John B. Swainson Room Dedicated

Manchester Area Historical Society's John Schneider Blacksmith Shop now houses Swainson's home office and mementos.

Tuesday, November 21 marked the culmination of the efforts of many members, friends and family members in the dedication of The John B. Swainson Room.

Deb Havens, Historical Society President, welcomed some seventy five friends and relatives of Swainson. Rev. Dr. Vincent W. Carroll, Emanuel UCC gave the invocation.

Diane Hough, First Vice President of the Historical Society, introduced Howard Parr, Past President. Howard gave a short history of the Swainson Room. Here are Howard's comments.

"On May 13, 1994 John Swainson didn't get to the Coffee Shop in Manchester. The news that he had finished his earthly course that morning was soon spreading from patron to patron there with disbelief and sadness. After the initial shock was over, it didn't take long for the talk to turn to what he had meant to many of us and how we could memorialize him.

By the September annual meeting, President Reno Feldkamp had a plan in place. The membership present at that meeting unanimously passed a resolution which addressed the issue. The resolution was drafted by President Feldkamp and Secretary Betty Cummings and approved by Board members. John's lifelong service to this State in legislative, execu-






recounted. His deep interest in history - particularly Michigan History — was also noted. The resolution added,

'Whereas, He served the local community of Manchester as a Member of the Board of Directors and President of the Manchester Historical Society, led the effort to renovate the Blacksmith Shop, advised and helped local residents and organizations, and was a friend to all; Now, Therefore, Be it Resolved, That the Manchester Area Historical Society dedicate the meeting room in the Blacksmith Shop to the memory of John B. Swainson in recognition of his achievements and that it be known henceforth as the John B. Swainson Room...'

At the conclusion of this same meeting newly elected President Deb Havens quickly appointed a committee to plan any changes needed in the room. Serving with her on this committee were: Sandy Trolz, Tom Walton, John Hinkley and Howard Parr. Three board members were also designated to serve: Reno Feldkamp, Lou Vogel and Loring Ebersole.

At the first committee meeting, exploration of what could be done with the room to improve it was free and farranging. Various improvements were agreed upon - lighted display cases, coordinated decor, heating and air conditioning,

increased ceiling lighting, removal of wall sconce lighting, open upper shelving, removal of storage closets and use of a track mounted ladder for access to upper shelves. It became apparent that nothing less than a complete renovation would be cost-effective or feasible.

Plans were then reviewed by Alice Swainson to get further input. Contracts were awarded to the following: Norm Walz Construction, General Trades; Manchester Electric, Electrical Trades: John Steele, Mechanical Trades; Don Smith, Painting. John Hinkley agreed to coordinate the work.

What had started out as renaming the room and making minor adjustments grew into a complete renovation of the room to make it suitable for storage and preservation of any artifacts the Society might have or come into. When it became apparent that a new home was needed for many of John's things, arrangements were made to house many of them here at least on a temporary basis.

I wish to acknowledge tonight the many, many hours that have been put into implementation of this project by John Hinkley, the Architect. Alice Swainson has personally laid out every item now in the Swainson Room. Loring Ebersole, Deb Havens and

Car Strikes Manchester Hotel

On Thanksgiving Day, a vehicle occupied by a two-year-old traveled across Main Street from the Hop-In and hit the front of the Manchester Hotel Building (formerly the Black Sheep Tavern).

The father was inside the Hop-In at the time of the incident and had left the car running. The child bumped the car into gear and it drove across the street, damaging both the car and the large window at 115 E. Main.

This is the second time in less than a year when a car left idling at Hop-In has made its way out of the parking lot. Both times, fortunately, no one was injured; but this time the potential for a child's injury brings the danger more clearly into focus. The possibility exists that another time, someone walking or driving down Main Street could be seriously injured.

Please do not leave your vehicle running while unattended, even for a short time. The danger is not worth the convenience.





Everybody Wins!

Mr. John Eisley came to Manchester in August of 1995. At that time The Enterprise introduced him to the community. We went back to visit with him and find out how he likes Manchester now that he's had time to settle in, and what changes, if any, are needed.

Mr. Eisley was hired as the Athletic Director/Assistant Principal. As Athletic Director he heads all student sports. Our sports roster is full, with Varsity and Junior Varsity Football, Varsity and JV Girls Basketball, Cross Country, Freshman, Varsity and JV Boys Basketball, Varsity and JV Cheerleading, Wrestling, Varsity and JV Volleyball, Golf, Varsity and JV Softball and Baseball and Track. If this weren't enough to keep him busy, he also has duties as Assistant Principal. As such, he helps Mr. John Korican (interim High School Principal), keep track of student absences, supervises detention students, and occasionally fills in for an absent teacher. Mr Eisley likes Manchester and after talking with him, I hope he stays here for quite some

Spend some time with Mr. Eisley and you will find a man who is dedicated and enthusiastic about sports, but who also demands academic success. He believes that students who are involved in sports do better scholastically. This is backed up by statistics. "It's been proven nationally as well as here in Manchester, that 60% of students who participate in a sport carry a 3.0 grade point average or better," states Mr. Eisley. "I would like to see more students who participate in the fall sports get involved in the winter and spring sports, and continue their academic successes."

In spite of these statistics, Manchester still has quite a few athletes "doing minutes". Doing what? If a student gets a D+ or lower grade in a class, or is failing a class, school policy requires that the student serve 100 minutes with Mr. Eisley or a teacher. Currently, students serving minutes are grouped together with students serving detention. The students serving minutes are required to bring a book or assignment from the problem class.

However, are these kids really studying or are they just "putting in time?" Many be-

lieve it would make more sense if these kids were separated from detention students. Secondly, the students could be grouped together in the classes they are having trouble with. And number three, it may help each group to have a tutor help with that particular area of study.

Mr Eisley has already thought of all these things. "I need to talk to the National Honor Society to see if they would be willing to help, and I do have some phone numbers of parents in the VISA program who are willing to help. I just haven't had the time, yet." Mr. Eisley set up a similar program during his previous tenure in Pinckney, but it took him two years to get it organized. He

needs that same consideration here in Manchester.

Since it seems we have a lot of students doing minutes, perhaps something more needs to be done. Starting right at the beginning of the season, extra help needs to be given so that students don't get behind and have to do minutes. Mr. Eisley is on top of that, too. He is trying to incorporate a study session for athletes, but he cannot at this time make attendance mandatory. This would be for in-season and outof-season athletes. "For some students 100 minutes is not enough. They need to learn time management and how to study. There is no reason for a student to be ineligible, because there is help available".

There hasn't been enough time for some of the changes Mr. Eisley would like to see, but one idea has been inplemented already this fall. Students participating in sports while keeping their grade point average at 3.0 or better will receive a scholastic medal along with their certificate from the sport. Eisley believes if he expects academic excellence, then it should be rewarded.

A new idea this year which has been inspired by Eisley's creativity is a basketball scrimmage between teachers, coaches and players, as a preseason warm up taking place Monday, November 27. The basketball season will begin next Tuesday, December 5th. Basketball season will be Eisley's unofficial "inauguration" as Athletic Director, as football season was already well underway when he arrived late this summer.

It will take time to get our athletic department back to where it should be. As time goes on, academic medals will become the norm instead of for the few. Let's give Mr. Eisley the time and the support needed, so that he can institute some new ideas. Time to make these ideas work and our support as tutors or in any other capacity which can help our student athletes.

Our participation can and will make a big difference. Welcome to Manchester, Mr. Eisley and good luck for a long and productive tenure.

Our fortunes must be wrought; Thus on its sounding anvil shaped




Tuesday October 24, 1995 (draft minutes - subject to modification)

Roselle Havens, her mother, designed a master scheme for the room — with Alice's help and suggestion, of course. A careful inventory was made as furniture and materials were moved from The Hustings.

I look forward to a productive time ahead during which we learn to live with our new John B. Swainson Room. As we do this, we will also give Alice and her family time to sort out their thoughts and to make final judgements about what should best be done with the mass of materials and items left over from the life of a politician-statesman-jurist as he served his state and his home town. We are most fortunate to have a chance to help along the way.

In conclusion, I am happy to render this final report of the Swainson Room Committee. Your active participation with us was most helpful.

'Let Us Continue'."

Diane Hough presented the next speaker. "I'm pleased to introduce to you the Honorable Frank. J. Kelley, Michigan's 50th Attorney General.

Mr. Kelley was appointed Attorney General by John B. Swainson on January 2, 1962. He was elected to a full term in November of that year. He has been re-elected ten times since then, including 1994 - and as we all know, that was a very tough year for those in office - many others were shown the door! But not he. In thirty-three years as Attorney General, Mr. Kelley has become known as the advocate of all the people.

He was the first state Attorney General to create a Consumer Pro-

tection Division, an Environmental Division and a Medicaid Fraud Division. These divisions are known as some of the best and most successful in the country. Mr. Kelley has received many awards for his service on behalf of the people of Michigan, but he is remarks of Alice Swainson. special to us here in Manchester for more personal reasons.

This is not the first time Mr. Kelley has joined us in honor of a special occasion. He came here in 1987 on Michigan's 150th birthday to celebrate Heritage Day and helped us dedicate the Village

The last time Mr. Kelley came to Manchester, he delivered the eulogy at John's funeral. Tonight, he is here to help us inaugurate the John B. Swainson Room. [We] welcome someone very special to our community, the Honorable Frank J. Kelley.

Betty Cummings, Historical Society Secretary, sums up Kelley's remarks in her report to the Enterprise.

"The Honorable Frank J. Kelley...paid tribute to his friend John. He recounted how their friendship began when they met on the day that new, young lawyers were sworn in as members of the bar. At the age of 25, John had survived more adversity than most men face in a lifetime. He had been an Eagle Scout, captain of his high school football team, and war hero, losing both legs. In 1958, G. Mennen Williams selected John to be his running mate as Lt. Governor. John subsequently became Governor of the State of Michigan and during his term, he appointed Kelley as Attorney General.

John never let anything get him down. He accepted whatever happened and went on from there.

Kelly closed with a quote from Shakespeare's Caesar: He was gentle, and the elements so mixed in him that nature might stand up and say to the world, "This is a


