The 1954 Bull Sheets

While doing some research on the year of 1954 as part of a project commemorating Illinois Lawn's fortieth year in business, I read the 12 issues of the **Bull Sheet** published in 1954 that were in Fred Opperman's files.

I discovered that they were not only interesting, but were rich in the history of the Midwest Golf Course Superintendents Association and Chicago area golf in general. In 1954 MAGCS officers were George Roloff of Roselle Country Club (now Schaumburg Golf Club), President; Frank Dinelli of Northmoor, First Vice President; Walter Kilmer of Ravisloe Country Club, Second Vice President; Al Johnson of the Indian Hill Club, Secretary/Treasurer; and Directors were Ray Davis of Medinah Country Club, Bill Stupple of Exmoor and Bill Kraft of Southmoor (Palos C.C.). 1954 GCSAA officers included Norm Johnson (formally at LaGrange Country Club but relocated to San Jose Country Club in Jacksonville, Florida as President). Bob Williams and Detroit-area superintendent Andy Bertoni (well known in Chicago from his W.A. Cleary days) were Directors.

Bill Stupple was Editor of the **Bull Sheet**. Associate editors were Bert Rost, Al Johnson and Bob Williams. Art Director was Paul Burditt, Paul was a real workhorse for the **Bull Sheet**. He was the official photographer, submitted a monthly column, "Spreading It Thin," under the pseudonym "The Mole". This was a gossip-type column with a wealth of interesting golf course studies and goings on. Most 1954 superintendents did not know that Paul Burdett was "The Mole". In addition, Paul was the "ghost writer" of many other **Bull Sheet** articles. Another hard working midwest member was Bob Williams who was a member of the Midwest's Educational Committee, Chairman of the GCSA Educational Committee and a member of the U.S.G.A. Green Section Educational Committee.

Frank Dinelli, who was credited in the 1954 **Bull Sheets** for solving several differences of opinion, was often referred to by Dr. Bill Daniel and many of his peers as "Dean of the Greenskeepers."

All of the 1954 **Bull Sheet** issues had eight pages. The last two pages were advertising with the biggest ad, being a quarter page in size.

Meeting Highlights:

The May meeting was held at Glen Eagles Country Club, Walter Fuchs - Host. Advance information; a statement from club manager, George Cox. He said, "No friend of Walter's will go away hungry." One task Walter faced was the uprighting and resetting of a 100-foot pontoon bridge that had blown over during the winter. Fred Grau, who was with West Point Products Co. at that time, demonstrated an early version aerifier and verticut machine at the meeting.

The September meeting was the joint meeting with the Wisconsin Greenskeepers Association. It was held at North Hills Country Club, Milwaukee, Wisconsin. Host Superintendent was Charley Shiley. Midwest members were urged to attend as Charley was a former assistant to Ray Didier at Tam-O-Shanter.



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The October meeting (which was the annual fall tournament) was held at Evanston Golf Club. Mel Warneke, Host Superintendent. Golf winners included Amos Lapp, Emil Cassier, Ray Gerber, Bill Saielli, Emil Mashie, Al Bertucci, Bob Breen, Bert Rost, Mel Warnake, Norm Kramer, Dave Mastroleo, Ed Stewart, Jerry Dearie, John Coghill, Don Strand, Bob Williams, Chuck Daugherty, Frank Dinelli and Don Gerber to name a few. Dom Grotti was out of action with a bad back; so Dom, who had been a consistant winner throughout 1954 (and other years before and after) did not participate in the tournament. Golf Committee Chairman, Bill Kraft, must have been so busy passing out prizes that he did not win one. It should be pointed out that rain was a factor in all three of these meetings and was a hinderance to the golf events.

Under the heading "some things never change" the Fall Dinner Dance was held in November at River Forest Country Club, Ed Stewart, Host.

The December meeting was held at Big Oaks Country Club. Barney Wendt, Host. O.J. Noer was there and presented his annual report. Ham, beef and chicken were served family style, all you can eat. The cost of dinner was \$3.00 each. Big Oaks was on Gunnison Street in Chicago and was subdivided sometime during the decade of the 50's.
