## Lucille Bruner Honored for Girl Scouting

Lucille Bruner of Manchester is one of many area residents honored for their contributions to Huron Valley Girl Scout Council. Lucille is one of five women who received the Honor Pin at the Council's annual Volunteer Recognition Awards ceremony, April 22, 1999, at the Sheraton Inn, Ann Arbor.

Candidates for the Girl Scout Honor Pin are registered adult Girl Scouts who, over a period of time, have provided outstanding service that furthers the Council's goals and is delivered to two or more geographic areas or program delivery units.

Manchester's Lucille Bruner received the Honor Pin in recognition of her many years of service. A Girl Scout for 19 years, "Lucille is aware of the importance of volunteer recognition and always sees to it that the volunteers in the area receive the recognition they deserve," says Girl Scout Sharon Haeussler. "Her lon-

gevity has kept Girl Scouting stable in Manchester. Knowing the history of the service unit keeps Girl Scouting moving forward rather than starting from the beginning every few years."

Almost an entire generation of Manchester Girl Scouts have prospered under Lucille's guidance. The stability she has provided to the scouting program over the 15 or so years she has served the Manchester cluster of scouts, has enabled the group to grow substantially over the years. Lucille recalled that the first Girl Scout round up she held in Manchester had only a handful in attendance. This year, there were over 50 new

girls interested in scouting! The program is growing substantially and welcomes new Leaders and other interested volunteers.

The United Way supports Girl Scouting through community collaboration and funding. The contributions of the seven United Ways in the Council's service area were also recognized at the event for the support they provide for each community and more especially Huron Valley Girl Scout Council.

The Huron Valley Girl Scout Council serves more than 15,000 girls in Washtenaw, Livingston, and Monroe Counties, and in parts of Oakland and Wayne Counties.

## Board Shortens School Year

### Track Expenditures also Authorized

At a special meeting of the Manchester Community Schools Board of Education on May 3, the 1998-99 School Year calendar was adapted to meet the required number of instructional hours and days required by the state of Michigan.

A resolution stating that the Board exercises the option permitted by Section 1284 of the Revised School Code, established a school calendar for all schools in this district that ensures for the 1998-99 school year at least 180 days and 1047 hours of student instruction. This resolution will allow the last day of school to be Friday, June 18 instead of Monday, June 21 as originally scheduled.

Friday, June 18 will be the last day of school for students and teachers. It will be scheduled as a half-day

for students and a full day for teachers.

If an emergency occurs where the start of the school day is delayed or school is dismissed early, the following adjustments will be made:

- 1) Time will be added to the school day on June 18.
- 2) If time needed is greater than three hours, additional minutes (no more than ten per day) will be added to the remaining days of the school year.
- 3) If that is still insufficient to meet the required number of instructional hours, school will be held on Monday, June 21.

In other action, the Board heard a report on modifications to the track and authorized a maximum of \$140,000 to maintain and renovate the existing six lanes of track and amenities.

### A Mom Provides Calm for Calamity Jane

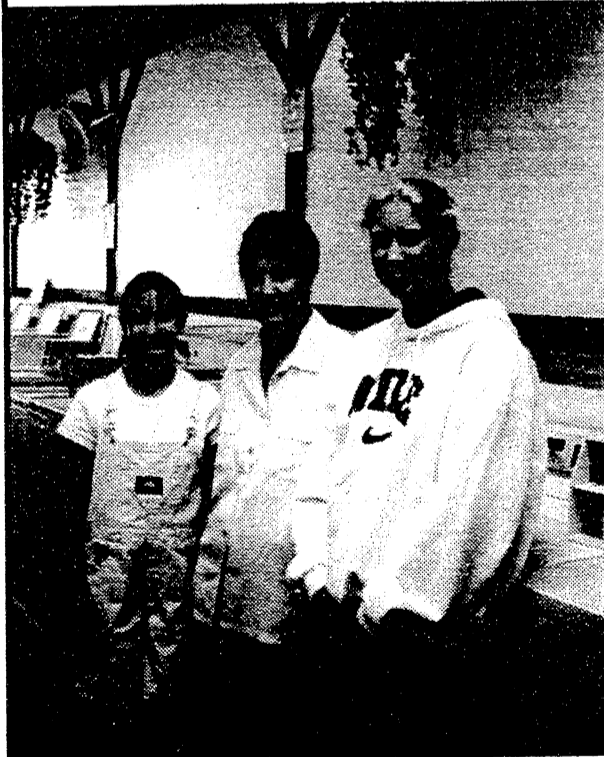

### Double The Pleasure, Double The Fun

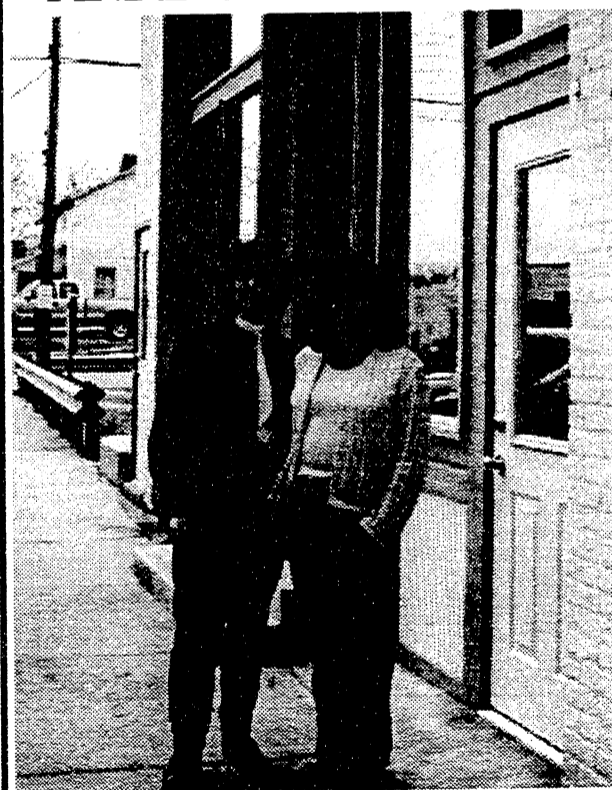

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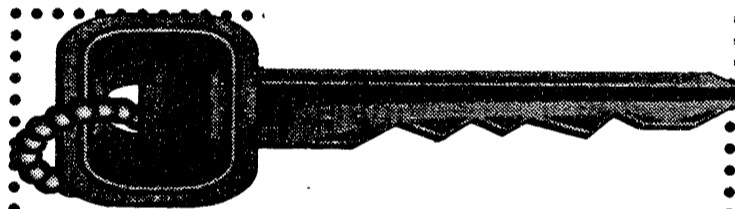
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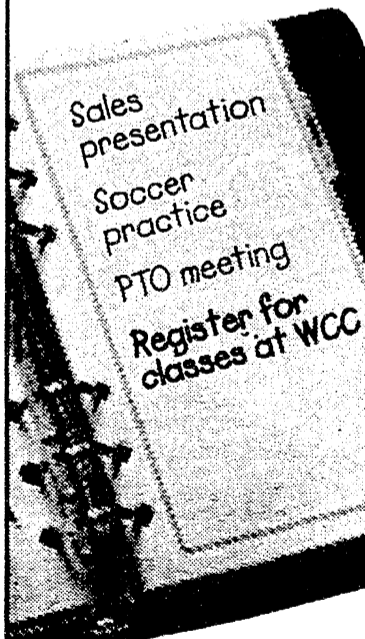

The minutes of the April 5, 1999 regular meeting were approved as presented on a motion by Marshall, support by Dzengeleski. Vote: Ayes-all.

The minutes of the April 5, 1999 closed session were approved as presented on a motion by Dzengeleski, support by Way. Vote: Ayes-all.

The proceedings of the April 5, 1999 regular meeting were approved as corrected on a motion by Marshall, support by Vaillencourt. Vote: ayes-all.

The Agenda was approved as amended on a motion by Conaway, support by Dzengeleski. Vote: Ayes-all.

Monty Okey, 18 year Village resident approached Council with a request to have them look into a study for a M-52 by-pass to relieve the traffic congestion at the main intersection.

**CORRESPONDENCE** - Motion by Schaffer, support by Vaillencourt to approve the request from the American Legion

to close Main Street for the Annual Memorial Day Parade on May 31st at 1:00 p.m. Vote: ayes-all. Request and information from Chris Lehr asking for Council permission to burn off prairie grasses on his property. Council was concerned with the adverse health effects of allowing the burn at this time and did not approve his request.

### 7:30 PM - PUBLIC HEARING

**COLLINS & AIKMAN PLASTICS IFT APPLICATION** President Schaffer opened the public hearing at 7:30 p.m. He gave a brief description of the tax abatement process. There was no public comment and the hearing was closed at 7:34 PM.

**COLLINS & AIKMAN IFT APPLICATION** - Motion by Vaillencourt, support by Marshall to adopt the resolution approving the tax abatement for 9 years, based on the evaluation form total of 334 points. Vote: Yes - none, No - all. Motion denied. Mr. Leeman will contact the Clerk to get the application and attachments in order for resubmittal. This will be an agenda item at the May 3rd meeting.

Letter from Manchester Manor, requesting re-zoning consideration was acknowledged. There was no discussion on the request.

**SHERIFF REPORT**- Sgt. Heren did not know who the new deputy would be for this shift bid, but will include Conaway in the

orientation.

**DPW REPORT** - Motion by Way, support by Vaillencourt to purchase the 5-10A pavement marker in the amount of \$3935.00. Roll Call Vote: Yes-5, No - one. Motion passed. The new mower is in and has cut the time spent mowing down to 3 days, from a full week in the past. The new sweeper is being used every day, either sweeping or cleaning catch basins.

**MANAGER REPORT** - **DPW YARD** - Wallace supplied Council with an aerial view of the DPW yard so that they could use it to consider the location for a village hall. Marty will have an idea on a cost for a building at the next meeting.

**MAIN STREET BRIDGE** - Wallace asked Council for direction on the Main Street Bridge project. They have to decide if they want the bridge to remain open with one lane resulting in a completion date of 4 to 6 weeks, or closing the bridge completely and rerouting traffic which would only take 2 weeks to complete, weather permitting. Council discussed different options. Wallace will let the merchants on Main street know as soon as possible of the bridge closing.

Motion by Way, support by Dzengeleski to appoint Bill Schaffer to the Tree Board. There is still one more person needed on the board. Vote: ayes-all.

The meeting adjourned at 8:57 PM.

### Michigan Penal Code

750.411a Fictitious crimes, report to police officers, bomb scares.

Sec 411a. Any person who shall willfully and knowingly make to any member of the Michigan state police, any sheriff or deputy sheriff, or any police officer of any city or village, or any other peace officer of this state, a

fictitious report of the commission of any crime knowing the same to be false, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable by imprisonment in the county jail not more than 90 days or by a fine of not more than \$100.00. If the report of fictitious crime relates to a bombing, an attempted bombing, or threat to bomb and said report shall be willfully and knowingly communicated to any of the aforementioned peace officers, or to any other person, then the person making such fictitious report shall be deemed to be guilty of a misdemeanor.

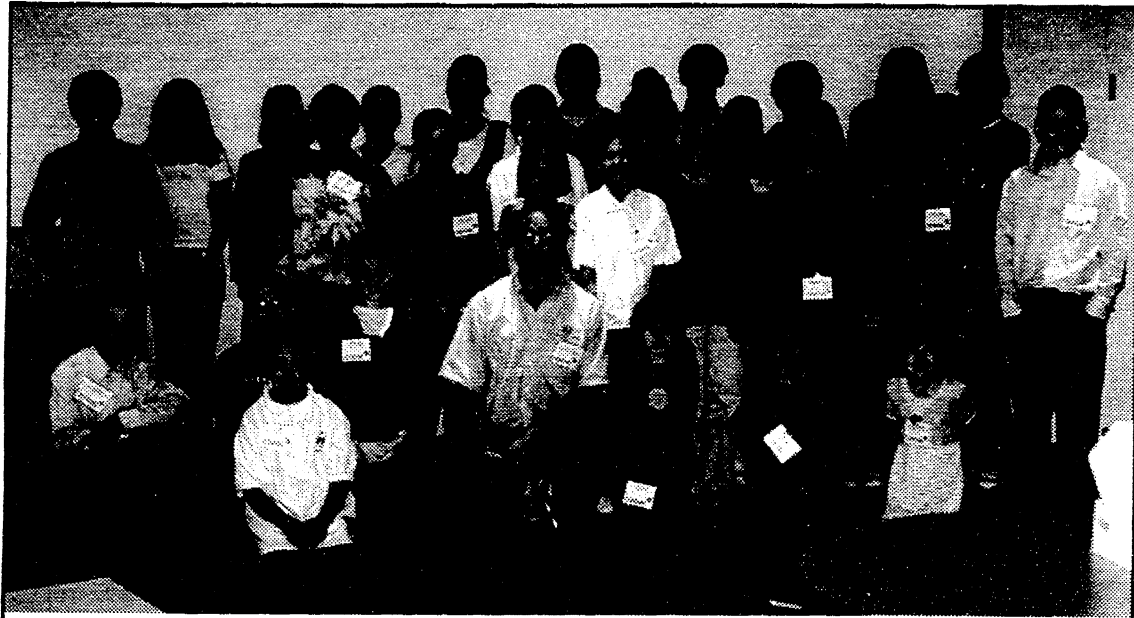

First, there was the heating and melting of the polyethylene terephthalate (P.E.T.) resin. Second, the molding of the preform and the third, and final step, the blowing of the bottle. From the production tour, we continued on with a visit to our wet and dry laboratories to observe the different tests performed on bottles to make sure they will meet specific criteria

for our different customers. These tests included a burst test to measure the amount of internal pressure the bottle could withstand and a top load test that determines the compression strength.

A late-morning break included entertainment by Manchester's own Flying Aces Pro Frisbee Team followed by a good ole' cookout of hot dogs and hamburgers!!

After lunch, we continued our tour to the Engineering Department. Design Engineers, Richard Steih and Walt Strasser demonstrated the different ways in which bottles are designed using the CAD/

CAM system. Also, our supervisor of stereo-lithography, Kevin Gaydosh, demonstrated how we use lasers in the making of a prototype mold for a new bottle design so a customer can get an idea what a bottle will look like before it is actually mass produced.

The last part of our day included an animated presentation by our Manager of Creative Services, Becky Streby. She began her presentation by taking pictures of all the kids with a digital camera and projecting them on screen for all to view... another way used to enhance our customer presentations.

Upon concluding our day, the kids were given various gifts donated by the different departments within Schmalbach-Lubeca which made for a perfect ending to a fun day.

All in all the day was a huge success... Not only did the kids learn what their parents do on a daily basis, but it also proved to be very educational. Thank you, Schmalbach-Lubeca for allowing the kids to be a part of the working world for one special day!!

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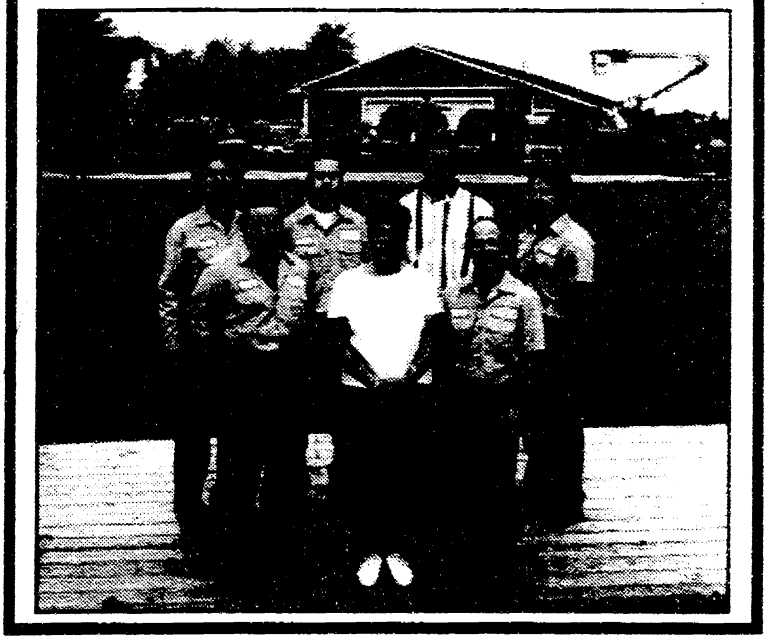
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## Fatal Motorcycle/Deer Crash

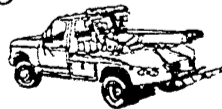

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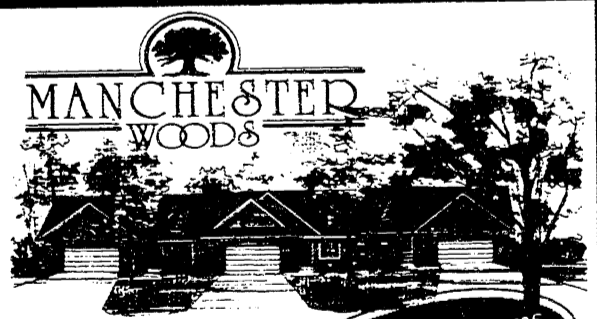

## Navigating the World Wide Web

In the last issue we covered domain names and the hierarchical structure of the Internet. Although technically accurate the article did not provide a lot of understanding on how to "surf the web."

Before we get into how to navigate the Internet lets make sure we understand the difference between a web page and a web site. A web page is simply a one-page document. A web site is a collection of web pages owned or maintained by a single source. A web site may be as small as a couple pages or as large as thousands of pages.

In order to view information on the Internet it is necessary to have software installed on your computer which is capable of displaying the infor-

mation that is provided. This software is called a browser. The two major players in web browser software are Microsoft Internet Explorer and Netscape Navigator. In addition, American Online (AOL) has a pseudo browser, which is actually software that runs on top of your default browser providing a unique interface for the user.

Regardless of which browser you use the procedures for surfing the web are pretty much the same. After connecting to the Internet you start your web browser software, which opens on the same web page each time. This page is referred to as your home page and can be set to start at any page you wish.

For a lot of people their home page is set as the default

by the web browser software manufacturer or their Internet service provider (ISP) after installing their dial-up software.

From the home page you can navigate the web by entering a web address (www.something.com) in the address line. The technical name for a web address is uniform resource locator and is often referred to as the URL.

Manually entering an URL is the way you would use the Internet to go to a specific web page of which you know the address. Often these URLs are found in magazines, television and newspaper advertisements, business cards or stationery, and referrals from others.

Another way to navigate the web is to follow hyperlinks. Hyperlinks are the easy-to-spot

underlined words or phrases you click on (pressing the left button of your mouse) to jump to another screen or page. The hyperlink can take you to a page within the same web site or to an entirely different web site. Following hyperlinks around the World Wide Web is what we refer to as "surfing the web" and can be an amazing journey.

A third way to navigate the Internet is using search engines. Search engines are web-based programs that catalog web pages. When using the search engines you enter text on an input form, which is analyzed for matching terms in an index file. The search engine provides links to the web pages found to be relevant.

There is no one-way to navigate the Internet. Experienced users combine all three techniques described above. Newbies (people new to the Internet) typically are frustrated with search engines. A vague request for information on baseball bats may turn 384,147 pages, which includes a recipe for fruit bat soup. Although interesting, hardly relevant to baseball bats.

In the next article we will cover search engines and how to use them effectively.

*Web Tip: A web browser cache stores the pages, graphics, sounds, and URLs of places you visit online on your hard drive so when you go back to the page, everything doesn't*

*have to be downloaded all over again.*

*If you go to the same sites often give your browser more disk cache, say 12MB or more. If you frequently go to new web sites set your cache size smaller so your browser does not have to search through a large disk cache before going to the Internet. Be careful you do not set it too small or your browser may be forced to reload all the graphics, which will slow things down. You will need to experiment with this a bit.*

*For Microsoft Internet Explorer 4.x: Select View, Internet Options, and click on the General tab. In the second section labeled Temporary Internet Files click on Settings. Slide the lever to change the size of the disk cache. For check newer version of stored pages I recommend you select the option: Every time you start Internet Explorer. Click on OK in both boxes when you are done.*

*For Netscape Navigator 4.x: Select Edit, Preferences. Click on the plus sign (+) next to Advanced and then on Cache. Try setting Memory Cache to 1024 and Disk Cache as described above. For Document in cache is compared to document on network I recommend setting it to Once per session. When finished click OK*

These guys have been working hard, and our opponents will be made aware of their talents, especially come the conference, regional, and state meets. We hope to see you at a meet or two.

## Addison Relays

Track and Field season has officially begun with the traditional opening meet at the Addison Relays. The Flying Dutchmen jumped off to a good start with a very respectable 5th place showing out of ten

teams with fifty (52) points in this early season test.

The boys jumped out of the blocks with a quick ten points from Nick Gordon and Mike Heskett in the pole vault relay. Jason Schaible and Pat DuRussel picked up where they left off last year with a first place showing in the high jump relay. Other point scoring teams for the Dutch were the Distance medley team of Eric Walter, Schaible, Heskett, Eli Bragg with a fourth place finish. The 3200 relay team of Walter, Phil Krall, Bragg, and Schaible finished third. We picked up a fourth place finish from our 400 relay team of Gordon, Damian Evans, Chris Maly, and DuRussel. Our throwers provided us with valuable points as the discus team of Krall, Brian Blossom, and Matt Horodczny rounded out the scoring with a fifth place mark.

## Sand Creek Dual Meet

Rain, wind, and cold were the storyline in our dual meet with Sand Creek. We traveled back to Coach Cory Cox's home territory and fought and elements and our opponents with grit and determination. Those weren't enough though and the Aggies handed us our first loss of the young season, 52-85. Some of the highlights follow.

Our high jumpers dominated the event, taking the first four places. Pat DuRussel was the winner with a jump of 5'6", and Jason Schaible and Eric Walter were not far behind. The 3200 relay team or Eric Walter, Phil Krall, Eli Bragg, and Schaible did their part with decent time of 9:04. Kyle Harris ran a 4:56 in the 1600 run to win with Bragg scoring a third place point also. Walter and Jacob Sawyer ran workmanlike 400 dashes for a first place and third place finish, respectively. Kyle Harris completed his day with a first place finish in the 3200 run. Finally, our 1600 relay ended the miserable day with a fine time of 3:51.2. For the third straight year, we traveled to Grass Lake for the Warrior Invitational. The guys team had an outstanding day, finishing 4th out of ten teams, and only one point out of 3rd place. 63 points was what the Dutchmen were able to muster.

No first place medals were taken home, but a number of 2nd place showings placed the Dutch to their finish. Leading the way

were Pat DuRussel in the high jump, narrowly missing 6' for 5'10". The 3200 relay team of Eric Walter, Kyle Harris, Eli Bragg, and Jason Schaible ran a 8:53.4, and the 1600 relay team ran 3:48.5 with Walter, DuRussel, Kreg Norgaard, and Schaible. Adding to a great day was Norgaard with 2nd place finishes in both hurdle races, the 110 highs, and the 300 intermediates. His times were 17.7 and 45.0, respectively. Walter rounded out our

2nd place finishes with his in the 800 run in 2:09.8. Schaible ran a 55.2 to take 3rd in the 400 dash and high jumped 5'10" for 3rd also. Mike Heskett pole vaulted 8'6" for 5th place, and our 400 relay team of Clint Grenier, Chris Maly, Matt Williams, and DuRussel ran a 50.6 for 6th place.

The meet afforded us a look at conference foes Grass Lake and Hanover-Horton, plus a look at non-conference rivals Morenci, Whitmore Lake, Ann Arbor Greenhills, and Ann Arbor Gabriel Richard, all of whom run at our regional. 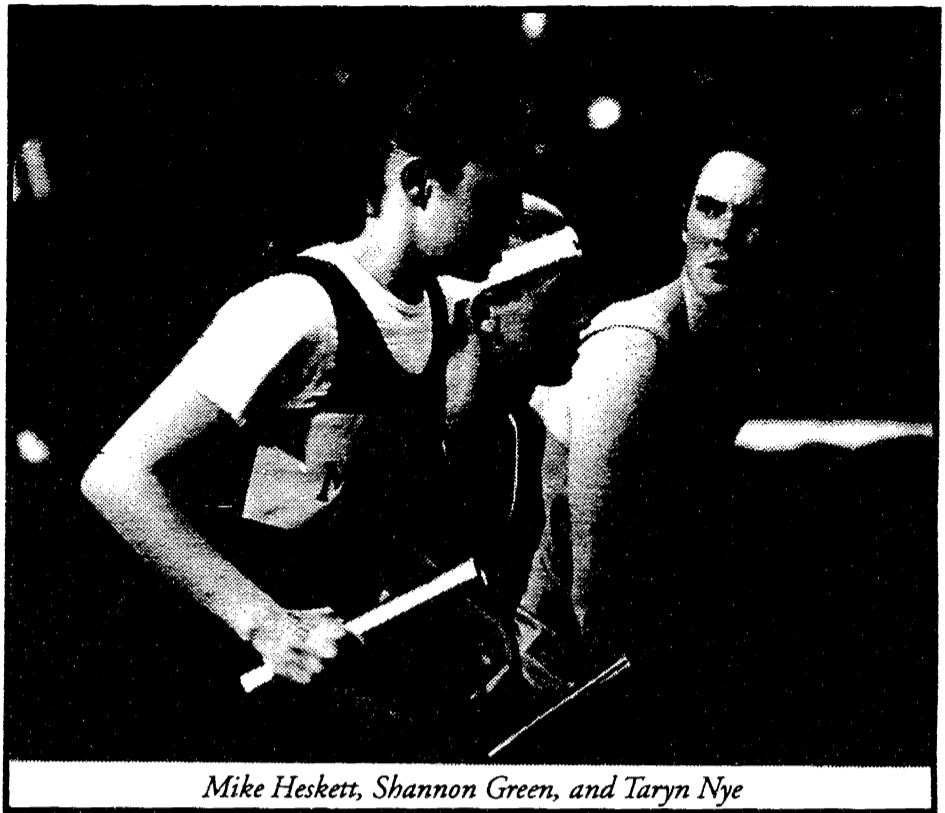
those who have helped.

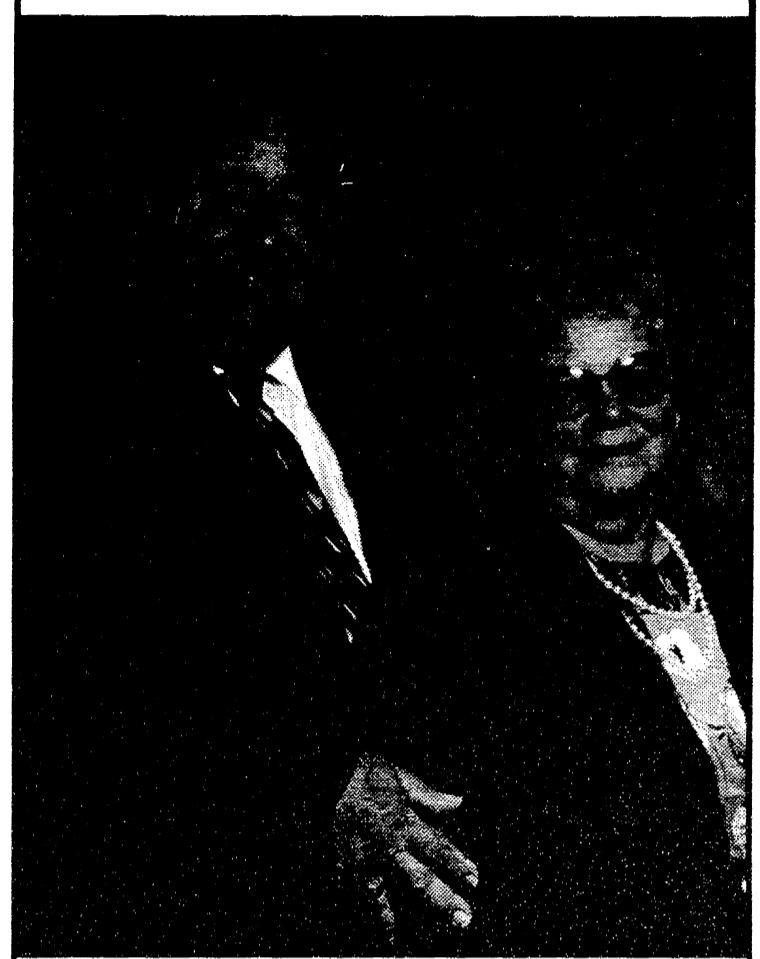

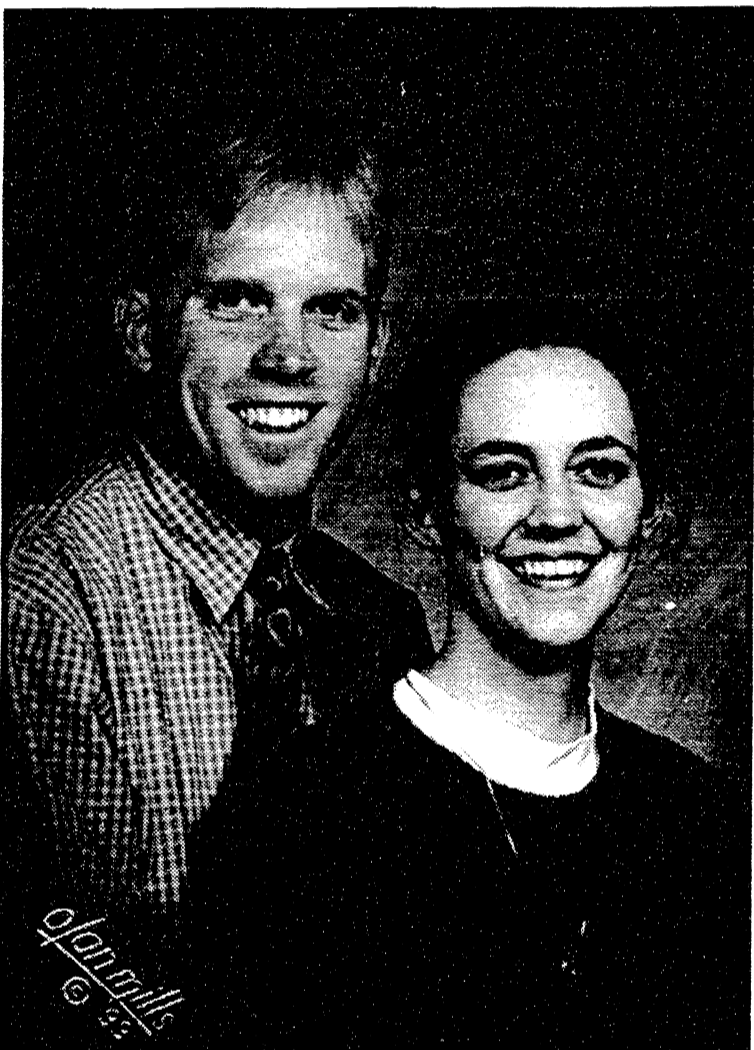



## Legion and Auxiliary Prepare for Poppy Days

American Legion Auxiliary volunteers will distribute the familiar red, handcrafted poppies honoring America's war dead on May 14 & 15 designated as Poppy Days by Auxiliary Unit # 117 in Manchester.

Planned to coincide with the Memorial Day holiday, the annual event pays tribute to those veterans who have died in the last 75 years. It also honors the millions of Americans who have willingly served their country in seven decades.

It serves as well as honors the veteran with all proceeds from the distribution invested in local programs for the benefit of the veteran and his/her family.

Each nine-piece poppy is made by veterans for veterans in Auxiliary-sponsored Poppy Shops that supplement physical and psychological therapy needed by hospitalized and disabled veterans. The Auxiliary provides the materials and the volunteers. The veteran makes the poppy and is paid a small amount for each painstakingly-made flower. For some it is their only income.

No matter what the cost of maintaining and supplying the Poppy Shops, the memorial poppy is never sold, but given in exchange for a contribution.

The Poppy program has been part of Auxiliary programming for more than 70 years. It has been estimated that approximately 25 million Americans wear the poppy to honor America's war dead and all veterans, contributing over \$2 million for rehabilitation and welfare programs.

Mary Smith is Chairman of this year's event.

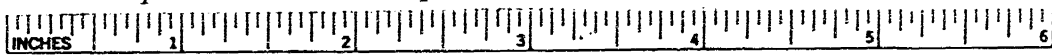
