### MHS Students Advance to **Math Finals**



Sophomore Patrick Chapin and Senior Andre Kormendi of Manchester High School have learned that they have qualified for the second part of the 39th annual Michigan Mathematics Prize Competition sponsored by the Michigan Section of the Mathematical Association of America.


Students qualified for Part II by placing among the top 6% out of about 16,000 participants in an examination given at over

360 schools across the State of Michigan last October 11. The qualifiers competed by taking the Part II exam on December 16. The 100 students with the highest combined scores will be invited to a banquet in their honor at Grand Valley State University next March 2, and approximately the top 50 will receive college scholarships ranging in value from around \$400 to \$2,400.



# The Second Front Page Paper or Plastic?

# Is The Cashless Society Coming?

How are you paying for all those extra groceries this Christmas season? Have you ever reached the check out lane after a long day of shopping only to realize you wrote your last check at your nextto-the- last shopping stop?

You do have another couple of convenient options that were not available just a few years ago. First is the use of debit cards - where the money is deducted directly from your checking or savings account, and the use of Credit Cards is also becoming more and more popular when paying for groceries.

Manchester Market owners Jerry Dobbs and Jeff Tanner indicate that a lot of Manchester shoppers are using plastic to pay for their groceries these days. Visa and Mastercard are popular options, and ATM/debit cards are also being used more and more frequently.

"We are fully set up to handle both credit and debit -cards," said Jeff. But still sometimes a computer glitch or lack of available funds causes a card to be declined. Usually when that's the case, "They just pull out a different card and that one goes through," says Jerry. So people who use plastic for payment are utilizing several different options of their own.

Currently, only about 3 percent of the population uses debit cards, but that percentage is expected to increase greatly during the rest of the '90s, according to Debbie Barrow, Extension Home Economist for Washtenaw County.

What is a debit card? A debit card looks and acts very much like a credit card, but using it causes an immediate

transfer of funds from your account to the merchant's. It is very much like using cash, in that you are paying out money at that moment, but you use the card to debit your account instead of writing a check or paying in cash.

The merchant receives his or her money right away and the transaction costs you less than writing a check. On the other hand, your account is instantly reduced by the amount of the transaction. When you write a check, it may take several days for it to clear. When charging you have a month to pay the charge without incurring interest costs.

Many grocery stores and gas stations are offering debit card options to their regular customers. Debit cards are also being issued in many places for purchasing food and health care instead of using food stamps and Medicaid.

ID debit cards are also becoming popular. For example, on many college campuses ID debit cards can provide information for library use and check cashing. They can also changing the way we shop

store financial information. When a student buys a meal or attends a sporting event, the card is scanned and the amount is deducted from the amount the student paid at the beginning of the school year or semester.

Another type of debit card can be used to pay public transportation fares. Cards with bar codes can be used on the Washington, D.C., subway system for fares, for example. In several states, commuters who travel daily across toll bridges or on toll roads can have a bar code on their window scanned for the toll.

Prepaid telephone cards are another version of the debit card. Purchase a card and use it until the amount you paid is used up. Then you can toss the card. These are convenient for students, travelers and can be purchased almost everywhere - including the Hop•In right here in Manchester. Other phone cards are given away as promotions by companies hoping to receive your business.

Debit cards are definitely

and transact business. We probably won't have a cashless society in the near future, but we are definitely seeing a trend toward the use of much less cash.

The question "Plastic or paper" used to come from the bagger at the grocery store. Now the cashier can ask that question, too, and he or she won't be referring to how you want to take the groceries home.

In many of today's grocery stores, it's possible to put your grocery purchases on "plastic" — that is, credit cards. This raises the question of wise use of your credit cards.

It can help to remember that when you are paying off credit card bills, you are using money in the present to pay for debt in the past, leaving credit increases with age. you less money to achieve your future goals.

You can make a decision about the appropriateness of a credit card purchase by comparing the value of the item to the time it will take to pay for it. Will the value of the item last longer than it will take

you to pay for it? For example, if you buy groceries for credit, will you have them eaten before they are paid for? Compare this to a winter coat, for example, that will be used long after it is paid for.

Can you pay off your credit card debt in one year? If you can answer "yes" to both of these questions, you are probably using credit cards appropriately.

You may be tempted to use a credit card to pay for a bargain item. But if the cost of the credit cancels out the savings, you are probably not using your credit card appropriately.

Another sign of inappropriate use is using your credit card to stretch current income rather than for convenience.

Who uses credit? Use of About half of 18 to 29 year olds use credit, but nearly twothirds of 45 to 59 year olds do. Credit use also increases with education. Sixty percent of high school graduates have credit cards; 82 percent of college graduates have them.

to lose her expertise? Couldn't the school system accommodate Sheryl and allow her to take one day per week off without pay? Niedzwiecki responded, "The courses she is taking are not related to her position here, therefore she does not qualify for an education-related leave one day per week, even without pay."

Are not all education enhancement courses valuable for someone in her position? "Well, we do not allow time off unless it is directly related even if it is educationally enriching."

Her resignation adds to other positions that are still unfilled. We have been unable to hire a Librarian for the high school. This position was being covered by Coach Vitale and Mrs. Feldkamp.

Principal John Korican said there are more job openings for librarians than persons to fill them. According to Mr. Korican, "The traditional librarian we remember has changed. Today's librarians must be accomplished in computers, computer programs, Internet, CAD, DOS and all of today's technology. Being a librarian today is a demanding career."

Additionally the position of High School Principal must be filled. "The position will be posted again and the present candidates are being notified," stated Niedzwiecki. "We also have the need for a paraprofessional to assist the teachers and a half time art teacher at Klager. That position was created by board action at the last meeting."



- 11. Do better at academic subjects by listening to lectures and tapes.
- 12. Play with coins or keys in pockets.
- 13. Learn to spell better by repeating the words out loud than by writing the work on papers.
