# An Old Year, Old Friends - 1995 New Year, New Beginnings - 1996

#### 1995 - The Year in Review

January 5, 1995: Russell Wolff, Manchester resident, received his WWII medals, 50 years after leaving the service, thanks to the efforts of his son Delruss and the intervention of Sen. Don Riegle.

A story begun so long ago was completed the last day of 1994...Seven Manchester men went to war. Six of them served in the Battle of the Bulge, and all returned safely. And 50 years later, one of those veterans received seven medals, including the distinguished Bronze Star for heroic and meritorious achievement.

January 19, 1995: New tanks, pumps and canopy bring the business back to Wackers in Sharon Township. Although the canopy is the most visible evidence of the month of work which preceded the opening, "the most important part is buried underground," according to George Wacker.

February 23,1995: President's Day was a special day at Klager Elementary School this year! The entire 300+ Klager Kids gathered in the gym to be featured on Young Country Radio saying the Pledge of Allegiance.

The next day, Mrs. Janice Little's class was featured saying the Pledge. Ryan Beagle led the group, dressed in red, white and blue and wearing a George Washington wig!

March 19, 1995: The Manchester Mill Run returns after a long hiatus. Thanks to the efforts of councilman Chris Brooks, and run in memory of Elvin Johnson, Manchester once again hosted a competitive race. The chilly early-spring weather did not discourage

the hard-core runners from participating in the run, and many non-competitive runners and walkers also participated. Hopefully this will once again become an annual event in Manchester.

May 18, 1995: The Ride Safe program was kicked off at Klager School by Brian and Dana Zink, concerned parents and health care professionals. In an effort to make sure that all Klager Kids were protected by bicycle helmets, the Zinks applied for and received a grant which enabled the Kids to purchase helmets at a reasonable cost. Many Klager Kids took advantage of this offer and rode their bikes safer this summer, thanks to the Zinks.

May 25, 1995: New Faces at Walco Foods - oops, that's Walco Foods No More! The name of our local grocery store changed to Manchester Market this spring and more changes have been taking place ever since. Fresh coats of paint and wax, and a general scrub-down have resulted in a more pleasant shopping site in Manchester - A true gift to the community.

June 1, 1995: The First Annual 24-Hour Relay Challenge raised over \$2,500 to support D.A.R.E. and other prevention programs in the Manchester Community Schools. Plans are currently underway to make the 1996 Relay bigger and better! Over 200 community members participated in this special event last year, as members of a team or as one of the multitude of volunteers, and a drugfree community was formed for 22 hours

June 28, 1995: Governor Engler visited Manchester to help dedicate the new Johnson Controls' Research and Development Center. "A few weeks early for the Chicken Broil," as he noted in his brief remarks at the opening ceremony, he still was impressed by our community and what a great place it is to live and work here. But we already knew that, didn't we?

July 11, 1995: Jennifer Brushaber, representing the class of 1996 is crowned the 1995 Manchester Community Fair Queen. The Fair, of course, is just one fraction of Manchester's Busiest Month, July. The Fireworks in Carr Park, the Chicken Broil, and the Summer Festival are all great additions to the summer line-up and certainly make that busy month live up to it's reputation.

July 20, 1995: 'Rained on but not rained out," was this year's Chicken Broil Theme. Although the clouds were out in force, the crowds were out as well, and neither

Eisley and Korican have worked hard together over the past four months to strengthen the high school's programs.

September 4, 1995: Many Manchester residents made the trip to the Straits of Mackinac in order to make the bridge crossing on foot (or by motorized wheelchair, as the case may be). Ambrose Lentz was one of the latter, and Gerald Grossman one of the former. Grossman got up early for an opportunity to walk along with Gov. John Engler and his family.

October 12, 1995: A Bed and Breakfast is planned for Manchester Township. The Sharon House of Manchester Bed and Breakfast will be opening in the new year, out at the Heimerdinger farm house on Sharon Hollow Road.

October 26, 1995: The 1995 Manchester Flying Dutchmen Football Team is well on their way to a winning season with a shut out of the Grass Lake Warriors. After a surprise beginning when Clinton came on strong and defeated the Dutch, the remainder of the regular season was victorious. The crossover games were a disappointment, but look out for next year's Dutchmen! We hear they are a force to be reckoned with.

November 21, 1995: The John Swainson Room was dedicated by the Historical Society and the arrival of another Michigan notable in Manchester was welcomed as Attorney General Frank Kelley came to deliver the keynote address at the dedication. 




ABOVE: The Swainson Room was completed and dedicated this fall providing the Historical Society with a museum-quality area for exhibits and storage

December 18,1995 Dear Editor,

I am an easy going, flexible guy who very rarely gets shook up. I have never written a letter to a Congress person or for that matter to an editor. But right now I am not only shook up, I am down right angry. I am angry at the members of the United States Congress. They have shut the government down again. I was perturbed by the first shut down when Congress closed down portions of the government including the bus tour of the NASA Space Museum in Huntsville, Alabama, when Judy and I visited there on our vacation. We asked for a discount for the bus tour we could not get but we still had to pay the full admission price. We also met two young men from the Netherlands who were sight seeing in our country. We had to explain to them why they could not get into our national parks. It was rather embarrassing telling them what was really happening.

Both the Republicans and Democrats knew the shut down deadline well in advance. They finally funded the government until December 15, 1995, but no negotiations took place causing this second shut down. If my employer gave me a deadline to meet and Irefused to take any action to meet it, I would be fired. Here we have grown men and women we elected to represent us and make decisions refusing to talk to others to keep the government operational. Their decision not to take any action has caused other government workers to have payless paydays and much consternation. This latter group consists of working people who deal with the every day public and who are generally on the lower level of pay and who need that income. Congress people don't have to worrytheir salaries still keep coming in.

I am now of the belief that any time Congress - and to me that includes the President, Vice President, Senators. Representative, Secretaries of State, etc. and their staffs - shuts down the government which causes other government employees to have payless paydays, they should have all of their pay and staff operating monies stopped also until the government is back to normal operating activities.

I cannot stop Congress' pay and operational monies but as of now, I will not contribute one penny (or any other figure) to the Republican or Democratic party. I will not contribute to the campaign coffers of any incumbent' senator or representative seeking re-election in 1996 nor will I vote for any of them in the coming election.

I am sending a copy of this letter to every Congress person representing my district. Hopefully there are others who feel and will do the same.

The minutes of the November 20, 1995 regular meeting were approved as presented on a motion by Marshall, support by Conaway. Vote: Ayes-all.

The proceedings of the November 20, 1995 regular meeting were approved as presented on a motion by Conaway, support by Marshall. Vote: Ayes-all.

The Agenda was approved as amended on a motion by Schaffer, support by Vought. Vote: Ayes-all.

Motion by Brooks, support by Schaffer to accept the Treasurer's Report for November, 1995 as presented. Vote: Ayes-all.

Motion by Schaffer, support by Brooks to approve the payables for November, 1995 in the amount of \$40,846.98. Roll Call Vote: Ayes-all.

Motion by Vought, support by Brooks to accept the Sheriff Report for October, 1995 as presented. Vote: Ayes-all.

EMPLOYEE RETIREMENT AGENT CHANGE - Motion by Schaffer, support by Vought to appoint Joseph F. Conn, Agent #0016-00670 as Agent of Record for the Village of Manchester pension plan. Vote: Ayes-all. This will not change the pension plan with Principal at all but will provide employees with a yearly visit from the agent.

VILLAGE ASSESSOR - Council discussed putting a change to the village charter on the March ballot to do away with the Village Assessor position. The position is now basically handled through the township assessor.

<u>DPW REPORT</u> - Motion by Brooks, support by Marshall to allocate \$1500 for a new floor for the 1978 dump truck per the quote from Koebbe Welding, if Gary knows that there is money in the fund to pay for this. Discussion was held on having Gary handle the DPW budget and keeping the Committee informed instead of the manager doing it. Roll Call Vote: Ayes-all.

LEAF AND BRUSH PICKUP - Council asked DPW to continue picking up the leaves and brush that residents have piled on the roadsides even though the notices had the end of November as the deadline.

TREE BOARD - Motion by Conaway, support by Vought to authorize up to \$4500 to be spent on trimming and/or removal this fiscal year by the Tree Board. Roll Call Vote: Ayes-all.

Motion by Becktel, support by Marshall to approve the Sheriff Contract for the contract year 1996 with the present Letter of Agreement, reviewing the Letter of Agreement after the first of the year, in the amount of \$259,060 for four full-time deputies with a staff sergeant in place. Roll Call Vote: Ayes-all.

MEETING DATE FOR 1st MEETING IN JANUARY - Motion by Becktel, support by Marshall to change the 1st meeting in 1996 from January 1st to Tuesday, January 2nd at 7:00 PM. Vote: Ayes-all.

# PROPOSED SYNOPSIS Regular Meeting Manchester Township Board

Monday, December 11, 1995:

The meeting was called to order at 8:01 PM with all board members present. Minutes from the Board's last meeting, held November 13, 1995, were approved. Minutes from the planning commission, library board, and River Raisin Watershed Council were accepted.

Approval was given for bills that have been paid, and for payment of outstanding bills totaling \$4093.01. The Treasurer's report was accepted.

Action on the zoning violation appeal of Brian Calloway was tabled until next month.

Fire Department activity for the month included 2 fires,

14 medical runs, 13 personal injury, and 3 miscellaneous runs, for a total of 32 runs. Chief Wiedmayer reported that, with monies received from public donations and memorials, the Firefighters Association has purchased a carbon monoxide detector and presented it to the township. Several firefighters will be taking ice rescue training in January.

The Supervisor, Planning Commission, and Recycling reports were accepted. Constable activity for the month included 16 complaints written, many deer hunter checkings, 9 investigations through the Michigan State Police, and attendance of a

police seminar. As zoning administrator, Mr. Moore's report included 1 new residence, 15 property re-inspections, 1 private road inspection, and 1 zoning violation.

Approval was given for purchase of a computer from Woodbrook Enterprises, and for replacement of a monitor on one computer currently in the township office.

The Supervisor was authorized to sign the Washtenaw Central Dispatch Authority's 1996 contract for dispatching services at \$296.15 per month.

Correspondence required no action from the Board. There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 9:52 PM.



# **Around Town Charitable Contributions: When Giving**

Also Means Receiving

(Prepared by the Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants)

Charitable contributions are not only good for the soul, they also are good for the tax return. According to the Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants, charitable giving is a smart year-end tax move for individuals who itemize on their tax returns. Generally, if you make a contribution to a charity by December 31, 1995, you may deduct the amount on your 1995 tax return and thereby reduce your taxable income.

#### Qualified Organizations

To claim a deduction for. a charitable contribution, you must contribute to a qualified organization. These include: churches; nonprofit schools, hospitals, and volunteer fire companies; veteran groups; and medical research organizations, such as the American Heart Association and the American Cancer Society.

Political contributions are non-deductible. Generally, dues for a fraternal lodge, and contributions to lobbying groups (such as Clean Water Action and the Sierra Club) cannot be claimed as charitable deductions. For a complete listing of qualified charitable organizations, see Internal Revenue Service (IRS) Publication 78, Cumulative List of Organizations.

# Types Of Contribu-

You need not limit your charitable contributions to cash. The rules give you the option of making various types of contributions. These can include furniture, clothing, computer and other equipment, and even an old car. When you donate property, the amount of the deduction is generally equal to the current fair-market value of the donated property at the date of the contribution, not its original cost.

Limits On Contribu-

Generally, you can deduct cash contributions equal to 50 percent of your adjusted gross income (AGI). Any excess can be carried forward for up to five years. Contributions of appreciated capital gain property, such as securities or works of art, are generally limited to 30 percent of AGI.

#### Record Keeping Is Critical

For any contribution of \$250 or more, you must have a receipt, letter, or other statement from the charitable organization listing the amount of the cash donation, or, for contributed property, a description — but not necessarily the value — of any property donated. In addition, the receipt must state whether or not the charity provided any goods or services in exchange for the cash or property. Where a charitable organization provides goods or services in exchange for contributions over \$75, the organization must provide the donor with a goodfaith estimate of the value of the goods or services provided.

For non-cash contributions over \$500, you must complete Form 8283 and attach it to your return. If the non-cash contribution exceeds \$5,000 (\$10,000 for gifts of closely held stock), you also may have to obtain and attach a written appraisal. A summary of the appraisal should be attached to the tax return to substantiate the deduction. (Additional requirements apply to contributions of art, if you are claiming a deduction of \$20,000 or more.) There is no appraisal requirement for publicly traded securities for which a market quota is readily available on an established securities market.

#### **Deferred Giving**

large charitable contributions each year, consider establishing a charitable lead trust or a charitable remainder trust. These enable you to reduce your current taxable income and also can help you to minimize estate taxes.

In a charitable lead trust,

property is donated to a trust, creating an income interest in the property to the charitable organization for a certain number of years, or for the life of the individual(s). At the end of the term, the remaining trust assets pass back to the creator of the trust (you), or other designated noncharitable beneficiaries (your

In a charitable remainder trust, property is transferred to a trust that provides for a specified distribution, at least annually, to one or more beneficiaries (you or your heirs). The distribution may be for life, or a term of years. At the end of the term, the remaining assets pass to a charity.

SNOW AND ICE SHALL BE SO REMOVED FROM SIDE-WALKS IN ALL BUSINESS DISTRICTS BY FOUR (4) BUSI-NESS HOURS AFTER THE CESSATION OF ANY FALL OF SNOW, SLEET, OR FREEZING RAIN, OR BY THE BEGIN-NING OF BUSINESS HOURS OF THE NEXT DAY FOL-LOWING SUCH FALL, WHICHEVER PERIOD IS SHORTER.
