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

ny book which begins with a dedication - to golf greenkeepers who, through their tireless work, maintain, enhance and conserve a large area of our countryside for the benefit of all - is bound to attract my attention. I equally believe that it will attract readers of this magazine in great numbers. The authors, John Hacker and George Shiels, have produced a fascinating little work entitled Golf Course Presentation, purposely to bring to the notice of all greenkeepers the high importance that should be placed on presenting a golf course to its best advantage. This is essentially a book of guidance and doesn't purport to teach its readers to suck eggs - far from it, it treats the reader as an equal and gives valuable advice on how to get the best from a golf course without ignoring its general health and well-being. Does presentation make a difference, it asks, answering with a categoric YES, it definitely does. The authors maintain that it is the surface finish which stamps the greenkeeper as being someone who cares; producing an extra effort which suggests that today is special who would dare argue against such observations?

The book, actually a booklet of some forty pages, covers every aspect of presentation most thoroughly, including greens, tees, fairways, bunkers, rough and water features and includes a special chapter on tournament preparation. Whilst it may not give all the answers it will certainly make both greenkeepers and golfers think about the type of golf course they really want and how they can achieve it. phone call from a greenkeeper who'd been held enthralled by the words of golf course architect Donald Steel at a recent BIGGA seminar sent me chasing after a copy of Classic Golf Links of Great Britain and Ireland, Donald's most recent book, which he had mentioned in his lecture. I am pleased to tell readers that the search was well worth while, for the book lives up to its name and is a 'classic' for true lovers of links, those windswept courses amongst the dunes that many regard as the only real place to play golf. Donald Steel's love of seaside links shines through his writing as he takes us on a journey round Britain and Ireland, taking in 75 courses, including such venues as Prestwick, St Andrews, Muirfield, Royal St Georges, Carnoustie and Turnberry. However, the supporting cast includes a string of equally familiar names ranging from the hallowed Royal Dornoch to Rye, Saunton, Formby and Hillside in England, Royal Porthcawl in Wales and Ballybunnion, Royal County Down and Royal Portrush in Ireland - and some unsung gems. The influence that links have had on golf course architecture runs as a continuous theme through the book. The author places each course in its historical and architectural context, describing its setting and main characteristics, and shows how the course plays, focusing on the most interesting holes. A detailed map and a card of the course accompany each entry, while Brian Morgan's stunning photographs capture the beauty and variety of seaside links. Classic Golf Links (224pp hardback) is published by Chapman at £25.

aving written two successful golf books John Behrand has turned his pen to fictional short stories. Culled from a lifetime of golf, which has included captaincy of the R&A and the Royal Liverpool GC, together with playing golf at county level and in national championships, the author has assembled a collection of stories - St Andrews Night and Other Stories - which

entrance, delight and perhaps also raise a few evebrows. Every story has its twist and the reader is kept in suspense until the last line. 'Some of the characters and situations', the author states in his introduction, 'are drawn in part, never wholly, from my own personal memory bank. I even appear myself from time to time in various guises. There are no prizes for guessing who's who!'. eslie Edwards, the author of The Game That Was Golf is the elder of two surviving founder members of the Association of Golf Writers. He's what some might describe as an 'ancient', which qualifies him better than most to write first hand THE GAME THAT about the golfing stars (and characters) of a former era, and his book offers the reader a splendid opportunity to re-live the memories of championships of the past forty or fifty years. The book also gives insight into the world of golf correspondents, men too often decried by fools who aver 'they never left the clubhouse!'. Such contributors to the game as Darwin, Longhurst, Crawley and Ward-Thomas are all dealt with comprehensively and as a personal friend of them and of most of the men and women who have covered golf in the past sixty years, the author is able to provide clues as to their character and help explain what gave their writing such compelling appeal. Highly recommended, The Game That Was Golf (197pp hardback) is published by Fore Golf Publications, 129a High St. Dovercourt, Harwich CO12 3AX and costs £17.49 post inclusive.

very grand (and very expensive) book has just arrived from Japan, from the pen of golf course architect of GREAT BRITAIN and IRELAND Shunsuke Kato, entitled What Makes a Good Golf Course Good. In this lavishly colour illustrated volume Kato attempts to explain his views on the designing of golf courses and his design techniques, which are greatly influenced by old Scottish style and by an avowed strategic design philosophy. The volume covers the more than forty golf courses he has designed, explaining his thinking. I found it an enlightening experience to look into the oriental mind, especially the thinking revealed that his work includes his conception of the virtuous points of the Japanese character. Some of the errors in translation from Japanese into English will make the reader smile, without malice. What Makes a Good Golf Course Good (256pp hardback) is available in Britain from Grant Books, Victoria Sq., Droitwich WR9 8DE at £62 post inclusive.

Ian Harrison, the new ICI Premier Greenkeeper of the Year, almost pulled out of the prestigious competition after his father died. DAVID WHITE reports on how the man of the moment overcame his sorrow to collect the industry's most acclaimed title

t's a little under 60 miles from Darlington to Aldwark Manor, a sling-shot journey down the A1 that can take less than an hour. For Ian Harrison, however, his long and winding route from Darlington to Aldwark Manor – or to be more specific from young apprentice greenkeeper to ICI Premier Greenkeeper of the Year – took about 14 years!

Utilising the essence of high drama, Roger Mossop, the marketing manager for award sponsors ICI Professional Products, welcomed the five 1992 ICI Premier Greenkeeper finalists to a dinner given in their honour before announcing the results – in reverse order – to the hushed and expectant group. It was, observed someone, not unlike the BBC Sports Personality of the Year awards, only the trumpet fanfare was lacking!

At an event of this magnitude there is a pressure-cooker atmosphere that permeates through the day with the heat as much on the judges as those being judged. For the first time ever, this writer was privileged to observe the whole of the final interview proceedings and to listen whilst the participants unfolded their individual tales. It was a grey December day outside, though the sparkle that emanated from the 'fabulous five' – Dean Cleaver, Kevin Green, Iain MacLeod, Ian Harrison and Ian McMillan – certainly brightened that grey day considerably – I wouldn't have missed it, but as I've written before, I certainly wouldn't have wanted to be in the judges' shoes.

How are the candidates judged? First by nomination from their section, then by a written paper on an essential greenkeeping topic, followed by a searching assessment of their course. The final daunting hurdle is a lengthy interview, chaired by Neil Thomas and headed by BIGGA education chairman, Huw Parry, and ICI's Richard Minton. Down to the wire results are almost the norm in these exciting ICI finals and this year's event was no exception. In the end, Ian Harrison was declared the 1992 ICI Premier Greenkeeper of the Year, winning by a slim margin from Ian McMillan and Kevin Green, second and third respectively.

What finally swayed the judges? In Ian Harrison's case it was almost certainly his 'fire in the belly' conviction that greenkeeping at Darlington was a challenge to enjoy. His is no easy task, for the Alistair Mackenzie designed course at Darlington is

constructed on heavy clay-based meadowland and is squeezed into just 81 acres, yet he manages to produce consistently good playing surfaces that are a credit to him and his dedicated team. All this on a modest though well documented budget and under the critical eye of a larger than average committee of fourteen and a huge and demanding membership. In addition, Ian is a delightful person with a keen sense of humour, known to be a good friend as well as a good boss to his staff. He masterminds a tight and efficient ship, keeps an immaculate workshop (sparkling enough that you could eat off the bonnet of his tractor, said one first hand observer), and he is a fine ambassador for BIGGA and the education cause. On that front, he gives credit to Frank Newberry and Paul Whiteley, those BIGGA management course wizards, for their clever guidance in bringing out the best in his personal presentations, both written and verbal.

Returning to Roger Mossop's presentation speech, it was so refreshing to hear him describe Ian Harrison as being 'not only good for the course but good for the cause', a sentiment that his colleagues in the Cleveland section will recognise and be proud to echo, for they know Ian as a greenkeeper whose heart is and always has been in his work and in BIGGA.

I watched Ian's face as he was named the victor, first displaying total disbelief but quickly recovering composure as he declared to an admiring audience that his dear wife Carol should be sharing equally in his happiness. We learned that Ian's father had died early in 1992 and that his first reaction had been to withdraw from the event. Spurred on by Carol, even though his heart had at times understandably been elsewhere, he declared that the win was 'theirs', a joint effort spurred on by a loved one who had supreme faith in him. In talking to Ian afterwards, he declared that winning the ICI Premier Greenkeeper of the Year award would be a worthy dedication to the memory of his father.

Of the future, we were delighted to learn that this hugely prestigious award, now moving into its fourth year, is to continue under the patronage and guidance of ICI Professional Products and that once again the search will begin to elect another BIGGA member as ICI Premier Greenkeeper of the Year – it could be you!

■ May I respond to the letter that appeared in November from Sandy Brown, Crieff GC., seeking clarification on the pricing of pesticides labelled for golf course use as opposed to horticultural or agricultural uses?

To begin, may I make it quite clear that the chemical industry, like any other, has to run on a sound commercial base. That means covering all the costs of development, registration, production, promotion and staff – and then returning a positive contribution to its directors or shareholders. We are not profiteers as was implied, but companies that seek to survive in an increasingly difficult climate.

The legislation associated with pesticide registration is now so complex and rigid that extensive development trials and efficacy work has to be done for every individual label recommendation, let alone the initial toxicological, ecological, residue and storage tests that have to be undertaken for any pesticide registration. This is a very expensive process.

To explain this in simple terms let us take for example the easiest and cheapest route to introduce a chemical, ie. an established agricultural product such as a fungicide that has potential in turf.

Costs involved £

 i) Development programme Minimum 3 years of *replicated* trials which will hopefully give adequate efficacy on a range of turf diseases. Cost of 4 trials = £20K/ yearapprox £60,000

ii) Trials clearance (MAFF) permit1,550

iii)Registration submission
 Preparation of trials protocol,
 the written submission, letters of
 access to ingredients, final formulation,
 writing of label, etcapprox £15,000

iv) MAFF Submission (fixed charge) New label usage£2,250

This can take up to three years from submission to receiving approval. The possibility of introducing a new molecule into the amenity sector that is not already registered in the UK for other uses is dictated by the considerable costs involved. A new molecule would require extra support data to the previous example plus an increased registration fee:

i) Toxicological studies

Human and environmental safety

.....approx £30,000–50,000 ii) Residue data.....approx £10,000–20,000 iii)The registration fee to the

Ministry in this case is a fixed

figure of:....£53,000 TOTAL.....£93,000-£103,000

The registration of a new molecule can take up to six years from submission to approval. The costs involved in developing a new prod-



uct are therefore considerable, but it does not end there. All the older established products have, by law, been subject to reviews and their data packages updated so registrations could be maintained. The amount of work required will vary but can cost up to £50,000 per product.

Unfortunately the golf/leisure and amenity markets are relatively small and therefore any costs have to be spread over a much lower sales opportunity than experienced in agriculture or horticulture. Customers operating in these sectors must be prepared to pay a premium if they want manufacturers to retain current registration and invest in the registration of new products.

To compound the manufacturers problems of cost, the timescales are also prohibitive. Money has to be invested over a 4-10 year period and at any stage of development the programme may have to stop for a multitude of reasons. Even when a product is launched the threat of competitors is ever present and the opportunity to recoup these costs can be limited.

The information provided here are facts and are the justification for the price differentials that occur. To use chemicals that do not have a specific label recommendation is illegal. If the industry wants the opportunity to use chemicals as a management aid they must accept there is a price to pay in order to provide the necessary data for registration of label recommendation. Failure to accept this position could ultimately mean manufacturers will not invest, and products needed to maintain our courses and public areas will disappear from the market.

Despite these costs and resources involved,



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

MICHAEL BIRD investigates what's involved in the planning and building of a golf course workshop. Part 1

here's considerably more to the planning, design and construction of a workshop than simply asking a local builder to put up a new shed on a bit of spare ground. Unlike similar buildings found on farms – which amazingly rarely require Building Regulations approval – a new golf course workshop, irrespective of its size and cost, must satisfy the full force of the building and planning regulations before, during and after its construction.

Those who build without the necessary permissions and approvals are leaving themselves defenceless in the event of a problem, such as water pollution caused by inadequate drainage, or an accident resulting from poor workmanship, design or materials used in the building's construction. "Any short term financial gain can be quickly erased by the cost of correcting a fault or paying out compensation," comments Nigel Belton, leader of one of ADAS's Building Design teams. "At the end of the day, it has to make sense to do the job 'by the book' rather than to risk a life or to be told to pull down the building."

Formerly funded from the public purse for the benefit of agriculture and horticulture in England and Wales, ADAS now charges commercial rates for its range of services. To support the changes, the organisation has a new structure, new headquarters and a new logo, underpinned by the clear message that it now serves the food, farming, land and leisure industries.

Drawing on the expertise and experience built up over the 40-plus years' existence of ADAS, The 70-strong Building Design team includes surveyors, architects, civil and structural engineers and a full technical support staff, working from seven locations in England and Wales. The leisure and amenity sectors are two areas in which Mr Belton is seeking to increase activities and although he would like to see all prospective clients beating a path to his door, he does not expect to have it all his own way: "It's certainly not unusual to have to tender for building consultancy work," he comments. "In fact, I would always recommend golf clubs to speak to more than one consultancy before making their final choice."

Ideally, the tender figure submitted should, he says, cover the cost of the essential first stage of any building project, namely, carrying out a feasibility study. Encompassing examination of the chosen site and determination of the requirements of the client, the feasibility study will establish, first, whether the project is practicable and, second, what it is likely to cost. According to Mr Belton, the biggest problem encountered is under-budgeting by the client. "In addition to producing a basic scheme design which meets the needs of the greenkeeper and his staff, the feasibility study should detail budget capital costs for the job," he says. "At that point, a decision can be taken on whether to go ahead, or to revise the plans, or to start again."

Apart from site suitability, details determined during the feasibility stage will be the major decisions concerning the main purpose and functions of the building. These could include whether it is to serve both as a machinery store and a workshop; whether it needs spare parts storage; whether it should include an office, mess-room and toilet facilities; and the size and type of equipment which may need to be accommodated. In addition, external details such as the position of any wash-down area and the need for covered storage for soil mixes, composts and fertilisers or lockable compounds for gas, fuel and chemicals should be covered. "We find that our clients usually know most of the answers," he comments. "It's basically down to us to ask the right questions. We can then produce a design which satisfies most, if not all of their requirements."

Having agreed the basic design and budget costings, the client and designer can then proceed to stage two of the building project – the production of the outline proposals and the final scheme design. At this point, the designer will make contact with the planning officer of the local authority to assess whether the \Rightarrow 15




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BACK to the **DRAWING BOARD**

13 \Rightarrow proposed building and its location is likely to receive planning approval. Giving agreement in principal that the project may proceed to the next stage, outline planning approval is gained by submitting a site location, a description of the proposed building and a fee.

With outline consent granted, the project can then move towards the gaining of full planning approval. Considered to be the most time-consuming part of any scheme, this involves working up the sketches produced for the feasibility study into drawings detailing the technical aspects of the scheme. These will take into consideration, among other items, the movement of people and machines within and around the building, site access, the floor plan, loadings on floors and walls, drainage for contaminated and foul water, mains services, heating and ventilation, all health and safety aspects and the need to satisfy building regulations. "Costings can run away at this stage," he points out. "It is vital therefore that any changes to the agreed basic design brief are noted, costed and reported to the client."

The plans and elevations produced will serve two main purposes. Detailing both the overall layout and an artist's impression of the finished building, they can be used to show club members the proposed development. Accompanied by the appropriate forms and fee, they will be submitted to the local planning authority to seek full planning approval for the project.

However, it is important that all details of the design and use of the building must have been agreed between the designer and the client prior to the application. "This stage of the project should involve close liaison between the two parties," he observes. "It is vital that the designer interprets correctly the client's needs and that the latter understands exactly what is proposed, because any subsequent changes are likely to incur additional and unnecessary costs."

In addition to the planning committee of the local authority, other bodies which may become involved at this stage include the local Parish Council, the National Parks, the Council for the Preservation of Rural England and the National Rivers Authority. The NRA must always give approval to any planning application involving waste disposal. Certain developments in sensitive areas will also entail site visits by interested parties as part of the application process.

With full planning consent under one's belt, the project can move forward to the detailed design stage. This is where all the technical aspects of the building's design and construction are finalised and a full set of detailed drawings are produced in order to gain Building Regulations approval. Administered by the building control department of the local authority, the regulations cover all technical and structural aspects including foundations, walls, roofing, lighting, heating, ventilation

and drainage, these to ensure that the proposed building is fit for its purpose and suitable for human occupation. "This area can be a minefield, but it is an essential part of any building project if the job is going to be right," comments Nigel Belton. "The production of scale drawings will also go a long way to obtaining consistent tenders."

The tendering action is the fourth stage in

the project and marks the point at which the laws of contract 'enters the ring'. Explaining further, he says that you are now asking someone to make you an offer to construct a building. "We recommend inviting at least five companies to tender, determined beforehand that they are willing to do so," he suggests. "Those firms selected must all receive the same drawings and explicit building specifications. They should also receive a formal contract document which forms part of the tender package and sets out all the conditions that must be met in undertaking the project."

These include required start and finish dates, site access and security, water availability, payment details, wash facilities, dispute procedures and the need for suitable insurance while the site is in the builder's hands. This contract, drawn up by the designer in full consultation with the client, gives legal protection to all parties. "Any reputable design consultancy will produce a detailed specification and a contract document for its client," he says, "and most good building contractors will expect to receive them."

With tenders returned, each needs to be carefully analysed as some may include exclusions or qualifications. Tender analysis is not straightforward and it is not uncommon to find that the cheapest has amended certain details or omitted part of the specifications. "We will present a complete analysis and tender breakdown to the client and make recommendations as to the appointment of a contractor," explains Mr Belton. "Providing the tenderer has followed the brief, there should be no ambiguities and no reason why the least expensive should not get the job."

At this stage, 75% of the building project has been completed. However, there are still pitfalls in the final stage - operations on site. Although it is the designer's responsibility to ensure that the project is completed to specification, additional work involving extra costs will often arise. Minor changes, such as different door handles or paint, should not incur additional cost, although they must be documented. Unexpected problems such as old buried water pipes or localised subsidence may add both time and money to the project and these will have to be agreed and costed before proceeding. It is important that the client gives no direct instructions to the contractor at this stage, nor becomes physically involved with the project due to the cost and insurance implications.

The payment details should all have been agreed in advance in the contract particulars, and Nigel Belton recommends that all stage payments should include a retention figure of 3%. When the building is completed and released by the contractor to the client, half of the retained money is paid, leaving 1.5% to cover the cost of correcting small defects or problems arising during the subsequent six months.



Simon first entered golf as an assistant professional at Gerrards Cross GC, retaining his 'pro' status until 1979, when he attended Leeds Polytechnic until 1982 to study Landscape Architecture. From 1983 he worked as a self employed consultant at Hawtree & Co and during that time worked on many golf courses both private and public in Britain and abroad.

Courses for which he has had primary responsibility, both in terms of planning, design and contract supervision include the Seedy Mill GC, Sandford Springs GC, West Hove GC, Salisbury & S Wilts (extension), and the prestigious Puckrup Hall Hotel course at Tewkesbury.



Richard Barker is well known to readers of Greenkeeper International, playing a multifaceted role in the develop-

ment of the Association through his chairmanship of the East Midland section, his just announced appointment to the committee of the Midland region and his launch into greenkeeping 'stardom' as an award winner in the 1991 ICI Premier Greenkeeper of the Year awards.

Apart from his 'serious' work,

Richard has achieved high honours in the game of golf and has on numerous occasions been seen taking the giant's share of silverware at BIGGA tournaments.

Since 1988 he has been head greenkeeper at Kirby Muxloe GC, near Leicester, and it is from his experiences at Kirby Muxloe that he presents his talk on **Grass cutting to cost cutting**, a paper that will outline several important aspects in the preparing and monitoring of a golf course budget and its subsequent presentation to the club treasurer – valuable ammunition.



David MacIndoe began his career under the expert guidance of Jack McMillan, cutting his metaphorical golfing teeth on

the fine turf of Cardross, Scotland. At the age of just 20 he won recognition by becoming the head greenkeeper at Kingsthorpe GC, Northampton, following this with similar posts at Kingsdown GC and the West Herts GC. Throughout all this time David was the most active of committee men, serving on the executive committee of BGGA, on the board of management of EIGGA and chairing the London branch for both BGGA and EIGGA.

Ireland beckoned in 1984 and he became course manager at the exquisite 36 hole Killarney Golf and Fishing Club, a club that has played host to the Carrolls Irish Open in both 1991 and 1992. We know David as a man with essentially practical views and we are sure that seminar participants will enjoy listening to his discourse on **Greens management** – back to reality, a thoroughly intriguing title.



Kerran Daly is the course manager at Salisbury and South Wilts GC., as well as being one of the select handful who has achieved Master Greenkeeper status. He's a Scot by birth and breeding but with the unusual distinction of having only ever worked on golf courses in the south of England – rare indeed!

Always an active member of BIGGA, Kerran has held various positions within the committee structure, including chairmanship of the Sussex section. More recently he has been elected as the regional board representative for the South Coast section, expressing his main interest as that of advancing greenkeeper education. On that front, Kerran will address the Harrogate audience on the subject of Computers in golf course management, with a vow that he will refrain from mentioning Poa annua, Penncross, 'The Way Forward', Fusarium, Take all patch or any other such taxing subjects, this for a full thirty minutes!



John Millen is the envy of many of his colleagues, a course manager who has achieved a lifelong ambition, that of designing

and constructing a golf course from scratch. His course, however, is not one of the umpteen million pound wonders that swallow profit and bruise credibility, rather it is an essentially practical play-every-day layout that will take heavy traffic, despite its clay based soil. This has been achieved at a cost of just £700,000 and from the very beginning has shown a healthy profit and attracted great acclaim – creditable indeed.

John practices what he preaches and will pose for discussion the premise that **Golf – 365 days a year!** is no pipe dream, rather an eminently achievable target for those who seek to provide year round play on a full course at reasonable cost, coupled with true, firm greens and mud free fairways.



George Barr has much to be proud of, managing as he does the delightful Ham Manor course, undoubtedly one of

Harry Colt's finest. At the back of George's mind, however, there had long been a nagging feeling that the eighteenth green at 'The Ham' had somehow not survived in quite the same way as Harry's seventeen other gems, often playing in an uncharacteristic manner. With unbounded enthusiasm and a modicum of guidance from the experts, George photographed the green, took meticulous measurements of every contour and idiosyncrasy and then proceeded to lift the turf and rebuild the entire green to USGA specifications. His talk, The layman's view on building a USGA spec green will make fascinating listening, with the ghost of Harry Colt, I fancy, nodding approval.



Martin Jones started in greenkeeping as a result of summer work whilst studying maths and engineering. During a period

spent on the Southend Parks Department course, he decided that his future lay in golf course management. Positions at Saffron Waldon GC and Tadmarton Heath GC followed and he is currently responsible for growing in the prestigious Rees Jones designed Oxfordshire course near Thame.

His paper, Setting up an American style development in Britain, will highlight the differences between managing old and new courses and outline the techniques used during the establishment of an American style course.



Jane Ryan is secretary of the BIGGA Sheffield section and the glamorous half of Yorkshire's only husband and wife green-

keeping team, working alongside husband Paul at Abbeydale GC. She is rare in many respects in being not only a player of great merit, having competed at national level against the likes of Laura Davis and Alison Nicholas, but also a qualified greenkeeper with over seventeen years solid experience and, above all, being foremost amongst the most dedicated of those whose cause it is to further the proud profession of greenkeeping. Speaking for the first time to a nationally assembled group, Jane's subject is one dear to our hearts – **Hold your head up high** – a cri de coeur that should not be ignored.



Bob Lupton worked at the STRI for four years before becoming a head greenkeeper, at the tender age of 19, at Baildon

GC. After six years he moved to a second head greenkeeping post, this time at West Bradford GC, and eight years later moved to his current job, that of course manager at Cleckheaton, where he has been in charge for some five years. Bob is a high profile BIGGA personality - a lifelong member, currently the Northern region administrator, a committee member of the Northern section and a former chairman, secretary and treasurer. In addition he has also worked on the Turfgrass Advisory Committee and the Askham Bryan College Liaison Committee.

In the dim and distant past, before pocket calculators made their mark as popular playthings, this writer would often struggle with the intricacies of a slide rule, failing miserably and gnashing teeth in exasperation. Thus if there is one thing guaranteed to make this math ignoramus gasp in admiration, it is the apparent ease and aplomb with which accountants skim through balance sheets, making huge mental calculations with nary a keyboard in sight. I will admit to the world that I hold the rarefied field of accountancy in very high esteem indeed, I am in awe.

The subjects of my most recent Golden Key interview, Bernard Hedley and Clive Williams, are as unlike the popular conception of accountants as you will ever find, being extrovert, relaxed, fun to be with people – yet both began their careers in accountancy. Both are living proof that accountants are not the stuffy number-crunchers of popular misconception, being warm, sensitive, utterly charming human beings entirely tuned to the real world, empathetic and oozing charm. In a nutshell, these two stalwarts of the fine turf business that is Rigby Taylor are the power-houses that make the company tick, clockwork and precision-like, each contributing in his own way to making Rigby Taylor a force to be reckoned with.

Bernard Hedley, the chairman and managing director, is a Fellow of the Institute of Chartered Accountants who began his association with Rigby Taylor in the seventies as their accountant, partner in a local professional practice. There is no doubt that from this privileged position Bernard was better able than most to recognise a good thing when he saw it, and when a management buy-out of Rigby Taylor was mooted in 1980 he was instrumental in seeing the purchase through smoothly, whilst also seeing the wisdom in becoming a shareholder. At first he took on the role of financial director, becoming the chairman and managing director in 1986, a task which Clive likens to 'being in charge of the total logistics package'.

Bernard, a Lancashire native, likes to describe himself as an ex-accountant, rightly so when one considers the huge responsibility involved in directing such an extensive operation, and he sums up his job as being 'almost a referee', giving people their heads – within the framework of company policy – and creating an atmosphere where the customer is king. That the policy works there can be no doubt, for with a field force of 28, coupled with their own agronomists, technical experts and back-up staff, together with distributors of their Mascot range, Souters, Spray-Chem, GCSE (Germany) and Lindsay's, they are most certainly major league players in the sports and leisure business.

I like to dig a little in these discussions and was curious to learn more of company philosophy, the thinking behind the doing. Bernard was not unhappy with my suggestion that they are the big fish in the little pond that is the sports and leisure industry. 'In the manufacturing context', he told me, 'I may draw a parallel with Marks & Spencer. We know where to go to get our own name brands manufactured, made to our own specifications, utilising ideas that we have devised and perfected. By definition I suppose we are relatively small in global terms but big in our field. Whether a client spends £200 or £200,000, the same philosophy to total service always applies'. Clive chips in - 'We are big enough to say to the major world-wide manufacturers, we will be your vehicle for new products in the marketplace, we'll give you coverage in Britain and Europe. Big or small, the thinking behind Rigby Taylor is one of professionalism, of really caring about individual needs. We can concoct a one-off cocktail, package a special mix, as we have done just recently for an environmentally sensitive area, we're quite unique in that situation. We're different from normal distributors, we search for products that will fit a real need in the market place, we have our own technical staff who trial, test, write labels - everything that is necessary to bring fine products to the end user'.

If Bernard is the referee, Clive Williams, Rigby Taylor's sales director, is certainly the team coach. He's been in the business for what seems like forever, beginning his career as an accountant though soon realising that a sales career was his forte. He cut his teeth with the Murphy Chemical Company, working through the sales ranks and ending as their general manager, following this with a spell at May and Baker in their garden products section before joining Rigby Taylor in the spring of 1989. I think of him as 'the happy fella', indeed both he and Bernard I see as a jovial twosome who know the importance of communication. They talk together; campaign together; laugh together, get things done together – they're kindred spirits.

The 'happy fella's' task sounds simple enough, but it is a huge one none the less. His is the task of training and moulding the sales team, ensuring that their technical abilities match their selling skills. He coaxes, motivates, inspires. He's hugely proud of his sales force, especially of their high level of technical knowledge. Both in the field and the sales office the emphasis is always on being recognised as experts. ****** 46

'Customers won't accept the advice of someone they don't trust'

45 - All are BASIS trained, constant updating in the light of new technology their way of staying ahead. Clive's thinking is summed up when he says 'customers won't accept the advice of someone they don't trust. Most of our selling is done by giving advice, therefore the advice must be utterly believable, true and honest, the client must believe in the man'.

Clive's a countryman at heart, never happier than when pottering in his lovely garden in the Cambridge village of Hardwick or when taking aim with a shotgun at clay pigeons, his second love. For all that, he covers 50,000 business miles a year in his car, so he must have some affection for the motorway system! He and Bernard are like twins when they talk of work.

To some this may be a dread disease, but to them it's a highly enjoyable experience from which they both get a positive 'buzz'. Bernard says that when he gets to his desk the adrenalin starts pumping and both liken their work to sport, a game they'd rather be winning than losing!

No interview would be complete without some discussion on the BIGGA connection. Rigby Taylor have become Golden Key supporters for one simple reason, they believe in the education of greenkeepers! As an investment in the future both Bernard and Clive see BIGGA as central to their thinking: they like their company to be involved both at section and region level and are glad that this new

way of saying thank you can be registered now on a national scale.

Asked what they would like to see for the greenkeeping profession if they could wave a magic wand, their reply in unison was for a greater awareness at club level - members, committees and green chairmen alike - of the professional qualities involved in caring for such a valuable asset as a golf course -the assets are massive, the recognition should be likewise.

Above all, they enjoy dealing with 'our' profession, expressing the view that it is populated by nice people with nice attitudes. From two nice people with nice attitudes, that's a very comforting statement.





On 24-25 February we are running a two day trip


