## NORTHERN SECTION ANNUAL TOURNAMENT By the Editor

ON Thursday, 3rd May, I had the great pleasure of being present as a guest at the Annual Tournament of the Northern Section, which this year was held at the Huddersfield Golf Club, Fixby (by kind permission of the Committee). It was my first visit to Yorkshire for a purely Northern Section tourney, but I hope most sincerely it will not be the last, for not only was the hospitality extended to me something that I shall never forget, but the general organisation and running of the Tournament itself was as near perfection as one can hope for in this imperfect world.

I must at once pay tribute to, and heartily congratulate, all concerned—the Committee; the Chairman; the indefatigable Hon. Secretary, my old friend F. G. Smith; and the Hon. Treasurer, genial W. H. Bartle, who gave up his day and became a backroom boy so that the players could get out on the course and enjoy themselves. Especially must I also thank Mr. F. V. Southgate, who not only had a busy day issuing and checking the cards and the returns, but very kindly met me in Leeds and conveyed me to Huddersfield and back in his car—a much appreciated gesture.

Of the Fixby course much could be written if space allowed. I hope to refer to its long and notable history in a separate article in a future issue. For the moment let me say that it measures about 6,400 yards over grand, undulating terrain; that the soil is naturally acid (rather like that of Ganton) and therefore the finer grasses thrive and the weeds do not. The local custodian is none other than Syd Jolly. He has been in charge for many years, knows every blade of grass by its Christian name, is highly efficient, exudes friendship of a special Yorkshire brand, and is deservedly most popular with the Club he so ably serves. It gave me added pleasure to meet this Northern stalwart, and must congratulate him on the condition of his course, notwithstanding the lamentable lack of rain common to the whole of the Country. As I write these lines it is actually raining here in the outskirts of London, and I hope Syd is getting some of it at Huddersfield, too, for it is badly wanted-lots of it.

Over 40 competitors took part in the event which, as usual, consisted of 36-holes medal

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play under handicap, with two divisions, and subsidiary sections for competitors who quite erroneously are described at "veterans" (such, for example, as George Kendall); for Vice-Presidents; and for Greenkeeper-Professionals. In short, there was something for everybody to shoot at, but they found a tough test awaiting them, and nobody made Fixby's S.S. score of 72 look even remotely foolish. The returns were in the main just steady stuff, as will be seen by a perusal of the full list of prize-winners below.

As might have been expected, the lowest gross aggregate of the day (154) was compiled by F. Walker, the Clitheroe greenkeeperprofessional. This expert hitter of the ball made very few mistakes throughout the day. Here are the details of his cards: Morning: Out, 5, 5, 4, 4, 6, 4, 4, 4, 5, -41; In, 3, 4, 4, 3, 5, 3, 4, 6, 4-36; total, 77. Afternoon: Out, 5, 5, 4, 3, 5, 5, 4, 4, 5, -40; In, 4, 3, 4, 4, 3, 4, 5, 6-37; total, 77.

Leading all Sections in the morning was H. Driver, of Bingley St. Ives, with 75 net, but his afternoon 79 opened the gate to Sandmoor's J. Scott (18) who, after a prelunch net 79 excelled himself in the afternoon with a capital 71 for an aggregate of 150 to win the 2nd Division section.

In the 1st Division G. L. Sharp (12) gained the premier award with commendably steady returns of 79 and 81, beating A Money, of Headingley, playing off a similar handicap, by a single shot. It will not escape notice that two competitors called Smith (senior and junior) both managed to figure in the prize list. I seem to have heard of these two before, and in congratulating them on their success I shall watch their further progress towards scratch! Smith junior marred an otherwise good afternoon card with a 7 at the 5th and a 9 at the 12th, but even so he turned in a net 79, playing off 7.

One competitor, who shall remain anonymous, but for whose pluck and persistence I have the greatest admiration, registered 259 gross for the 36 holes, four holes in the morning round alone cost him 11, 10 and two 9's. Such is golf, and most of us have done it in our time!

With the day's play over, we assembled in full force in the lounge, where Mr. H. G. Whitley, the Captain of the Club, very kindly presented the prizes, supported by Mr. E. E. Ainley, ex-Captain; Mr. W. Scott, Hon. Secretary; and many members of the Club.

Mr. G. Geddes, Chairman of the Section, ably proposed, and Mr. T. Hullah equally ably seconded, a collective vote of thanks to Mr. Whitley for presenting the prizes; to the Huddersfield Club for granting the courtesy of the course for the day; to Mr. S. Risdon, the Steward, and his wife and sister-in-law for the splendid meals and service provided both in the dining room and at the 19th hole; to Mr. F. V. Southgate for handling the cards and returns; to Mr. Syd Jolly and his staff for the hard work put in to get the course in such excellent condition; and to

First Year Competitors. There will not be a separate competition for First Year Competitors. All First Year Competitors must play from an official handicap. (This excludes, of course, participation in the "News of the World" and "Jubilee" Cup Competitions which are played from Scratch.)

Greenkeeper - Professionals. Greenkeeper -Professionals who are not members of the P.G.A. may compete in the Annual Tournament on the same basis as other members. They will, of course, play from their lowest handicap.

Prize Allocation. The following points are of importance.

- 1. The 18 Holes Stableford Competition to be played on Monday, 13th August, is to be regarded as a Competition entirely on its own. Once it has been played, it has finished. The winning of prizes in this competition will not debar any member from participating in the Prize Lists for Tuesday and Wednesday.
- 2. The Winner and Runner-up of the "News of the World" Competition; the Winner of the Artisan Medal; and any member eligible for a prize in the "Jubilee" Cup Competition will not be debarred from participating in the Junior or Senior Division Prize Lists on Tuesday, 14th August, and vice versa. There is, of course, one exception, and that refers to the "Coming of Age" Cup as previously mentioned. Thus, the Competitions played on Tuesday, 14th August, finish on that day and do not affect in any way the Prize Lists for Monday and Wednesday.
- 3. The 18 Hole Medal Competition to be played on Wednesday, 15th August, is to be regarded in the same light as Monday's Competition.

It is hoped that the position is now perfectly clear, but just to go a little further, let me say that under this scheme it is possible for any ONE member to be the recipient of a prize as follows:—

Monday: 18 Holes Stableford.

Tuesday: "News of the World" Cup. Artisan Medal. "Jubilee" Cup.

"Coming of Age" Cup or "Divisional" Competition. Wednesday: 18 Holes Medal.

ALSO in any Putting Competition that may be organised.

Accommodation. It is hoped that all members will have booked their hotel accommodation by now. YOU HAVE BEEN WARNED!

Sweepstakes. The following optional Sweepstakes will be run :---

MONDAY, 13TH AUGUST.	18	Holes.
TUESDAY, 14TH AUGUST.	36	Holes.

WEDNESDAY, 15TH AUGUST. 18 Holes. Sweepstakes will not be divided into "Senior" and "Junior" Divisions. The stake will be 2/6 per person per day (a total of 7/6) and payment will be made in the following ratio :—

1st	 	50%

3rd	 	20%

Staff Gratuity. Competitors are requested to contribute at the rate of 5/- per head for Staff Gratuity. Distribution will be made between the Outside and Inside Staff of the Club.

Meals during the Tournament. Luncheon and Tea will be available each day and the charges are as follows :---

Return of Cards and Handicap Record Book. Sectional Secretaries are reminded that the THREE CARDS to be submitted by each competitor for handicapping purposes, together with the Section's Handicap Record Book, must be despatched so as to reach me not later than Saturday, 30th June.

Handicaps. Competitors must state on their Entry Form their LOWEST Club, Association or Golfing Society Handicap. Members are requested to note that the Tournament Sub-Committee is empowered to alter any handicap prior to or at any stage of the tournament if considered necessary, and the Committee's decision on this or any other point appertaining to the running of the Tournament shall be final. Sectional Secretaries are held responsible for ensuring that the handicaps under which their members enter are true and accurate, and must be prepared to substantiate these if called upon to do so.

Ties. In the event of a Tie for 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th place (and so one) the result will be decided on the LAST NINE HOLES.

Should a Tie still exist, the LAST SIX HOLES WILL COUNT.

Should a Tie still exist, the LAST THREE HOLES WILL COUNT.

The Rule governing Ties will NOT apply to the "News of the World" Tournament.

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In the event of a replay being necessary the contestants shall play together; Stroke Play over 18 Holes.

Local Rules. Competitors should make themselves familiar with the Local Rules before commencing to play.

Completed Cards. Score Cards, duly completed and signed at the end of each round, must be handed to the Hon. Secretary immediately upon return to the Club-house.

Caddies. Mechanical caddies will be available and the normal charge is 1/- per round.

Play on the Course prior to the Competition. Competitors may play over the Course on Saturday and Sunday, 11th and 12th August, but it would be appreciated if the numbers could be restricted.

## **Southern Section Tournament**

## By the Editor

MANY roads led to Berkshire on Tuesday, 8th May, when over 50 members of the Southern Section assembled at the Reading Golf Club (by kind permission of the Committee) for their Annual Tournament.

The weather was ideal, and the course was in splendid order, always remembering that rain (in common with all courses) was long overdue. It was all to the greater credit of Head Greenkeeper Kingston and his staff that he had contrived to get his fairways and greens to such a degree of excellence. Incidentally, he was a busy man, for he not only managed to get in his two rounds and win a prize, but he filled in the rest of the day behind the bar, while his cheery stewardess wife and her staff provided perfect lunches and teas, in generous portions that satisfied even the hungriest of the competitors.

The players went out in threes and kept well to schedule, despite four stiff opening holes measuring, 446, 440, 395 and 418 yards respectively, and few players contrived to register the 4, 5, 4, 4 of Col. Bogey. However, the general level of the net returns was; I thought, extremely good.

The hero of the day deserves, and must have, a paragraph all to himself. I refer to W. B. McKean, of South Beds., who had a field day and swept the board well and truly clean. This amiable Scot, whose swing is one of the "can't-go-wrong" variety, played superbly. He was round in a gross 77 in the morning, less 8=69, and his gross 75 in the afternoon was an even better effort, as his handicap had been reduced to 6. This gave him another net 69 for a winning aggregate of 138. A combination of skill and good fortune gave him a hole in 1—the blind and tricky 6th (141 yards). This helped him on his way rejoicing, and subsequently cost him a few bawbees celebrationally!

Here are the details of his two cards: Morning: Out, 5, 5, 4, 5, 4, 3, 5, 3, 5-38; In, 6, 3, 4, 4, 5, 3, 4, 5, 4-39; less 8=69. Afternoon: Out, 5, 6, 5, 5, 4, 1, 4, 3, 5-38; In, 5, 3, 5, 5, 5, 3, 4, 4, 3-37; less 6=69.

The runner-up in the main competition was another Scot in J. K. Glass (6). Long teeshots down the middle and accurate approach work gave him net rounds of 75 and 72 for an aggregate of 147. His afternoon card read: Out, 5, 5, 4, 4, 5, 3, 5, 4, 4—39; In, 5, 3, 5, 5, 5, 3, 5, 4, 4—39; less 6=72.

J. M. Johnstone (8), of Leeds Castle, took the third prize after a tie with F. W. Corner

(6), at 148, a success due to a fine net afternoon round of 70.

On the principle of "one man one prize", the scratch award went to that rapidly improving young player J. Kirkpatrick, of Dulwich and Sydenham, with 151, after a tie with W. A. Gardner, of Guildford. The latter, who plays off 3, and hits the ball "a mile", as the saying goes, has a beautifully compact and controlled swing, and his golf was a pleasure to watch.

In the section for the "over 55's", the leader was our old friend S. Morton, who returned recently from the North of Ireland to these shores, and is now at Old Fold Manor. Playing off 10, he was the embodiment of steadiness in returning a net aggregate of 149. For the full list of winning returns, see below.

Not all survived the day without disaster. For instance, J. Noakes, who off 2 handicap is no mean performer, had an extraordinary afternoon gross round of 80, which made him furious! He went out in 44 which included an ugly 10 at the par four 7th, and came home immaculately in 36. A cruel blow, that 7th! Another player suffered the horrors of compiling 8, 14, 7 and 10 at the first 4 holes in the morning, but he carried on bravely, as all good sportsmen should but many do not!

The lounge provided an animated scene when Mr. M. L. Ash, the Captain of the Club, after a speech of hearty welcome, presented the prizes, which included a special Club "hole-in-one" tie to Jock McKean—a nice additional memento of the occasion.

In the unavoidable absence of Mr. Fred Chambers, the Section President, a collective vote of thanks was proposed by Mr. J. G. Glass. He thanked the Club for granting the courtesy of the course and club-house, which everyone present had so much appreciated. He said the course had played extremely well, thanks to the work of Mr. W. Kingston and his staff; and they were truly indebted to Mrs. Kingston and the indoor staff for having provided such wonderful food. They were also most grateful to Messrs. Hazell, Marshall and Cammell, of Ransomes, for their untiring work throughout the day in handling the cards and collating the scores.

A pleasing feature was the attendance of Mr. W. Smithers and other old members of the Association. It warmed our hearts to see these familiar faces. ## Correspondence

(To the Editor)

Dear Editor,

I have been very interested in the correspondence on de-worming in recent issues of our magazine.

My experiences have been very contradictory.

Pre-war I took over a nine-hole course in the month of January which had been treated with 6-cwt. of Lead Arsenate on the nine greens the previous September, and the wormcasts were as large as walnuts!

I treated these greens with Mowrah Meal in favourable weather and swept up worms, filling a barrow on some greens; and, in spite of mowing greens, banks and approaches with the boxes on, worms re-populated the greens, attracted presumably by the de-composing Mowrah Meal.

I found Derris Root (5% Rotentone) better;  $\frac{1}{2}$  oz. Derris per sq. yd. being more effective than 8 ozs, of Mowrah Meal and needing less water; in fact, if I slipped up in water supply the Mowrah Meal was lost, but Derris Root was efficient if it rained some days later.

After the war I went to another course and this had been farm land in the past.

The 5th green was worm-infested to a terrible extent and was very soggy; and some so-called greenkeepers had played about draining it, because I hit drain tiles when changing the hole.

I dressed this green with Lead Arsenate at the 2-oz. rate on the first Monday in September and again gave the same dose the following April-without clearing the worms. (When I use Lead Arsenate I mow with the box off, hoping the grass leaves will poison the worms.)

I told, the Committee that I would have to try to alter the soil condition and I asked for 50 lbs. of Sulphur.

Mr. J. I. Preston, of Fisons, agreed with me, saying that as the soil was heavy the Lead Arsenate lay in a thin layer on top, and worms could penetrate this layer without consuming any Lead Arsenate, or at any rate, sufficient to kill them. Mr. Preston advised spiking to open up the soil and mix the Lead Arsenate with it.

I used the Sulphur in October, 1953, and the worms disappeared in a most miraculous way and, from being a soggy patch, it was the driest part of the course in 1954.

In February last year I took over the Manchester Golf Club and I have two greens that confirm Mr. Cooke's theory about open soil.

These two greens are on hill tops, and when I watered last year, water poured out of the hill sides a few feet lower down in a very short time. (Pluviette sprinklers, three to a green, were used.) These two greens have a few casts on them, more than on any of the others.

The 18 greens get 2 ozs. of Lead Arsenate per sq. yd. every year, but I put the presence of these casts down to the compost dressing bringing worms in, but I have known greens so open and well-drained that I have never seen worm-casts on them.
