What could be better?

Yes, the 2001 BIGGA National Championship was a wonderful occasion and in Royal Birkdale and Southport & Ainsdale we had two golf courses which ensured that the entire field were tested but most of all felt privileged just to be

Played on the Monday and Tuesday after the Ryder Cup was scheduled to be played it shouldn't be forgotten that between them Birkdale and S&A had hosted four Ryder Cups and in Birkdale's case a host of memorable Open Championships. So it was with a sense of real history and awe that the maximum field - reduced slightly by last minute call-offs - teed off at Birkdale on the Monday.

The conditioning of both golf courses was a real tribute to Chris Whittle and Mike Mercer and their teams at Royal Birkdale and Southport and Ainsdale respectively. A wind gusting at up to 50mph meant it was never going to be easy so tribute must be paid to Ian Semple, National Board Member and Course Manager at Old Folds Manor who knocked it round in 74. That score can be put into perspective by some of the high scores of his fellow competitors. One player actually holed a 20 footer to keep a 20 off his card at the par-3 12th while there was a 17, a 13 and numerous double figure scores lan was joined at the top of the leaderboard by local man Chris Ball at the end of the first day whose fine 81 gave him a nett 73. He put his fine form down to finding an Irish penny at the back of the 1st green which he used as a ball marker

It was Chris, an assistant at Hillside and former junior member of Royal Birkdale who set a target on the second day that wouldn't be beaten. A 78 nett 70 was good enough for victory and it was the 29year-old who lifted the majestic trophy at

for the rest of the round.

the end of the day.
"When I saw the Championship was to be played at Birkdale and S&A I knew I had to enter it," said Chris as he savoured his triumph.

'SInce then it had been on my mind and I knew I had to win it. I hit it low and when the wind blew I told the guys at the club that I knew I had a chance." said Chris who won the event held at Royal Birkdale to celebrate Tom O'Brien's retirement a few years ago.

The fact that the Championship will again be held in the Southport area, on his own Hillside course as well as Hesketh, sees Chris already looking 12 months ahead. "I'll definitely play next year and defend the title. There will be more pressure on me as it is on my own Hillside course and I never play well round there," he said, already trying to reduce the expectation that will weigh upon him.

Ian Semple couldn't reproduce the heroics of the opening round but he hung on to lift


the scratch prize following a second round 77 for a one shot win over +1 handicapper Tony McLure. Tribute must also be played to Walter Woods who played some sparkling golf on both days to finish high up the prize list and, more importantly, see him ahead of his old rival George Brown, of Turnberry.

Next year's National Championship will be played at Hillside on September 30, 2002 and Hesketh on October 1, 2002

Barry Holt did a Justin Rose at Birkdale's 18th by holing a chip for a birdie. It produced scenes not seen since the 17th green at Brookline with a display of over enthusiastic celebrating from the delighted left hander. As a follow up he also birdied the 1st at S&A and completed his two days of work with another birdie on the 18th, on this occasion followed by a slightly more restrained punch of the air.

Even now Past Chairman Elliott Small is hot on the trail of the player who played his ball - a Titeleist 3 - on the 16th at Birkdale causing him to return. As the purple mist descended he finished his round birdie-eagle which perhaps only compounded his fury.

As yet it is not known whether any BIGGA members were responsible for Liverpool and England's Steven Gerrard getting into trouble prior to the England-Greece game. Gerrard was spotted out drinking in a Southport bar at 2am on Tuesday morning, around about the time many greenkeepers were also frequenting bars in the area.





Director of BIGGA.


Each finalist will already have been judged at country level* and had their course visited by Walter and Bruce.

Tickets for next year's lottery are going quite well at the moment. Only a few members have returned them, some have even put them in an envelope anonymously, but don't worry lads we know who you are!


Remember all monies and unsold tickets must be returned to me by the end of December. As this is the only fund raising venture which is run by the Section I hope that not too many tickets are returned.
