



The times they are a'changing...

ocated somewhere in the centre of England, some 200 miles respectively from London and Edinburgh is a country hotel with a surrounding eighteen hole golf course. Known as Aldwark Manor it is not the easiest of places to initially locate although only a few miles north of the great city of York. It was to here that a young organisation known as BIGGA located in May of 1989 from the Sports Turf Research Institute in Bingley, initially to portacabin offices before moving into a converted out-building in December of that year. Since that time both the organisation and the offices have grown. Through prudent conversion, the offices have doubled in size but they are barely adequate for current let alone future needs. BIGGA is presently committed to a lease which expires at the end of 1997. The Board of Management has now established a Buildings Fund to raise monies to provide for suitable alternative accommodation in the years ahead and has signalled its intent with an initial donation of £5,000 from general funds. So the search is on but it will surely be a wasted search unless the Buildings Fund can raise sufficient revenue to make things happen and facilitate a much-needed move. Within the regions and sections of BIGGA there is an appreciation that accommodation needs becoming acute and now is the time for BIGGA members to become pro-active in their revenue raising activities to ensure that a move becomes a practical option. Members need to spread the word about the Buildings Fund whilst regions and sections need to give priority to fund-raising activities and set targets each year. It will all help and assist in the Association moving purposely forward to the year 2000 and beyond.

BIGGA's computer system has grown piecemeal since the early days at the Sports Turf Research Institute in 1987 and 1988. We followed the STRI in the use of an Apple Macintosh system and it has served us well over the years. However, in the nature of these things it is now outmoded and

simply not fast or flexible enough to meet the growing demands of our burgeoning Association. With this in mind the Board of Management has authorised the purchase of a new Apple Macintosh system which is currently being installed with software programmes being adapted to meet both current and future needs. There will be particular benefits for the Membership Services and Finance sections and it is, of course, vitally important that we stay abreast of current technological developments if we are to provide an increasingly sophisticated service to our members. It has not been possible in the past, particularly on membership matters, to provide the information services we would have liked to regions, sections and individual members. Now our updated equipment will allow this to be done and we will have in place a system to service the Association's needs over a five to ten year period.

This will be a productive year for BIGGA's Education and Development Fund and one which confirms the wisdom of the establishment of the fund back in January 1992. No fewer than five projects will come to fruition in the months ahead. Currently available is 'A Practical Guide to Ecological Management of the Golf Course', jointly published by BIGGA and the STRI. Shortly to follow will be a video on golf course preparation. A second video on the reconstruction of a green is not far behind whilst in the pipeline is a booklet on grass identification. Finally the longawaited localised management training courses are coming to fruition with the first two taking place at Elmwood College in October. These must surely be outstanding value for money at a price to members of just £50 a head. So, another significant year of development and new projects made possible by our golden and silver key supporters, who comprise the seventeen contributing companies within the industry and those individuals who wish to further BIGGA's education and training programmes. To one and all I extend the Association's appreciation.


Those of you of a certain vintage will recall folk hero Bob Dylan telling the world that 'The Times They Are A' Changing'. No more so than at Headquarters.

In recounting his time at the club Pat remembered what the greenkeeping facilities were like when he started at the club and how much things had progressed in the time he had been with Shipley.



A team of greenkeepers won the Aberdeen Trades Foursomes tournament at Hazelhead at the first attempt. The team all BIGGA members was Chris Pearson, Murcar, Bradley Wood, Westhill, Richard Watt, Deeside and David Murray of Newmacher clinched the final in the double foursomes format by seven holes. It was reckoned to be the first time that a team had won in its debut in the event since in inaugural tournament in 1936.

East Dorset settlement will have long term implications

The East Dorset Golf Club court case, the result of which has been eagerly awaited within the industry because of its wide ranging implications, has been resolved out of court with Hawtree and the STRI settling on and paying out an undisclosed sum.

The terms of the agreement struck two days into the court case precludes both Hawtree and the STRI from comment but it is believed that the combined payment to East Dorset was in the region of £1.8 million.

The case came to court after the club accused Hawtree of costing it around £4 million when the course waterlogged and developed thin grass cover and it lost potential club memberships and green fees. The core of the matter was a fine rootzone mix which had been decided upon to allow the course to combat the fact that the area was apt to become wet.

Unfortunately, because ultimately the case was not heard in court, the facts did not have the chance to be aired and this coupled with the confidentiality imposed by the terms of the settlement mean that the detail will remain shrouded in mystery.

Chris Bakhurst who was Managing Director of Golf Build (UK) Ltd, constructor of East Dorset said, "Although I have already read some comments in the press

which are ill-informed I frankly do not wish to enter into a public debate about this profoundly complex case. Golf Build (UK) Ltd which, in fact, no longer exists was paid in full for its work and maintained good relations with all the parties involved.

"It is a matter of sadness for me, personally, that Martin Hawtree for whom I have the greatest admiration found himself in this situation and I hope that the industry will leave this matter behind it and continue to strive for excellence."

It is thought that the East Dorset case and the significant settlements may open the flood gates to more law suits.

Educational recognition for experienced greenkeepers

Hundreds of experienced greenkeepers who have learned their skills "on the job" can now be officially recognised for their ability without having to go to college.

The greenkeepers, many of whom will have seen their young colleagues go to college and gain qualifications, will be able to achieve nationally recognised qualifications at the appropriate level without having to attend college.

This exciting development comes with the Greenkeeper Training Committee becoming an assessment centre by gaining approval from City & Guilds and Scotvec to offer NVQ/SVQ in Amenity Horticulture levels 1,2,3 and 4

By October the GTC will have 42 NVQ/SVQ adviser/assessors in place. All Course Managers or Head Greenkeepers they will have attained qualifications which allow them to:

■ offer accreditation of prior learning and thus be in a position to advise greenkeepers on the appropriate starting level of NVO/SVO.

assess a greenkeeper on the

basis of watching him or her work and questioning his or her knowledge.

■ assess the candidate using diverse sources of evidence other than merely assessing skills and knowledge such as previous non-NSVQ qualifications and testimonials from other Head Greenkeepers.

The 42 adviser/assessors all have the support of their employer and are spread throughout the country with eight in Scotland, 32 in England and two in Wales

In addition to the 42 there are

200 assessors, who are also Course Managers or Head Greenkeepers, so everyone will have an assessor within easy reach.

"I am delighted that we have achieved Centre Approval and feel that this will help education within the greenkeeping profession and reach as many people as possible," said David Golding, GTC Education Director.

"The GTC's initiative to train advisors and assessors will allow colleges to go back to providing candidates with the underpinning knowledge of their subject and, wherever possible, let the assessment of this happen in the workplace," said David.

BIGGA, colleges and other training providers will still play a large part in greenkeeper training.

"I think this is a great step forward. BIGGA will continue to assess training needs and provide appropriate training courses," said Ken Richardson, BIGGA Education Officer.

Golf clubs are now to be encouraged to contact the GTC to have their greenkeeping staff's training needs assessed and through the NVQ/SVQ advisory service more trained, qualified greenkeeping staff will enhance golf course conditions.

The GTC will continue to train Course Mangers and Head Green-keepers as assessors and if either golf clubs or greenkeepers are seeking more information on the NVQ/SVQ system, assessing etc they can contact the GTC at Aldwark Manor on 01347 838640.

BIGGA SUPERVISORY AND MANAGEMENT COURSES

This year's BIGGA Supervisory and Management Courses are filling up fast. Be sure to reserve your place by returning the card in this magazine, together with a cheque for £117.50 to BIGGA HQ at Aldwark Manor. These courses provide the ideal opportunity to help head greenkeepers bridge the gap to course manager and to prepare all greenkeepers for management roles. Head greenkeepers who have not received any formal supervisory or management training should advise their

clubs that grants of £150 may be available from the GTC to help with the cost of sending their greenkeepers on one or more GTC endorsed management courses.

The 1995 series of BIGGA Supervisory and Management Courses has been designed not only to meet the underpinning knowledge requirements NVO/SVO Level 3 Units but also introduce elements of NVO/SVO Level 4. BIGGA courses are open to all greenkeepers who need to improve their supervisory and management skills. The courses are:

Module 1: Managing People 1. October 16 - October 20. Covering team building, interpersonal skills, leadership, time management and computers in greenkeeping.

Module 2: Managing People 2. October 30 - November 3. Covering assertive communication, influencing skills, grievance and discipline and computers in greenkeeping.

Module 3: Managing Operations

and Resources. November 6-November 10. Covering planning and organising, estimating cost, budgets and project management. Module 4: Managing Information. November 13 - November 17. Covering writing memos, letters and reports, communication skills, collecting and recording information.

Module 5: Management Techniques. November 20 - November 24. Covering level 4 management techniques. Topics maintenance include and improvement of service and operations, project management, negotiation skills and quality

All course delegates and employers will receive an end of course summary. This could be used to provide evidence for NVQ/SVQ assessors.

Attendance at each year's course qualifies for eight credits towards the Master Greenkeeper

The cost per week, including accommodation, all meals and tuition fees is £420 + VAT for BIGGA members and £475 + VAT for BIGGA non-members.



Skin cancer fears lead to warnings about sunburn

The Health and Safety Executive has launched a new free booklet warning of the dangers of sunburn.

The leaflet "Keep Your Top On" is aimed at all those who work outside and are in excessive danger of exposure to the sun.

"It is extremely important for outdoor workers to realise the danger of over-exposing the skin to the sun," said Dr Paul Davies, a senior health policy official at HSE. "Too much sunlight can be damaging – especially to people with sun-sensitive types of skin. Excessive exposure can prematurely age the skin, leaving it wrinkled and leathery and

increase the chance of skin cancer in later life."

In England and Wales there are nearly 40,000 new cases of skin cancer registered among the general population every year and around 1,600 deaths. This number has increased over the last decade and this is believed to be linked to the increased extent to which people expose themselves to the sun for a suntan.

"In our climate the sun is not as strong or as intense as in the tropics but workers are advised to protect their skin from undue exposure to the sun while working out of doors in the summer – particularly during the three or four hours around the middle of the day. Recommended precautions include wearing a long sleeved top and a hat with a wide brim which will shade the face, head and back of the neck," said Dr Davies.

The leaflet also explains that some people are more sensitive to the sun than others and gives simple advice on how to recognise skin types most at risk.

STRI sets out its policy statement for golf clubs

The Sports Turf Research Institute (STRI) has led the field for many years in providing sound, independent advice to golf clubs.

Golf courses are an integral component of our countryside supporting a wide diversity of habitat types, often contributing significantly to the conservation of the landscape, much of which is under continual threat of habitat destruction and/or modification. Many golf courses are important in conserving nationally and internationally important plant and minimal species. Golf clubs are gradually realising the importance of the surrounding natural landscape for the enhancement of the game, realising the need for sympathetic approaches to ecological management.

In working alongside golf, the STRI is striving to promote a greater ecological awareness through:

■ Education to establish a greater depth of underpinning knowledge behind ecological management and naturalistic approaches to landscape development.

The STRI will strive to:

- Consider all issues related to golf course management, especially those with ecological implications.
- Keep abreast of, and comply with, relevant environmental legislation.
- Work with the management of the golf club to develop and implement environmental enhancement programmes and their future monitoring.
- Avoid activities which could result in undue or excessive danger to plant, fish or wildlife, or which could threaten or damage their habitat.
- Provide recommendations for the most effective and most efficient use of resources.
- Ensure that contractors and managers recognise their environmental responsibilities.
- Provide recommendations for the most effective use of fertilisers and pesticides and to minimise their movement from target areas to the immediate environment through transport in air, water or soil.

FLYING DIVOTS

■ A new report shows that nine out of ten golf courses built within the last five years are in financial difficulty.

The report "Financial Performance of UK Golf Developments" by the Golf Research Group claims that of the 388 courses built since 1989, 88% have incurred losses and many have been forced to cut joining fees and reduce standards to attract new members.

An analysis of the accounts of 78 new courses found that 28 made a combined profit of £17.85 million with two of them accounting for almost £12 million of that while the other 50 had combined pretax loses of £32.79 million. SMALL IS Beautiful

Scott MacCallum meets Bryan Griffiths – a man who builds courses for those new to the game.

ow often have you read of a new golf club which, the literature boasts, is "a championship course over 7,200 yards in length" and has cost the equivalent of the prize fund for half a dozen weeks on the lottery?

Membership fees are invariably five figures and the courses are always in immaculate condition partly because when you when you pass they are usually devoid of play unless of course there is a visiting merchant bank entertaining clients.

They are all aimed at the elite end of the market and many have failed to break the shackles of enormous debt and seen more bankers pass through their gates. On these occasions though they are wearing business suits and frowns and talk is of rescue packages, not how they contrived to make seven at the short 8th.

These clubs do little to promote the game on a popular level. Even if juniors were subsidised and encouraged to join, the courses are so long and difficult they would soon drain any confidence golf's wannabees had in them.

So where can the young and, indeed, old learn the game and, in the case of the younger students, take the first steps to emulating the likes of Faldo and Montgomerie.

There is an answer but unfortunately it is an option which is being embraced by the game's sleeping giant – Asia – and is being virtually ignored in the United Kingdom.

Short, or par-3, courses built as part of an integrated golf academy allow youngsters, and those oldsters new to golf, to build up skills and confidence in an environment not designed to intimidate before they move onto the rigours of the par 72 7,000 yard monsters.

One man who has been at the forefront of the short course concept is Bryan Griffiths, Chairman of Golfconsult International Ltd, who has found the bulk of his current business in Asia. He has designed over 50 courses in 44 countries and pioneered the introduction of suspended water table green in the UK.

"There are 24 million active golfers in Asia and the latent demand is huge and they are showing a great interest in the short course concept. Unfortunately there is little interest here," explained Bryan who worked with leading architect the late John Harris.

"We generally build an adults' short 9 hole course with perhaps two short par-4s, a children's par-3 course, putting facilities, practice ground and teaching facilities. It is all there. Beginners can play and handicap players can brush up their short and medium iron play on the short course and their long game on the driving range," he said.

"They can be built on a third of the land of a conventional 18 hole course for two thirds of the cost and the capacity is four times greater than an 18 hole course so they are extremely profitable," said Bryan, whose company philosophy is "Feasibility Followed by Design."

"It only takes an hour to get round so many people can play a quick nine holes in their lunch hours. Doing that soon sharpens up your game and handicaps will drop," said Bryan.

"I design for the 95% of people who pay for the industry and not for the pros who, if you forgive me for saying so, take their money out of the game."

The par-three concept is not new. Sir Henry Cotton advocated the idea many yeas ago with his plea for "cow grass" courses where the course merely consisted of cut grass for greens.

"That was great at the time for encouraging people to take up the game but things have moved on and the short courses must be built to the best possible specification. They have to be available for use all the time in all weather so they have to be hard wearing built to top spec using all the modern technology."

Par 3 course greens are generally two thirds the size of conventional greens and Bryan includes very little rough and no water hazards. "I did break that rule once where I put in one hole across water. The reason was that the complex included two signature courses which were stuffed with water and the client thought it no bad thing to give them a bit of a knee trembling experience."

On the whole however the aim of the short course is to encourage and not intimidate.

"There is nowhere in this country where a beginner can feel comfortable and have all the facilities available to them to become a rounded handicap golfer. Beginner demand is almost infinite. There is an unending supply of people who want to play but can't because they can't afford it or snobbery keeps them out of the exclusive private clubs.

"The longest par three I'll have is 190 yards off the back tees anything else is just a waste of money. What's the point of putting down 200 yard par-3s when most of the users are beginners. Brute force should not be encouraged. Anyway some of the finest holes in the world are some of the shortest. Just look at the Postage Stamp at Royal Troon."

With land at a premium and extremely expensive many developers, or existing clubs with some spare land, could do a lot worse than consider building a complex dedicated to beginners.

"The smallest course I have done is a kid's nine holer at 625 yards and this requires only two acres. The standard short course is around 1,500 yards and needs only around 15 acres," explained Bryan.

Just because a course is designated for children doesn't mean that older handicap players should shun it.

"You mustn't be snobbish. Play the 10 year olds. It's quite a challenge for the adults and I can tell you if you play for a bar of chocolate you don't win very often.

"Even very experienced players can take out their wedge and play. It requires real discipline. I'm a great advocate of the saying 'Adults may play if accompanied by a child'," said Bryan.

So there you are. If there is anyone out there with the wherewithal and desire to invest in a golf development don't rule out the short course concept. It need not be an act of selfless philanthropy. In the location with a sizable catchment area it can be extremely profitable venture almost guaranteed to make a return on investment much more quickly than a conventional 18 hole golf club.





- A total of 700 bunkers were found during the course of regular play in the Championship Rocca's visit to the Road Hole during the play-off took the figure to 701. The final day, including the play-off produced 156 visits to bunkers. The Road Hole claimed 14 including Daly, Els and Rocca in the play-off.
- The last man to find a bunker in the Championship was Davis Love III who waited until the 8th hole on Sunday before entering a bunker. Dean Robertson pushed him close but his challenge came to an end when he found sand on the 6th during the final round.
- The 17th produced the most sand drama. The hole claimed 94 victims with 72 of them coming at the Road Hole including Rocca's visit in the play-off.
- Lee Westwood was the man who made most visits to sand during the tournament with 12 visits to sand during the four days. Nick Faldo was second with 10.
- James, Tomori and Nakajima were the men who made the fewest visits to sand during the week. Tommy Nakajima who became known for his Road Hole horror in 1978 made his first visit and only visit to sand on the 14th hole in the third round.
- The hole which possessed bunkers but which claimed the fewest victims was the 8th with 16 victims all week.
- Craig Parry was sick of the sight of one particular bunker on the course. He found the same bunker as he played the 7th and the 11th causing extra work for Sean McDade of the BIGGA Greenkeeping Support Team.
- After his second successive 75 former US PGA Champion Wayne Grady gave away his putter to a young girl who had accompanied his match. The comment from Robert Hogarth, the BIGGA Greenkeeping Support Team member who followed the match was, "On this showing I don't blame him."

Managing and

Management tips from Duncan McGilvray, Course Manager at Letchworth GC in North Hertfordshire.

If one person manages the golf course efficiently, and takes control of the many varied responsibilities involved, the benefits to the golf course and the club as a whole, are immeasurable

This may be a rather obvious statement to make but I have to say there are still very many private members' golf clubs which do not hold one person responsible for managing their course, and because of this the golf course and its members have to suffer substandard conditions and long term problems.

The person or persons who may be responsible at the moment may range from the General Committee, the Green Committee, the Green Chairman or Convenor, the Secretary, or how about the Course Superintendent or the Estates Manager? Or even a "working" Course Manager (whatever that may mean) and in a few isolated cases it may be the Head Greenkeeper.

With all that confusion around I am not surprised that there are many private members' courses not being efficiently managed. But let's not blame anyone for this rather confusing situation. At the moment there is no workable alternative. To be quite frank there are not enough suitably qualified Golf Course Managers to go round. I do believe however that there is an answer and an ideal which can be achieved in the foreseeable future.

To manage a golf course you need a Course Manager NO MORE – NO LESS. There may be Managing Committees and even Managing Sub-Committees which are there (quite rightly in my view) to ensure the members interests, but there should be no argument against the necessity of every golf course having a suitably qualified Course Manager to be responsible for the golf course.

To whom that person is answerable may be a matter for debate but we must hold one person responsible and that person must be a Course Manager.

In the next few months we will cover what I believe is the absolute minimum requirement/remit/job description of that person and I fervently hope that it will become the rule at every private members' club and not the exception. With the Greenkeepers Training Committee now well established, and the many training providers (including BIGGA and the approved colleges), there will be no excuse for not finding the relevant training to develop the necessary competency levels and skills required to be a successful and effective Course Manager.

1. TAKING A MAJOR ROLE IN THE FORMULATION OF POLICY

What is "policy"? Simply explained, it is an agreed system within which we work. Note the word "agreed". The Club sets policy – not the Course Manager. That point is extremely important – we may think the course is ours but it belongs to the members and we are employed by those members to carry out their instructions. That said however – because we are trained to manage courses and possess the knowledge, expertise and above all, experience to avoid potential future disasters – we must be involved and indeed take a major role in the formulation of such a policy.

If for example the club aimed to have a policy of no aeration: "we don't want all those holes in the greens disturbing our putting" – and lots of water so that "we can hold the ball on the green more easily" – it would be the Course Manager's duty to convince the Club of the catastrophic results and that a different policy should be adopted.

In this way policy is set and the Course Manager is responsible for that policy being carried out.

I do not wish to go into detail regarding what a policy should contain but suffice to say it should cover every area of the course from greens and conservation areas, to clubhouse surrounds and car parks. It should also contain all staff and committee responsibilities. This may sound daunting at first but, believe me, if policy is set out, your working relationship with the Club will be much more amicable and workable.

The biggest aggravation I hear from colleagues is that the Committee/Secretary/Green Chairman (or all of them) are always "interfering" in the work on the course. If you set policy and work within it, there is no need for any "interference" – everyone knows what the aims are, and how they will be achieved – the course will be managed in a way which the Club can understand and relate to, and in the case of a written Course Policy Statement (which is highly recommended), is clearly defined and documented.

2. TO OVERSEE THE SHORT, MEDIUM AND LONG TERM MAINTENANCE OF THE COURSE WHICH IS DICTATED BY THAT POLICY

This covers the common sense decisions, made by us without realising it, on a day to day/week to week/month to month basis.

It covers decisions on staff working singly, in pairs, in groups, using overtime effectively and managing your staff's time as well as your own, eg. two or three tasks may be carried out at the same time thus making obvious savings, not only in time but also in machinery wear and fuel costs.

I also think it's essential to re-evaluate how/when we do anything on the golf course

on a regular basis. There is always a more efficient way no matter how well we think we do it already.

The most important work in the above heading is oversee – Course Managers are paid to manage, not to sit on machinery cutting grass all day every day – you save your club a considerable amount of aggravation, and therefore money, because you think and manage.

I do believe, however, that in our position we must earn the respect of our staff by not only being capable of doing any task we ask of our staff (no matter how menial) but also assist staff where and when appropriate What we have to do is find the balance between overseeing, administration and the physical use of our own labour as part of the overall Greenstaff, so that the course is run as efficiently as possible.

Overseeing should not mean spying on staff. This is time wasting and counterproductive. In my experience staff respond extremely well to trust.

3. TO PRESENT AND IMPLEMENT WORK SCHEDULES

The Course Manager must be capable of assessing the detail and duration of every task on the golf course and convey this information whenever asked. The largest work schedule which must be presented, approved and implemented will probably be the Annual Winter Programme. This may be presented in many different forms but we have found the "3 Part System" to be very effective (Parts 1 to 3 in order of priority).

PART 1. NECESSARY ANNUAL COURSE MAINTENANCE

For example:

- · Checking drainage and cleaning ditches, etc.
- Checking trees, staking/tree ties/lopping,
- · Checking/replacing small bridges.
- Painting course furniture and machinery overhaul, etc.
- Health & Safety updates, etc.

PART 2. AGREED PRIORITY WORK


The Committee/Green Chairman/Secretary will have more of an input in this section. It is effectively what the membership would like done on the Course, for example, new paths, new tees/larger tees, tree planting, etc.

PART 3. GOLF COURSE ALTERATIONS

Following a recognised Golf Course architect's appraisal this section would cover improvements to the Course in design terms, e.g. movement of bunkers, green re-design/re-construction, etc. The Winter Programme should state when it starts and is due for completion, eg. October 31st, 1994 to March 17th, 1995 as well as stating how many staff will be

involved, and how that staff will be allocated to each project. Ideally a Master Plan would have been prepared as part of the Policy Document, so that Annual Winter Programmes are not viewed in isolation, but part of an overall strategy looking well into the future. Regular Course Reports to the Club should be produced throughout the year as a form of work schedule, covering progress and future work envisaged on the course, so that the Committee, and ultimately the membership, know what has/what is/what will be carried out on the course. (More detail of this under the later heading of Communication). Forward Planning is so important in ensuring things run smoothly for ourselves and our staff as well as the membership. Without going into any detail, written schedules have to be kept in a folder with access for all staff, which is updated on a daily/weekly/monthly basis so that everyone knows what is planned for

today/tomorrow/next week/next month. This is of course in addition to Year Planners, Holiday Schedules, Fixture Lists, etc. In this way the allocation of staff, materials, and machinery will be as efficient as possible. However, in the real world there are changing circumstances, and these have to be accommodated, but this should not be used as an excuse for not planning ahead.

4. TO PRESENT AND IMPLEMENT MACHINERY MAINTENANCE **PROGRAMMES**

A proper Machinery Maintenance Programme is very much reliant on finance and this will therefore be covered more fully under the next article heading of "Controlling Finances".

However, I would like to cover two very important points under this heading now.

An accurate machinery/equipment inventory which is updated immediately following any change is absolutely vital and is the responsibility of the Course Manager. An efficient, clean, tidy and well-designed workshop, as well as good, comfortable canteen facilities where all staff know where all tools and equipment are kept sets the scene for the whole course. If the workshops are well kept I would bet that the Course would be too.

5. KEEPING ACCURATE RECORDS

Thank goodness for the Health & Safety Executive. Above all others they are the authority which has forced all of us into keeping accurate records. I must say I have certainly improved in this respect following their inspection, ie. chemical records, usage records, machinery repairs, etc. Another form of keeping records is via the desk diary. This tends to be used as the focus of all our opera-

It holds the obvious things like appointments and dates for golf days and the like, but having kept many years worth of work activities on the course, as well as what and how materials have been applied, it is a formidable record for the Club.

It is also important, should you move on, that the next Course Manager has the knowledge of what has gone on in the recent past, and would undoubtedly make his job easier.

And lastly, an accurate plan of the Course is essential in ensuring that everyone knows what's underground as well as what's on top. Expenditure records will be covered under Controlling Finances.

6. KEEPING UP TO DATE WITH MODERN **METHODS, MATERIALS AND EQUIPMENT**

In this ever-changing environment, with the myriad of materials and machinery, it is our duty to keep up with developments in all areas. I have to say that the best way I have found is to meet with colleagues at every possible opportunity, both in the line of business, eg. BTME, Education Conferences and Workshops, Saltex Exhibition, etc. as well as semisocial occasions, such as BIGGA golf days, etc.

The obvious occasions are the demonstration days given by companies within the trade which are very helpful, but still find talking to colleagues on those days more beneficial. We seem nowadays to be inundated with product information and the tendency is for it to go straight in the bin. However, we owe it to our employer continually to look at the most cost effective way of managing the course, and if that means reading every circular, book or magazine article, then we have to do it. Today's golfing member deserves an efficently run golf course for the money he or she is paying, and more and more of these members are questioning where their money is being spent.

A Course Manager totally responsible for the course is I believe the only way to make sure that requirement is met in future.

Calls to the Association's legal helpline continue to grow. Employment barrister Jonathan Waters considers some common problems concerning greenkeepers' employment.

I am an assistant greenkeeper. I have heard on the grapevine that the committee is going to make an assistant greenkeeper redundant. What is redundancy and if I am chosen what procedure should my employer follow prior to making me redundant?

Unfortunately, as a consequence of the recession, this is a common enquiry. The term "redundancy" is often misunderstood – both by employers and employees. In law, redundancy has a specific legal meaning. It basically occurs when either the golf club or the place at which the greenkeeper works closes down or, as is more common, there is less work available for the greenkeeper to do.

A greenkeeper who has been employed for in excess of two continuous years would be entitled to a statutory redundancy payment based upon his length of service, age and gross weekly salary. The statutory redundancy payment is calculated as follows: a) one and a half week's pay for each year of employment which consists wholly of weeks in which

the greenkeeper was not below the age of 41;

b) one week's pay for each year of employment (not falling within (a) which consists wholly of weeks in which the greenkeeper was not below the age of 22; and c) half a week's pay for each such year of employment not falling within either of the above.

The maximum amount of a week's pay is £205.00. The redundancy payment is tax free.

The greenkeeper would also be entitled to notice money calculated on the basis of one week's notice for each complete year of service. If, however, the contract provides for more notice money than this then it is the greater amount that must be provided.

Making someone redundant, an employer must follow a full and proper procedure. This usually involves consultation with all greenkeepers who are likely candidates for redundancy, consideration of alternatives to redundancy (such as an agreed reduction in hours or salary) and consideration of alternative employment – if available.

If the greenkeeper is one of a number who may be selected for example, the employer needs to dismiss one of three assistant greenkeepers, then the employer must have a legitimate reason for selecting that particular employee. Traditionally, this has been based on the principle of "last in, first out" however, in recent years, there has been an increased tendency to follow a points criteria. This is based on marking each employee on factors such as attendance, timekeeping, sickness record, disciplinary record, and qualifications. The greenkeeper with the least amount of points is the one who will be selected for redundancy.

If a greenkeeper has been employed for more than two years he will be protected from unfair dismissal. If he considers that there is either not a true redundancy situation or that the procedure followed is defective then he may make a complaint for compensation for unfair dismissal at an Industrial Tribunal within three months of the date of dismissal.

I recently left my last club to take up a new position as a Head Greenkeeper at a rival club. My new employers have requested a reference from my old employers but they have refused to provide one. Are they entitled to do this?

Unfortunately, the answer to the question is yes. With the exception of the financial services industry, a former employer is not legally obliged to provide an ex-employee with a reference. The law does, however, provide that if a reference is provided then it must be truthful and accurate. If it is not and the green-keeper is unable to obtain a new job as a result then he may be able to sue the former employer for damages to compensate him for any losses sustained.

Celtic Manor Golf and Country Club is the result of one man's dream, a dream which will give pleasure to thousands and provide Wales with a truly great Championship venue.

'It is a quality development of truly international standard'

crossing the Severn Bridge into Wales at the moment it is difficult not to marvel at the magnificent structure currently under construction a mile or so to your left. The new, as yet unnamed, bridge, complete but for a few gaps in the span and with huge cranes somehow floating in the water around it, gives a reminder of man's ability to create technological masterpieces.

Travel a few miles further down the M4 and again your breath is taken away by another extraordinary feat.

Like the new bridge Celtic Manor Golf and Country Club is a showcase for man's talents as well as being a tribute to the achievements of one particular human being. We've all heard tales of the local man made good but the story of Terry Matthews puts most others in the shade and is sufficiently awe inspiring to make all but Richard Branson feel an underachiever. He began his professional life repairing telephone kiosks and has risen to become the tenth richest man in Great Britain. He no longer resides in Wales however. He moved to Canada some time ago and his £500 million personal fortune - that's £500,000,000, a five and eight zeros - was amassed from the telecommunications business, Newbridge Network, he founded.

Terry was born in the building which is now the Celtic Manor Hotel when it was a maternity hospital. He bought it some years ago and turned it into a hotel before his dream of creating a golf course fit to host a top PGA European Tour event for a Welsh title developed fully.

It's a dream which is nearing fruition and one which has cost in excess of £50 million.

It sounds, and is, a lot of money but when you visit Celtic Manor and see the sheer scale of the development, 36 holes plus the Ian Woosnam Golf Academy, and the blind devotion to excellence it is easy to see where the money has gone and even, it may sound ludicrous to say, conclude that he's got a bit of a bargain.

Designed by Robert Trent Jones Snr, who would have a strong case for being the man at the very pinnacle of the profession, the Roman Road course at 7001 yards par 70 is not something you'd want to play to in the Monthly Medal while the Coldra Woods course 4094 yards par 61 will help to develop new talent – Celtic Manor is also the new home of the Welsh Golf Union. Coldra Woods is a selection of par-3s and par-4s with the added bonus of making it a pure par-3 course by moving to the front tees which have been built on the par-4s.

Testing every club in the bag the Roman Road will be a particular examination for the putter as Trent Jones Snr has installed his trademark greens with subtle and some not so subtle borrows. One thing it doesn't do is comply with conventional wisdom when it

comes to considering Roman Roads. Long it may be but dead straight and flat it isn't. High on a hill overlooking some majestic Welsh countryside it will require shot making of the highest quality to make a score and when the wind blows as it undoubtedly will even Touring Pro Ian Woosnam will be hard pushed to tame it from the back tees.

It also carries the flag of the Wales Tourist Board which is hoping that it will attract top sportsmen and women as well as accompanying tourist influx from all over Britain and the rest of Europe.

"It is a quality development of truly international standard and ideally placed, just off the M4, to attract visitors from the rest of Wales and across the border," said Shan Ekin-Wood, Wales Tourist Board Press Offi-

"With Ian Woosnam's involvement and with proposed equestrian and tennis centres it should attract top quality sportsmen and women to Wales. It will be an important part of the Welsh tourist industry," she added.

Course Manager, Jim McKenzie, is the man who has been charged with bringing the courses to peak condition.

"We've actually kept very quiet about Celtic Manor before we opened. Our marketing people have been very clever in that they have not given the course a huge build up as has happened at some others. The idea was

to finish it and then let people make up their own mind about it. Then they could be the ones to sing our praises," explained Jim.

A 33 year-old Scot with an impeccable greenkeeping pedigree having worked at some of the country's finest courses, Jim has been on site since June '93 slowly bringing it along so its condition will match the quality of the lay-out.

"I've had the benefit of being involved from very early on so I've had input on a great deal of the construction work.

"Trent Jones Snr drew up the construction specifications, Wenvoe Construction of Cardiff moved the top soil, Trent Jones' own shapers shaped the course, the top soil was replaced, Gerald Davis did the final seeding and the irrigation was put in by Toro," he explained.

Jim's own team did all the final shaping, all the drainage and sanding of the bunkers and this not only had cost cutting benefits but also enabled the job to be done at the opti-

"By doing this ourselves it meant that we could structure the jobs much better. If it was

too wet for my guys to put in sand they'd go and do something else. If a contractor came he'd do it anyway.

The course has been built to be extremely maintenance friendly and capable of fending off all but the worst the South Welsh elements could throw at it.

"It really is a facility to play golf every day of the year. It's built on the apex of a hill so drainage is not a problem and there is little or no frost because of the wind. There is very little time consuming strimmer work involved and it's all ride-on Toro mowers on the banks so it's quick to do."

At the moment there are 35 people working on the course with 20 full time permanent staff. Once open, and the official opening will take place at the beginning of this month, there will be a full time staff of 25 to 26 working under Jim including two mechanics and two gardeners.

There are two Head Greenkeepers. Russell Anderson, formerly with Jim at Wentworth, is Deputy Course Manager and in charge of the Roman Road while Paul Davies, who previously worked at St Pierre is Assistant Deputy Course Manager and in charge of Coldra Woods.

Byron Thomas, runner-up in the Toro Student Greenkeeper of the Year, is also a member of the Celtic Manor staff.

"Once both courses are open I'll pick out people with strengths in particular areas to work on the course where that skill is important. The ability to handle a machine on a slope will be a skill required on the Coldra Woods course for example," explained Jim who in addition to his last position at Wentworth has had experience at Haggs Castle, Cawder and Renfrew, a course he rates as one of the best inland courses he has ever seen.

The maintenance sheds at Celtic Manor are

among the best anywhere and at a cost of around £333,333 they should be.

"The design came from a collaboration with Robert Trent Jones, a local architect and myself.

"There is a drive in area to the Chemical Store so there is little danger of spillage and the Mess Room is designated a clean area so dirty boots and jackets are banned. The floors are tiled and the tables and chairs can be

folded away and stacked so it can be hosed down. The office is by the main gate so I can see who's coming and going while we have a skip permanently on site so you won't see any litter anywhere.

"We have low level lighting so mechanics don't need spotlights to see what they're doing."

Jim rates Chief Mechanic, Patrick Callaby, as the best in the country and is delighted that he was able to persuade him away from St Pierre.

"The maintenance area was available in April '94 and I didn't touch it or buy anything until Patrick arrived and he lived in his workshop for two weeks before he bought anything just to make sure he had the feel of it. It took seven of us to unload his specially designed £1,000 workbench when it arrived.

"People might read this and think it's alright for them they've got the money to do it but I'm sure if they were in the same position they'd try to do the same," explained Jim, whose February wedding to Tracy, the Sales Manager, was celebrated at a reception in the sumptuous hotel.

Celtic Manor is probably unique in that it concentrates on one main company for all its greenkeeping equipment and another for

the heavier work with the club owning 34 pieces of Toro equipment and six Massey Ferguson tractors.

"I went for Toro equipment because Lely, Toro's UK distributor offered me the best overall deal and the benefit in going for one brand is quite considerable when it comes to spare parts and in the general maintenance and servicing of the machinery.

"It was not a decision taken purely on financial grounds, quality of service was extremely important as well. To give you an example our local Toro dealer is Pro Turf in Carmarthen 70 miles a way but I phoned an order in for three items about £10 each and someone made the 140 mile round trip to deliver them to me that day. That is them coming across with their side of the bargain."

For Jim it is a superb job but also a huge challenge and one which swallows up his time.

"I used to look at the Greenkeeper of the Year Award and think it was wrong because instead of going to the likes of David Whitaker at Wisley with all the money he could possibly want it should go to the one man and a boy working on a course at the top of a hill. I've changed my thinking and now believe that the more money you've got the more pressure there is and the greater the expectations.

"The entire staff have been working seven to seven, seven days a week for the last five weeks and there was a time last year just after we'd seeded that we clocked up 103 hours in the one week. We'd arrive in the dark and go home in the dark.

"At the moment (just before opening) we're not under the same obligation to do things when they should be done. For example the tees need cutting today and if we were open we would be doing them but the boys are doing something else and we'll cut the tees tomorrow.

"You just throw the rule book right out the window.

"You always try to strive for perfection and ideally I would like it to open next year because then it would be better and all the non grassed areas would be grassed,"he said.

It's that attitude and general attention to detail which will ensure that when the course and clubhouse opens fully Celtic Manor will quickly establish itself as one of the premier golf and hotel resorts in Europe. It also virtually guarantees that the dream that has driven Terry Matthews will make that all too rare metamorphosis and become reality.



Golf courses that have had the foresight to manage their landscapes are without doubt the most attractive and inspiring to play, says Andrew Vaughan. Catch up with a thoughtful tree planting programme.

nyone connected with the Amanagement and upkeep of a golf course will be aware that virtually all courses are currently in the process of being measured to upgrade their Standard Scratch Score.

As the deadline on 31 December 1995 draws ever closer, at the time of writing some 30% of courses have yet to be measured and surveyed. Of those already completed, approximately 50% will remain unchanged, 30% will have their Scratch Score raised by 1, 10% raised by 2 and 10% reduced by 1.

Although the assessment procedure is rather complex (if not mystical) an understanding of the Rating System could allow the Scratch Score to be maximised.

For the uninitiated, the Standard Scratch Score and Handicapping Scheme originated in 1925, and was last upgraded in 1983 when the system used by the Australian Golf Union was

SCRATCH

introduced, based on all scores returned by players under Medal Play conditions. However, this still did not address the problem of uniformity of Scratch Scores or the portability of handicaps, and as a result the Course Rating System of the United States Golf Association is now the basis on which golf courses are to be assessed. Under this system the Standard Scratch Score is the score which a scratch player is expected to return in ideal conditions over a Rated course.

Before assessment and measurement begins, the course is provisionally rated by standard length (the sum of the horizontal distances from the medal tee to the centre of each green). The Provisional Scratch Score is then adjusted up or down depending on a number of physical factors that affect the playing length, namely; roll, changes in elevation, forced lay-ups, dog-legs,

prevailing wind and altitude. Secondly, the obstacles that affect playing difficulty are evaluated and scored to give a final adjustment.

The basic USGA Course Rating is therefore based on the performance of a scratch golfer, whose better half scoring average will equal the Course Rating in normal conditions. However, more interestingly the USGA System also provides procedures to determine the Bogey Rating, based on the performance of a Bogey Golfer (handicap 17 to 22, or a player who cannot normally reach the green on a hole exceeding 370 yards in 2 shots).

Such a rating could help deter poorer golfers, or at least reflect the anticipated difficulty (or cost in new balls!).

Besides driving the ball much shorter, the bogey golfer is much less successful at hitting fairways and greens. He/she plays long par-4 holes as a par-5 and is not nearly as effective in getting up and down from rough or bunkers. Thus the areas (and angles) they play differ from those of a scratch golfer.

While the Rating system adjusts for the bogey golfer, no account is taken of an obstacle being more difficult for them to escape, or because they cannot recover as well as a scratch golfer. Overall, the system converts obstacle ratings to stroke values by multipliers of 0.26 for scratch players and 0.11 for bogey golfers (because scratch players avoid and overcome obstacles more than twice as easily as bogey golfers).

In the process of rating a course, and a typical hole, an assessor will consider the following (roughly from tee to green):

Chute – consisting of trees that are positioned such that they can interfere with the early flight path

of a shot, where on average, the ball must pass through a narrow opening. Difficulty is rated on the width of the gap between extending branches, how far the opening is from the tee, or for a subsequent shot, from the landing zone. Other factors include foliage density, where might the ball drop and how well can the player recover.

- Extreme Rough classified as vegetation that will either make it likely that the ball will be lost, or can only be advanced with great difficulty (eg. long grass, heather, gorse, tree roots, marram grass, underbrush).
- Landing Zone defined as the area from where the shot hits the ground to where it comes to rest (length) by the fairway width. Generally, Landing Zones are rectangular, and obstacles are considered to be near when within 20 yards.
- Layup Forced where obsta-

cles cross the fairway or reduce the width in the normal landing zone to less than 15 yards.

- By Choice where a player decides to hit less than a full shot to allow a subsequent full shot to the next target (usually a green).
- Obstacle Squeeze occurs when obstacles within 20 yards of the centre of a Landing Zone prevent a player playing away from either obstacle.
- Shot Length assuming players hit straight shots, the average distance covered after two shots can consistently vary by 100 yards between Scratch and Bogey golfers. Therefore assuming obstacles apply to all golfers, is often not the case.
- Transition Zone the area just beyond the average distance of shot expected to be hit with consistency. On the drive, 10 yards, from the fairway (2nd/3rd shots) 20 yards. Where a green lies within a transition zone, a golfer

has a 50% chance of reaching the green. Placing an obstacle close by can determine how the "average" approach shot is played (eg. lay up by choice with short approach to give a full shot to the green).

- Accuracy Pattern an Accuracy Table indicates the average target size that can be hit with 67% of shots over increasing distance. This is used to evaluate the effect of an obstacle around the target or Landing Zone (usually a green).
- Combining and Weighting In some situations an obstacle can have a greater effect than would otherwise be the case, particularly where two types combine (eg. extreme rough under trees or crossing deep rough to a green surrounded by bunkers). Also severity on one side of a Landing Zone can differ greatly from the other, or indeed where one "hazard" varies in severity (eg. well maintained grass under trees in one section, heavy rough in another).

Ten types of the most common obstacles have been identified that will affect play namely; Topography, Fairway (width, nearby hazards, hole length), Green Target (difficulty of hitting green). Recoverability Rough, Bunkers, Out of Bounds/Extreme Rough, Water Hazards, Trees, Green Surface (Putting difficulty) and Psychology (cumulative effect of obstacles on a player's score).

Other than major changes to

the layout of a golf course, the obstacles that are most easily influenced by course management are greenside bunkers, rough and trees.

Missing a green is twice as significant as missing a fairway, thus increasing the difficulty around the green is likely to be the favoured option when tightening up a course. This also generally coincides with the largest area of "dead" ground.

While increasing the acreage of heavy and semi rough will almost certainly be opposed by many club members, the planting of trees is gaining popularity. Many courses considering tree planting not only seek an immediate "woodland", but also one which is designed to provide an attractive and pleasant backcloth to the course. Although shelter is an obvious benefit, trees also provide security to players/passersby/neighbours, help divide the course in a natural manner and influence how the course is

Very few courses are prepared to be really bold in making certain holes more difficult, as with increasing player numbers and pressure, slow play (and exasperation) is often the result.

Accordingly, designing woodlands for golf courses is fraught with difficulty, not least as golf balls are one of the best tree pruning devices available.

Previous attempts at tree planting on an informal basis very often prove to be an expensive and wasteful exercise as either tree protection and maintenance are non existent, or they are sited in the wrong place. There is no instant way to establish trees, and although many courses plant six to eight feet high "Standards", they are initially expensive and establish slowly, while smaller, trees quickly establish and can soon overtake their larger counterparts.

Provided minimum area criteria are met, grants are available from the Forestry Authority to plant small woodland copses that by careful design can benefit the playing of a particular course (and cover 30-80% of the total cost). Coupled with planting individual trees scattered between larger areas, the effect can he very natural and attractive.

When designing the layout of new planting, the following criteria are especially important:

- 1. Landing Zones off the Tee should general be given a wide berth, as there is no point making a particular hole impossible to play for the poorer player. Also, as tee shots are the most erratic trees close by the landing area are likely to be bombarded at regular intervals making establishment difficult.
- 2. Trees will eventually occupy significant space as the canopy broadens and matures. Thus, strategically placed young trees will increasingly interfere, with play.
- 3. Creating Obstacle Squeeze

for players approaching the green is the most likely method of deliberately affecting play, not least as this usually corresponds to the largest area of dead ground, and is the one shot that is under control (reducing damage to trees. However, maintaining adequate aeration and light to the playing surface must also be considered.

- 4. The location of open space and vistas is just as important as where trees are located. Reducing space around the green/tee area will increase wear and tear as player traffic concentrates in a narrow through-route.
- 5. Tree planting need not be completed all in one season. Not only will this spread the cost, but it allows for the player/tree interaction to be gradually increased.
- 6. Work out a grass management regime before tree planting, identifying who does what and where. Green staff need only be concerned with areas potentially in play. Maintaining closely cropped grass in between hundreds of young trees is not realistic.
- 7. Where possible try to use site specific native tree and shrub species. This should ensure rapid establishment and promote the long term vigour and viability of the trees into old age.
- 8. Plan for dropping zones (and the necessary local rule changes) such that the tree bound shots are properly but fairly penalised.
- 9. Secure the support of club members/players, or at least attempt to educate them about the problems of tree establishment and the damage they can inflict.

10. Be prepared to maintain newly planted trees for three to five years, ensuring that a prescribed maintenance programme is rigidly applied.

Those golf courses that have had the foresight to manage their landscapes are undoubtedly the most attractive and inspiring to play. Therefore, golf clubs wishing to plant trees are initiating a major change in how their course looks and plays, and seeking specialist guidance is crucial to getting it right. Happy planting!

TWS and Arvs.

Hugh Tilley canvasses opinion on six TMV and ATVs from the people who know them best.

hether their main used is as course runabout, to carry specific attachments or as the major component of greens maintenance, turf maintenance and all terrain vehicles (TMVs and ATVs) have found a place on most UK golf courses. Cushman has arguably become a generic name and the best known of TMVs, perhaps with the greatest number of attachments built for it, however there are competitors and most greenkeepers agree that a TMV is not always the best machine to carry out some tasks, nor are they ideal for three point linkage implements. For tasks such as ball collection or course ranger an ATV without frills, except possibly a protective cage for the driver, is a simple and inexpensive means of accessing all parts of the course without damaging the turf. Many tasks require load carrying capabilities, while for others the ability to carry two or three people as well as tools and materials is important. Prices range from around £2500 for a plain ATV toaround £4000 -£6000 for a transport utility and up to £14,000+ for a purpose built TMV. Diesel adds perhaps £1000 to the price but few greenkeepers are looking at anything else, nor is price the most important factor when it comes to buying such a major item.

Jacobsen Workhorse SV 2322 at Tiverton GC

The SV of the name means "Sys-

tems Vehicle" - Tiverton Golf Club has now had its own for a couple of months and the club extremely satisfied with it. Bought through MST at Tiverton nevertheless consideration was given for several other competitive machines. Head Greenkeeperat Tiverton is Stephen Baker and he said that selecting the Jacobsen was a joint decision because all four of the greenkeepers expect to have to operate and maintain it, "and it is no good having a machine which not everyone is happy with".

The machine is expected to undertake the majority of greens and tee work, and for this the club has top dresser, cargo box, sprayer and multi-tine aerator. These units have the same working width as the Workhorse itself thus making matching runs easy, particularly when topdressing. Stephen commented that turning on and off the topdresser drive was extremely easy and pleasant as the lever was very conveniently placed. Important features in the selection apart from the easiness of driving was the fact that the engine is mounted at the front under a bonnet where it is

extremely convenient for maintenance. The "solid" construction of the machine was another factor and it felt safe with four wheels and a good track width. Stephen said that they undertake their own machine maintenance and the good accessibility made this simple, it also meant that such routines as checking oil levels was less likely to be neglected. The three cylinder Kubota diesel rated at 23.5 hp has adequate power, and the payload is around a tonne. Although Stephen felt that the machine may be heavier than its competition it is still very nimble, and it does have very wide wheels, thus he is perfectly happy to have it in his greens.

Cushman Turf Trucksters on Salisbury & South Wilts GC

This 27 hole downland course has two Kubota 22hp engined diesel Trucksters, both three wheel versions and the club likes them. Naturally Salisbury has an extensive range of equipment to fit, including a three point linkage kit which has yet to be used. The main uses for the machines apart from transport of staff and materials is for spraying and top

dressing. At the present one machine is being used exclusively with a Hardi sprayer, while the other alternates between transport duties, topdressing and other implement tasks. The 'stable' includes two types of slitter, a coring drum and brush.

Kerran Daly, Course Manager at Salisbury admits to being a fan of Cushmans, he likes the simplicity, the (lack of) size and the manoeuvrability. He hopes that Ransomes won't increase the Turf Trucksters size, add complications or in any way 'tart the machines up'.

The only serious reservation he has is over the pto which at 1000 rpm is too fast for the many implements which use (the normal European speed) 540 rpm. Mention was also made of the fact that the machine found difficulty maintaining a constant speed on undulating ground, so that the operator has to consciously compensate with the throttle to maintain his speed when spraying. There are other little niggles such as the seats which are not well attached and a cab induced drone which is "wearing" for the operator over day long use. The service record includes a parking brake cable which snapped, but with this as with other items no problems have been found with spares and service which are sourced through T.H. White Ltd. For maintenance access to the engine and mechanical components was rated is as excellent. Kerran said he finds the machines 'very stable', certainly he has no criticism over the three wheel configura-

tion, and with a good suspension they are very comfortable. Attaching implements is easy, and the box is light enough not to need legs or complex jacking systems. The new machine is seen as several important offering improvements on previous models, such as wider lower ground pressure tyres, greater ground clearance and several other upgrades which add strength and reliability to the machine - and better looks in the Ransomes livery. Nevertheless the machine still scores at Salisbury on its simplicity, ease of use and overall efficiency for the job.

Toro Workman 3300D - Highpost GC near Salisbury.

Lauchlan Millar "inherited" the Workman when he moved to Highpost earlier this year, in this time he has become an ardent fan of it. Although only 18 months old the Highpost machine has clocked up 1,000 hours with few problems. A lot of the work has been hauling soil, sand and other materials around the 18 hole course during the winter when the ground was too wet to take a tractor and trailer. Lauchlan praised the brakes and surefootedness of the machine which allows the operator to back to the edge of a bunker and tip in the knowledge that the machine won't slide in. The hydraulic tip works even with a full load of over a tonne. Highpost has the full length cargo box which was considered the most useful option, a decision which not been regretted. Another option which has been appreciated is the cab,

"the course is not called Highpost for nothing," Lauchlan added. It is possible to get the machine to spin its wheels, as like both the Jacobsen and Cushman only rear wheels are driven. This was not really a criticism just a reflection of the natural result of making a light-footed carrier which can be taken onto greens without marking them. The Workman mounts its 21hp Mitsubishi engine and transmission centrally and integrates them with the rear axle to give better balance. There are two short constant velocity joints on the transaxle and Highpost have had a problem with one.

The machine was bought with topdressing as a priority use and for this it has been "brilliant". "I was stunned how fast it works," Lauchlan said. "We can topdress all18 greens in under a day including the brushing in. The machine has a fast transport speed and a topdresser which is wider than the loader bucket thus non-working time is minimised. Toro provides a key lock-out feature which prevents operators accessing 3rd gear unless it is unlocked by key. "We don't need that feature here, but I foresee a lot of clubs where it would prevent abuse," he commented -"members don't like to see greenkeepers racing around the course."

Other uses for Highpost's Workman include slitting, tineing and brushing. The brush is used on Saturdays and Sundays rather than switching, "and you can't see any marks.'

Routine service and maintenance is carried out by Highpost staff themselves, but the machine did go back to Romsey Garden Machinery for a 1000 hr/pre season service this winter. There were no criticisms over assess to the mechanicals which live under the body, props are supplied to hold the body up safely and servicing was rated as "easy". The considered user opinion on the Toro Workman at Highpost is that it is a well thought out machine, with a suspension which is "streets ahead" of the competition.

Kawasaki Mules at Donnington Grove, near Newbury

Two Mule 1000s on the Donnington Grove Country Club have a hard life and are putting a lot of miles under their wheels. Bought specifically because there is a lot of running around to do, it is over a mile to the furthest hole, and even the nearest is over half a mile from the ex-farm buildings used as the greenkeepers' base. Bought in March 1993, each has now clocked up about 7500 miles, and cost a significant sum in replacement parts. Course Manager, David Winterton, was not critical of this except that he considered that Kawasaki parts were expensive, quoting the recent necessary replacement of the electronic ignition circuit box as £260

Donnington looked as several machines before electing to buy the Mules. The competitors were "failed" for lower speed and lack of "pull". Stability, low ground pressure and ability to carry a payload were factors which added to the Mule's speed and

engine torque to select them. The Mules ability to climb steepish slopes even when loaded is not overlooked and, of course, this is important given the steep nature of quite a lot of the course.

Both machines are on differing tyres to those originally fitted, Donnington had to try quite hard to get a less aggressive tread patmachines have tern. Both weather cabs fitted, a feature which is particularly appreciated because of the exposed nature of much of the course and the distances which are travelled at high(ish) speeds going to and fro. David assessed the life of the machines, in his use, as about three years, when they should have clocked up about 11,250 miles, used about £2350 worth of petrol and cost £1500 in parts. Bought at £4700 and with an anticipated resale value of £1000. this means an annual cost of £2500, however when worked out on a mileage basis the 67 pence per mile is seen as perfectly acceptable given the work they are undertaking.

Donnington's experience with the Mules was that they need a skilled mechanic close by, fortunately they have one in-house, otherwise they might not have kept the machines. Apart from replacing parts there had been a regular need to re-tune the twin carburettors, however David conceded that new models are likely to be better.

Although on the face of it this does not appear an ideal recommendation for the Mule, David was happy that he received good value, particularly as they did a

job which he felt nothing else could do significantly better or cheaper.

Huxleys Huxtruk at Maidenhead GC

Right price and package with proven backing were important factors in Maidenhead GC's selection of the Huxtruk. It was supplied with box, cab and topdresser and also a Hardi sprayer. In future there is a prospect of purchasing a Coremaster, when the hydrostatic drive of the Huxtruk will mean no problem travelling at the very slow pace required for this operation. There was some initial scepticism about the electronic speed control however it has been found to work very well and the greenkeepers have become enthusiastic about it.

Gordon Payne, Head Green-keeper and Chris Mitchell, First Assistant and main operator were very positive about the machine. They had found that in almost all respects it was better than the well known machine it replaced. For instance they considered it to be better made with a stronger box, better to tip and it has a better turning circle. They were also sold on hydrostatics, feeling these to be simpler, more flexible and less prone to wear and tear. Power steering and a well placed steering wheel were singled out for mention as was the hydraulically driven pto.

Top dressing has become a mornings work which can be carried out by one man on his own. The machine has sufficient speed to make it easy to return to the heap and tractor loader without bothering to take a tractor and trailer out or have another member of the staff hanging around to service and assist the topdresser. Maidenhead's Huxtruck service record is excellent, and in the 18 months it has been on the course there has been one pto seal failure and a loose hydraulic pipe, both "no charge" items.

Routine servicing is minimal with very few grease points to grease and no problems of access. If there was a criticism it was that there is too much fibreglass cladding, however it was agreed that this material withstands a greater knock than "tin" without damage or loss of paint, although once damaged it was more difficult to repair. The feeling was that it would keep its good looks better.

Both greenkeepers felt that Huxleys had listened to greenkeepers about what they want in a TMV, and they complimented the attention to detail such as the higher front to the box which prevents material tipping down the front onto the works beneath. They also liked the cab which was easy to remove, furthermore it has a better windscreen wiper than its predecessor. The machine was supplied by and is serviced by Huxley's retail division.

John Deere Gators at Wootton Bassett Golf Club

American Golf (UK) Ltd, operator of Wootton Bassett Golf Club near Swindon, has purchased about ten John Deere Gators for UK courses and has three working on this particular course. Their main



use is as lightweight runabouts with ability to carry a significant payload. The Wootton Bassett's machines are in constant use every day and Laurence Pithie, Director of Maintenance UK, said because of the drainage problems inherited on the course they were about the only machines which could be used this winter. Two of the machines are 4x2 models - four wheels with two driven while one is a 6x4. The latter carries a greater load and is more comfortable to ride, but is also more difficult to steer. However according to Mark Silk, course superintendent, once you have the knack of using the throttle to assist the turn it is no more difficult than the normal two wheel drive machines, although there is less manoeuvrability.

Mark admitted that the machines were often overloaded, nominal capacities are 408kg and 544kg, but at Wootton Bassett they pile the box as high as they can. With the soil, sand and gravel which so often are the payload this has had the local distributor, John Miller Ltd at Chippenham, wincing. Nevertheless there has been very little downtime for the machines, the main replacements have been two king pins and an exhaust on the two 4x2s which are now almost eighteen months old. Drive belts have also been replaced once, more as routine than necessity, as the cost is only £20. The six wheeler is a year younger than the four-wheelers.

Options specified on the machines include the plastic bed liner, electro-hydraulic box tip, heavy duty air filters and a tow hitch. The standard knobbly tyres have been retained, but when questioned about any damage to the turf, Mark was adamant that there was very little even with the

machines fully laden. Although the engines are petrol driven Wootton Bassett has found them very economic, tanks are normally filled about once a week, and "filled" means three quarters full as there can be some leakage from the cap breather when filled

right up. The club has a licensed petrol store which is kept locked and complies with local authority and fire brigade requirements, although storage quantities probably don't need this. Thus there were none of the problems often levelled against petrol machines.



Acid theory: controversial topic needs exploring

I am pleased that Jim Arthur and I are in agreement that many old greens do not need the addition of phosphorus for healthy growth of turf (*You say*, June issue). There are two reasons for this.

The first is, as we agree,that many already have very high phosphorus levels in the soil.

Secondly, where old greens are healthy but have extremely low "available" soil phosphorus levels it may be that they can sustain growth because the grasses and other plants growing in them have mycorrhizal fungi growing symbiotically with their roots to help them absorb phosphorus from the soil. The simple chemical extractants used in laboratocannot simulate beneficial effect of these fungi so it appears that the grasses need less phosphorus than they are actually getting. On new greens with low phosphorus levels these kind of microscopic relationships have not developed and fertiliser containing phosphorus should be added if analyses so indicate.

On the subject of the acid theory, how can Jim Arthur say that the ideal pH is the one you have got when the acid theory which he seems to be espousing involves the artificial lowering of soil pH by the use of acidic materials?

The acid theory has always been a very controversial topic and has damaged many greens over the years I suggest that, to get a balanced view of the theory, the "students and starters" which Mr Arthur wants to protect from modern thinking on nutrition go to their college libraries and read some of the old literature on the subject. I suggest "Turf" by Lewis, published by Faber in 1948 and "Lawns and Sports Greens" by A.J. MacSelf for starters.

A fair day's pay

Congratulations to BIGGA who in the last seven years have created a new image and professional status of our greenkeeping workforce. These initiatives have given us better guidelines for working conditions, recommended salary/ wage scales and further education programmes. This professional approach will manifest itself at club level with well trained dependable staff being available when needed.

In your recent article in *Greenkeeper International* you explained that the published salary/wage scales were "recommendations" and not mandatory. This statement will assist Green Chairmen when dealing with their individual club wage negotiations. Salaries can now be paid which will be commensurate with staff qualifications and their workload.

The Association of Golf Club Secretaries (North West) recent survey revealed a wide variation in salary/wage scales, hourly rates, overtime rate, staffing levels and hours worked. The findings of these clubs through the North West were so varied it was evidence that no positive guidelines had previously been available and an ad hoc system had prevailed.

Often neighbouring clubs would compare their course and staffing levels and make pay awards accordingly. Pay awards and conditions for house staff does not often promote such lengthy discussions. Green budgets have been reduced to ensure staff remain who provide food and drink. That I suggest is not the main function of a golf club.

The initiatives of Ken Richardson, BIGGA Education Officer, and the Greenkeepers Training Committee will in the long term benefit clubs.

The educational qualifications can be drawn up and included in all green staff terms and conditions of employment.

Further education will benefit both the profession and golf clubs and will provide us with staff who can advise us on all specialist matters which currently most clubs have to seek from "Advisory Services" at considerable expense. We will soon be able to pay a "Fair Day's Pay for a Fair Day's Work".

Keeping in touch with news and comment from the regions

North West

The temperature is 90 degrees in the shade and rising. The grass has not been cut this year and is now six feet tall and turning to a golden brown because there is no irrigation system and it has not rained since January. Everything is dust dry but I'm enjoying every minute of it. Yes, I am on holiday in central Africa (Zambia) and it just occurred to me that I had better drop you a line to remind you about the autumn tournament at Didsbury GC on September 7. Soup and sandwiches will be served between 12-1pm. The tee is booked from 1.30pm and tee off times will be allocated on the day. The closing date will be Friday September 1 and all applications to play including a £10 deposit must be sent to Paul Pearse, 1 Swan Close, Poynton, Stockport SK12.

Now back to the holiday. My wife Marie and I are staying at the orphanage that we help to support deep in the bush about 30 miles from Lusaka, the capital of Zambia. The only way to the orphanage is on a road cut through the bush about one and a half cars wide and riddled with pot holes. We use a four wheel drive Toyota pickup truck to go to Lusaka for supplies and driving in the town is similar to the dodgems at the fairground.

The orphanage, called Kasisi (which means little sister) is run by a Polish community of sisters and they care for about 130 babies and children from one week old to 13 and 14 year olds. Unfortunately many of the babies that arrive are HIV positive but they are all cared for as normal babies by the sisters. Amazingly in several cases after about 12 months further tests prove they are negative. No medical cure has been found for HIV so I can only assume that the never ending love and care that these children receive from the sisters can be the answer.

Since we arrived two weeks ago we have travelled extensively and we have visited Livingstone and the Victoria Falls, the Musi-o-tunya Game Park and the Kafue National Park photographing rhino, hippo, giraffe, elephants, crocodiles, monkeys and many other animals. The national parks are thousands of square miles of thick bush burnt brown by the sun and the lack of rain. It is a beautiful country totally unspoilt.

Today we visited the Kariba dam and Lake Kariba, travelling about 300 km on a winding pot holed road. On each side of the road is dense bush and towering above the bush are giant Boa-Bab trees that look as though they are growing upside down with branches that look like giant roots.

The only problem is that in a week's time we have to return home. But hopefully we can save enough to return again next year.

A brighter future begins today

Pr Mike Canaway has had six weeks to settle into his new office and become accustomed to the responsibility of being the Chief Executive of the STRI. In many ways it is less of a quantum leap that it might have been for others as he been with the Institute since 1974 and made steady progress through the ranks before making the final step up from Head of Research and Assistant Director to main man.

He has therefore an almost encyclopaedic knowledge of the workings of the Institute and appreciation of its strengths and weaknesses.

"The beauty of the Institute has always been that we've had our research department providing answers to questions that our agronomists and their clients want answers to. It is the perfect chain, one which no-one else can provide," he explained. "On the other hand one of the problems we've had in the past has been our conflicting corporate objectives and a lack of overall direction. In other words the communication between the different departments has not been as good as it could have been.

"We've also been weak in the past with regard to our image within the industry. We've tended to let work come to us and done very little in the way of marketing."

It is this situation which Dr Canaway is keen to address quickly and he already has a plan in place.

"It is my intention to appoint an External Affairs Manager who will look after marketing, advertising, public relations, customer care, publications, seminars etc. Our staff is professional and I want them to have the back-up from base to help them improve

our customer care."

An unassuming, friendly man Dr Canaway, who achieved his Doctorate from Liverpool University while at the Institute, is modest to a fault. He must be otherwise the "Differential Slip Wear Machine" which is internationally recognised as the best piece of equipment to simulate golf course wear would have been know as the the "Canaway Differential Slip Wear Machine".

He feels that it was his commercial business like approach in his 12 years as Head of Research that helped him clinch the job as Chief Executive.

"I encouraged staff to produce budgets and costings for different projects so that I could produce annual budgets for different sections. Prior to that nobody had really looked at costs. We were a non-profit research organisation with some advisory work grafted on to it.

"We're in a different, more commercial world these days so you have to look at everything in terms of cost and ensure that whatever is being done in the most cost effective way. Are there other ways in which we could do it better? Are there other ways in which we can give a better service to the clients and to the golf clubs?"

It is a point which was hammered home time and time again during our meeting and gave a clear indication that Mike Canaway's STRI is more attune to the demands of its customer and the threat of competition.

"I want to be more customer

led... We need to be meeting the needs of the customer rather than just offering a service... We need to operate in a commercially aware manner and generally operate in a more efficient way and in a manner appropriate to an organisation heading towards the 21st century."

He is still fine tuning his vision for the Institute but it is clear that an ability to fight its corner and compete for business will be fundamental in that vision. As will a restructuring of its internal workings.

"Other than in 1951 when other sports were added to golf the structure of the Institute has not changed since it was formed in 1929 and I think from a business point of view it has led to us under performing.

"We have conflicting objectives in that as a research organisation we are here to carry out research for the industry as a whole and provide answers to questions and that essentially is why the Institute is a non profit making organisation. Research is not meant to be profit making. If we are doing research for the R&A it's not our intention to profit from it as they have donated money for it to take place freely and on behalf of golf. So one element of our work is almost a charity.

"The other part of our business, the advisory, consultancy work and commercial research is where we are trying to be profitable, trying to be dynamic and a commercial operation trying to make money.

"We are therefore in a Catch 22 situation. If we make money people say why should we give you donations when you've got enough money to do it yourselves and if we don't make money we're told we're not operating efficiently.

"I would like to look at ways of ensuring that the two sides of our business work independently and are not as closely connected as they are at the moment."

Meeting Dr Canaway you are left with a feeling that the new Chief Executive is a man desperate to pull the STRI into the commerical world and will ensure that the resources are there to make it happen.
