NEW RULE FOR GOLF, NO CAN DO

When our golfing forefathers passed down this wonderful game to us, over 400 years ago, I'm sure they never considered all the rules that the game would take on. One of their original rules was "The Two Club Length Rule". This basically is how you went from hole to hole. Once you putted out, you took two club lengths from the pin, and teed off from there. Needless to say their greens probably were divot covered, but "Rub of the Green" prevailed until "Winter Rules" or "Improved Lie" came with the merging of Golf and television.

At this point I would like to introduce a new rule that I think every "Purist" and Golf Course Superintendent worldwide would endorse. Simply stated; your opponent has the right to penalize you one stroke per hole for not fixing your ball mark! Individual play would be on their "honor" to score accordingly.

Sound ludicrous - think for a minute, how many putts have you missed because of bumpy greens, or the ball going "hard left or right" a foot from the cup?

How many "man hours" nationwide are spent in labor to just fix ball marks? Millions? I think so!
