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

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

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The 36th International Turf Grass Conference and Show of the Golf Course Superintendents' Association of America took place at the Sheraton Hotel, Cleveland, Ohio, on 7th to 12th February. More than 40 speakers took part in the six education assemblies and more than 33,000 square feet were devoted to the Association's "Greatest Show on Turf" in the hotel's exhibit hall. The area was taken up by a record number of 97 commercial firms and attendance was close on the 3,000 mark.

The National Association of Groundsmen announce that the Groundsmen's Field Day will be held on Wednesday, 7th April 1965, at University of London Athletic Grounds, Motspur Park, New Malden, Surrey (by kind permission of the University of London). Demonstrations will cover Renovation of Winter Playing Fields, including the first full scale working demonstration of the "Contravator" and Lospred seed sower. A demonstration of drainage work, trenching, pipe-laying and use of the new plastic drain. Spreading of top dressings. Demonstration of New Machines and recent introductions also Machines for special jobs — Trulute, etc.

Messrs Hargreaves have added two more useful machines to their wide range. The "Contravator" \* which is basically a tougher, wider application of the Rotorake principle tilths a surface with minimum disturbance while the "Lospred" \* immediately behind measures grass seed with extreme accuracy and sows it at once in the prepared ground. It is expected that lower seed rates can be employed and the Contravator and Lospred in tandem will have many uses in speeding up constructional and renovation jobs.

Everything happens on Sunday in Barcelona. Take 28th February for instance. We were on the way to the golf club at El Prat in the morning when the road became lined with crowds and traffic was swung to the off-

Even so, we were having a cup soon after five at the Barcelona Yacht Club where a considerable number of admirable vessels were drawn up, including a representative from the Thames.

Upstairs, for good measure, an art exhibition was thrown in. We naturally preferred the sculpted lady golfer, two large canvasses painted at El Prat and a curious gouache of a golfer looking for his ball in a fog.

Capacity Crowds


By now there was just time to get back to the Barcelona-Real Madrid game at 8 p.m. The stadium is reported to hold 120,000 and they were all there when thunder flashes and a scared black cat preceded the home team on to their pitch. The visitors in white shirts, shorts and stockings followed to slightly less thunderous applause. Seventeen free kicks later, half-way through the first half, Barcelona scored. This released a considerable tide of emotion and a rocket sailed into the air to announce the goal to the city. Alas, there were no rockets thirty-two and forty-one free kicks later respectively when Madrid scored their two. An older and more artful team, they were hard pressed for the rest of the game but held on to their lead and would have added another if the final whistle had not blown too soon.

### Another Match!

As we came away, another match of less consequence was starting and there had been another before the big game, so the patrons could not complain of short measure. Agrostis stolonifera, by the way, on the pitch and only a tiny area of wear round the goal mouths. The floodlighting was flattering, making the whole affair look like a colour slide, but evidently this is the grass for that climate. When it is planted, it is broadcast by the handful and then rolled with a row of fairly sharp discs, two or three inches apart, which squeeze the pieces into the soil. Greens, tees and fairways get exactly the same treatment.

By now it is 12.10 a.m. on 1st March and supper just over. Roll on Monday and the relaxation of a hard day's work.

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

### MEMORIAL FUND

This fund was started in 1956 by the British Golf Greenkeepers Association, the Artisan Golfers Association, the National Association of Public Golfers and the Addington Court Golf Club. 
So far, the fees for seventeen pupils have been paid by the fund with living

We reprint in full the first two pages of this excellent guide issued by the Royal and Ancient Golf Club because it will not only be of use to those for whom it is intended but also to all golfers in reminding them of situations which can arise and could be avoided.

# DUTIES OF REFEREES AND COMMITTEE MEMBERS UNDER THE RULES OF GOLF

DEFINITION 26 defines the principal duty of a Referee as being to decide questions of fact and of golf law. It is not sufficient for him to render a correct decision when appealed to: he must also at all times be sufficiently alert to observe accurately and to interpret correctly all the events which may occur during a round. But within the scope of these duties, he is assigned to a match to help ensure that it will be fairly played under sporting conditions.

This brings up the question of the referee's ethical position when he sees a player about to break the Rules. The referee does not have the authority to prevent a wilful violation of the Rules, but he certainly does have the obligation to advise the players about the Rules. It would be contrary to the spirit of fair play in golf if a referee failed to inform a player of his rights and obligations under the Rules and then penalised him for a violation that he could have prevented.

The following situations are among those where the referee may be able to prevent a breach of the Rules.

(1) Ask players on first tee, if they have counted their clubs.

(2) Ask players to identify brand and number of ball on first tee.

(3) If player at any time puts a second ball into play or plays provisional ball, ensure that player can identify both balls.

(4) If player tees ball ahead of markers, draw his attention to it before he drives. (5) If player is about to lift loose impediment in a hazard or water hazard, remind him that his ball is in a hazard.

(6) If player is about to adopt wrong dropping procedure, call his attention to it and point out correct procedure.

(7) If a player is about to play a second ball, ask player whether it is provisional ball.

An occasion when a referee can assist a player is when he is playing from bushes, etc., and is in process of taking his stance: a referee should watch the player and guide him in his actions if need be.

Sometimes a player may be careless in his observance of a Rule. If there has been no actual violation, the referee should caution the player and so minimise the possibility of having to call an infraction later: this can be done by making sure that the player is familiar with the particular Rule.

At times awkward situations will arise. The referee should be firm and positive, but take plenty of time.

It is always as well to consult the Rule Book and it will help to let the players read it. Frequently in reaching a decision, the intention of the player can be important and determination of this can be very useful as a routine approach to a questionable action, as for example if this player should appear to test the depth of sand in a bunker or to touch the line of his putt when there are no visible loose impediments to be removed.

Finally there are difficult questions of fact raised by casual water and interference by an obstruction. To be deemed casual water, a temporary accumulation of water must be visible on the surface of the ground before or after the player takes his stance, under normal pressure of the player's weight. As for interference by an obstruction, the interference must be physical for the player to evoke the Rule. The Rule is not intended to cover mental interference or interference established by wild contortions.

DEMONSTRATIONS OF ANY ATCO CAN BE ARRANGED TO SUIT YOU OR YOUR GREENS COMMITTEE For a referee in stroke play there is one important difference in his duties: he is not bound to reach a decision on the course as in match play: he can, if necessary, require the player to proceed under Rule 11-5 and complete the hole with two balls and pass the burden of a difficult decision to the Committee in charge of the competition.

When committee members are watching play or assigned to a particular place on the course, but are not acting as referees, their duties are different. In match play without a referee, the players involved in a particular match are there to protect their own interests and there is no reason for a committee member to take any notice of a breach of the Rules that he may observe, unless he is satisfied that the opponent is not in a position to observe the breach. His presence on the course is solely to assist players in the event of a claim (Rule 11-1a and Rule 11-3). His handling of the situation will depend on whether the committee have granted individual members unlimited authority to represent the committee and make This is an issue on final decisions. which a clear decision must be made advance. However, deferring a decision should be resorted to only in exceptional circumstances, since it is a principle of match play that each side is entitled to know the state of the match at all times.

In stroke play the position of a Committee member on the course is different. Now every competitor has a direct interest in the play of all other competi-Since only those playing in a particular match can represent the interests of the others, it becomes the duty of every Committee member to represent the interests of the remainder of the field. Thus a Committee member must act on any probable violation of the Rules which he may observe. This may be done by immediately questioning the competitor about his procedure. he will be called upon to make decisions on the course and they should be handled as in match play except that the need for an immediate decision is less urgent.

Competitors in a Tournament are keenly conscious of the spirit in which it is conducted and there is no more certain way of injuring the reputation of a Tournament than by slack management. It may be difficult and unpleasant to be punctilious in the enforcement of Rules, but it is a rare golfer who does not prefer to compete in a well run event. Players are quick to recognise the official who makes use of his position to watch the play better or to inflate his own sense of importance. Authority should be exercised for the sole purpose of helping to ensure that an event will be fairly played under sporting conditions.

### PUBLICATIONS RECEIVED

THE 1964 Journal of the Sports Turf Research Institute, issued to Subscribers in March 1965, has taken on a new appearance externally, but still provides the same brand of good, red meat on the inside. A thirty-five page report on the fertiliser trials, which have been a feature of the experimental plots ever since the station began, will be of particular interest to greenkeepers. It bears directly on aspects of fertilising which can be overlooked in reflecting on our own results and the total view which it presents will be invaluable in training our minds to gauge the effects of treatments in the long term as well as for the Captain's Prize next month.

Mr. William Bartle returns with his descriptions and photographs of new machinery and Dr. Noel Jackson evaluates varieties of useful grasses in one article and comments on 1964 turf

diseases in another.

A wide range of other papers and features will give the greenkeeper assistance and interest for as long as he cares to study this excellent publication.

Messrs. Carters have sent us the 1965 edition of their Treatment of Golf Courses and Sportsgrounds. This year's booklet has expanded and taken on more colour with great benefit to its usefulness and appearance. Extremely well illustrated, it shows examples of the firm's work all over Europe and pictures of weeds, pests, and machinery in the treatment section complete a useful guide which any greenkeeper can obtain by writing to Messrs. Carters Tested Seeds Ltd., Raynes Park, S.W.20.

BEA have issued their 1965 edition of Golf in the Sun which describes a selection of golf courses throughout Europe within easy reach of airports served by the air line. It is difficult to say much about a golf course in the space of a short column and it is curious that part of this limited space is used in almost every case to state that the clubhouse contains facilities which will surprise nobody. Although their order

of mention is varied, their repetition does not add to the force of the descriptions. These seem to have been composed from letters received from the clubs themselves and it is again no surprise to learn that nearly every course is attractively sited and in excellent condition.

Of the twenty-nine French courses listed, two are spelt wrongly and one, set amongst pines and heather is described as a parkland course. In Germany, two 18-hole courses within five miles of the Dusseldorf Airport are not mentioned, nor is another only ten miles farther on, where championships are frequently played. One hopes that other countries have fared better.

There is, nevertheless, a great deal of useful information — Address, Telephone Number, Location, Nearest Airport, Length, Par and Green Fees. The problem starts when we come to "Amenities". For example, "A most picturesque and delightful clubhouse containing changing and locker rooms, restaurant and bar". And in the next column "A pleasant and well furnished clubhouse containing changing locker rooms, showers, restaurant and bar". On the next page: "There is a very well appointed clubhouse containing changing and locker rooms, bar and restaurant". Next columns: "A wellequipped clubhouse containing. . . . A well-equipped clubhouse that contains. . . . A pleasant clubhouse containing. . . ." Not a lot to choose between any of them.

The "Condition and comments on the course" which follow are reminiscent of an 1890 Golf Handbook. "Although a short course it is by no means an easy one. The greens are well guarded and underhit strokes can be severely penalised." Or "This course should not be missed from any golfing itinerary. The standard of the fairways and greens is good and the hazards are well placed to catch the bad shot."

Better, surely, to stick to facts . . . heather, parkland, seaside, lakeside, wooded or whatever it may be, name the nearest hotel and price, give unusual

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

### Own Corner

Easter will soon be with us, so it will be Hot Cross Bun time again; and how about some Easter Cookies?

### **Hot Cross Buns**

You require: -1 oz. yeast -1 teaspoonful of sugar  $-1\frac{1}{2}$  lb. plain flour -3 oz. sultanas -3 oz. currants -6 oz. sugar  $-\frac{1}{2}$  pint milk -6 oz. margarine  $-\frac{1}{2}$  teaspoon cinnamon - pinch salt. Cream the yeast with the spoonful

Cream the yeast with the spoonful of sugar. Mix the 6 oz. sugar with the  $1\frac{1}{2}$  lb. flour and add the dried fruit, salt and cinnamon. When thoroughly mixed make a hole in the centre and pour into it the yeast and the milk heated to blood heat. Mix surrounding flour only with the liquid to a thin paste, sprinkle with dry flour and set the bowl in a warm place for the mixture to rise. When it has risen well (about half an hour) add the 6 oz. margarine and mix in suffi-

cient warm milk to form the mixture into a soft dough. Now let this rise for half an hour, then form the dough into buns, mark with a cross and bake, Brush over with a little syrup made of sugar and water when they are done.

Gas No. 8. Electricity 450 deg. F.

Time: 20 minutes.

### Easter Cookies

2 oz. Butter or margarine—3 oz. castor sugar — 1 egg — 4 oz. plain flour. —1 oz. currants—1 tablespoon milk—

 $\frac{1}{2}$  teaspoon rum or brandy.

Cream the butter with 2 oz. castor sugar until it is really soft, stir in the well-beaten egg yolk and the rum or When all are well blended, brandy. work in the flour and a little milk, then currants to form a rather stiff dough. Set it aside for half an hour to settle. Roll out thinly, cut into rounds three inches across with a biscuit cutter. Bake on a well-greased baking sheet until the cookies are firm and lightly coloured. Brush over with the whipped white of egg and sprinkle with the remaining castor sugar. Return to the oven for a minute or two. This will make about 18 cookies, store in an airtight tin. Electricity 375 deg. F. Gas No. 4 Time: 15 minutes.



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
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
