A brighter side to events in Belfast was the opening last month of a new £250,000 sports complex on the slopes of Belfast's Black Mountain. The Green Briar Golf Centre is situated on a 24-acre site, easily reached from the city and already has a 135 ft. covered driving range in two tiers which cope with 24 customers at once. Two uncovered Driving areas, each with 15 bays, will be added shortly and work has already begun on developing a short 9-hole course.

Journalist Mike Borissow has just completed the first 9 holes of his own golf course on farmland between Sissinghurst and Benenden. The Borissows bought a run-down farmhouse with 100 acres, obtained planning permission, hired farm worker Charlie Woolford as groundsman and in eighteen months had 9 holes ready for play.

On the other hand, Mr Fell who omitted to get planning permission before making his 9-hole course on land opposite his home in Lapworth, Warwickshire, has been told he cannot play on it. Mr Fell has now applied for planning permission and hopes he will not be obliged to revert the land to its original use.

Average strokes taken by competitors in the Open at St. Andrews were highest at No. 17. Over the four rounds, players failed to make par at this hole 208 times and only 5 birdies were recorded.

Whitburn Golf Club is living on the edge of a cliff as quarrying operations creep closer to the back door of the wooden club-house. Crockery rattles on the shelves in the greenkeeper's cottage when blasting takes place.



SOME AUTUMN TURF DISEASES

The weather conditions which prevail during the autumn period are often highly favourable for the development of a number of damaging turf diseases and precautions should, therefore, be taken to guard against disease attack. Turf disease attacks can be greatly reduced by management practice. As with human disorders, prevention is undoubtedly better than cure.

Fusarium Patch Disease

Probably the commonest disease of sports turf, Fusarium, is encouraged by mild damp weather which frequently prevails during the September-October period. If such weather conditions seem imminent it is wise to apply a preventive fungicidal dressing whether disease symptoms are apparent or not. This practice is particularly desirable on areas which have been prone to the disease in previous years—golf greens on damp, low-lying or sheltered situations, for example, often require precautionary treatment of this kind. Bearing in mind that moisture is essential for the development of Fusarium, it will be obvious that the turf can be protected by keeping its surface as dry as possible. Regular morning switching or brushing is, therefore, useful in the autumn to remove dew and to assist the speedy drying of the playing surface.

Apart from the measures mentioned above, Fusarium damage can be prevented, or at least minimised, by ensuring that the grass has as much natural resistance to fungal attack as possible. A generally strong and hardy sward is less prone to disease infestation than one which has been weakened by mismanagement during the course of the growing season. The diseaseresisting properties of a turf can also be seriously reduced by excessive fertilizer treatment at this time of the year-encouraging a lush sward by applications of nitrogen during the autumn lays the area wide open to Fusarium attack. Fertilizer dressings containing appreciable amounts nitrogen should, therefore, not applied later than the end of August as a general rule. Autumn top dressings (compost/sand dressings, soil/ sand/peat dressings etc.) if applied in damp, smeary condition, or in too great amounts, or if not thoroughly worked in after application, will smother the sward and produce a surface microclimate ideal for disease development.

If, in spite of all precautions, the turf is hit by Fusarium, apply a suitable fungicide without delay. Mercury dressings (both organic and inorganic) and Quintozene (PCNB) give effective

control.

Ophiobolus Patch Disease

This affliction is also frequently encountered during the autumn and is often confused with Fusarium, though its characteristic ring-shaped symptoms should make it easily identifiable. Ophiobolus is encouraged by much the same management and weather factors as Fusarium, but is particularly likely to appear on recently limed areas during a warm wet summer or autumn. Fairways are particularly prone to the condition after liming the previous winter, although if the winter liming is followed up by a good balanced fertilizer dressing the following spring the fertilizer can reduce the chances of attack.

Because Ophiobolus is encouraged by damp conditions, spiking and possibly drainage work can go a long way in reducing incidence of the disease.

The disease can be controlled by repeat applications of organo-mercurial fungicides at suitable rates, and if the disease appears on a golf green then treatment of this type undoubtedly be given. On fairways the cost of such treatment over a wide area is usually prohibitive.

Red Thread Disease

Red Thread or Corticium is also

prevalent in autumn and is most frequent in fine turf where fescue is an important constituent of the sward -(although it will attack other grasses too). Not the most serious of the turf diseases, Corticium can cause a general loss of colour and ruin the appearance of a golf green during the latter part of the season. Corticium appears particularly on swards of low fertility where nitrogen is lacking, and the importance of carefully balanced ferti-lizer treatment is well illustrated by considering the relative incidence of Corticium and Fusarium. Too much nitrogen encourages Fusarium, too little favours Corticium and a balance must be struck between the two.

Various fungicides will give a degree of control, inorganic mercury fungicides in many instances proving the most

effective of all.

Other Fungal Diseases

A less well known disease is Helminthosporium leaf spot which also frequently appears during the summer and autumn. It is most often encountered on golf tees where smoothstalked meadow-grass is the most important constituent of the sward. Adequate fertilizer treatment during spring and summer is helpful, and the turf should not be too closely mown. The use of more disease resistant smooth-stalked meadow-grass varieties such as Prato or Merion is also advisable.

Fairy rings of various types are common during the autumn months, most of them fairly harmless, although there are exceptions—the rings caused by *Marismius oreades* for instance which actually destroy the turf. If you are unlucky enough to get these *Marasmius* rings on or near your greens you will just have to cut them out entirely, removing the infected soil and turf, and replace them with fresh material.

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

ANNUAL REPORT — 1970

Administration

We congratulate our chairman, Mr H. A. D. Fry, on the quiet and efficient way he has carried out his duties and trust he has enjoyed his year of office as much as we have enjoyed his chairmanship.

Mr A. Robertshaw, our vice-chairman, will be succeeding Mr Fry and we offer our congratulations and wish him a most happy and successful year.

The annual draw was once again a successful effort, the final result being on a par with last year and our thanks are once again due to members and friends who made this result possible. The draw this year is being held on the Dunlop Masters Tournament and it is hoped that this will enable the draw to be made and publicised earlier.

Our thanks are again due to the R. & A. for kindly forwarding a dozen passes for the Open Championship at

St. Andrews.

Once again we entered two members for the Artisan Annual Tournament this year at Moor Park and our representatives were Mr F. Ford, of South Herts, in the Junior Handicap Division, and Mr W. Machin, of Addington Court, in the Senior Handicap Division. Both made a great show on behalf of the Greenkeepers and we must offer our sincere congratulations to Bill Machin on winning third prize in the Senior Division with a nett score for 36 holes of 139.

A very important factor in our administration this year has been the formation of the South Coast Section for members in the Dorset, Hampshire and West Sussex area and, which according to early reports, is proving most satisfactory. Our thanks and appreciation are due to Mr P. Malia who was largely instrumental in the formation of this new section and we would also like to thank the members who have taken office with Mr Malia and the Southern Section for their splendid co-operation in this new development.

The wage scale recommendations

The British Golf Greenkeepers' Association

Minutes of the 53rd Annual General Meeting held at the Filey Golf Club on Monday, 17th August 1970, at 3 p.m.

The Association Chairman opened the Meeting at which there were approximately 60 members present and invited Mr Carl Bretherton to occupy the Chair. Mr Bretherton thanked the Chairman and expressed his willingness to conduct the Meeting.

The Minutes of the last A.G.M.

The Chairman suggested that as these had been printed in the Association Journal, he thought that the Meeting would probably like to consider them as read, which suggestion was accepted.

Annual Report

The Hon. Secretary read the Annual Report and its adoption was proposed by Mr Herrington and seconded by Mr Dixon.

Financial Report

Copies of the annual accounts had been posted in the clubhouse and further copies were handed round at the Meeting. The Treasurer advised that the Auditors had apologised for having made an error in last year's figures with reference to the Benevolent Fund. In calculating the Loss on Sale of the Investments last year, incorrect figures were used for the cost of the Investments Sold and as a result, the Balance of the Benevolent Fund and the Balance of the Costs of Investments retained were both overstated by £256. Adjustments have, however, been made and shown in the Balance Sheet. It was proposed by Mr Robertshaw and seconded by Mr Payne that the accounts adopted. Carried unanimously.

Executive Committee Report

The Tournament Sub-Committee elected at the Executive Meeting were

Messrs. Fry, Robertshaw, Herrington, Walsh and Folkes. Three to form a

quorum.

The Secretary advised the Meeting that the 1971 tournament had been arranged to take place at Hollinwell Golf Club by the East Midlands Section and he had himself been in contact with the Club who had expressed their willingness to entertain the Association during August next year and final details would be agreed later. There were several objections immediately raised to the venue for 1971 as it was not a seaside course and several members made strong protest. The Secretary advised the Meeting that this question of seaside courses and inland courses was always arising at meetings and he felt it was time that a definite decision should be taken with a view to future arrangements to avoid this continued dissatisfaction among certain members.

After considerable discussion, the following proposal was put to the Meet-

ing:

"That the section asked to run the Tournament should be given full authority to find a venue which would not be disputed but that the section should also be advised that whenever possible a seaside course would be preferred."

An amendment to this proposal was made:

"That if a section could not find a seaside course, another section should be asked to take over the arrangements for the Annual Tournament."

This amendment was put to the vote and carried with a majority of 21-17.

The question then arose as to whether the tournament for 1971 should be held at Hollinwell as the Club had already agreed to accept the Association and the Secretary felt that it would be very discourteous and harmful to the Association in general if it withdrew its request after having the courtesy of the Club extended to them.

After considerable further discussion, this matter was again put to the vote as to whether next year's tournament should take place at Hollinwell and it was agreed that it should by a majority of 33-6.

Election of Officers

President

At the unanimous request of the Meeting, Mr Carl Bretherton was re-elected President of the Association. Mr Bretherton thanked the Meeting and said he would be very pleased to accept this office for 1970/1971.

Vice-Presidents

Following the request of the A.G.M in 1970 that the names of Mr Phillip Marshall and Mr William Payne, representatives of Messrs. Ransomes, Sims & Jefferies, should be added to the Association's list of Vice-Presidents, it was proposed that these two gentlemen's names should be added to the existing list of Vice-Presidents as listed in the Association's Journal. This was carried unanimously.

Chairman

It was proposed by Mr Lewis and seconded by Mr Herrington that Mr A. Robertshaw should be elected Chairman of the Association in succession to Mr Fry. This proposition was carried unanimously.

Mr Fry then rose and invited Mr Robertshaw to occupy his chair and wished him every success in his new office. He then thanked the President and his Committee and all members present for their support during his year which he had enjoyed and trusted that he had been a satisfactory representative in the view of the members.

Mr Robertshaw then expressed his appreciation and the honour bestowed upon him at being elected as Chairman and sincerely trusted that he would be able to carry out his duties to the satisfaction of everybody and thereupon presented Mr Fry with a tankard in recognition and appreciation of his services during 1969/1970.

Vice-Chairman

The Hon. Secretary reported that he had as yet been unable to obtain a nomination from the East Midlands Section but as soon as this was avail-

able, he would notify the members through the Journal.

Secretary and Treasurer

It was proposed by Mr Walsh and seconded by Mr Fry that Mr C. H. Dix should be re-elected Secretary and Treasurer. This was carried unanimously and Mr Dix thanked the members and expressed his willingness to continue his office this year.

Executive Committee

It was proposed by Mr Cashmore and seconded by Mr Dixon that the Executive Committee should be elected as nominated by Sections. Carried.

Hon. Auditors

It was proposed by Mr Herrington and seconded by Mr Ford that Messrs Smallfield, Rawlins and Co. be reelected as Hon. Auditors for 1970/1971. Carried.

Hon. Solicitor

The Hon. Secretary informed the Meeting that Mr R. A. Beck, who had represented the Association as Hon. Solicitor, had unfortunately died last year.

Thanks to the good offices of Mr F. W. Hawtree, Mr H. Dowding had kindly offered to represent the Association in this capacity. Appreciation of Mr Hawtree's efforts in obtaining a successor to Mr Beck were expressed and the proposal was carried unanimously.

Any Other Business

After experiencing the difficulty of starting at the 7th tee on the morning competition, the Meeting agreed that for Tuesday and Wednesday, the starting would revert to the 1st and 10th tees and that play would be from the back tees yellow markers.

There being nothing further to discuss, the Meeting closed with a vote of thanks to the Chair by Mr G. Herrington.

Major Move To Centralise Works By Ransomes

As part of the long term planning policy of Ransomes Sims & Jefferies Limited to centralise all their activities on their Nacton site, the Company have announced the following relocations. Production from Ransomes Grass Machinery Works at Fore Hamlet, Ipswich, will be transferred progressively to Nacton during 1971. Ransomes Stanton Works, near Bury St. Edmunds (formerly Catchpole Engineering Company), will also be closed and its production moved to existing Company premises by 31st December 1970.

Due to redeployment and natural wastage of labour within the Company, it is not anticipated that the move from the Fore Hamlet site will result in redundancies. However, due to the location of the Stanton Works, some redundancies are inevitable and these will be treated in accordance with the requirements of the 1965 Redundancy Act. Every assistance will be given by Ransomes Personnel staff in co-operation with the Department of Employment and Productivity to find alternative employment for those affected.

Ransomes centralisation of their activities on the Nacton site will lead to greater efficiency and economy of production, simplify communications and improve working conditions.

RENEWED PRODUCTION FOR ROTARY SIFTER

In response to extensive demand, H. Pattisson and Company Limited, of Stanmore, have recently renewed production of their Rotary Sifter for screening ashes, topsoil, compost, etc.

Powered by the Norton Villiers F15 four-stroke engine, the Pattisson Sifter has a 6ft. x 3ft. diameter drum and is equipped with a special safety clutch which prevents damage to the machine in the event of overloading.

The Sifter can happily keep pace with loading by a two-man team and the screened product can be delivered into wheelbarrows below the drum. The steel-framed machine is mobile and is fitted with tyred wheels and a tractor draw bar.

British turf maintenance and golf course equipment ranks among the world's best and export orders feature regularly for Pattisson's specialist equipment. Among recent overseas sales of the very popular self-propelled Turf Piercer was one to Fiji and another delivered to an Italian golf club.

The piercer, which uses a Villiers F15 power unit, cuts out the "hard labour" of hand-drawn machines and its 30-inch wide cylinder carries 72 spikes. Wheel spin is completely eliminated due to propulsion being on the tines. Pattisson's provide a range of ancillary equipment for their piercer covering a variety of functions of turf maintenance.

Congratulations and successful year in your office — from Captain and Members of Ilkley Golf Club.

Our new Chairman obviously has the support of his home club. This telegram arrived at Filey Golf Club where he was elected for 1970/1971. We all join in wishing him a happy and successful year.

Charles H. Pugh Limited will be exhibiting four new machines which were introduced during this selling season and comprise a 20-inch Heavy Duty, a 20-inch Special for Superfine mowing, a 24-inch Riding Mower and the 30-inch Garden Model. The latter two are offered either as pedestrian models or as riding mowers fitted with the unique Atco Auto Steer Seat.

The power units fitted provide power to spare for long periods due to extra long life specification. A built-in decompressor reduces starting effort to a minimum and instantly adjustable tubular handles provide good control at all times. The main controls come readily to hand on the handles and extensive use of ball bearings throughout reduces maintenance to a minimum.

A lever mounted behind the chain case declutches the cutters which enables the machine to be operated with the cutters stationary and twin ball races in the main clutch operating mechanism provides drag-free pullback.

The 20-inch Heavy Duty, 20-inch Special and 24-inch models are fitted with two-sectioned rear rollers, each section independently driven, while the 30-inch Garden Model is fitted with a three-section rear roller and full differential. To ensure good traction the rear roller units for the 24-inch and 30-inch Garden Model are rubber covered and fluted to increase grip. NEW 15FT. TORO PARKMASTER CUTS TIME AND MOWING COSTS

The latest addition to the Flymo Institutional range of high work rate mowing machinery is the Toro Parkmaster.

The Parkmaster is a powerful combination of a purpose-built tractor with 79 h.p. six-cylinder petrol engine and either five-gang mowers (11ft.) or seven-gang mowers (15ft.)—hydraulically raised or lowered from the operator's seat.

Capacity at eight miles an hour is almost 100 acres per day.

The Parkmaster, making its exhibition debut at the Motspur Park display of equipment organised by the National Institute of Groundsmen on September 15, 16 and 17, is claimed to reduce normal grass maintenance costs by 50 per cent. with low maintenance charges on large grass areas of parks, playing fields, motorway verges and golf courses. The machine will also be seen at Meyrick Park, Bournemouth, during the annual conference of the Institute of Parks Administration on September 22 and 23.

The Parkmaster has a choice of either Spartan six-blade units with 30in. x 8¼in. diameter cutting cylinders for formal areas, or Roughmaster four-blade units with 30in. x 10in. diameter cutting cylinders for areas less frequently maintained.

The hydraulic system enables each cutting unit to be raised or lowered by a simple push of a lever at the operator's elbow to vary cutting widths from 30in. to 15ft. and to raise units completely for transport.

Road speed is the maximum permitted of 20 m.p.h. to reduce lost cutting time travelling between sites. The tractor has four cutting speeds and reverse to suit requirements of any terrain.

The Parkmaster has hydraulic brakes and a turning radius of only 7ft. 3in. and can operate on steep slopes because of the facility for re-distributing the weight by lifting the outboard units on the slopes.

I would like to take this opportunity to express my views on the apparent lack of educational facilities for golf greenkeepers.

Why, since 1912, has no structure of education and examination designed for the enlightenment and qualification of students of greenkeeping been evolved by the B.G.G.A.

It is true that there exists an apprenticeship scheme and week-long block lectures at the S.T.R.I., but these factors, although of some merit, are hopelessly inadequate. As for the St. Ives courses, well, they are fine but all too swift and indigestible with no real results. The training of an accomplished apprentice depends solely upon his head greenkeeper who might view his potential prodigy's well-being with jealousy and apathy.

Apart from a greatly enchanced future, it would be far more interesting and rewarding for the apprentice to work for and attain a set level of requirements in both theoretical and practical aspects of golf course management.

Tell me, is greenkeeping to remain a semi-obscure profession confined to the peasants of the field? For this I am sure is the impression of the majority.

Finally, in desperation, I ask you, if possible, to acquaint me with any N.A.G. examination courses in my immediate area, or better still nationwide, for the benefit of other frustrated assistants.




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
