


MATERIAL LIST AND DIRECTIONS FOR THE ASSEMBLY OF THE "BOB WILLIAMS BOOM"

5 ft. of 1/2" pipe
2-1/2" pipe couplings
1-1/2" pipe cross
1-1/2" street elbow
1-1/2" x 3/4" reducer
1-3/4" pipe to hose thread coupling
1-1/4 turn quick opening gate valve
1/2" high pressure sprayer hose
(3/4" hose thread fittings)

DESCRIPTION

The "BOB WILLIAMS BOOM" is a spray
Boom that has been developed by Robert
M. Williams, Supt. of Grounds at the
Beverly Country Club, Chicago, Illinois.

The boom has proven so successful that Bob has given the plans and specifications to golf course superintendents throughout the country, so that they too may build their own boom.

The boom is designed to operate on pressures of from 100 lbs. to 400 lbs. with a minimum flow of 12 gallons per minute. The coverage is approximately 30 to 35 feet in width. Many variations of this boom are possible according to the size and capacity of your sprayer.

The boom should be 4 feet wide with one nozzle on each end and one in the center. The nozzles have 1/2" pipe thread and fit into the couplings on the ends of the pipe and into the street elbow at the center. The nozzles have ball socket joints and can be adjusted horizontally and vertically after they are in place. The outside nozzles should be adjusted to throw their spray slightly back of a straight line across the front of the tractor. In this manner, very little if any area is missed when you pass a tree.

A quick opening gate valve should be installed in the hose line between the boom and the sprayer, in a position available to the operator.

The volume of the boom is approximately 60 gallons per acre at a speed of 5 to 6 mph. No marker is used to gauge possible over-lapping.
