





One truism totally applicable to the world of greenkeeping is the old saying: 'a little knowledge is a dangerous thing'. Few would argue that this is best demonstrated in golf green committees up and down the country, where a farmer member who grows vegetables, or one who can maintain a pretty lawn, is often seen as the perfect choice for the lofty role of green chairman. The results of such 'expert' infiltration, where scant knowledge of real golf course problems is obvious and dictatorial edicts are frequently issued - often coloured by experiences that are light years away from modern practices of greenkeeping management - can be seen long after the offender has departed to bask in false glory, though the consequences remain.

Such a rod for the back is one that most greenkeepers are forced to bear, since the added problem of lack of continuity in committee structure, where an element of real learning may be gained by a long standing committee incumbent who has the will, the desire and the capability of gathering knowledge from his greenkeeper, is one problem that will not go away!

It's a situation greenkeepers learn to come to terms with, but a further question begs askance: must they also come to terms with the 'little knowledge' emanating from a noted turf management magazine, which in its most recent issue (written as if the writer had come up with The Original Thought) suggests that if greenkeepers were to stop whinging and offered a united voice in stating the facts concerning over play, that golf managers (for managers, read green committees) will get the message!

My own experience suggests that greenkeepers have been shouting this very message from the rooftops for years, with about as much effect as trying to drain the Atlantic Ocean with a bucket. Further, the offending piece suggests that only the fear of members quitting in disgust at not being permitted unlimited play, irrespective of conditions, makes 'management' allow play in even the most unsuitable conditions.

What arrant nonsense! In over forty years I've never once heard of a Club member walking out for this reason, since membership to any private Club is not easily gained, is certainly a privilege, and is one to be guarded at almost any cost. I venture to suggest that many Clubs would welcome a walk-out from such grumblers, since new members bring with them additional income in the form of premium payments - usually twice or three times the annual membership fee - upon being elected.

There's more, for the magazine offers yet another turf management recommendation: that where a Club does not nurture thoughts of holding the Open Championship, it would make more (economic) sense not to plant bents and fescues, but to plump straight away for planting that most ubiquitous of weeds, Poa annua!

Ye Gods! What a suggestion. Out of the door go years of sound management practices, replaced overnight with the nastiness of Poa annua, along with the soggy misery it brings in its wake every winter. I doubt the author of such a thoughtless edict has ever walked the fair greens of the many delicious courses blessed with a dominance of either bent or fine fescue, but if I am mistaken, I fancy that rose tinted spectacles were worn. No doubt those seed companies who spend fortunes in striving to produce improved strains of fine turfgrass - and who advertise their fine products - will register protest at the offending statement, as no doubt will all greenkeepers who labour for perfection in the battle against 'the most noxious plant'.

As if the above gaffs were not enough, the magazine further failed in its most elementary homework, demoting British Empire Medallist, Walter Woods, probably the highest profile course manager in the world, to the humble status of 'groundsman' at St Andrews and wrongly titling our esteemed ex-chairman, Jack McMillan, who has been running his own successful consultancy company for more than a year, as both head greenkeeper at Sunningdale and 'Sunningdale Chief'. One wonders what Lawson Bingham will have to say about that? Not good enough say I, such little knowledge is most certainly a dangerous thing!



The EEC, new directives on pesticides, the handling of loads – and how all this affects YOU


n addition to the changes within the UK on pesticides reviews, registrations and withdrawals – expected in 1992 – there are also some changes expected as a result of EEC Directives. The Pesticides Directive is expected to be available in the spring and will contain the expected list of substances permitted – and not permitted – to be sold and used within EEC Member States. The EEC will also be conducting reviews of pesticides in addition to the individual reviews of Member States. It seems very likely that the decisions of the EEC Parliament regarding pesticides reviews will be imposed upon Member States.

Nobody is sure just how this will work in practice, but it is possible that the EEC might overturn a UK decision following our own review of a substance. The new Directive on personal protective equipment will have far reaching consequences for those not supplying the correct equipment for the job, and it must be understood that PERSONAL means just what it says. The new standards of quality – the CE mark – will also apply from 1992 and purchasers of protective equipment should specify that the garment will comply with EEC standards.

#### EEC and the manual handling of loads

The Health and Safety Commission has issued a Consultative Document entitled 'Manual Handling of Loads, Proposals for Regulation and Guidance'. This has appeared in response to EEC Directive 90/269/EEE 'on the minimum health and safety requirements for the manual handling of loads where there is a risk, particularly of back injury, to workers'.

The document states that more than a quarter of the accidents reported each year are due to the manual handling of loads. In addition



there is an unquantifiable number of cumulative, unreported injuries that result in some form of disability and sometimes permanent disablement.

As with all the modern workplace legislation recently introduced, these draft proposals will require employers to assess the risks to staff when manually handling loads. The hierarchy of decision making steps proposed is similar to that used in COSHH Regulations:

• Avoid hazardous manual handling operations where possible.

- Assess any hazardous operations that cannot be avoided.
- Remove or reduce the risk of injury, using the assessment as a basis for action.

The requirement under the existing Health and Safety at Work Act to establish 'safe systems of working' forms an important part of this process.

The emphasis is on the controlling of manual handling (which may cause) injury and not on the weight of the load. In fact the proposed Regulations state:

• Each employer shall so far as is reasonably practicable, avoid the need for his employees to undertake manual handling operations which involve a risk of their being injured; or where it is not reasonably practicable to avoid the need for his employees to undertake manual handling operations which involve a risk of their being injured; make a suitable and sufficient assessment of all such manual handling operations to be undertaken by them. (b) To take appropriate steps to reduce the risk... (c) To provide information and training on the manual handling of specific loads at work...'

It is quite clear that many of the old ways of man-handling work and the acceptance of the fact that we all have a bad back must change – and about time too!

One of the more obvious ways of reducing the strain and 'exposure' to back injury is to have mechanical equipment such as fork-lift trucks or similar, for tractors. If fork-lift trucks are purchased, separate regulations apply and a Certificate of Competence is required.

Intensive week of training will bring greenkeepers up to date with pesticide regulations

# Association moves quickly to boost pesticide certification

ecent seminars and conferences, together with the Management Training Programmes held recently at Aldwark Manor, have revealed some interesting training needs. The very low number of head greenkeepers and course managers who have pesticides certificates of competence (PA2A) is worrying. Equally, it is worth noting that a full certificate (PA1 & PA2A) is ten credits toward Master Greenkeeper status. Some have openly confessed to hiding behind the so-called 'grandfather' clause and this mistaken belief – that experience is an excuse for competence – needs clarification.

Regulations state quite clearly that 'all who use pesticides' will be competent to perform their duties. To be competent the operator of a pesticides applicator must be fully familiar

with the Regulations and the Code of Practice.

It is not possible to be up to the new standards of competence without attending the Foundation Module and the Ground Crop Sprayer Course. Since a certificate is required to supervise a non-certified operator (and it must be understood that to supervise means to keep the operator within sight at all times during the operation), how can a greenkeeper be expected to do his job to a good professional standard? If we are to raise and maintain high standards, the full certificate of competence to apply pesticides must be one of the basic qualifications to be a course manager.

One thing is certain, we cannot rely on the 'grandfather' clause as it seems likely that it will be removed as an option in the near future.


To meet this obvious need, David Golding is arranging a special one week course at Aldwark Manor, March 16th-20th inclusive. The total cost of the course will be £495 (inclusive of VAT). This includes accommodation, meals, training and examination fees. This will be an intensive week of training and testing for experienced greenkeepers. Jon Allbutt will be taking the pesticides section and arrangements will be made through the County Proficiency Test Committee to have testing carried out at the end of the course. # To be a Golf Course Manager...

Few will deny that the title 'Course Manager' is one that is open to misinterpretation. To the head greenkeeper, young or old, we put the following questions:

Have you the craft skills of greenkeeping but wish you could communicate more skilfully with your staff and green committee? Would you like to be a better manager, with the ability to prepare monthly reports and make verbal presentations at green commit-

tee meetings?

# he need to keep golf greens in play throughout the year has led increasingly to the use of sand based rootzones in Great Britain. This type of green construction has also been employed on many newer courses across the United States, hence the investigation into its potential for use in this country.

Fertiliser nutrition was considered to be a critical aspect of management and thus worthy of specific experimentation, due to the inherently low nutrient status of sands and the very high potential for leaching of fertiliser. It is worth noting that the results discussed herein can only be applied to the establishment phase of green management, as the trial ran only for the first three years following construction.

Generally the trial proved to be a great success, and we were able to gather a great deal of information, not only relating to fertiliser management but on the various problems associated with sand greens themselves. Here is a sum-

mary of our findings:

■ Nitrogen: To establish and retain a satisfactory turf cover, the greens require much more nitrogen than soil greens, the exact rates being somewhere between 250 and 400 kg/ha per year of N, a rate of nitrogen which is at least twice as much as is normally applied to soil greens. However, it should be noted that the requirement for nitrogen would probably decrease with time as natural organic matter accumulates in the sand. It is also worth noting that these higher rates of nitrogen also favoured the development of Agrostis (bent) at the expense of Festuca (fescue).

■ Phosphorus: Phosphate application was required to prevent significant losses of ground cover. Agrostis was particularly susceptible to phosphate deficiency in the sand and problems were noted at levels of less than 10 ppm of P2O5. However, only very low application rates are recommended in these circumstances (ie. no more than 25 kg/ha/year) as there was a definite tendency for Poa annua colonisation of

plots receiving high rates of phosphate.

■ Potash: The application of potash did not have a significant effect on ground cover readings during the trial period, although it appears there was some natural release of potash from the sand, which complicated these findings. However, we noted that there was a definite response to potash in a number of the playing quality tests which we carried out. In particular, the turf tended to exhibit a much 'springier' response to ball impacts with increasing potash application, and this may indicate other effects on the turf which were not picked up with ground cover tests, eg. increased root growth, organic matter production, etc. We also found that fertiliser derived potash was highly prone to leaching, through the acid plots in particular.

■ pH: Acidity increased (ie. pH decreased) very rapidly as a response to the repeated application of sulphate of ammonia (the chosen source of N). In some instances pH levels

dropped below 4.0.

This very rapid decrease of pH had a significant effect on turf growth and caused unacceptable ground cover losses. It was also interesting to note that the bent grass (in this case Highland) was much more tolerant of the increased acidity than the (Frida) fescue.

The very acid plots were also characterised by poor surface water infiltration rates due to a capping effect, which may have been caused by poor organic matter degradation.

As part of the experimental programme, lime was applied to half the plots, with the purpose of neutralising the effect of repeated sulphate of ammonia treatment. In the short term this resulted in stimulation of growth and good ground cover response, but as expected, there were a number of longer term severely detrimental effects. Poa annua invasion was rapid and we also observed the development of Take-all patch disease in a significant number of limed plots.

Based on the results of this work and our own experience

in the field, we do not recommend the use of pure sand based constructions for the follows reasons:

1. pH control is critical: because sand is such an inert substance pH can vary considerably, depending on the treatment. The environment of the grass plant is consequently open to rapid and possibly detrimental changes.

2. As there is no naturally derived organic nitrogen source, the condition of the turf deteriorates rapidly through the winter, and in the case of the particular trial severe losses of ground cover were noted throughout this period. As the fertiliser derived nitrogen source ran out through the autumn, the lack of any naturally available nitrogen prevented steady growth through mild periods and thus the turf was prone to wear damage.

3. Sand greens are very prone to Take-all patch disease due to the lack of any naturally occurring antagonistic bacteria/fungi in the rootzone.

4. Establishment of the turf can be slow and patchy due to the very rapid loss of moisture from the surface, this having an effect on germination and seedling growth.

5. Maintenance costs are potentially high due to the need for repeated fertiliser application during the first few years of establishment.

6. Repeated rootzone sampling is required as nutrients are prone to leaching and regular applications of potash, together with low rates of phosphate, may be necessary. Consideration will also have to be given to micro-nutrient testing with a view to possible application.

In theory, the basic rationale behind the use of pure sand constructions would appear to be perfectly sound, there is no doubt that the provision of a free draining rootzone is highly desirable and of great importance in this country, because of the frequently wet and mild winters which characterise our climate. This weather pattern, combined with the massive increase in playing levels, particularly during the winter, does make provision of free draining putting sur-

It is worth bearing in mind that many of our best greens in terms of drainage and year round quality - have been established on coastal links sites, frequently utilising the local dune or beach derived sand. However, closer inspection of these greens reveals a rootzone that does not consist of pure sand alone. Usually the sand has a significant organic and soil component. It is this distinction which we have found to be so critical.

The lack of organic matter and soil renders the pure sand rooting medium prone to rapid changes in pH, increases the requirement for fertiliser and substantially influences turf growth and wear tolerance through the winter. We consider these problems far outweigh the potential advantages 🖚 13

in terms of rapid drainage rates.

Furthermore, it is frequently the condition of the surrounding land, ie. fairways and especially green approaches, which dictate the feasibility of winter play through periods of heavy rainfall and consequently, the availability of ultra free-draining greens becomes irrelevant. That is not to say that the provision of a free draining putting surface is of low priority, indeed quite the opposite is true. A compromise is the obvious solution and we prefer use a growing medium which contains at least 70-80% of uniformly graded lime free sand of medium particle size, blended with a small amount of light soil and organic material. Given the provision of good quality materials which conform to a very tight specification, this growing medium will provide free drainage and promote healthy growth of the desirable turf grasses. Indeed, this type of sand/soil mixture is more in line with our original links green constructions, when com-

In conclusion, the combination of research work and site experience leads us to believe that generally there is no place or need for pure sand greens in this country. The only miticircumstances gating which could contradict this conclusion may arise due to a complete lack of suitable local materials and a tight construction budget.

pared to pure sand.

As is so often the case with experimental work, more questions become apparent and in responding to the need for further investigation into the whole subject of green construction, the Institute is carrying out extensive comparative research into pure sand greens, the USGA Green Section specification and local topsoil constructions. This five year experiment, again sponsored by the R&A, will also encompass investigations into irrigation rates and links with fertiliser application.



During June/July/August, the section nominations will have a course assessment carried out by the BIGGA Regional Education Chairman and the local ICI Area Sales Manager on a regional basis. Scientific assessment of climate change notes that the world is indeed getting warmer. Taking to one side the reasons why, IAN BARRIE and DAVID HEMSTOCK consider the implications for the greenkeeper and the necessary changes for golf course irrigation




Fig. 1: Annual deviation of global mean temperatures for the period 1861-1989 (shown by bars), relative to the average for 1951-1980. Source: United Nations Environment Programme Report 1990

ew of the world's climatologists would now disagree that our Earth is warmer than it was 150 years ago – and that the trend is still upwards (see figure 1). The 1980s set several world records for the warmest years over the past couple of centuries.

However, the cause of this global warming is still the subject of intense debate amongst scientists. Some consider that it is little more than a continuing recovery from the Little Ice Age, which affected Europe in the 16th and 17th Centuries, whilst others argue that it is principally the cause of mankind upsetting the natural chemical balance of the atmosphere by releasing vast quantities of carbon monoxide and other greenhouse gasses, such as CFCs and methane.

Rainfall records display a greater level of variability than those of temperature and accordingly it is harder to identify any trends, either by region or globally. At this stage it would be not be fair to say that just because the UK and large areas of mainland Europe have had three consecutive dry summers that this is due to global warming.

Whatever the outcome of the scientific debate, those among us who have to plan for the longer term must consider the implications for a warmer world in the future. One of the best ways to do this is to look back and assess the irrigation need for past years before going on to speculate on the consequences for the future.



#### **Assessing irrigation need**

Over the past few years a new method of assessing irrigation need has been developed. Put simply, it involves calculating (from weather records) the daily evaporation losses from a turfed surface, this loss then being balanced against daily records of local rainfall. As the 'soil' dries out there will come a point when irrigation is required.

An example of this would be to say that on successive dry days the evaporation losses were 2.5mm, so after three days this moisture deficit would be 7.5mm. Therefore the follow-

ing day, when the deficit reached 10mm, would be a good time to apply, say, 5mm of irrigation. In short, 5mm of irrigation was applied when the moisture deficit reached 10mm. Now follow this plan day in day out for 25 years and you should have a pretty good idea of not only the average water use, but also the water need in hot dry months and seasons.

Luckily our computer does most of these calculations for us, as it is linked directly into the Met Office's computer.

#### A strategic irrigation plan

A plan similar to the one described above can be formulated for each area of the course, and indeed was formulated for a typical course in the South East of England. For example, applications of 5mm at a moisture deficit of 10mm may be suitable for most tees and greens, but with deeper rooting on surrounds a moisture deficit of 20mm would be reasonable, whilst if fairways have to be irrigated a moisture deficit of 40mm could be allowed before moisture stress became serious.

#### **Esates of seasonal irrigation need**

From year to year both evaporation and rainfall rates will vary, with the variation in rainfall being the greater. In SE England, summer rainfall (ie. April to September) has been as low as 185mm (1990) and as high as 500mm (1968).

The effect on the calculated irrigation need is dramatic Figure 2\* shows the total seasonal need over the period from 1966 to 1990. For a long time 1976 stood out as a freak year, with irrigation near double the long term average. However, 1898 and 1990 have cast a new light on the chances of prolonged drought. Whereas not too many people would have planned to cope with such a dry period previously, there is now a more apparent need to cope with a situation which has risen three times in 25 years.

Using typical acreages for tees, greens and fairways, a similar calculation reveals that if fairways are also to be irrigated then the average irrigation need would have been 12,000 cubic metres against the 3,100 cubic metres needed for tees and greens alone. In a dry season the numbers increase to 42,000 and 6,100 cubic metres respectively. In other words, fairways would account for 80 to 90% of the total water need.


\* An additional allowance has to be made for wastage due to uneven applications, overlapping and wind drift.

#### **Peak irrigation demand**

A necessary planning value for the sizing of pumps, pipes and reservoirs is the maximum short period - or peak - irrigation demand. In the chosen example shown this occurred in July 1990, when tees, greens and fairways would have needed 15,200 cubic metres. Figure 3 illustrates the difference between this peak and the average monthly demand. Roughly speaking, peak rates are double the average.

#### A plan for the future?

Please accept that neither crystal balls nor seaweed will produce the information needed to form a sensible plan for the future! Scientifically, it is also clear that if temperatures continue to rise then evaporation rates will also increase. If this is accompanied by a reduction in summer rainfall then Fig. 3 the need for irriga-



tion will rise markedly. At our disposal is a range of options which will help redress the balance.

Specific sowing of drought tolerant species is a sound first step. This would allow an increase in the moisture deficit at which irrigation is applied. If irrigation was applied at a deficit of 15mm, rather than the 10mm taken previously, in an average year a water saving of 15% would result. If a deficit of 20% could be allowed then the saving increases to 26%. Logically, in a wet year the savings would be larger.

More obviously, superior design and operation of an irrigation system reduces the amount of wastage due to overlap areas, uneven application and wind drift. The more novel forms of irrigation which have been the subject of much discussion would also have a role to play.

#### The wider picture

Realistically all the above has to be set in a global picture. It cannot be overstressed that we must consider ourselves an integral part of the world as a whole. If the gloomier forecasts are proved right - that the world warms by 2 degrees centigrade and sea levels rise by 50cms or more - then London and half the coastal cities in the world will be under sea water; drinking water will be in short supply and famine will be on an unprecedented scale.

This argues strongly for the type of actions which will hopefully be agreed at the Earth Summit Meeting in Brazil this year. They will call for large scale forest planting, reduction in greenhouse gas emissions and more efficient use of energy. Only the very brave - or the very foolish - would totally ignore the signals which have been evident over the' past few years.

The managers of golf courses will have their part to play along with everyone else and a more efficient water use management policy will be as important as any.
