County struggles with poli

■ Village, Bridgewater Township feel less pinch than Ypsilanti-area contract agencies.

A staffing shortage at the Washtenaw County Sheriff's Department is forcing police substations across the county to juggle deputies and adds significantly to labor costs as more deputies are required to work overtime hours.

"Right now we're short 10 positions." said Washtenaw County Undersheriff Herb Mahony.

The county is authorized to employ 113 deputies to help patrol the 11 communities and four school districts under contract with the WCSD.

"Right now there's a national ple wanting to get into police

The 10 vacant positions represent 50 shifts and 400 unfilled

hours each week, and are filled by deputies working overtime. Those shifts pay time-and-ahalf-roughly \$23.50 versus \$15.66—that cost an extra \$3.132 per week in labor costs alone. based on the starting annual income listed at \$32.573 for county deputies.

And that figure could grow in coming weeks.

"With projections of retirements coming up this month, we are down 12 at the end of the month," said Police Cmdr. David Egeler, who deals with human resources for the WCSD.

Egeler added that the number of time-and-a-half overtime hours fluctuates from week to week, and has added costs such as retirement pensions and FICA (Social Security and Medicare tax) costs.

"Obviously it's expensive, but it ends up being the same rate as a position with benefits." Mahony said of the overtime shortage of law enforcement shifts. "We're not going to lower officers." Mahony explained. our entrance standards just to

"We're handling it in stride. We'd like to get those positions

filled as soon as possible. Mahony said the application. screening and training process. which can take up to seven months to complete before an officer is eligible for unassisted road patrol, slows the process of filling positions.

Village the Manchester and Bridgewater Township contract with the county for police coverage. receiving four and one police service units (PSUs) respectively for 24-hour coverage eligibili-

"Because Manchester is obviously the smallest part of Washtenaw County as far as the contract, it's going well down here," said Police Sgt. Jim Anuszkiewicz, who oversees the WCSD substation in Manchester.

What our responsibilities are as far as the contract is concerned is to insure that the village and Bridgewater Township receive 1.880 hours (of labor per deputy) per year. As long as we meet those needs, we have fulfilled our contract.

"If we have shortages in hours. So far. Anuszkiewicz said. neither Bridgewater Township nor Manchester has been shorted contract hours. Four officers

currently staff the Manchester substation. leaving one deputy slot for overtime fill-in.

Of all the entities and all the contract areas in the county, it is my opinion that Manchester is being affected the least of any contract area," he said.

With four regular deputies. simpler things are Manchester than Ypsilanti Township, where Anuszkiewicz was police sergeant until transferring on May 1. There, Anuszkiewicz was in charge of scheduling 44 deputies.

That, he said, "was extremely more difficult than here in terms of juggling the hours.

"Where you see a lot of our officers working a lot of hours is over near Ypsi." Anuszkiewicz said. "Down here, we're only doing it once a week.

Part and parcel of the overtime slots is the reality that many officers are working long. grueling hours.

"Unfortunately, because of vacation and everything that comes up, that does come up." said Mahony. "There are some people who are working 16-hour

Palmer Ford reopens Manchester auto facility

Former Stu Evans showroom will house used cars, light maintenance.

Staff Writer A few weeks after falling victim to a Ford Motor Company market consolidation, the empty Ford dealership at 510 West Main Street in Manchester has partially reopened as a used-car operation run by Palmer Motor Sales of Chelsea.

John Chamberlain, manager of the Palmer Manchester lot, said the dealership reopened on May 21 with a limited inventory of used cars.

When contacted last week, Palmer coowner Biff Weber said he hoped to have the Manchester dealership fully opened as early as this week, but had established no date. Weber had yet to order new signage for the dealership.

"I want to get everything set before I jump up and down," he said. "Hopefully, we'll be ready to go in another week or so.'

Weber said he was currently interviewing candidates for at least two technician openings in the Manchester dealership's service garage. He is also looking to hire parts and sales workers.

"I'd like it to be a full-service facility

even though I can't sell new cars," Weber

He added that the facility would likely offer services like maintenance, light repair and oil changes, "just some light work, make it a little more convenient for Manchester residents so they don't have to drive all the way up (to Chelsea).

"I hate to leave Manchester in the lurch." Weber said the new business, which would be called Palmer Motor Sales or Palmer Ford Mercury, could eventually employ up to 10 workers.

When Stu Evans Ford closed its doors on May 3, all 19 employees were effectively terminated. Weber said he recently hired one former Stu Evans employee for the new business and has interviewed two others. Other former employees were reportedly offered positions at Stu Evans Lincoln Mercury dealerships in Clinton Township and Garden City.

In resigning his franchise agreement with Ford, Stu Evans President John Evans ceded the Manchester marketing area to Palmer Ford, saying Palmer was "the right organization to handle this." Weber has described the move as a way to concentrate distribution in more regionalized areas. and said Ford has determined Manchester is no longer a distribution point for new

As of last week, Chamberlain said there were roughly 15 cars on the lot, saying that number might grow to 25 or 30 as regular inventory.

Weber said although Stu Evans is gone. Ford continues to lease the Manchester building from Greg Marvin, the former owner of Midwest Ford.

"Right now we're on a contract for a few more months and we'll just extend it with him," Weber said.

Midwest Ford closed in 1997 to make way for Stu Evans.

Weber said the new operation will sell used Ford, Lincoln Mercury "and any other type of used vehicles" out of Manchester.

"I think Manchester is a wonderful opportunity for us," he said. "We're used to the Manchester/Chelsea-type market.

"It's difficult when you're a big city dealer. Everything's pretty much the same; the pace is just a little bit slower."

Palmer Ford currently employs nearly 70 people at four locations in Chelsea, where it has been in business for 90 years. The dealer has won the Ford President's Award, based on customer satisfaction surveys recognizing outstanding sales and service, for four years running.





House passes helmet law

of state House Representatives last week approved legislation by state Rep. Gene DeRossett to revise Michigan's mandatory motorcycle helmet law.

"This is about giving experienced adult riders the option to choose not to wear a helmet. said DeRossett, R-Manchester. "It expands personal freedom and responsibility.

House Bill 4823 lifts the helmet requirement for people 21 or older who have two years of riding experience or completed a motorcycle safety course sanctioned by the state Board of Education. Those meeting the age and skill requirements would have the option not to wear a helmet. Thirty states permit motorcyclists to ride without helmets, including all the states bordering Michigan. Research indicates that helmets may cause many accidents because they limit



visibility, hearing, cause rider fatigue and trap heat.

Fatality rates over the last 25 vears have been virtually the same for states with and without helmet laws, according to Highway National Transportation Safety

House approves DeRossett land-use legislation

state House Representatives approved legislation on May 23 by state Rep. Gene DeRossett to redevelop urban areas and promote better land use.

"This is a momentous development in Michigan land-use polisaid DeRossett, R-Manchester. "The development pressure we are feeling in Washtenaw County is directly related to the inability of cities to redevelop their own abandoned properties. This is a big step in reversing that trend."

House Bill 4852 is the product of three years of legislative work by DeRossett and Republican leadership. It is part of a fivebill bipartisan package to revitalize urban areas by clearing the titles of an estimated 55,000 tax-reverted properties. Large areas of many cities are closed to development because their ownership is in question.

"We need to get this property back into private hands so that it can become productive again." DeRossett said. "This is about restoring the entrepreneurial spirit that built our cities."

The measure establishes a new method to clear titles by



So you want to create your own web site

So you want your own website.

Suppose you, your family, your company, or your organization want to get your own web presence. What do you have to do to make that happen? There are five different tasks you need to perform to turn your idea into a place on the web. Here they are.


Determine your requirements

Why do you want a web site? Are publicizing your organization, or just trying to share some files with friends? Before you do anything else, ask yourself why you want to be on the web.

Are you building a commerce site? The web can be a great equalizer for smaller companies looking to gain more geographic reach.

Are you trying to publicize your organization? Are you looking for new members, or to gain more support? Or, are you trying to provide services for your existing members?

The answers to these questions will help you select the right features you need from a web hosting provider, and help you deter-

mine the content you need.
Also, consider how profession-

al vou need your site to be. Are you sharing some files with friends, publicizing your favorite music, or are you trying to promote your business? If you are trying to create a public presence for an organization or company, the more you will want your own domain name. If you are just trying to keep some friends up to date with your latest vacation photos, you can pick a free site from Yahoo, MSN, or one of the other online communities. If you are trying to build a business, you will want your own free-standing site.

Develop some content.

Even before you pick a host. start developing some content. You can use any text editor to write HTML content. I use Macromedia Dreamweaver for our company site. It is simple to use. has quite a few features and lets me see a preview of the site while I am creating it.

By creating some initial content, you will further refine your requirements. Also, you can try it out on a few friends before publishing it to the entire world.

Pick a domain name.

If you need to get your own domain you need to find an available one. The easiest place to find a domain name is at www.netnames.com. Search for any of the domain names you want (for example. "Manchester") and they will tell you which are available. You do not need to add the final zone to your domain search: netnames automatically searches the .com.

.net, .org, and .us zones for you. You can use any of these domains, regardless of the kind of organization you are registering: .com is for commercial sites, .org is for non-profit organizations, while .net is for network providers. The internet has been growing very fast over the last several years, so you may need to try quite a few names before you succeed.

Find a host.

Once you have created some initial content, and determined what domain name to use, you are ready to find a host. You do not want to host your own site. There are more than enough web hosting providers that will do it for you. Hosting companies also tend to crop up overnight in many areas. You can search using Google and find quite a few possibilities in the area.

But remember, you really don't need a local hosting organization. There is no reason your web host provider needs to be in the same geographic area. If you have any peculiar requirements, you can use web hosts anywhere in the world.

I recently needed to find a web host that would let me create my

own web application using ASP.NET: the closest host I could find was located in Florida. Depending on the features you need. hosting can be as low as \$15.00 per month. A good hosting company can also help with getting your new domain registered. and getting the domain live. They can also help with the next step:

Publicize your site.

What if you create a web site and no one comes to visit? After your site goes live, you will want to register it with all the common search engines: Google. AltaVista. Ask Jeeves, and Yahoo would be the main ones. Before you register your site, try to imagine someone was looking for you. What would they type into the search box to find your site?

For example, we registered our company site using the keywords that we expect people to type when they are searching for us: "Software Development, C#.NET Java C++ Consultants".

All the search engines will give you the option to give your own keywords.

The reality of death strikes too close to home

"Motorcyclist killed in M-59 collision" reads the headline on the front page of Sunday's edition of the Livingston County Daily Press and Argus. The motorcyclist was a friend of mine. The tragic, horrific details of the accident are beyond belief. I have been unusually close to tears many times today. I called my deceased friend's wife on the telephone after I saw the headlines just to make sure it was indeed my friend. Unfortunately, it was.

Whatever the theme for this week's column was supposed to be, it has changed. I have been somber the past nine hours, and I am not like this. Jim was 43 years old when his life tragically ended on Friday, a little after 7 p.m. While the rest of us were just settling down with our hot dogs, chips, popcorn, and pop to watch the Red Wings demolish the Avalanche on Friday evening, my friend was being thrown 20 feet in the air and later pronounced dead at the hospital.

What a different world from one living room to the next. Hysterical crying in one as the family receives the dreaded phone call ... and exuberant shouting in most others as the Red Wings scored quick and fast in Friday night's game.

None of that matters now, at least for my friend's family. Their lives are forever changed. There are two teenagers, one boy and one girl, who will forever long to kiss their dad before going to bed. There are two teenagers who will never again (this side of heaven) see the smile on their dad's face.

In ten years or so, there will be a wedding. Oh—it will be beauti-

ful! The attendants stand in a row with matching dresses and tuxedos. Beautiful candles flicker softly. Flowers and smiles and gifts galore. A beautiful young bride will grace this wedding, causing all eyes to gawk and "ooh" and "ahh" as she makes her way down the aisle. But she will be walking alone.

I'm sorry, friends, but this day has changed me. I haven't been super-close to Jim the past few years, after they transferred and moved to a new city, but knowing how the lives of the members of Jims family will forever be changed has changed me. too.

It has caused me to consider the frailty of this life. It has made me realize my need to kiss and hug my wife and children one more time before getting into my car the next time.

You may be wondering what this has to do with teenagers. Let me tell you. I would love to help all you teenagers grasp the reality of death. Teens are dying in car accidents way more than I would like. Teens are drinking (and many adults are encouraging it!) at home parties. Overdoses are occurring all the time at every hospital.

I know: I've been there with teens that have been on the verge

of death after taking pills. They didn't take the pills in order to commit suicide. They preferred. rather, to take the pills to get a cheap high.

Teens, you must listen to this youth pastor who has been touched by the reality of a friend's accident. His accident served as a horrible reminder that people die sooner than they need to. Lives are cut short. Destinies reduced to motorcycles and automobiles crumpled nearly beyond recognition. Life is short, but that doesn't mean that you have to play by risky rules. Foolish decisions you make now could cause your parents and siblings heartache and grief.

I am overwhelmed by feelings of hopelessness and sadness as I recall articles I have read about young guys and girls whose lives have been cut short by murderous madmen. I have needed the grace of God in those hours after reading articles that have made my blood boil. Madmen have literally ended young futures, productive futures, endless-possibilities futures.

Teens, you all know that normally I am the most upbeat guy around, but today is different. I am sad. I am overcome with grief, knowing that possibly some of you reading this right now will die an early death because of poor decisions you will make. Young person, life is short, and you have an incredible future ahead of you. Make sure you get

If I have the capacity at all today to encourage you, allow me to say this to you. Try to understand how fragile life is. Respect it. Don't be foolish. But—don't

allow that to scare you into doing nothing with your life. Anything worthwhile in life will require a certain amount of risk. Just don't be foolish with your actions.

Teens, you must listen to this youth pastor who has been touched by the reality of a friend's accident. His accident served as a horrible reminder that people die sooner than they

"Lord, comfort ail those who are mourning around our globe. Give grace to the families who are left behind, trying to pick up all the pieces. We know it is hard. Lord, so we pray for the families. Help this generation of teens be wise in their living, that they need not die prematurely."

Friends, death is a reality. You don't want to go there.

Mock crash demonstrates crisis rescue techniques

Fire chief recognizes fast actions of teens.

A mock car crash was staged May 30 at Manchester High School to illustrate the dangers of drinking and driving. It also demonstrated the dramatic actions that need to be taken by a rescue unit.

The event was organized by Manchester High School senior Russ Cruz and included a special presentation recognizing three Manchester teens who helped evacuate a home on fire in Chelsea last month

Participating in the enactment were Fire Explorers from Manchester and Chelsea, the Stockbridge Medical Explorers. Fire Chelsea Area Stockbridge Authority. Ambulance, the Washtenaw County Sheriff's Department and graduating seniors from Manchester High School.

The Explorers is a volunteer group comprised of young people between the ages of 14 and 20 who are trained by professionals in either emergency

medical response or fire-fighting techniques. Participants from the Chelsea post included David Culverhouse, Marius Varner, Rob Wall, Tom Miller, Russ Crawford, Eric Walter and Josh Reeter.

They often accompany their mentors on actual runs where their training, as evidenced at the event, can prove invaluable.

Chelsea Fire Inspector Matt Tuttle, who is a Fire Explorers adviser, and Ron Hodder, formerly of Stockbridge Area Ambulance, who is the Medical Explorers adviser, narrated the event

Katie Wall, a Dexter firefighter who serves as an adviser to the Chelsea Explorers, super-

The scenario began with Manchester High School seniors Damien Evans, Ryan Maggetti, Jeff Punches, Kevin Taylor and Wesley Waggoner climbing into two cars designed to look as if they were in a collision.

The seniors were made up to look as if they were seriously injured. Beer cans were placed at the scene to illustrate the cause of the so-called accident.

Far off, sirens could be heard

as a group of "bystanders," com prised of Chelsea Explorers and Manchester High School sophomores Brittany Gardner and Erica Lowell, as well as Alex Kormendi, looked on in horror at the crash site.

Soon, fire vehicles from Chelsea responded along with Stockbridge Ambulance personnel and deputies with the Washtenaw County Sheriffs Department, and the Explorers went to work.

Hodder said it would not be unusual for some of the Explorers to recognize the victims, but he said they are trained to focus on the task at

The scenario assumed that the only way to rescue the victims in one of the cars was by extrication with hydraulic tools, a process Tuttle described as loud and scary."

Blankets were put over victims in the car, as well as over the Explorers involved in the extrication, to protect everyone from glass shards as the windshield was removed with a spe-

Next, the "jaws of life" were used to take off the roof of the

car and its supporting structure.

When the operation began, Hodder said that ideally the process should take 15 minutes. The Explorers had it removed in 14 minutes.

Officials said that each Explorer unit has a coordinator who, upon seeing someone doing something unsafe, will yell "freeze," whereby all action is stopped until the situation is

The demonstration emphasized the importance of stabilizing a vehicle before extrication. the care taken in removing an accident victim from the vehicle, the necessity of stopping all bleeding and the administration of cardiopulmonary resuscitation.

Besides warning against drinking and driving. Hodder also spoke against playing car radios so loudly that an emergency siren could not be heard.

Hodder said he was proud of the Explorers and that they set a positive example for the commu-

Cruz, who is a first lieutenant with the Chelsea Explorers and president of the newly formed Manchester-Sand Lake Explorers, said it was difficult to organize the event in the midst of final exams, but well worth it.

"If just one more student than before leaves here realizing that drinking and driving is dangerous, it'll be worth it." Cruz said. The mock disaster was folplaques to the three Manchester teen-agers who helped rescue the family in Chelsea. Andrew Mahony, 17, John Jameson and Lauren Engel. both 16, noticed the home on fire May 4 while driving back home to Manchester.

The teens knocked on the doors and windows to awaken the home's five occupants, and used a garden hose until firefighters arrived.

"It's no exaggeration to say that lives may have been saved that night." Ellenwood said as the students erupted into applause.

Sharon Township recycling operation feels the heat

Unlicensed business receives DEQ warning, zoning violation notice.

Sharon Township businessman Matt Anderson has arrived between a rock and a hard place.

The owner of Interactive Metals, a scrap metal recycling facility on Washburne Road, is running an increasingly scrutinized business these days. He has received zoning violation notices from the township and a letter of warning from the Michigan Department Environmental Quality.

Stan Idziak, an inspector with the Waste Management Division of the DEQ in Jackson, sent the letter dated April 30 to Anderson. It contends that based on an April 23 site inspection, Anderson is operating a solid waste processing plant without a license.

Interactive Metals violates township zoning ordinances because it operates on an old dairy farm on land zoned for agriculture. As such, it has attracted the ire of neighbors who object to the dumpsters, excavation equipment and semitruck traffic that have become increasingly common at the site.

Idziak said the DEQ letter presented Anderson with two choices: apply for a solid waste processing license or convince the DEQ the operation does not require one. The letter established a response deadline of May 31.

"I was kind of surprised because I had checked into all that stuff to make sure I wasn't breaking any of those laws." Anderson said of receiving the DEQ letter. "I guess I've got a neighbor problem."

The allegation that Anderson is operating an unlicensed processing facility is based on the DEQ's Part 115 governing solid waste operational memos, which outline acceptable types of materials, covers and proper license and construction permit application procedures.

In responding to the DEQ, Anderson said he prepared a four-page letter, which he handdelivered to Idziak's office in Jackson on Friday. He said the letter makes the case that his business does not need to apply for the license because it meets parameters "that would make the allegations that were put forth not so.'

When contacted early Monday, Idziak confirmed receipt of the letter, but would not discuss its contents barring a Freedom of Information Act request.

"I think I'm gonna go back out and take a look there and see if anything's changed." he said.

Idziak, who was alerted to the facility by an anonymous tip, said he discovered numerous open containers of metal and construction debris during his April 23 inspection.

There was a whole bunch of metal waste ... behind the silo." Idziak said. "There were a series of roll-off containers containing construction debris.'

Yet Anderson is quick to dispel alarm.

"I got my response to the DEQ. We are in compliance," he said.

"The complaint was that I'm acting as a transfer station and I'm not," he said. "When the complaint came through, there were a couple boxes (of trash) here ... and now. they're gone.

Anderson, a Manchester native and high school graduate who has run Interactive Metals for at least four years, said his business recycles "all sorts of materials"—mainly ferrous (iron-based) and non-ferrous metals—and provides dumpsters for jobs.

"The trash I pick up and take it to a landfill. It's not coming here." he said.

Presently, the DEQ warning is limited to the lack of a license, and does not address any environmental contamination, Idziak

The DEO warning is the second to be issued to a Manchesterarea scrap facility, after C&L Recycling on West Austin Road in Manchester Township. C&L, which failed to meet a January deadline for compliance, is currently under investigation by the Office of Criminal Investigations.

Anderson once weighed purchasing C&L to relocate there, and discussed the possibility with the Manchester Township Planning Commission December. He said he has since nixed the idea.

Anderson now plans to move the business to an industrialzoned location outside of Adrian, and is awaiting financing approval and other formalities from the bank before purchasing the property.

The zoning violation notice letters, which Sharon Township Zoning Administrator Dave Wilson said were issued "some time ago," ask Anderson to move his business and clean up the

property. "The township has been a little lenient with him because he has been working toward that goal,' Wilson said.

"We hate to disrupt somebody's business and livelihood for the sake of the ordinance, but it may be coming to that if we don't see some dates."

Wilson planned to contact Anderson Monday to establish moving dates, which would be discussed at tonight's township board meeting.

"He just kind of (ran his business) inside a barn to start with," Sharon Township Supervisor Gary Blades. "It's a case of where he had a little business and then it became very successful.

"I think he knows that he's gotta go. He knows he's gotta go and we're all trying to help him

do that."

Anderson, who also lives on the rented Washburne Road property, said he would continue to keep his residence there after the business moves to Adrian.



If you are a parent of more than one child, you have surely come to recognize that building sibling relationships can often be hard work. While each of your children has built a strong individual attachment to you, it will take time for siblings to learn to respect and care for each other.

This may be intensified by a young child who, before the age of three, is not mature enough to share. Although sibling rivalry is normal, it is sure to become annoying to the rest of the family

The good news is that, in allowing your children to work out most of their conflicts by themselves, you are providing an ongoing opportunity for them to begin practicing social skills and expressing emotions. They gain confidence to keep trying and work harder in relationships by asserting themselves.

By watching reactions, they learn how their actions hurt or please others, which helps them begin to experience and identify both positive and negative emotions. They try different solutions for the same problem, while increasing in their problem-solving skills.

As children grow in these relationships, they will need less of your undivided attention and gain more affection for each other.

To help lessen sibling rivalry and help children handle their feelings, do not compare siblings in front of them. Obviously there are times you will need to mediate conflicts. In doing this, resist the urge to make judgments.

Always encourage cooperation and remember to praise pleasant interactions. Make it clear to your children that abusive behavior will not be tolerated. Try to prevent and redirect aggressive behavior to avoid the need for punishment.

Children who show signs of being hungry, tired or overstimulated may need sibling interaction to be limited or stopped.

Don't worry about treating your children equally - it can't be done. Value each child's individual strengths and give loving support to each, based on their needs at the time. Leaving your children alone to work things out for themselves when possible will help them learn to respect and care for each other.

Remember that sibling "battlegrounds" are grounds for learning!

Kiwanis takes on doll project

Manchester and friends of Kiwanis have begun a special project for children who are being treated in local hospitals. The 15-inch dolls are cut and sewn by at-home volunteers. then finished off at Kiwanis stuffing parties.

Kiwanis "hospital dolls" were born through the efforts of the Kiwanis clubs of Australia and are well-traveled throughout Europe. The soft, huggable toys help children cope with anxiety.

The first few months of the local doll project has produced about 125 dolls that have been delivered Community Hospital, Herrick Hospital in Tecumseh, Bixby Hospital in Adrian and St. Joseph Mercy Health Systems in Ann Arbor.

The faces and bodies of the dolls are featureless, which allows hospitalized children to decorate them, an activity which greatly reduces the stress that young hospital patients may experience. With their artwork on a doll's face, or by marking the area on their doll at which they feel pain, children are able to express their feelings about their hospitalization.





shifts. For a short period of time we've got some people working a long number of hours.

"It's not uncommon in law enforcement for people to work double shifts."

Anuszkiewicz said deputies in Manchester normally work standard eight-hour shifts, "unless there come the circumstances where we need to fill a midnight shift." Anuszkiewicz added the county maintains a rotating list of deputies to staff the overtime shifts

"If there's a vacant slot down here in Manchester, it's not necessarily the sole responsibility of a deputy from Manchester to fill that slot," he said.

"They increased our overtime budget for this year

because this is the first year we've had to deal with the contract budget," Anuszkiewicz said. "With all these townships going to contract this year, that actually increased our road staff" while the county sheriff lost county-funded positions.

Egeler said the county was short by as many as 18 deputies in the late 1990s.

In the department's history, this is not the worst time." he

Anuszkiewicz mused that the relatively low pay rates for non-federal law enforcement officers combined with factors such as the increased public scrutiny of police officers may have combined to limit the profession's appeal.

He said the WCSD was lucky to have four to five applicants per job, and that one-third of those applicants typically do not pass the department's background checks.

Beth State Moranty, who works at the Ypsilanti post. That post has 31 assigned troopers, which is its allocation. Each of them, she said, typically works standard eight-hour shifts.



Colorful art program part of Riverfolk's charm

■ Students showcase photography skills.

Associate Editor "This is the beginning of something wonderful," CRC Director Chris Kanta said in introducing Manchester's artistin-residence program to the Manchester Area Historical

Society at its May 14 meeting. The program, part of the preparation for the Riverfolk Arts and Music Festival to be held Aug. 3 at Carr Park, brought together 12 high school and alternative school students with Manitou Beach artist and photographer Jan Kaulins. The results of this collaboration were unveiled at the historical society's meeting with the students' hand-colored photography taking center stage as Kaulins described the process and philosophy of the project.

Kaulins, whose career spans a quarter-century, is well known for his work photographing cities, particularly Detroit, New Orleans and Miami South Beach. He also has a body of work including vintage motorcycles, cars, drive-ins, cigar boxes, and old diners available in this format. Many of his photos were taken while traveling the country on his Harley-Davidson in search of vanishing bits of Americana.

"Before the relatively recent advent of color film, photographers, since The Civil War, have used pencils, dyes and paint brushes to add color to their black and white photos."

Parr made a well-received presentation about Manchester's architecture and shared historic photos with the students, it was decided to document the Manchester area and its surrounding townships in 2002.

"The kids were swept off their by Parr's presentation, Kaulins said. With a high level of interest and enthusiasm, the eight Manchester High School students and four Alternative Education students selected one subject each.


After local historian Howard Mann feed mill in Bridgewater and the old mill at Sharon Mills Park in Sharon County Township are subjects of the outlying townships while downtown scenes predominate in the village photographs. Each provides a unique look at a familiar landmark.

Beauty, of course, is in the eve of the beholder. And the students found their own beauty in each photographic subject as they took artistic license with their project.

While choosing their photographic subjects, students did research on the structures they chose and also wrote an artist's statement and biography, which was part of the assignment. Under Kaulins' direction, they learned about photographic composition, faced challenges in scheduling and discovered how subtle changes in lighting can affect the outcome of the ∢photos.



The artists' medium was oil pencils which they used to handcolor the details on the blackand-white photographs. Some of the students chose to highlight only certain parts of the subject while others, with great attention to detail. hand-colored indi-

such as the John Schneider high school art teacher Blacksmith Shop.

Some of the students, whom Kaulins described as having "true artistic temperament." were never quite satisfied with the outcome of their work, and continually tried to do it over.

"I finally had to take their erasers away." he joked. "You can be too self-critical."

The goal of the project. according to Riverfolk coordinator Mark Palms, was to give the students contact with professional artists such as Kaulins and provide an outlet to showcase their talent. Since art is a big part of the Riverfolk Festival, Palms consulted with

Marianne Sachs for student referrals. Ashley Schlosser, one of the

students with "artistic temperament," said that she thought the project was an "awesome idea."

"We needed more time. though," she said. "I would have liked to do it when we were less pressed for time.

As a career artist himself, Kaulins also spoke to the students about the possibilities of making a career out of their own artistic endeavors. "If your heart is in it, it's gonna

be good," he said, "And if it's good. it'll sell."

And, he joked to the members

of the historical society, there just happen to be 12 photographs, which would fit ideally on a future Manchester Area Historical Society calendar.

The students' artwork will be on exhibit between now and the Riverfolk Festival and each piece will be sold at a silent auction at Carr Park the day of the festival All proceeds will benefit the Community Resource

First-graders prove they've learned a thing or two about tropical rainforests.

The first-graders at Klager have been learning under the canopy of a steamy rainforest for the last several weeks, and they have learned a lot!

Six students were kind enough to inform this reporter on the many wonders of the tropical rainforest. Olivia Greene. Dane Smith and Benjamin Tamagne from Pat Merrill's class: and Maris Cook, Phillip Louis and Roslyn Vashon from Suzanne Birgy's class shared their knowledge of the most biologically

"THERE ARE four layers in the rainforest." Olivia reported. The floor, the understory, the canopy, and the emergent layer. At the floor level, trees have extremely large bases to support their height, according to Ben.

Further up, the trees branch nice. out and create a dense canopy that allows rain to enter, but prevents heat from escaping, and produces a very steamy environment.

"It gets really hot in e rainforest." said

"They get 80 inches of rain in a year," said Ben. That's a lot."

Despite the canopy. which blocks 98 percent of the sunlight from reaching the understory and floor, many plants have adapted to life in the

"Some plants grow on branches, not on the ground." Maris commented.

"Their roots hang down like strings, they're called epi-phytes," added Roslyn, "A bromeliad is one.

THE MORE exciting part of the rainforest for these students was undoubtedly the animal life.

"Half the animals in the world live in the rainforest!" said Dane.

"Some are nice, and some are not." added Phillip. "Frogs are

"Except for the poison ones!" Maris chimed in.

"Poison dart frogs have enough poison in their body to kill 100 people." Dane said.

They have sticky pads on the bottoms of their feet to help them climb trees." added. "They're my favorite animal because they're really colorful.

The bright colors are actually a way of warning predators away from poisonous prey.

Some bugs and spiders are light colored, which means 'don't eat me.'" said

ONE OF the few animals that live on the ground is the tapir. Ben said. "It has a nose like an elephant's runk, but snorter.

Also on the ground are many, many kinds of ants. "Brown ants, black ants, red ants ... if one animal kills another, there's a kind of ant that comes and they eat a

An exceptional teacher who helps students excel

■ Special education teacher retires after 13 years in district.

Albert Einstein once said, "Only a life lived for others is a life worthwhile.'

As a man who strongly disliked school because of its monotony, he undoubtedly understood the value of teachers who go out of their way to provide an exceptional learning environment for their students.

One such teacher is Sue Whitney, who will retire from Manchester schools at the end of the school year. Teaching first and second grade special education, while heading up the literacy program in Manchester, she has spent the last 13 years striving to help her students excel when traditional education does not succeed.

"I provide support for youngsters who learn differently," she says of her career. "It's not uncommon to have above-average kids, they just don't absorb information in the 'normal'

WHILE ENROLLED in

undergraduate study at the University of Michigan, a counselor suggested Whitney pursue special education, recognizing that her love of children was a unique gift and an important tool.

Armed with a Bachelor of Science in special education. and later a master's degree in education, Whitney tutored students in reading in her Ann Arbor home until her husband's death in 1988.

That year, she began an interim position in Milan, working with students in the reading lab, which introduced her to the routine of public schools.

In August 1989, Whitney began her job in Manchester. working with special education students in first and second

"Our principal (John McGuire) has said a lot of parents tell him they just want their children to be with someone who loves them.

"Patience and affection, that's the priority. It's so important for a child to like the

One approach Whitney uses to connect with her students is a lunch date, where her students take turns bringing one guest to eat in her room, a fun vacation" from the cafeteria.

Whitney has also co-authored a book with teacher Joanna Van Raden which utilizes poems and phonics exercises to help children play with and learn to use language.

The book hasn't been published," Whitney says, "but it was still a fun project to work on. A lot of the teachers use it anyway.

WHITNEY HAS seen special education evolve dramatically

"Thirty years ago, there wasn't nearly the support or structure of today's programs," she says. "It's a completely different animal today. Special education is highly organized and structured.

"It's not just a dumping ground for the kids with problems," she says, referring to the dying stigma that special education is for the "bad" kids.

"Now people realize that a lot of children who struggle with learning are intelligent. And there are specialists who work with all kinds of issues.

"It's great to see (the students) grow. Some come with such low skills, and it's exciting to see them develop. Their chances of being successful are much higher.'

With the improvements in special education also came greater accountability to the standards set by states and regional school systems, as well as improved methods for evalu-

THE DOWNSIDE to a constantly changing and improving program such as special education is the inevitable paperwork. Whitney just considers itpart of the job.

"You want to work with the kids, and it takes time away from creativity, but it's neces-

sary," she says. But what she feels most strongly about is the staff she works with on a daily basis.

"They are so dedicated," she says. "They set such high standards for themselves besides just their accountability to the head of special education. And they are fantastically creative.

"We have such a great support staff ... just superb parapros. It's uncanny how we keep getting such good ones vear after year. To come to school every day and see such a great staff, it's so rewarding. They're like my family!"

ASKED WHAT she anticipates most in her retirement, Whitney laughs and shrugs.

The name is a mouthful, a jawbreaker, a super-moniker and then some. It has the sound of big government, a bursting bureaucracy about it. In the field of public education. South and West Washtenaw Consortium-SWCC—could stand for "Sure Way to Wages, Careers," Or "Student-Work Worth Cash."

For 20 years, the Saline, Milan, Manchester, Chelsea and Dexter public schools have—by pooling teaching facilities, portions of their staffs and their budgetsbeen offering lifetime career opportunities to students searching for a fulfilling line of work. Starting in their third year of high school, students who opt to explore the career and technical education programs offered by SWWC can choose from 15 or more work-study classes that the

One of the Building Trades classes is centered in Chelsea and one in Saline: the Print Graphics sessions are based in Dexter; the Health Sciences are taught in Chelsea, as well as at Saline Community Hospital; and the Cosmetology teaching sessions are held in rented space at the Huron Valley Beauty Academy on Stadium Boulevard. With these few exceptions, the SWWC sessions are all located in Saline.

Busing and teaching costs are shared proportionately by the five school districts.

"Busing is a major part of the consortium budget." says Diane Skinner, principal/director of Career and Technical Education with SWWC.

And Diane ought to know. She travels from school to school. class to class, making sure that the mission of the consortium is being accomplished. Based in a small office at Saline High School, she is a smiling leader and inspirer.

"I believe in what we're doing," she says. "We're constantly monitoring the day-by-day progress of classes, and we follow up the employment successes of our graduates. One year after earning their diplomas. close to 80 percent of the program's alumni have found employment. A surprising number go on to college, aiming for a profession such as nursing or engineering that they've already gotten a head start in, as high school students.

South Washtenaw Consortium was

launched in the 1979-80 school year. David Mieras, a longtime teacher in Saline, was the key organizer. After building a strong foundation for the new program, Mieras retired in 1996.

Skinner, his successor, was born and raised in Jackson. She moved to Clinton in 1969, and commuted to Eastern Michigan University where she earned a bachelor's degree in home economics and science, a master's degree in consumer management, and a specialist degree in educational leadership.

"I COMMUTED to EMU through Saline," she says, "and I knew Saline was where I wanted to teach. In the fall of 1973. I started teaching home economics and biology here."

In 1981, Skinner joined Mieras on the faculty, and in 1989 she was named director of Career and Technical Education with the consortium. She has served as adviser to Future Homemakers of America, Big Sisters/Little Sisters Club, and was sponsor of the Saline High School Class of 1979 and part of the Class of '89.

Married to Gary Skinner, a pilot captain with Northwest Airlines, she and he are proud parents of daughter Terry, an upcoming junior at Michigan State, and son Tony, a member of the Class of 2002 at Saline. Soon he will join the student body at Western Michigan University. His major: aviation. Terry is studying to become a nurse, but ultimately she may end up teaching the subject herself.

SKINNER WILL retire at the end of the current school year. The Skinners will make their home at Lake Columbia in the Irish Hills. Gary has signed up for two years flying the Metro-Honolulu route. If things work out, they'll become "Hawaiians forever." If they decide they belong here in Michigan, they'll build a larger place at the lake.

And wherever they stay, Diane Skinner will always treasure memories of her happy, productive years as a teacher and direc-





When completed, the 2.887 square-foot home east of the industrial park will feature a two-car garage. laundry and mudroom, a kitchen with pantry and breakfast nook, a family

room with fireplace, living and dining rooms and four bedrooms, including a Jacuzzi mas-

An open house was held at the building site last Thursday to welcome parents and friends of the program to see how much the class has achieved since last September.

The foundation, brick work and shingles are the only parts of the home that have not been completed by students in the building trades class, who hail Chelsea. Saline. Manchester, Milan and Dexter.

Sawyer also considered Alma College and Albion College, also highly-ranked academically.


"I liked the atmosphere at Kalamazoo." he said. "It's inside of Western, so it's not like you're going to a small school.
