I would like to thank the membership for electing me to the secretary-treasurer office. After spending my last four years on the Board as chair of the Golf and Arrangement Committee, the change to my new position is welcome. I am very lucky to follow in Brian Bossert's footsteps. Brian did a great job in the position last year and didn't leave me to inherit any huge problems. However, we do have one small problem. In order to maintain our not-for-profit status with the Attorney General of the State of Illinois, we must have a certified audit performed. The Association's budget has grown to more than \$250,000. When a notfor-profit organization has a budget in excess of \$250,000 in operating expenses, the Attorney General wants to be sure that everything is on the up and up. The state requires a certified audit. In January, the Board of Directors voted to hire the firm of Arnold N. Schorn & Co. to perform the audit. The firm will also be taking over the bookkeeping duties, which will make my job a little easier. The secretary-treasurer will still be responsible for check-writing, bank deposits, meeting minutes and other miscellaneous duties. I will keep the membership informed on the status of the audit.

Back in January, Don Ferreri and I attended the Strategic Chapter Planning Conference at the GCSAA headquarters. I must admit, I was NOT very excited about giving up part of my weekend to go to Lawrence, Kansas. I was mistaken. I found the conference to be extremely educational. Not only was it very interesting to see how other chapters operate, but I think Don and I discovered that the MAGCS is a very well-run chapter. Many chapters had difficulties with membership participation; for example, they could not get the minimum number of attendees to a chapter-sponsored GCSAA seminar.
