

Windfall

Mr Donald Snodgrass, who died last October, has left £2,000 to the Royal Mid-Surrey Golf Club for course upkeep. He had been a member for thirty-five years.

Three Chances

Eton Rural Council will be asked for planning consent for a 9-hole golf course on a farm at Iver Heath. The Rural Council also has its own plans for a 9-hole course at Stoke Place. For good measure, Slough itself has ideas about an 18-hole course at Langley.

Too Late

Hawkstone Park Hotel and Golf Club, 12 miles north of Shrewsbury, was for sale last month. The course measures 6,315 yards and was laid out in 1920 by James Brand. Now a syndicate of members has bought it. The price is not disclosed but £70,000 was being asked for the property with 158 acres.

Thaw

Both Workington Golf Club in Cumberland, and Llandeilo in South Wales have received the maximum £10,000 grant from the Ministry of Education. Some Llandeilo rural Councillors are now asking why the Golf Club is favoured when they cannot get funds to extend their mobile Library Service.

Drought no worry

Ron Whitehead, head greenkeeper at Wheatley, Doncaster, is dreaming of a dry summer. By that time he will have pop-up sprinklers on all his greens, controlled from an 18-point master clock. The cost is estimated at £4,500. The club has also negotiated a new 75-year lease with Doncaster Corporation at £500 a year for the first 25 years.

Inundated

The Sports Sub-Committee of Worthing's Open Spaces Committee decided to meet golfers at Hill Barn Municipal Golf Course to discuss ways of improving the course. Now they have 133 written suggestions.

FERTILISERS AND SPRING GROWTH

PLANT nutrients are continuously taken up from the soil by the growing plant and the maintenance of an adequate supply of plant food through the application of fertiliser is essential to maintain satisfactory growth in turf. This is particularly true of golf greens and tees where growth has constantly to renew the foliage removed during mowing. The fertiliser requirement of fairways is less than that of greens because gang mowing returns the clippings so that the nutrient material is returned to the soil and gradually decomposed and made available to the plant again. Thus many fairways have survived quite adequately without fertiliser for ten years or more though others, on sandy or thin soil, or in areas of high rainfall where the fertiliser is washed out of the soil, require more frequent fertilising.

Main Elements

Greens require a much more continuous fertiliser programme with regular application of nitrogen (e.g. in the form of sulphate of ammonia) at controlled rates through the growing season. Nitrogen is accepted as being the most important element in providing growth for the renewal of leafage but a supply of phosphate and potash is also essential to maintain a healthy sward. Application of the spring fertiliser provides a good opportunity to apply both these elements and ensure a supply for the remainder of the growing season. It is also argued that young growth is more demanding in its phosphate requirement and therefore spring application of this element is appropriate. Phosphates are usually applied as superphosphate with possibly small proportions of fine bone meal while potash is generally in the form of sulphate of potash.

Weather conditions for steady growth are required in spring time before this complete fertiliser is applied. Suitable conditions in a normal season should occur round about the third week in April but unfortunately few years are "normal" and occurrence of the desired conditions will vary from year to year and between one locality and another. Therefore, the main criterion for application of fertiliser in spring is that favourable weather conditions should already be providing conditions for growth. Unfortunately, however, nature does not usually oblige by providing these conditions at the beginning of the main competition season, a fact which appears to escape a large proportion of the golfing fraternity.

False Spring

The unwary may be caught out by a false spring at this time with a sudden flush of growth during early March which quickly subsides with no further movement for three or four weeks. The resulting soft, forced growth may also be more easily damaged. Fertiliser mistakenly applied at this time will be largely wasted as, by the time growth restarts, much of the nutrient material will have become unavailable and a supplementary fertiliser may then be necessary to boost growth at the true start of the growing season. Generally a flush of growth in March should be mistrusted except perhaps in the extreme south and west and if there is a desire to apply fertiliser at this early stage it would usually be advisable to think only in terms of a light dressing of sulphate of ammonia so delaying the complete fertiliser until more settled growth is assured.

East Winds

An additional complication, perhaps most often experienced in the east of England and Ireland, and near coasts or other exposed positions, is the sharp easterly wind which often blows as late as May and can completely arrest growth causing discoloration by scorching leaf tips. Again it is often useful to

Fertiliser and Spring Growth-continued

follow such weather with a touch of sulphate of ammonia to get growth moving again and restore colour to the sward though it may be impractical to delay the main spring dressing in anticipation of these unpredictable easterlies. This problem cannot be completely overcome but can be reduced by working into the surface an application of good friable compost at 2-4 lb./sq. yd. in March following light wire raking. This will help to protect the grass and allow growth to resume more quickly when more favourable conditions return. Damage to the sward will also be minimised by avoiding unnecessarily close mowing.

Early Bite

A temptation to apply fertiliser too early often arises where, on a course surrounded by agricultural land, the farmer is seen to obtain response to his fertiliser dressings at the beginning of March or even earlier, but the grazier is able to obtain this early bite for his stock only by using the coarser grass species such as Perennial and Italian ryegrasses often specifically selected for his purpose. The coarser grasses naturally begin growth earlier than the fine fescues and bent grasses and this often explains the advanced growth of fairways in the early part of the year as compared with greens. Difference in growth between greens on courses situated within the same district may also be attributable to this feature where greens containing a proportion of the coarser grasses and annual meadowgrass can show greater growth than those containing a high proportion of bents and fescues, although the latter will provide the superior putting surface over the year as a whole.

Roots

Though adequate supply of fertiliser is essential for growth it is of little value if other requirements are not also satisfied. In addition to the points already mentioned the condition of the turf itself will have an important bearing on the effectiveness of fertiliser applications. Nutrient material supplied by the fertilisers is taken up by the roots and a deep, well spread, root system is essential to give a good, long lasting response which does not tail off quickly. A desirable root system and consequently efficient utilisation of fertiliser can only be obtained by a full maintenance programme giving adequate attention to deep aeration and fibre control.

pH Level

Over-acidity of the turf may also be responsible for poor response and the level of soil acidity should be regularly checked and corrected where necessary. In some cases nitro chalk will produce a better response than sulphate of ammonia on acid turf but this fertiliser should only be used exceptionally and with discretion.

MAXIMUM MANPOWER UTILISATION

From an article by Mr Orville Clapper in the December, 1966 "Turf Grass Times" with grateful acknowledgments.

Golfers are demanding better turf every year. This means more grooming and time table scheduling of work jobs. Every man must be fully utilised from the moment he checks in until he checks out. There can be no loafing or waiting for "play-through". All this is lost time.

We'll have to water those greens, tees and fairways at night. It could even be better for the grass as the nights are cooler, and, with no player interference to start or stop a sprinkler, we know we have applied the amount of water scheduled.

In my own business I am facing that mountain of paper work — government forms — tax collector's duties, until we seem to be sliding backwards. And the pile is growing daily. We note that businessmen who are in the same boat are actually **calling on**, not waiting to be **called** on, data processing and other updated equipment to speed up their work with fuller utilisation of present manpower.

Is it not about time that club officials start co-operating with their operations and management personnel to see what is new and better in equipment or methods to accomplish greater results with their present staff ??? It is not to "keep up with the Jones" nor beat "the Jones" but to make more golf time available for the increased membership necessary to carry this increasing cost of operation.

As we drive to and from work and note the heavily loaded traffic complexes we wonder why so much time is lost just waiting in traffic lines. Yet, we find the same good folks "a huffing and a puffing" — "dilly-dallying" in line on the first tee. With earlier starting times

There may be a tendency for initial keenness to degenerate into mere dogged persistence as the season progresses, but a touch of oil and carborundum is usually efficacious in such cases.

A word of warning however ... marked end-of-season fall-off in performance will not be corrected (as is too often thought to be the case) by a spell in winter quarters. Full remedial treatment is called for —and this is best left to experts.

COLD ENOUGH TO SPLIT A CHIEF JUSTICE


A famous statue of a chief justice has been severely damaged by frost and ice. The statue, of Sir Edward Coke, is a famous landmark for golfers at Stoke Poges Golf Course.

It faces towards the Law Courts, where Sir Edward Coke was intimately involved in championing the people's rights. He was called to the Bar in 1578 and later achieved fame as attorney general, Speaker of the House of Commons, and Chief Justice of the common pleas. He fought King James VI on many issues connected with the rights of the people. He finally became Chief Justice of the King's Bench — and in this position tries Sir Walter Raleigh. Earlier in his career he represented Oliver Cromwell in a libel suit.

The statue, situated on top of a 70 ft. high pedestal had split at the sides and back, due to the water trapped inside expanding as it froze. The statue has been restored by Szerelmey Ltd., who have filled the inside with cement and hardcore and stitched the terra cotta frame with non-ferrous cramps.

we might accommodate even 25 per cent more golfers in a given day. Yes, we might even light the last 3 or 4 holes if necessary.

It reminds me of the little boy with the wild eyes who crams his fist into the jar of jelly beans only to find that a very limited number can came out in his hand every time he tries. We can't make the hole in the jar any larger but we can put it on the counter earlier.

We have about reached the peak in reducing the number of necessary staff so we have only two other roads open to us: (1) greater efficiency from new and more modern equipment, and (2) move into the hours of darkness for much of the "on the course" maintenance tasks.

Mrs Greenkeeper's Own Corner

with Ann Mawson

Oranges should still be good, and as they are rich in Vitamin C, we really should make the most of them. There are so many different ways we can use them, and here are a few.

Orange Squash

1 orange, 1 teaspoonful of demerara sugar, soda water.

Squeeze the juice into a tumbler, add the sugar and stir until the sugar has dissolved.

Add soda water and serve.

Orange Souffle Hot

 $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. margarine, 2 oz. flour, 1 gill of milk, rind of 1 orange, 1 gill of orange juice, 2 oz. sugar, 3 eggs.

Mix the margarine and flour over a gentle heat and add the milk slowly, grated orange rind and juice; stir until boiling, remove from the heat, add the sugar and when slightly cooled, stir in the egg yolks. Whip the whites stiffly and fold into the mixture; turn into a greased souffle tin and steam very gently for 50 minutes or until well risen and set; turn out carefully and serve with orange sauce. To serve four people.

Orange Sauce

1 large orange, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, water, 1 teaspoonful of arrowroot.

Wash the orange and cut the rind off in thin strips (avoiding any white pith), now cut the strips into shreds. Remove the juice and make the liquid up to half a pint with water. Place the arrowroot, sugar and orange shreds into a small pan; add the liquid slowly, stir until boiling, allow to simmer for 3 minutes then serve.

Orange Salad

4 oranges, 2 oz. chopped nuts, 1 oz. coconut, 2 oz. brown sugar.

Remove the rind from the oranges, leaving no white pith. Cut them into thin circles, and remove any pips. Place the orange circles in a glass dish; sprinkle over first with the finely chopped nuts, then the coconut and lastly the sugar. Now leave in a cool place for at least 1 hour. To serve 4 people.

Orange Fritters

2 oranges, caster sugar, deep fat for frying, milk, 1 egg, salt, 2 tablespoonfuls of flour.

Mix the flour and salt together in a bowl, and make a well in the centre, Drop in the egg and 1 tablespoonful of milk and beat in the dry ingredients from the sides of the bowl. Add sufficient milk to make a coating consistency. Beat well, cover and allow to stand in a cool place for I hour. Skin the oranges, peeling them like you would an apple, cut into circles, remove pips and dust with sugar, dip each slice into the batter, making certain the orange is well coated. Place into smoking hot fat and keep in motion until the fritter is a golden brown. Drain in soft paper and toss in sugar, and be sure to serve immediately.

To serve 4 people.


