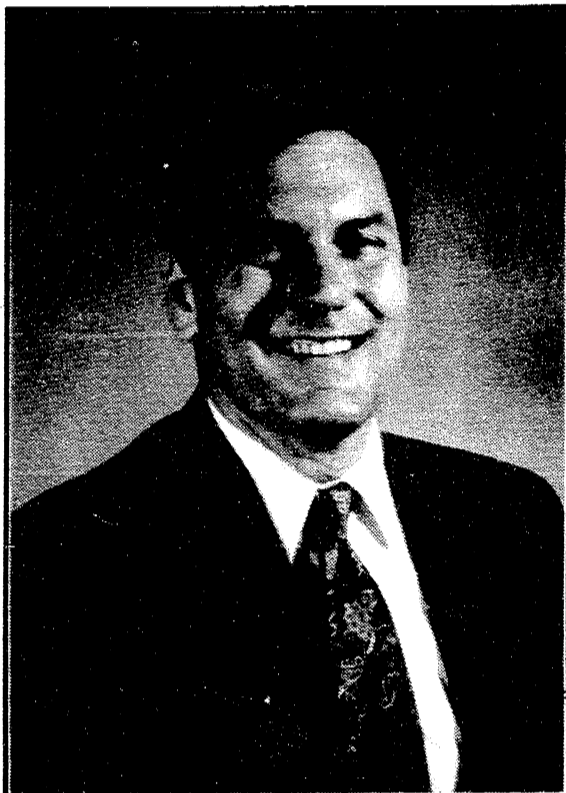

to excellence in academics; as a former coach, he also appreciates Manchester's tradition of athletic achievement.

"Having had the opportunity to teach in two totally different areas of the country I will be able to adopt some of the best practices from both to everyone's advantage," Smith commented. "Since Manchester High School

isn't broken to begin with, there isn't anything to 'fix.' And I have the unique opportunity to follow in the footsteps of a fine individual, John Korican, who has continued many of the fine traditions that have been mandated by the community."

Smith intends to meet both one on one and in small groups with staff, teachers, and community members to get acquainted. This, he believes, will help the school to begin to "act on our belief system, adapt our mission statement, and provide an opportunity to prepare our students for life in the global community."

Smith has a daughter, Becky, who is 19 and has been attending Georgia College. Jeremy, 16, will be a junior in Manchester, and placed fourth in Georgia in wrestling last year. Anthony is 13 and will be in 8th grade this fall. Anthony's favorite sport is baseball but also has dabbled in wrestling and basketball. Anthony and Jeremy arrived in Michigan with their dad, and wife Kathy is packing things up in Georgia.

What attracted Smith to Manchester in the first place? "It is a school with good traditions - curriculum, athletics, a good educational program - so when the opportunity to return home to Michigan arose, I jumped at it." The family had hoped to be able to return to Michigan and they look forward to enjoying four seasons' worth of activities, especially cross country skiing, once more.

"I am looking forward to participating in all the summer

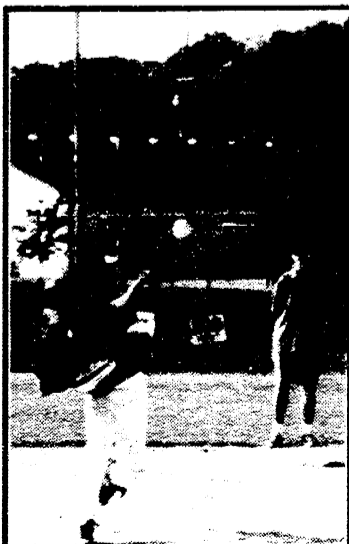

His goals for his tenure in Manchester are simple. "First of all, I am committed to maintaining the tradition of high academic achievement. I will work hard to establish an atmosphere conducive to learning." He also plans to attend all extra-curricular activities that he can, in part to get acquainted but also to learn more about community and school traditions, and to support all the students in their endeavors.

Smith's philosophy of education is also simple. "I want to prepare all of our children for a future we will not see. Prepare them with a lifelong love of learning, and for living in the 'global village.' By talking with people to assess the values and needs of this community, we can then set goals of improvement for our school system."

Dedicated to his own fitness, Smith enjoys running three miles as part of his daily regimen. "I believe you have to throw challenges at yourself, and that's part of my challenge." An additional challenge will be in his new position as MHS' principal, and keeping up with his sons' progress as they change schools mid-stream.

Smith exudes warmth and friendliness and his personal style should fit in well with easy-going Manchester folk. He's anxious to meet the community, so if you have a moment, stop in and introduce yourself, and welcome him to our school. -MJC

New Fire Truck Arrives!

(Almost) Ready to Respond

If you're reading this paper Wednesday afternoon, you will probably already have heard the ruckus created when the Manchester Township Fire Department brought their new 7-1 Engine into town. Chief Gary Wiedmayer learned late last week that the Department's new truck would be available on July 1st.

So Gary, Dave Jose, and Bob Blumenauer will be making the 620-mile trip to Pennsylvania to pick up this exciting new purchase. The 1995 KME Pumper Engine, built to Manchester's exact specifications, is being financed by the millage passed two years ago by the Township for fire equipment. The total cost of \$194,000 will be covered by the millage.

"We've already traveled two times to Pennsylvania," to visit the truck, indicates Wiedmayer. "The first time was for a blueprint pre-inspection." More recently they had another visit to inspect the actual truck. "We especially wanted it here for the Fair Parade," he explained. So the entire community will have the opportunity to view this new truck on July 9th - if they didn't already catch the sneak preview when the truck tools into town on Wednesday.

After it's first "public viewing," the truck will return to Detroit for mounting the generators. And then on August 4th, 5th, and 6th, it will make a special trip to the Chief's Show in Lansing. "KME donated \$2000 worth of equipment on this truck, to use it at a show." This state-of-the-art engine will become Manchester's first response vehicle once it is placed into service.

Wiedmayer indicated that KME is "a really good outfit. They built the truck from start to finish." Previous trucks have been ordered from more than one company and the work was parceled out accordingly.

The five person cab is a four-door, which has a chief's and an officer's seat in front and four seats complete with built-in air packs in the back. This will have more firefighters available as first responders for PI accidents and fires. With the air packs already in place the firefighters will be ready to go more quickly.

Another unique feature of the truck is that it will come equipped for foam application on chemical fires.

The truck will travel at a top speed of 62 miles per hour. "We debated on how fast the engine should be timed," explained Wiedmayer. "The officers felt

that it doesn't need to go any faster than this. It is better to get safely to our destination than to travel too fast."

This truck has been needed for some time now, according to Wiedmayer. The truck that is being replaced is a 1996 Ford, which the township will be putting out for bids.

"I can't wait to see it completed," said Wiedmayer. Indeed, it must seem like Christmas to the entire Fire Department to have this long-planned for and eagerly-awaited vehicle almost here. Seeing it so close to completion a few weeks ago has just made them more eager for it to arrive.

The design of the truck is different than our current, more traditional engines and our old-fashioned pumper truck.

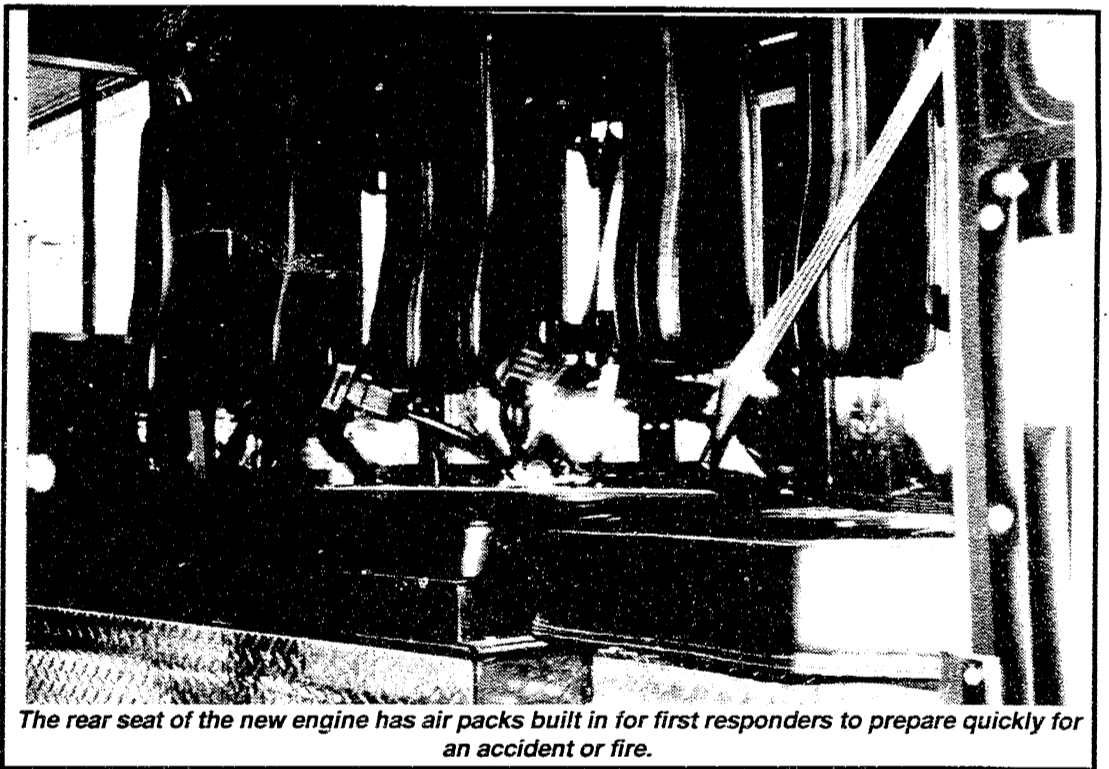
The fancy gadgets may seem superfluous but the thirty-year old trucks probably seemed pretty fancy themselves once upon a time. "We can reasonably expect this truck to take the department another 30 years," Wiedmayer acknowledged. Current and anticipated growth in the community will create a need for growth in the fire department as well over the next several years. "We don't want to have to do this over again any time soon," said Wiedmayer.

So watch for the new pumper engine to lead the parade next Tuesday. Or stop down to see it all shiny new at the Fire Station over the weekend. I suspect you will find plenty of avid firemen who will be happy to show off their new red truck.

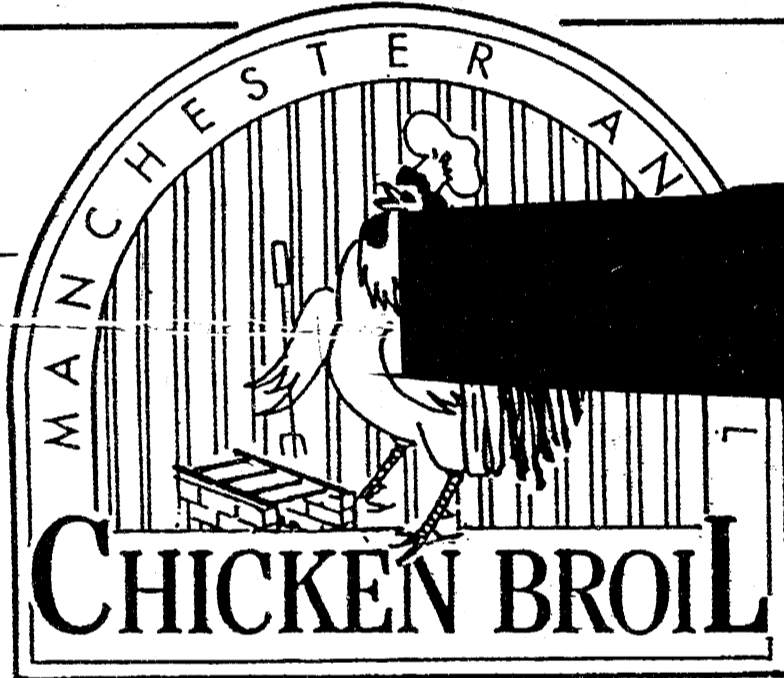

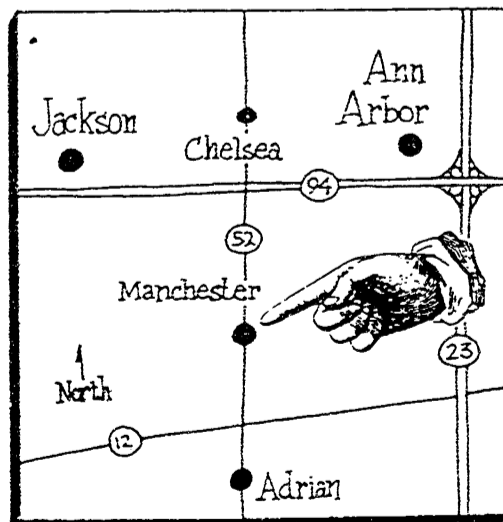

With all its sham, drudgery and broken dreams, it is still a beautiful world.

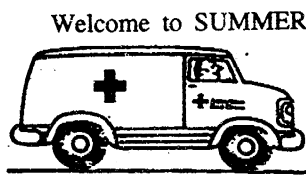

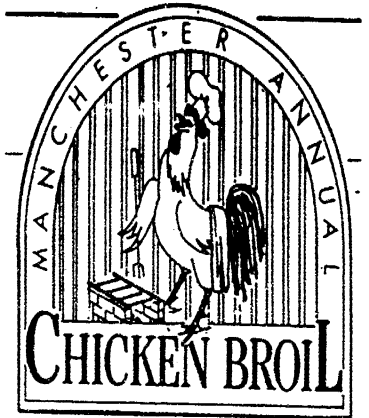

It's Coming!!

Who ever Thought a chicken could do all That?

What do the shelves in the Manchester Township Library have in common with the roof of the Blacksmith Shop?

How does the fence around our high school athletic field have anything to do with the Lifeline program, which allows those stricken with sudden illness to get help at the touch of a button?

Give up? Here are a few more hints—the press box at the athletic field, ball diamonds in the parks.

Okay. The final clue and real clincher if you haven't guessed yet—Chi Bro park.

And what they all have in common is chicken.

Profits from Manchester's annual Charcoal Chicken Broil have funded all these projects and more over the years. Thousands of chickens roasted over charcoal and basted with butter, served with Manchester's special recipe cole slaw, potato chips and radishes have brought Manchester not only a reputation for great food but a reputation for community service and small-town hospitality that is

unrivaled.

As the community has gained, so have its members, in sharing community spirit with friends and co-workers while grating cabbage, spraying butter, mixing slaw, turning chickens and serving their neighbors as well as the thousands who come from as far away as Europe for the feast.

There are others who have benefited from the Chicken Broil in more indirect ways. This writer is among those and would like to share a story with you.

In the early 1980s, I was a frustrated journalist looking for a way to earn money by writing. I jumped at the chance to write for the Jackson Citizen Patriot as a stringer (someone who writes about local events and submits them for publication). Stringers usually get paid by the column inch. My rate was a whopping one dollar per inch, and the upcoming Broil promised a minimum of 20 inches of copy, but more than that, it meant I would be a published writer.

That Chicken Broil was my first story for the Cit Pat and my

assignment was to cover the event and all the people who were coming, including the governor of the state, who was reportedly flying in from Lansing by helicopter to attend the event.

I interviewed lots of people standing in line, talked with a few of the workers who kindly stopped just long enough to answer my questions and then returned to the real business of feeding thousands of hungry people.

It was hot and sticky, and threats of a storm soon became reality as the sky clouded over and drops of rain began to fall. The sound of sizzling chickens turned to the sound of steam rising from hot charcoal as the rain turned to a downpour and reports of tornadoes in the area were circulated. Thunder and lightning and high winds turned the event to a dripping disappointment as hungry visitors were turned away, the governor's flight was grounded and electric power to the entire village was cut off by downed trees and wires and blown transformers.

Wet notebook in hand, I walked home in skirts that wrapped wetly around my legs, notebook sodden and less than legible. Leaving it to dry, I lit candles and fed the family soup heated on a camp stove. In the aftermath, everyone went to bed exhausted but somewhat cooler in the breeze that followed the storm.

And then it was time to write the story that I would sell. No governor, lots of rain, no chicken, wet notes . . . and no light to write by.

But I did write it, by candlelight and on a manual typewriter. It ran the next day and was the beginning of my writing career.

Thirteen years later, I am editor of a weekly newspaper on the University of Michigan campus, and have been writing since that stormy July day. My stories have been published in newspapers across the country and my career is far from over.

But it began that day of soggy chicken and candlelight and a manual typewriter on my kitchen table, writing about the Chicken Broil that wasn't.

For that and much more, I owe thanks to the Chicken Broil and to all the people who make it happen each year. You were there in the beginning and you will always hold a place in my heart and my memory.

Each year, as my small contribution to this annual event, I owe Dave Little a story that we hope will remind you to save the third Thursday in July, July 18 this year, to come out and join in the fun and feast.

Do you have a story about the Chicken Broil? Did you ever find anything unusual there, or by chance meet a friend or relative you hadn't seen in years? Do you know someone who has worked at the same Chicken Broil chore for years and years and wouldn't think of doing anything else?

If so, send your stories or ideas to Chicken Broil, c/o The Manchester Enterprise. Maybe this will be a beginning for you, too!

I hate to take the 'glow' off the Fourth fun, but once again feel it's time to warn about fireworks injuries. As a child, I was severely burned by sparklers and this looks like such innocent fun. We had long metal ones in the thirties and they burned hot. Did you know that they burn at a temperature hot enough to melt gold - 1800°F? More than 800 pre-schoolers are injured each year by sparklers and they are the second-highest cause of fireworks injuries requiring hospitalization. This information was presented by our down home Advance-Reporter by Williams County Farm Bureau.

The article goes on with...Gunpowder is a major ingredient in most types of fireworks. Class C fireworks (for example, firecrackers) contain up to 50 mg. of gunpowder. Men and boys are the most common users of fireworks; four out of every five injuries happen to males. Nearly 40 percent of fireworks injuries are to bystanders (as with me at that time).

Bottle rockets are among the most dangerous fireworks available today. They account for the majority of all injuries that lead to permanent eye damage. Bottle rockets can move as fast as 200 miles per hour, explode in midair and fly in any direction. Most of these injuries occur to children, with the 10 to 14 year age group having the highest risk. Body parts most frequently injured are the eyes, face, ears (usually perforated

eardrums), hands and fingers. So, be careful, have fun, but let's leave the 'shooting off' to the professional Fire Department guys who know what they are doing!

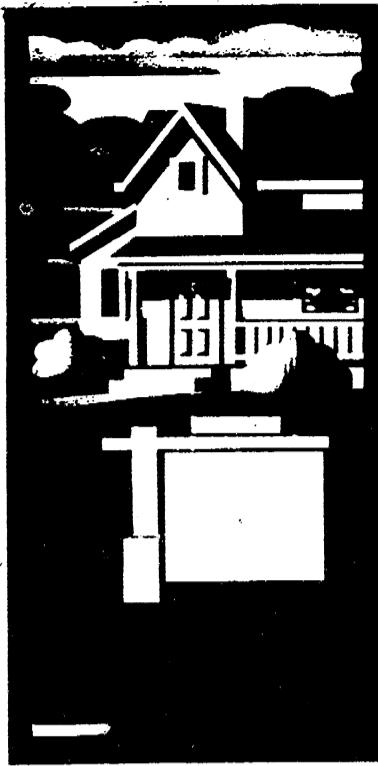

Local Students Attend Citizenship Seminar

Two students from Washtenaw County, Laura Klager of Saline and Marie Haeussler of Manchester, attended the annual Michigan Farm Bureau Young People's Citizenship Seminar, representing local Farm Bureaus. The seminar was held June 17-21 at Alma College.

Nearly 250 of the state's top high school juniors and seniors from across the state were selected to attend the nation's premier citizenship program. The students heard dynamic speakers, participated in programs and activities designed to encourage participation in the political process, and conducted their own campaigns for a variety of pretend political offices.

During the week-long seminar, students had the opportunity to participate as voters, campaigners, precinct delegates and candidates in a mock election process for political office. Experts in the fields of economics, world cultures and governments, and personal motivation provided background to the students on their role as citizens of the United States and the world.

In writing of her experience, Marie said, "The purpose of this camp was to better inform juniors and seniors about how the government works. We were divided up into Federalist, Individualist, and Populist parties. Each of these parties elected officials to run for office.

"We had heated debates on where we stood regarding three proposals: Proposal A, 'Should warrants be required to search for weapons or drugs in Michigan's Schools?' The majority vote said no. Proposal B, 'Should it be legal for physicians to assist terminally ill patients with suicide?' The majority vote said yes. Proposal C, 'Should Michigan reinstate the death penalty for persons convicted of first degree murder?' The majority said yes on this issue also.

"We voted on all of these issues using real voting machines."

Speakers at the Young People's Citizenship Seminar were: Luther Ellis, Detroit Lions Defensive End; Vic Verchereau, motivational speaker; Robert Rowland, director, Enterprise Square USA; Fred Honerkamp, Vietnam veteran; Maxine Hankins-Cain, teacher, Lansing Public Schools; Kathy Hughes, professional triathlete; Rep. Mike Goschka, member, Michigan House of Representatives; and Sen. Bill Schutte, member, Michigan Senate. Marie noted, "The motivational speakers were all exceptionally good." She especially enjoyed Kathy Hughes and Luther Ellis.

"There was also a formal banquet and cocktail party. Everyone participated in a talent show," Marie wrote. "Through this experience I have met many new friends and learned many new things which I would never have learned otherwise."

Some past seminar participants have gone on to political careers. For example, state Senate Majority Leader Dick Posthumus is a graduate of the seminar.

"I would like to thank the Washtenaw County Farm Bureau for sponsoring my trip," concludes Marie.

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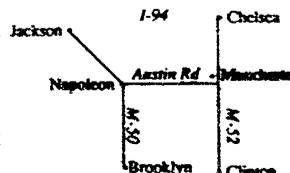

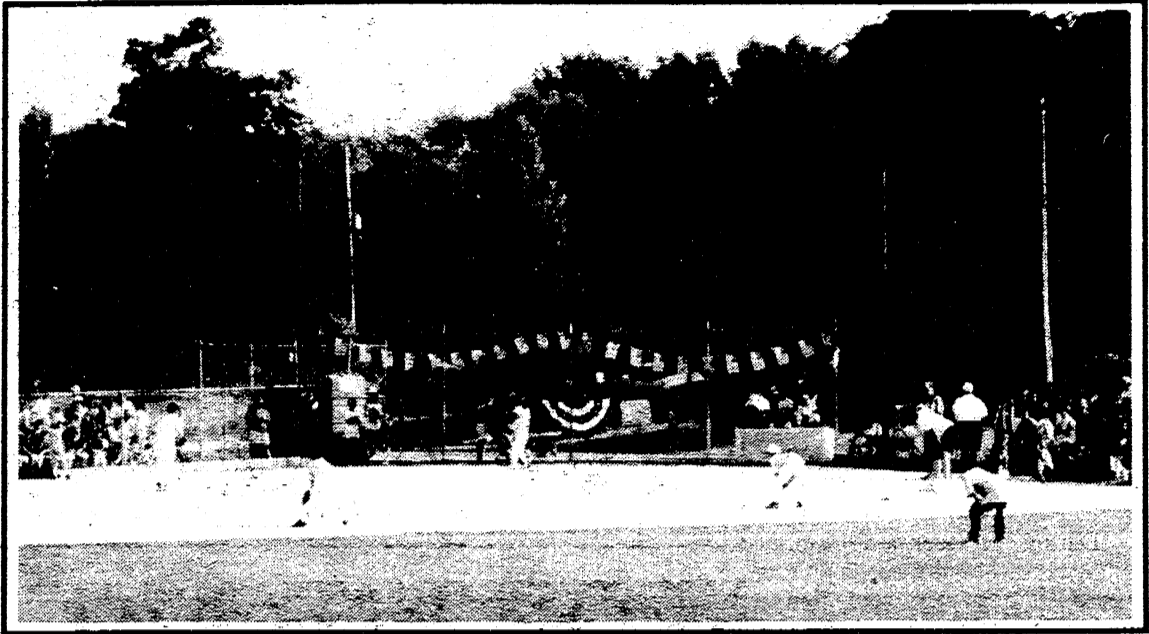

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**Fireworks Law
Enforcement Guide**

Fireworks means a device made from explosive or flammable compositions used primarily for the purpose of producing a visible display or audible effect, or both, by combustion, deflagration, or detonation.

It is illegal to sell, possess, transport, or use fireworks in Michigan without a permit. Exceptions are listed below.

LEGAL FIREWORKS (NO PERMIT REQUIRED)

- * Flat paper caps
- * Toy trick noise makers (party poppers, pop-its, fun snaps, toy pistols using flat paper caps, etc.)
- * Sparklers
- * Flitter Sparklers (a narrow paper tube attached to a thin wooden handle producing a shower of sparks)
- * Fountains that are cone shaped or cylindrical shaped that emit a shower of sparks and sometimes a whistle effect
- * Toy Snakes (a pressed pellet that produces a large snake-like ash upon burning)
- * Toy Smoke Devices (smoke bombs, smoke pots, smoke grenades, smoke balls, etc. that produce white or colored smoke)
- * Signal flares, blank cartridges or blank cartridge pistols, and railroad emergency signal devices
- * The sale of fireworks provided they are to be shipped directly out of state. (Dealers selling fireworks in Michigan using signed statements that the purchaser will use the fireworks out of state is prohibited!)

Fireworks which do not fit among the above exceptions are illegal for sale, use, or transportation without a permit. Violators are guilty of a misdemeanor (Cite MCL 750.243a).

Helpful Hint: If it makes a loud bang or leaves the ground, it is illegal.

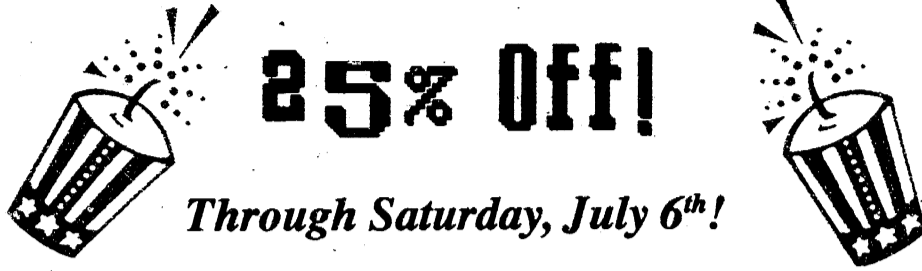
