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EARLY SEASON TROUBLES

A number of the boys in the district report early troubles. There have been reports of fungus on greens, ranging from "red ring fungus" on shaded areas of turf on greens and tees to a more serious type of fungus which Ray Didier had on his greens last spring and it is reported that he has it again this year. The red ring stuff does not seem to be very serious, it coming in in periods of wet cloudy weather and clearing up during dry, sunny weather. It doesn't seem to spread and just thins the grass out. The other is much more serious and is a real problem. Ray reports that copper fungicides have been helpful in clearing up the trouble.

Desiccation of bent, especially "old bent" in fairways is anothe problem which is troubling the men this spring. It seems that there is very little root system in much of it and in periods of dry windy weather the bent is apt to fade if not watered. It seems to come back all right but there is always the possibility of infestation of Poa Annua and weeds until it does.
