREOF, SNOW AND ICE SHALL BE SO REMOVED FROM ALL RESIDENTIAL SIDEWALKS WITHIN TWENTY-FOUR (24) HOURS AFTER THE CESSATION OF ANY FALL OF SNOW, SLEET, OR FREEZING RAIN.

(3) IN THE EVENT SNOW AND ICE ON A SIDEWALK HAS BECOME SO HARD THAT IT CANNOT BE REMOVED WITH OUT THE LIKELIHOOD OF DAMAGE TO THE SIDEWALK THE PERSON RESPONSIBLE FOR ITS REMOVAL SHALL WITHIN THE TIME REQUIREMENTS OF SUBSECTIONS (1) OR (2), HAVE ENOUGH SAND OR OTHER ABRASIVE PUT ON THE SIDEWALK TO MAKE TRAVEL THEREON REASONABLY SAFE. SNOW AND ICE SHALL THEN BE REMOVED AS SOON AS IT CAN BE ACCOMPLISHED WITHOUT THE LIKELIHOOD OF DAMAGE TO THE SIDEWALK.

(4) EXEMPTIONS. IN RESIDENTIAL DISTRICTS ONLY PERSONS WHO, FOR REASONS OF INFIRMITY, BELIEVE COMPLIANCE WITH SUBSECTIONS (2) AND (3) WOULD CAUSE UNDUE HARDSHIP, MAY FILE A REQUEST FOR APPROVE OR DISAPPROVE THE REQUEST ACCORDING TO GUIDELINES ADOPTED BY COUNCIL. IF APPROVED THE VILLAGEMAY THEN REMOVE SNOW AND ICE F RESOLUTION, BASED ON LENGTH, IN FEET, OF SIDEWALK

(5) FAILURE TO COMPLY. IF THE PERSON RESPON-SIBLE FOR THE REMOVAL OF SNOW AND ICE FAILS TO COMPLY WITH THE REQUIREMENTS OF THIS SECTION. THEN THE VILLAGE MAY REMOVE THE SNOW AND ICE, AND THE COST THEREOF MAY BE COLLECTED AS A SINGLE LOT ASSESSMENT UNDER CHAPTER 3, SECTION 1.85 OF THIS CODE. FURTHER, SUCH RESPONSIBLE PARTY SHALL BE LIABLE TO THE VILLAGE FOR ALL LOSSES TO THE VILLAGE OR RECOVERIES FROM THE VILLAGE FOR DAMAGES TO PERSON OR PROPERTY OF OTHERS CAUSED RESPONSIBLE PARTY TO BY THE FAILURE OF SUCH SO REMOVE ALL SNOW AND ICE ACCUMULATIONS IN ACCORDANCE WITH THIS SECTION.
